COLLEGE NOW AUTHORIZED
TO GRANT ALL CREDENTIALS

The College has received authorization from the Commission for Teacher Preparation and Licensing to process directly all teaching credentials which it is currently approved to issue. This means that credentials will actually be granted on campus directly to the candidate by the School of Education, which is expected to result in a saving of two to four months time which now exists between completion of the degree or program and receipt of the credential from Sacramento.

The new method of processing applies to all twelve credentials which are currently being offered by the School of Education.

Nathan Kravetz, Dean of the School of Education, states that he is very pleased with the additional delegation of authority granted by the Commission, which enables the College, one of five so authorized statewide, to issue a credential along with a degree. "Much of the credit goes to Debbie Sexton, Credentials Analyst, for having conducted the pilot program so well as to convince the Commission that we should receive this additional authorization."

The new time-saving procedure is an expansion of a pilot project which the College put into effect last year in which basic credentials only were issued. The success of that program made the College eligible to participate in the expanded version.

MICROCOMPUTER COURSE
TO BE ESTABLISHED
DUE TO N.S.F. GRANT

The fast-developing field of microcomputers will become a part of the College curriculum because of a \$13,600 grant from the National Science Foundation given for support of a project, "Development of a Microcomputer Laboratory in a Certificate Program."

F. F. Liu, Associate Professor of Physics, will direct the project, which will be aimed at preparing students for the wave of the future which is predicted to be changed by the technological advance of microcomputers, expected to be in common use in about five years. Dr. Liu states that small computers might well revolutionize our lives - by use in home appliances, cars, home entertainment, even robots (who will have computer-hearts).

The grant will permit the College to establish a microcomputer laboratory course with many small computers and accessories, probably to be offered in the Winter Quarter of 1979. Students taking the course will be prepared psychologically and technically for the job market of the future. The course will be made a part of the current certificate program in Computers and Programming.

The College will match the funds granted by the N.S.F., as part of the provisions of the grant.

LECTURE ON DANGEROUS CRIMINALS HERE MAY 3 "Dangerous Criminals: Who Are They and What Can We Do About Them" will be the topic of a lecture offered on campus Wednesday, May 3, by a visiting professor of sociology from Ohio State U.

Dr. Simon Dinitz, author of numerous publications on crime and mental health, will speak at 8 p.m. in PS-10. The College and outside community are invited to attend free of charge.

Dr. Dinitz has recently done considerable research in the area of criminology and has published several books on the topic, based on findings of that study, according to David Shichor, Lecturer in Sociology, who arranged the talk.
