word that his entry in the 1978 California-Hawaii Biennial Art Exhibit was selected for display in the San Diego Fine Arts Gallery in the 20th century artists permanent collection. The painting, "Arizona Cactus," was purchased by the gallery for \$600.

Other examples of his unusual work, similar to the San Diego piece, will be on display in Gallery 2, beginning Monday, June 5. His exhibit, "Airbrush Realism," will continue through June 19.

An opening reception is set for Monday evening, June 5, from 7 to 9 a.m. The College and all interested community members are invited to attend.



Most of Mr. Aguilar's works are over-sized close-up views which could pass for enlarged photographs. His work is done in acrylic on canvas with an airbrush which allows a free-flowing, soft effect. It is a relatively new concept in painting. The Gallery 2 exhibit is on desert plants.
