DEAN AND DEPT. CHAIR APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED

Six department chairmen and one school dean have been reappointed and four new department chairmen have been named, all to become effective with the 1979-80 academic year.

A new chair appointment was also made in the Department of Nursing. Mary Patterson, Professor of Nursing, will head the Department of Nursing, effective this quarter and continue through 1979-80. Dr. Patterson joined the College in Fall, 1977, coming from Cal State U, Fresno where she had served for ten years in various positions, ranging from Coordinator of Graduate Program in Nursing to Assistant to Dean for Health Professions and Chairman of the Department of Nursing.

Her other teaching experience was gained at the U of Hawaii, Cal State U, LA, and Cal State U, Long Beach. Her nursing experience includes seven years as Director of Nursing Services at Kaiser Foundation Hospital in Harbor City, Cedars of Lebanon Hospital and hospitals in Houston and New York. Dr. Patterson holds an Ed.D. from UCLA, an M.A. from New York U, and a B.S. from Columbia U. She has published nearly a score of articles dealing with public health and nursing.

Margaret Gibbs, newly appointed Chairman of the Department of Public Administration, has a wide background of experience in that field. She has held a number of elective offices, including her current term as a member of the Board of Trustees of Citrus Community College, of which she is former president and a six-year veteran. She is also president of the Citrus College Foundation and for eight years served as Claremont City Councilman. Other posts include serving on the boards of public libraries, recreation and youth service councils, delinquency prevention and planning commissions, parks and recreation commissions, and many others.

Dr. Gibbs' specialization is in policy formulation, local government and organization and management. In this area she has served as consultant to small jurisdictions and conducted workshops in ethics in public service, women in administrative positions and community organizations. Joining the College in 1975 as

associate professor, she has taught at USC, Claremont Colleges and high schools. She earned her B.A. and M.A. from USC and her Ph.D. in Government at Claremont Graduate School.

The Department of Economics will be headed by Thomas J. Pierce, Assistant Professor, who joined the College in 1976. Dr. Pierce specializes in the area of public finance and monetary economics. He earned his B.A. from La Salle College and his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in Economics at the U of Notre Dame, where he taught before coming to the CSCSB campus. Dr. Pierce is currently working on a project for computer-assisted instruction in the principles of micro-economics. He is co-founder and member of the board of directors of the Western Tax Association.

Robert M. O'Brien, Associate Professor, will serve as Chairman of the Department of Sociology. He came to CSCSB in 1974 and earned his M.A. and Ph.D. from the U of Wisconsin. He holds a B.A. in psychology from Pomona College. Dr. O'Brien has served as a research consultant for the Credit Union National Association and Foster Homes Research Project, both in Madison. He also has worked as an affiliate for the Institute for Economic Science in Beograd, Yugoslavia and the Institute for Sociology and Philosophy in Ljubljana, Yugoslavia. Prior to coming to the College, he served as a lecturer at the U of Wisconsin.

Edward Erler has been named as Chairman of the Department of Political Science. Dr. Erler, who joined the faculty in 1975, specializes in constitutional law and political theory. He has served as Pre-law Advisor since he came to the College. A graduate of San Jose State U, Dr. Erler earned his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees at Claremont Graduate School. Prior to his CSCSB teaching, he instructed at Cal State LA and San Jose State U. He is the author of a book, The Federalist Concordance, with Thomas Engeman, to be published by Wesleyan University Press, and over a dozen other articles and publications.

Reappointments include Ward M. McAfee as Dean of the School of Social and Behavioral Sciences.

Other reappointments are for the following department chairs: Robert G. Stein, Mathematics; Ronald E. Barnes, Theatre Arts; Jorun B. Johns, Foreign Languages; Arthur A. Moorefield, Music; Amer El Ahraf, Health Sciences; and Jack F. McDonnell, Business Administration.

\$99,000 RECEIVED FROM GOVERNMENT TO COMPLETE MALL, ETC.

A check for \$99,000 has been received in the Chancellor's Office from the Federal Public Works Program earmarked for the College to complete the campus mall and two other projects. The funds come from a surplus remaining from the government's allocation to the College of \$500,000 in 1977 for installation of the storm drain along North Park Blvd.

Vice President J. K. Thomas has been negotiating with the Regional Office of Public Works in Seattle for release of the funds. Approval was received to use the money for completing the mall, which will involve adding amendments to the soil and hydromulching (seeding with Manhattan rye, which is similar to the grass in the main entry), providing about six acres of additional playing fields for the P.E. area immediately south the the existing field. This will involve major grading, irrigation and planting. Also scheduled for construction is a small storm drain installation north of the Library which will empty the standing rain water which is known on campus as Nelson's Lake.

Plans are nearly completed for all three improvements, and following approval from the Office of State Architects, the contractor currently working on the construction of the new parking lot will undertake the additional work at the same time.
