J.C. ROBINSON NAMED
NEW ASSOCIATE DEAN

J. C. Robinson, Associate Professor of History, has been appointed Associate Dean of Academic Affairs, effective September 1, President John M. Pfau has announced.

Dr. Robinson will take over the duties of the position held by Robert A. Lee since 1973. Dr. Lee will return to the classroom on a full-time basis.

The new associate dean will be responsible for administering faculty personnel programs, including faculty evaluation, appointment of part-time lecturers, administration of faculty leave and development programs and representation of the College in faculty grievance and disciplinary matters.

A native of Colombia, Dr. Robinson joined the CSCSB History Department in 1971. His principal teaching field is in Contemporary Latin America. Since 1976 he has served as Coordinator of the College's Ethnic Studies Program. He is a member of the American Historical Association, Latin American Research Association, Conference on Latin American History, Pacific Coast Conference on Latin American Studies and Southwest Labor Studies Association. He presently serves as consultant to the San Bernardino County Museum in the development of a film on Mexican Americans and a manual to interpret the historical heritage of the museum's displays.

Dr. Robinson, who graduated from Columbia Union College in Maryland, earned

his master's and doctor's degrees in history from Indiana University. He has received special grants for Latin American Studies.

ENERGY INSTITUTE
BEING HELD HERE

Two chemistry professors, Lee Kalbus and Kenneth Mantei, assisted by Dominic Bulgarella, sociology, in cooperation with the Office of Continuing Education, have combined, under the sponsorship of the Southern California Edison Company, to offer a two-week energy institute on campus.

Currently 40 elementary and secondary school teachers from San Bernardino and Riverside counties are attending sessions on a scholarship basis. The program, entirely funded by the Edison Company, includes lectures, discussions and demonstrations. Also included are field trips to power-generating facilities, such as San Onofre, Castaic Hydro Electric Plant, Sylmar Power Converter Plant, and Etiwanda Fossil Fuel Plant.

DAN RATHER ON CAMPUS
FOR KHOKHLOV INTERVIEW

Dan Rather of the CBS 60 Minutes Show was on campus Wednesday to conduct a filmed interview with Nikolai Khokhlov, Professor of Psychology.

Also conducting an interview with Dr. Khokhlov at the same time was a representative of CBS' London branch, which is affiliated with BBC, who flew directly from London expressly for the filming, which took place in Dr. Khokhlov's lab.

The psychologist was questioned regarding his interpretation of the psychological and political implications of a series of recent actions against political dissidents residing in Britain and France. The possibility that such actions represent a new strategy on the part of the Soviet government in dealing with its political opponents was discussed by Dr. Khokhlov.

The campus interview was a follow-up of a similar one given by Dr. Khokhlov to the BBC in London last February. The campus filming will be aired when the new season begins in September.
