DEFERRED COMPENSATION AVAILABLE ON YEAR-ROUND BASIS TO EMPLOYEES

beginning of the following month. A participant may make two such changes during any one calendar year.

A new ruling now makes it possible for employees to enroll in the State Deferred Compensation Plan in any month and deferrals will start on the beginning of the following month. A participant may make two such changes during any one calendar year.

The Deferred Compensation Plan is a program designed to give state employees the opportunity to set aside a portion of their income now. They will not pay taxes on that money until it is received later, during retirement, when taxes will normally be less.

Those already enrolled in the program may submit requests for amount changes, or may add a new investment plan at any time during the calendar year.

The state places the deferred income in one of three approved investment companies chosen by the employee: T. Rowe Price Growth Stock Fund, Inc. and Rowe Price New Income Fund, Inc. (shares of no-load mutual and bond fund), Great Western Savings and Loan (investments in a savings institution) and California Western States Life Insurance (fixed and variable annuities).

The amount of salary that can be deferred by any participant is limited to 25% of their annual compensation. Contact the Personnel Office for forms and information
