FINE ARTS BUILDING REMODELING GETS CLOSER TO REALIZATION

Following a second bid opening on September 11, it now appears that San Bernardino contractor, Eason Construction Inc., low bidder for the remodeling of the Fine Arts Building, may be able to begin work on the project within a month.

Favorable word is expected within two weeks from the State Department of Finance which would clear the way for the final award of the contract.

Eason's bid of \$218,500 is within funds available for the project. The high bidder was W. D. Bell, Inc. of Riverside, with \$236,822.

Remodeling of the Fine Arts Building, one of the three original structures on campus, will include enlargement of the Art Gallery, construction of faculty offices and studios for classes in painting and drawing, jewelry-making, weaving, printmaking, communications design, sculpture and woodworking. A photography dark-room will also be built.

More Faculty Leaves SHERRIE BARTELL NAMED ADMINISTRATIVE FELLOW

In addition to the sabbatical leaves announced last January for faculty, effective this academic year, a number of other faculty leaves have been granted.

Sherrie Bartell, Assistant Prof., Education, was named one of 19 Administrative Fellows in the CSUC system selected from among 51 nominations made by campus presidents. Dr. Bartell was granted leave from the College for the entire 1979-80 year.

Administrative Fellows are assigned to administrative or executive "mentors" at other campuses. Dr. Bartell has been assigned to assist Joan Greenway, Dean of Continuing Education at Cal Poly, Pomona. She will understudy the role and function of the deans of continuing education in the CSUC system. Other assignments will include conducting feasibility studies, sitting in on academic deans' councils, involvement with affirmative action programs.

Other faculty on leave during the year are: Dennis Ikenberry (Physics), continuation of partial leave of absence; John Fine (Sociology) extension of leave of absence through the academic year; L. Rickes Tilman (Administration), extension of leave of absence throughout the year; and Christopher O'Hare (Psychology), partial leave of absence for the year.

Ongaro is the new Director of the Children's Center.

Miss Ongaro comes to the College from Colorado where she was instrumental in helping pioneer the field of child care. There, she says, many mothers don't work and the child care field is not as important. In California, she adds, both parents generally work and child care is becoming a necessity.

She was one of the first graduates of the new early childhood degree program at U of Northern Colorado. Prior to coming to the College she was director of La Petite Academy in Northglenn, Colorado, where she was involved in all phases of the operation. She feels that here she will be able to devote herself full-time to being director of a children's center because many of the supportive tasks will be taken care of by the College.

Miss Ongaro has also served as a preschool and first grade teacher and has taught early childhood courses for adult education programs in her home state.

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In addition to being in charge of the residence education program and supervising the resident assistants Wayne Hutchins will assist Craig Henderson, Housing Director, with other administrative functions. The housing occupancy in Serrano Village has increased over ten percent from last year.

Mr. Hutchins has a B.A. in psychology from DePauw U, Indiana, and an M.A. from Bowling Green State U, Ohio. He has held positions in housing and served as coordinator of judicial affairs for the associated students, campus wide, at U of Tampa and Ashland College, Ohio, and has had additional experience in other areas of student affairs.

With an athletic background (he played basketball in college), the new assistant director has hopes of starting a basketball club on campus which will compete with the local recreational leagues in the community.

LEAVES COLLEGE**

Jim Arabatzis, the College's first Bookstore Manager, is leaving the College's service. Today is the last day for the veteran employee who first came to the College on September 1, 1965.

A luncheon in his honor is being held today at noon in the Student Union.

As manager of the Bookstore, which began with a donation from President Pfau and a \$7,000 loan from a bank, Mr. Arabatzis saw the operation expand three times its original size in its old location in the Fine Arts Building. In 1977 the Bookstore moved into its new building, all furnishings and the facility paid for by profits from the store. The operation now exceeds one-half million dollars in sales and has assets exceeding \$300,000.

Mr. Arabatzis has purchased the D. J. Restaurant in Hemet. Beginning the first of October he will take over its operation.
