MOST AMBITIOUS ART EXHIBIT EVER PRESENTED AT CAL STATE

One of the most ambitious art exhibits ever presented at Cal State, a survey of late 19th century symbolist art, will open tomorrow with a preview reception at 7 p.m. in the Gallery of the Fine Arts Building. On display through June 10, the exhibit covers a period of art history that is often overlooked.

"Symbolism, a European and American cultural movement in the last decades of the 19th century, explored the realms of dreams, imagination and hallucination in search of meaning and significance in art and literature," explained Dr. Julius Kaplan, chairman of the art department and organizer of the major exhibit.

Featured in the show are sculptures, paintings, drawings, pastels, water-colors, woodcuts, lithographs, drypoints, etchings and monotypes from an international gallery of 19th century artists. Works by Picasso, Redon and Gauguin and more are included.

In conjunction with the art exhibit, the first of a three-part lecture series exploring the art and literature of the period will be given by Dr. Kaplan Wednesday, April 30. The free lecture will begin at 12 noon in the multipurpose room of the Student Union.

In his talk, Dr. Kaplan will present an overview of late 19th century symbolist art. He will examine the commonalities among artists of the period and explore the variety of work that was created.

Gallery hours, which have been extended for the show, are: Mon.-Fri., 9-noon and 1-4:30 p.m., Mon.-Thurs., 7-9 p.m.; Sat. and Sun., 1-4 p.m. On Sunday, April 27, the Gallery will be open from 11 a.m.-5 p.m.

68 EVENTS PLANNED FOR OPEN HOUSE

It may not qualify as "the greatest show on earth," but Cal State's Open House this Sunday is going to be the biggest thing that has happened on campus in 15 years.

A total of 68 different events and activities is in store for visitors attending the 15th anniversary celebration. They are being conducted or sponsored by students, faculty and staff who have put in many hours of advance preparation and are planning to devote their Sunday to the Open House.

**LIBRARY EXHIBIT FEATURES
"BEST MADE" WESTERN BOOKS** An annual exhibit in the Cal State library is that of the best books printed, designed and published in the West during the previous year.

This show will once again go on display April 28 in the glass case on the first floor. More than 40 selections representing approximately two dozen publishing companies have been selected by the Rounce and Coffin Club, an informal group of printers, librarians and educators. The books in the collection have been judged as the "Best in the West" not for their content but, rather, their quality, explained John Tibbals, head of library external operations. "They are being recognized for their craftsmanship, quality of paper, binding and illustrations." The exhibit will be on display through May 23.

TO BE SHOWN TOMORROW NIGHT** A literary masterpiece, "Therese Desqueroix," by French novelist Francois Mauriac, put to film by George Franju in 1963, will be shown Saturday evening, April 26 as part of the continuing Foreign Film Festival. It will begin at 7 p.m. in the Lecture Hall of the Physical Sciences Building. Filmed in French with English subtitles, the picture tells the story of a young woman's struggle to find happiness and meaning in her life. Free.

**SPRING QUARTER ENROLLMENT
REPRESENTS INCREASE**

Reversing a four-year trend, spring quarter 1980 enrollment is up slightly over winter term. Census date figures show the current student body to consist of 4039 persons. This represents an increase of 13 over winter 1980 and 142 above spring 1979. Spring enrollment has been lower than winter each year since 1975. The FTE figure, which is important for budget computations, is 2967 for the present quarter. This is a slippage of 39 FTE from winter quarter but is still 131 higher than spring 1979.

**INTEREST CREDITING RATE
INCREASED BY P.E.R.S.**

The Board of Administration for the Public Employees' Retirement System has passed a resolution to increase the interest crediting rate from 6% to 6 3/4% effective July 1, 1980. The new rate will be used to compute member costs for redeposits of previously withdrawn contributions, service prior to membership and other kinds of public service for which members can voluntarily elect to continue. **STUDENT SERVICES FEE TO
INCREASE IN THE FALL**

The CSUC Board of Trustees has approved a \$4 per quarter increase in the student services fee, effective with the fall term. For colleges on the quarter system, the fee will become \$52 a term for students carrying 6.1 or more units and \$42 a quarter for students with 6 or fewer units. The annual fee for full-time students on both quarter and semester campuses will become \$156; part-time students will pay \$126 per year.
