JULY PAY STATUS MAY HINGE ON STATE BUDGET ADOPTION

Kenneth Cory, state controller, has sent a letter to all state employees warning that unless a state budget is adopted by July 1, no pay warrants will be issued, even on a retroactive basis, for work performed after July 1.

"The purpose of this notice is to inform you well in advance that no state warrants will be issued, even on a retroactive basis, for work performed on or after July 1, 1980, unless a Budget Act has been enacted. We simply cannot be put in the position of spending public money or incurring obligations when there is no legislative appropriation from the Treasury," he writes.

"The individuals who work during this period will do so at their own extreme risk of not being paid--even on a retroactive basis," Cory said.

The state has begun several fiscal years in the recent past without a budget approved by the Legislature and governor.

The college also has received interpretive information from D. Dale Hanner, vice chancellor for business affairs, who has been in contact with the state controller's office.

Hanner said employees in academic year positions who receive twelve checks for an academic year's work will not be affected by the controller's statement. "The reason for this is because the services were rendered by academic year employees prior to June 30."

"For employees who work on a fiscal year basis, the situation is not as clear. However, we intend to maintain close contact with the controller's office to pursue our employees' interests," Hanner notified the colleges.

Copies of Cory's letter and Hanner's memorandum will be distributed to college employees with today's paychecks.

ART PROF EXHIBITS SHOW IN L.A. GALLERY Don Woodford, professor of art at Cal State, will be exhibiting a collection of work in the Baum Silverman Gallery at 8225 Santa Monica Blvd., Los Angeles June 4-July 5. He will be joined by four other Southern California artists, all contributing work for the show titled "Cardboard Art." An opening reception for the artists will be June 7 from 3-5 p.m. Woodford's contributions to the show are primarily wall reliefs built out of cardboard and wood, "generally from material you would throw away," he said. "The pieces are organized in geometric patterns with a subtle color and textural relationship and set on a dark field."

JAZZ ENSEMBLE AND DIXIELAND BAND TO GIVE FINAL CONCERT The final concert of the Jazz Ensemble and Dixieland Band will be offered Wednesday, June 4. The free program will begin at 8:15 p.m. In the Recital Hall. Favorites such as "Bourbon Street Parade," "Bill Bailey," "Can't Give You Anything But Love," "Basie Straight Ahead," "Tribute to the Duke," and many more will be played. Both musical groups are directed by Keating Johnson.

AREA HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS TO BE PART OF THEATRE WORKSHOP Students from 11 area high schools will be on campus Saturday to participate in the 10th annual Cal State-hosted Theatre Workshop. The all-day event will begin at 8:30 a.m. in the Theatre. Each school will perform a 20-minute scene to be critiqued by a panel of judges. The panel includes: Dr. Art Sheppard, chair of the theatre arts department at Chaffee College; Linda Wolverton, assistant producer in children's programming at CBS; and Dr. Ronald Barnes, chair of Cal State's theatre arts department. Although seating will be limited, the presentations may be viewed by interested persons at no charge. Dr. Amanda Sue Rudisill is coordinating the event.

FINAL FOREIGN FILM PRESENTS "YANCO" The final presentation of the Cal State Foreign Film Festival will be tomorrow evening at 7 p.m. "Yanco," winner of 16 International Film Festival awards, will be shown at no charge in the Lecture Hall of the Physical Sciences Building. The film is the tale of an eight-year-old boy who often takes refuge on a deserted river island to play his home-made violin. A simple and poignant story, "Yanco" is told with a minimum of background conversation and some very effective acting and photography.

MOZART WORK TO HIGHLIGHT WIND ENSEMBLE CONCERT The 24-member Wind Ensemble will offer a concert of works ranging from Mozart to John Barnes Chance Sunday, June 1. The free program will begin at 8:15 p.m. in the Recital Hall. A highlight of the evening will be the octet version of "The Marriage of Figaro," considered one of Mozart's most popular operas.
