## ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM REACCREDITED

Sanitarian Registration Certification.

The environmental health and safety program, a component of the B.S. in health science, has been re-accredited for a three-year period by the State Department of Health Services Advisory Committee on

The maximum accreditation was awarded after an on-site visit, including extensive review of curriculum, interviews with faculty, students and administration, plus scrutiny of space and facilities.

For CSCSB graduates, accreditation of the program means they need spend only one year as an assistant sanitarian before being admitted to the state registration examination. Otherwise, they must have two years of experience before applying for registration.

Cal State, San Bernardino is the smallest and the youngest of the eight California institutions having accredited programs.

## RUSSIAN VIOLINIST TO LAUNCH CONCERT SERIES

An international award-winning violinist, Irina Tseitlin, will launch the new concert series at Cal State, San Bernardino with a recital Wednesday evening, Oct. 1. The program will begin at 8:15 p.m. in the Recital Hall.

The first of a 14-concert season to be presented at the college, the program by Ms. Tseitlin will feature the works of Brahms, Chausson, Ravel, Paganini and Barkauskas. Her accompanist will be Yuri Lotakov.

A Russian emigre of four years, Irina Tseitlin has been recognized internationally since she was 16 years old and won first place in the International Music Festival Competition in Budapest, Hungary. Since that time she has received numerous other coveted awards and has toured throughout Europe, Russia, and the United States.

In the United States she has performed with the Los Angeles Philharmonic under Zubin Mehta and has been heard in the Bach Double Concerto with Pincus Zucerman.

Tickets for the concert are \$2 for general admission; \$1 for students and children. Single admission tickets, as well as season tickets for the 14-concert series, may be purchased at the door the evening of the recital.

## GASTON LACHAISE EXHIBIT TO OPEN 1980-81 GALLERY SEASON

An exhibit of sculpture and drawings by Gaston Lachaise, considered one of the most important modern artists of the 1920's and 1930's, will be on display in the Gallery of the Visual Arts Building Oct. 13-Nov. 24. An opening reception will be held on Saturday evening, Oct. 11 from 7-10 p.m. in the Gallery.

Approximately 27 bronzes and 23 drawings are contained in the show which is being organized by Dr. Julius Kaplan, chairman of the art department.

Lachaise established himself as one of the most important artists of the 1920's and 1930's with his one-man show, which was the first from a living artist at the Museum of Modern Art in New York. Before that he exhibited in the 1913 Armory Show, the first large and controversial exhibit of modern European and American art in this country which put modern art on the map.

The works of Lachaise are based largely on his obsession for his wife. The images of her ample, well-endowed physique dominate his sculpture and drawings.

Lachaise's early art is characterized by smooth, machine-like surfaces showing a definite connection to art deco. By the 1930's his work had turned to more expressive exaggeration of the human anatomy and rougher surfaces. Examples of his early style and later change is displayed in the exhibit.

Gallery hours for this major show will be 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 3 p.m., Monday through Friday; 7 to 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday; and 1 to 4 p.m., Saturday and Sunday.

## READING CLINIC TO BE OFFERED

A special 9-week clinic designed to help students in grades 1-12 with reading problems will be offered by the School of Education beginning Saturday, Oct. 4.

Applications for the clinic will be accepted through Oct. 15. To apply, parents should call 887-7781 or 887-7571. Children of Cal State students, faculty and staff are eligible to apply.

Students accepted for assistance will receive 45-minute appointments on eight consecutive Saturdays through Nov. 22. A fee of \$15 per student will be charged.

The service is provided by graduate students working toward their teaching credential. Director of the program is Dr. James Doyle, lecturer in education.

APPROVED BY STATE**

Applicants for Israel, which is a part-time appointment, are being sought for 1981-82 and 1982-83.

Qualifications include: appointment to the faculty or academic administrative staff of a California State University or College; possession of a terminal degree and some actual overseas experience; ability to write the relevant language; ability to administer and coordinate all aspects of the International Programs at the study center abroad. It is also desirable that the applicant have had experience in expending and accounting for state funds.

## LIBRARY EXHIBIT FOCUSES ON NOTABLE BLACK WOMEN

A Smithsonian Institution exhibition focusing on black women who have contributed to the development of this country will be displayed in the Cal State Library Oct. 4-Nov. 2.

Titled "Black Women: Achievements Against the Odds," the exhibit illustrates achievements and contributions of both known personalities and little recognized black women. It was researched and developed by the Anacostia Neighborhood Museum of the Smithsonian Institution.

Included in the show are women such as Maggie Lena Walker, the first black to serve as a U.S. bank president; Nikki Giovanni, writer of poetry and nonfiction; and Billie Holiday, noted blues singer.

The exhibit is divided into major sections: literature, medicine, civil rights, education, law and the judiciary, business, industry and inventions, fine arts, performing arts, armed forces and the government. The stories of more than 150 women unfold through the biographical and historical text, photographs and silkscreened illustrations.
