A study in the New England Journal

of Medicine concludes that Black patients and white patients are to a large extent treated by different physicians. The doctors treating Black patients may be less well-trained clinically and are less likely to have the resources that would allow them to provide extensive evaluations, specialists referrals and diagnostic imaging. The latest findings researchers say contribute to a dramatic

difference in the quality of care given to Black patients versus their white counterparts.

Years ago the findings would have shocked those attempting to understand why health outcomes are so drastically different for Blacks and whites. Winston Price, MD, a New York pediatrician, is the new president of the National Medical Association (NMA), the

nation's leading professional organization for Black doctors. He says the findings represent a fresh spin on an old problem. "The U.S. healthcare system is a broken behemoth of Titanic proportions. A reality the NMA has been trying to tell the American public for many years." Price notes that the nation's flawed Medicare program and the reality of 44 million uninsured Americans

are clear signals that the country is headed on a disastrous course. He says the disease of inequality has festered in the U.S. healthcare system for decades. "Not only has there been a history of inequality but significant inequality persists." The result he says is widespread disparity in the health outcomes of Blacks and other persons of color. "This is a top down systemic problem that affects Americans as a whole and Blacks and other minorities in particular."

Researchers from Memorial Sloan-

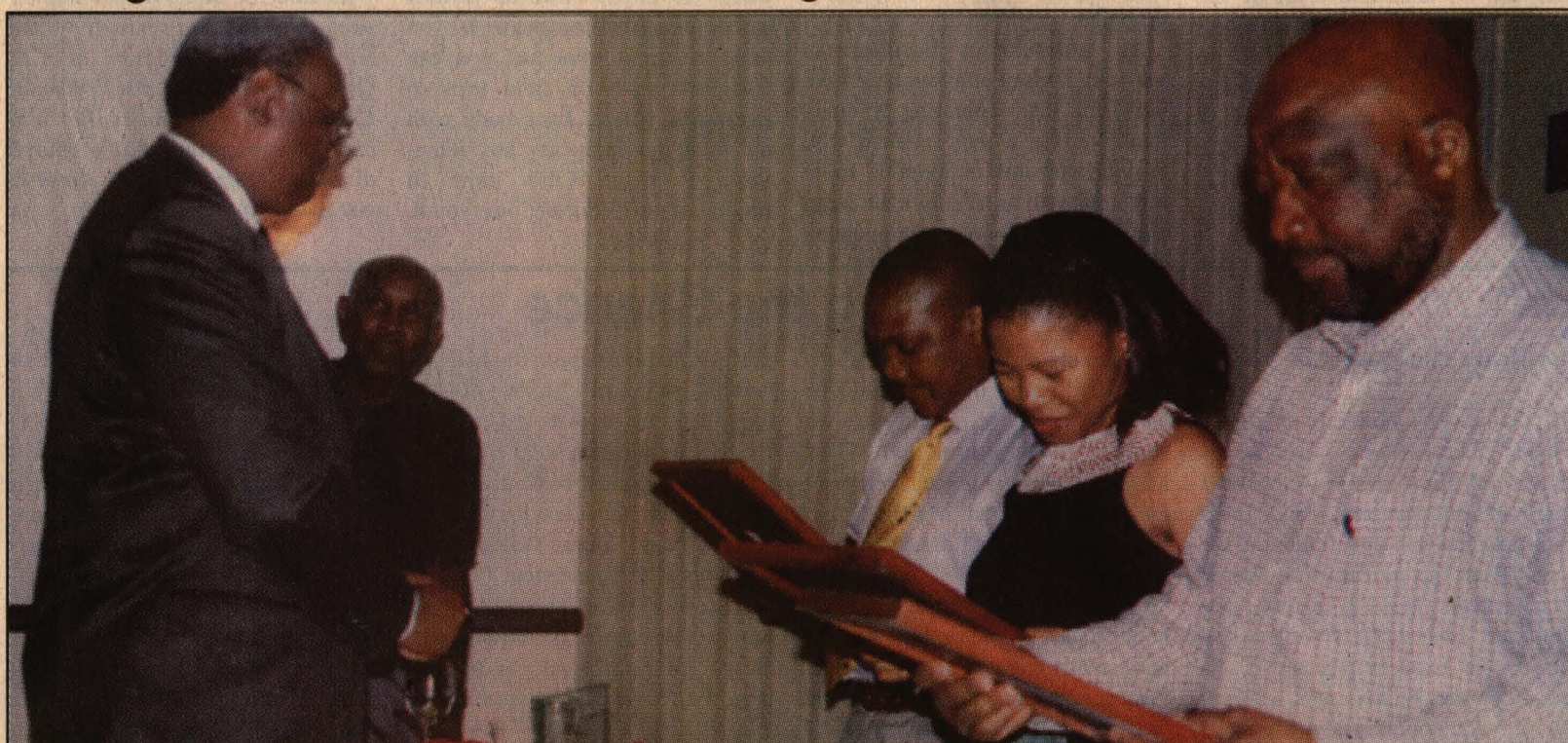

Kettering Center in New York and the Center for Studying Health System Change, a Washington based policy research group, examined data from 150,391 routine doctor visits by Black and white Medicare patients to 4,355

Three delegates from Pietermaritzburg, South Africa (Mazusi Msimang, Thabani Zulu, and Pam Zulu) visited Riverside with the hopes of establishing a Sister City International relationship. Sister Cities International (SCI) offers its members several unique programs designed to assist, enhance, and grow their sister city programs. SCI is a non-profit citizen diplomacy network creating and strengthening partnerships between the U.S. and international communities in an effort to increase global cooperation at the municipal level, to promote cultural understanding, and to stimulate economic development.

Riverside Mayor Ron Loveridge said he is prepared to initiate the next step. "We will follow the sister city protocol and work out the arrangements," he said as he reflected on a 1998 attempt to become a Sister City with South Africa that

fell through.

Mrs. Pam Zulu who has a keen sense of the world around her said that she knows, "South Africa's history of oppression will make the rest of the world love them for only a short time. Therefore, South Africa must continue to work towards being of use to the rest of the world." Mrs. Zulu also said that, "We must work now, if children are to have a future later, and no matter what obstacles are placed in the way, South Africa shall prevail."

Thabani Zulu who was imprisoned for working to better his people's lives, knows from first hand experience that if one is not sure of ones own attitudes toward a problem it is impossible to resolve the problem. He cautioned the audience to remember that, "If we work from different directions we will never reach our goals." Mr. Zulu also warns that, "Money is not everything, our united cause must be for the betterment of the people."

Mr. Mazusi Msimang, a city councilman representing the mayor of Pietermaritzburg, in language both poetic and rhythmic alluded to the incidents of misdeeds used by whites to hinder the progress of Blacks in his country. Despite conflicts of the past, Mr. Msimang said he, "Looks forward to the inevitable interchange of ideas that will be derived from the "Sister City"

Report Released on Casa Blanca Shooting

Last year, two White Riverside Police Department officers shot an African-American man to death in Casa Blanca.

Now, over 15 months later, the Community Police Review Commission is preparing to release what it called, its most thorough public report of an officer-involved shooting.

However, missing from that report would be the statement given by one of the involved officers, who refused to be interviewed during the criminal investigation of the shooting.

In response, commissioners have voted against issuing the report as it stands and are focusing instead on getting more answers from that officer.

On July 28, the CPRC took the unusual step of placing a motion to exercise its subpoena power on the table. The motion to subpoena Officer Tina Banfill was the first of its kind during the commission's four year existence.

tence. It was proposed along with another motion to invite Banfill to appear before the panel to answer questions about the shooting.

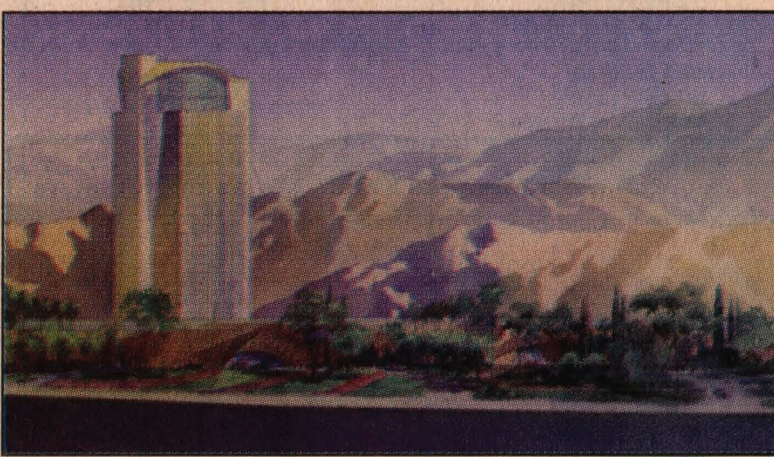
Commissioner Gloria Huerta's motions were soon tabled after Executive Director Don Williams instead proposed that the commission send Banfill a written invitation to meet with a private investigator retained by the CPRC instead.

Banfill's refusal to be interviewed by the Officer-Involved-Shooting team also catalyzed the Riverside Police Officers Association to file a lawsuit last year in Riverside County Superior Court against the city, the department and Chief Russ Leach, for injunctive relief.

In its lawsuit, the RPOA alleged that the policy which mandates the investigations of on-duty shootings was unfairly applied against officers. Leach, in a phone interview last year, said that the policy in question was one that the RPOA and the city had agreed to, several times the latest being in April 2002.

Morongo Casino, Resort & Spa Looks to Recruit

As construction on the new, \$250 million Morongo Casino, Resort & Spa nears completion, the Morongo human resources department is looking to Riverside, San Bernardino and Los Angeles counties to fill approximately 1,000 new staff positions, which will bring the total number of employees at the new resort to 2,400. Morongo's human resources department will host

two job fairs on August 16-17 and 21 and September 13-14 to recruit qualified candidates for various positions including entry-level food and beverage services, housekeeping, and porters to mid- and upper-management positions in the hotel, spa and casino.

The California Employment Development Department cited a 5.8% unemployment rate in June in both San Bernardino and Riverside counties. The new jobs created by the Morongo Casino, Resort & Spa will not only reduce the unemployment rate, but will provide a significant boost to the local economy – an estimated \$2.8 billion in jobs and economic benefits over the next five years.

Companies Combat Low Hiring Rates Among Blacks in Technology

Like many careers, the industry of Information Technology (IT) has a legion of qualified professionals from various ethnic backgrounds. But some companies have experienced difficulty

in attracting - and sometimes retaining - African-American IT professionals.

Sempra Energy Solutions based in San Diego, Calif. ranks at number 257 on the Forbes 2004 Fortune 500 list. In addition, the company earned the third spot on Forbes' list of America's Best Companies for Minorities. Of the company's 13,000 employees, about 9.9 percent are African-American.

But the company falls shorter among African-Americans within its three IT organizations nationwide, comprised of 678 employees. About 47 of its IT professionals - 6.9 percent - are African-American.

Lenolia Nichols, an African-

American IT manager for Sempra's subsidiary company Southern California Gas, said Sempra's reputation was the sole reason she joined the company 25 years ago. "They had a good image in the community ... a good profile. It was something I definitely considered," she said.

Nichols says the company does not provide any particular accommodations, similar to other companies, for her based upon her ethnicity.

Sempra attempts to reach all potential employees, regardless of a candidate's ethnic background, however, the furthest extent it goes to specifically recruit African-Americans is routinely

visiting Howard University in Washington D.C. during career fairs.

According to Denise Dayton, employee services administrator for Audiovox Corporation headquartered in New York, N.Y., the electronics manufacturer uses general methods to hire its employees, including potential IT professionals. In addition, the company does not maintain a proactive initiative to hire any specific minority group. Of the 25 IT workers employed with Audiovox, only four are African-Americans.

Audiovox's Vice-President of IT Services, Rick Maddia, declined to

Rep. Waters: The Administration's Budget Neglects the Needs of Veterans

There are over 26 million veterans living in the United States, 2.3 million of them live in California. Our veterans sacrificed their dreams, their plans and, often, they sacrificed their bodies so that the rest of us may live in freedom. We owe them a great deal. The President often says that he supports our veterans. Yet, a close look at President Bush's record reveals that he has consistently opposed policies that would help our veterans.

Since taking office, the President and Republicans in Congress, have tried to limit veterans' access to health care. They have consistently underfunded the Department of

FY 2005 budget request was \$1.2 billion below the amount that even the Administration's Secretary of Veterans' Affairs says is needed to maintain current services. The amount sought by the President is \$2.5 billion short of what veterans groups have recommended.

To add insult to injury, House Republicans last year broke their promise to veterans to add an additional \$1.8 billion for health care to the 2005 budget and, instead, in their Budget Resolution they actually voted to cut funding for veterans' health care by \$14 billion over ten years. Included in

these cuts was funding which would have added staff to reduce the enormous backlog in processing veterans' disability claims. For the past two years, an average of 14,000 veterans have been waiting more than 15 months for their "expedited" disability claims to be finalized, but, without the additional staff, it will be impossible to ease this wait. Fortunately, under pressure from Democrats, the Republicans backed off these dramatic cuts, but the VA's budget remains seriously underfunded.

In addition, for the fourth consecutive year, the President's budget pro-

posed new increases in the cost of veterans' health care by doubling drug co-payments and imposing enrollment fees for certain veterans. Fortunately, Democrats were able to defeat these efforts.

Unfortunately, the Republican's failed record on veterans issues does not stop there. For several years, there has been overwhelming, bi-partisan support to end the 'Disabled Veterans Tax,' the practice of taxing disabled veterans \$1 in retirement benefits for every dollar they receive in disability benefits. However, Republicans refused to join Democrats in immedi-

ately repealing the disabled veterans tax. Instead, they passed a bill which repealed the tax over ten years. But, as always, the devil is in the details. The Republican plan to repeal the so-called "concurrent receipt" disabled veterans tax fails to include 400,000 disabled military retirees. The Republican plan also makes one-third of the veterans that they do cover wait ten years before these veterans can collect full benefits.

It appears that the President has no intention of changing his ways. In fact, should he be reelected, the cuts proposed by the President for veterans in

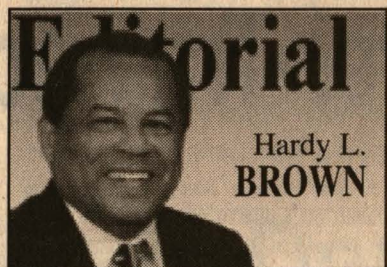

They came seeking employment and better living conditions, one in which their government did not give them at home.

We have opened our doors and forced overcrowded classrooms, we have built more schools, hired more teachers and support staff, we have given free lunch for those who qualify, we have denied some citizens employment because they do not speak the required language necessary to communicate with their children, we have given healthcare services to those children who need the care, we have provided free transportation, we have gone to extra expense to provide materials in their native language, we have provided extra classroom tutorial services and now you want to turn over the control of the district to them.

Reverend Jesse Jackson is a much sought after speaker because he has something worthy to say. Have you ever been in a school auditorium when Reverend Jackson spoke to the youth? Reverend Jackson has the audience repeat the phrase, "I am somebody." He instills, "I am somebody," into their subconscious. Then he goes on to say, "I may not have a fine home, but, I am, somebody! My mother may not buy me everything I desire, but... I am, somebody!" Then at other times he would chant, "Down with dope...Up with hope!" That's the kind of fire every concerned, mature adult must instill into the minds of our youth who claim the 'Streets' as their fraternity.

Being rebellious is a part of growing up. I realize that a lot of our youth consider themselves bucking the status quo by claiming to be from the streets. Most of them don't truly mean any harm. Unfortunately, gangs don't recruit college graduates and highly intelligent people, because they know it could be a waste of time. Street recruiters must seek the dropouts.

An independent businessman with hundreds of employees is more powerful than operating a crack house. Being a married man who provides for his children is more threatening to an enemy than being a player with a lot of children eating

off food stamps. A political figure is more powerful than a gang member with an automatic weapon. Sitting in a school classroom not learning anything is exactly what a racist loves to see in a Black youth. They're glad to know Black youth are selling dope and are envied by many other Black youths. Such a youth is no threat to the continued downward spiral of Black people. Quite to the contrary, such a youth is driving the bus of mass genocide.

It doesn't take a government program or grant from a charitable source to put our heads together and develop a plan to help our children. Too many are on their way to hell. Regardless of what business skills or creative talents you have, you can share your expertise with a youth. It might open up a new career direction for them. If you have a van or mini bus you can transport youth on field trips to interesting places. Everybody with the heart for humanity has something to offer. Let's unite in fundraisers to educate our youth.

Joe Louis once said, regarding money, "I don't love money, it just calms my nerves." So out of respect for the late great Joe Louis, let's raise enough funds to calm our nerves.

For youth to claim to be from the streets is not a legacy worth clinging to. It is an affiliation to a dead end. However, such a boast is common among youth in search of a deeper meaning to their life. If you ever encounter such a young man or woman, take a moment and share the love of God with them. If they are receptive, invite them to your church and begin to show the love that God commanded of us. If you're not a member of a church, I extend an invitation to visit mine.

Breaking the Silence

"Go into any inner-city neighborhood," Barack Obama said in his keynote address to the Democratic National Convention, "and folks will tell you that government alone can't teach kids to learn. They know that parents have to parent, that children can't achieve unless we raise their expectations and eradicate the slander that says a Black youth with a book is acting White." In a speech filled with rousing applause lines, it was a line that many Black Democratic delegates found especially galvanizing. Not just because they agreed, but because it was a home truth they'd seldom heard a politician say out loud.

Why has it been so difficult for Black leaders to say such things in public, without being pilloried for "blaming the victim"? Why the huge flap over Bill Cosby's insistence that Black teenagers do their homework, stay in school, master standard English and stop having babies? Any Black person who frequents a barbershop or beauty parlor in the inner city knows that Mr. Cosby was only echoing sentiments widely shared in the Black community.

"If our people studied calculus like we studied basketball," my father, age 91, once remarked as we drove past a packed inner-city basketball court at midnight, "we'd be running M.I.T." When my brother and I were growing up in the 50's,

our parents convinced us that the "Blackest" thing that we could be was a doctor or a lawyer. We admired Hank Aaron and Willie Mays, but our real heroes were people like Thurgood Marshall, Dr. Benjamin Mays and Mary McLeod Bethune.

Yet in too many Black neighborhoods today, academic achievement has actually come to be stigmatized. "We are just not the same people anymore," says the mayor of Memphis, Dr. Willie W. Herenton. "We are worse off than we were before Brown v. Board," says Dr. James Comer, a child psychiatrist at Yale. "And a large part of the reason for this is that we have abandoned our own Black traditional core values, values that sustained us through slavery and Jim Crow segregation."

Making it, as Mr. Obama told me, "requires diligent effort and deferred gratification. Everybody sitting around their kitchen table knows that."

"Americans suffer from anti-intellectualism, starting in the White House," Mr. Obama went on. "Our people can least afford to be anti-intellectual." Too many of our children have come to believe that it's easier to become a Black professional athlete than a doctor or lawyer. Reality check: according to the 2000 census, there were more than 31,000 Black physicians and surgeons, 33,000 Black lawyers and 5,000 Black dentists. Guess how many Black athletes are playing

professional basketball, football and baseball combined. About 1,400. In fact, there are more board-certified Black cardiologists than there are Black professional basketball players. "We talk about leaving no child behind," says Dena Wallerson, a sociologist at Connecticut College. "The reality is that we are allowing our own children to be left behind." Nearly a third of Black children are born into poverty. The question is, why?

Scholars such as my Harvard colleague William Julius Wilson say that the causes of Black poverty are both structural and behavioral. Think of structural causes as "the devil made me do it," and behavioral causes as "the devil is in me." Structural causes are faceless systemic forces, like the disappearance of jobs. Behavioral causes are self-destructive life choices and personal habits. To break the conspiracy of silence, we have to address both of these factors.

"A lot of us," Mr. Obama argues, "hesitate to discuss these things in public because we think that if we do so it lets the larger society off the hook. We're stuck in an either/or mentality - that the problem is either societal or it's cultural."

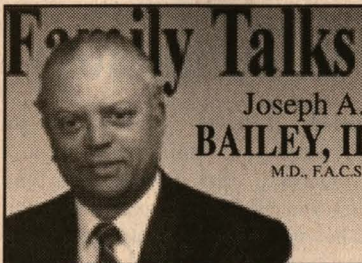
It's important to talk about life chances - about the constricted set of opportunities that poverty brings. But to treat Black people as if they're helpless rag dolls swept up and buffeted by vast social trends - as if they had no say in the shaping of their lives - is a supreme act of

condescension. Only 50 percent of all Black children graduate from high school; an estimated 64 percent of Black teenage girls will become pregnant. (Black children raised by female "householders" are five times as likely to live in poverty as those raised by married couples.) Are white racists forcing Black teenagers to drop out of school or to have babies?

Mr. Cosby got a lot of flak for complaining about children who couldn't speak standard English. Yet it isn't a derogation of the Black vernacular - a marvelously rich and inventive tongue - to point out that there's a language of the marketplace, too, and learning to speak that language has generally been a precondition for economic success, whoever you are. When we let Black youth become monolingual, we've limited their imaginative and economic possibilities.

These issues can be ticklish, no question, but they're badly served by silence or squeamishness. Mr. Obama showed how to get the balance right. We've got to create as many opportunities as we can for the worst-off - and "make sure that every child in America has a decent shot at life." But values matter, too. We can't talk about the choices people have without talking about the choices people make.

One of my medical school classmates asked the instructor why so many questions were repeated on the final examination year after year. His response: "In medicine, the questions don't change but the answers do." The same can be said about philosophy. The English word "philosophy" originated in Kamit (Egypt) as "seba" (wisdom) and millennia later was translated into Greek as "Sophia," loving wisdom (Asante, African Intellectual Heritage p. 259). For Africans, Wisdom is the ability to intuit the will of God and then make what is thought, felt, expressed, and done to be in harmony with God's will (Amen, Metu, Neter p. 86). Otherwise, philosophy deals with life-shaping values concerning profound things that underlie human and supernatural life. For this reason, philosophy is called "the mother of the sciences." The world's original philosophers came from three waves of Africans. Primitive Africans inquired into and devised explanations for the

profound events occurring in their lives -- things like natural disasters, crops, birth, death. The second wave were those Africans, perhaps 60,000 years ago, who were concerned about reaching the "Heaven Afterlife." The later arriving third wave of Africans brought in different types of philosophies that had God at its core and Order as its structure. Both were well formed by 7500 BC, perhaps by the Black Egyptian Hermes Trismegistus.

Originally called Tehuti and later Thoth (pronounced T-ho-t, with three syllables), he crystallized African philosophy by saying that God is a "Big Mind" who creates all and maintains the cosmos in beautiful order. His basic philosophy is that each individual ought to undergo "rebirth" by the actual transformation of human consciousness into divine consciousness. To reach this state of spiritual enlightenment involves the pursuit of what lies beyond one's physical mortal existence. This pursuing of answers to the transcendental (stepping from human consciousness into divine consciousness) questions of life is the way to "know thyself." The "know thyself" search is called Mystical Philosophy. To "know

self" is to have insight into one's own divine nature and that insight provides one with a new way to look at life. The process for "knowing thyself" -- i.e. first known in the world as Egyptian Yoga -- is the highest of all philosophical systems. Incidentally, Yoga was developed first in Egypt (Kamit) (Ashby, African Origins p. 88, 54, 211, 585). Mystical (Ritual) philosophy literature includes the Egyptian Book of Coming Forth By Day (c 10,000-5,000 BCE), the Coffin Texts (c 2040-1786 BCE), and the Papyrus Texts (c 1580 BCE).

The Memphite Theology, a unique form of the Kamitan (Egyptian) religion, is highly philosophical. By emphasizing those forms of intellectual development that lead towards intuition realization of the nature of self (Ashby p. 217, 540), it says the world is composed of neteru - divine energy (cosmic forces) -- that constitute all physical phenomenon. One of these neterus, the god Ptah, emerged from a primeval ocean and created order in the universe by his will and the power of thought (mind). The gods and goddesses (who are Ptah's thoughts) go on to form the elements of nature and the cosmic

forces that maintain nature (Ashby p. 217, 540). These effects are the result of Ptah's thoughts being transformed into "word" (i.e. vibrations). Such harmonious fashioning of the physical around the spiritual is analogous to a grand symphony in which every melody has been exquisitely combined to compose one magnificent order of harmony. From this Memphite myth came the African concept of Wholism. A third foundational philosophy is MAAT (love in action). Its theme is that the Supreme Spirit is in all God's creations and therefore, regardless of what one thinks, feels, says, or does, one is interacting with God. Maat is the path to promoting human order (i.e. displaying the right relations with and behaviors toward all human beings). With the appearance of human beings in need, Maat is displayed when one takes advantage of the opportunity to grow through selfless service -- and without developing resentment or taking attacks personally. Maat is the way to develop purity of heart (Ashby p. 204, 201, 558).

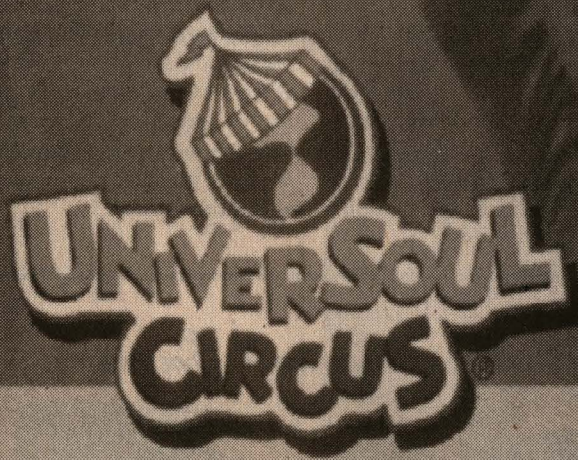

Banfill had agreed to give a voluntary statement to investigators but had refused to be interrogated in a particular room known as the “blue room” according to the lawsuit. The reason she gave was that she had interviewed suspects in that room and found the prospect of being interviewed there, unnerving and insinuating that she was a suspect. She was also concerned about the disclosure of confidential personnel information to individuals not affiliated with the police department. In June 2003, Banfill received a notice of intent to terminate from Leach, but was not fired, according to the complaint. Both sides are scheduled to take their battle to trial early next year, despite presiding Judge Sharon Waters’ attempts to get them to mediate at a status conference in April.

The Internal Affairs Division was soon dragged into the fray because of the division’s ability or apparent inability to abide by the same policy even as it investigates officers for violations of other department policies.

Earlier this year, the CPRC issued a recommendation to the department that

Internal Affairs should either independently investigate shootings as the policy states, or amend the policy to match its current practice of performing administrative reviews of the criminal investigations. Several commissioners argued instead that the CPRC should recommend that the Internal Affairs Division simply implement its written policy. If those administrators and investigators who work in Internal Affairs can not abide by set policies, how can they expect other officers to do so, several commissioners have asked. The city responded to that recommendation by stating that it could not be implemented while the city was in litigation with the RPOA in relation to that policy, even though the RPOA’s lawsuit has focused mainly on the department’s criminal investigations of on-duty shootings.

Banfill did speak to Internal Affairs investigators about the shooting, according to statements made by Williams at several meetings, as well as court records filed in relation to the lawsuit.

According to court records, Banfill was forced to drive to the Internal Affairs Division and answer questions about the Stokes shooting. That statement has been received by the CPRC, but remains sealed from the commis-

sioners until the public report is completed, according to Williams. The city’s legal department has advised the CPRC to issue public reports first, before reviewing documents from Internal Affairs to avoid cross-contamination of public information with information shielded by state law.

“Once we look at the I.A. report, we can’t say a thing,” CPRC Chair Michael Gardener said at the July 28 meeting, “The muzzle goes back on.”

As a result of all these actions, the public will likely never get an accounting of Banfill’s version of events that began with her arrival onscene and ended with the death of Stokes. The other involved officer, Adam Brown, reluctantly gave a statement to investigators in the “blue room” according to court documents, but is unable to be questioned further because earlier in the year, he was arrested by the FBI on child molestation related charges and is facing criminal prosecution by multiple jurisdictions on child molestation charges.

The CPRC still appears to be in the position of reviewing investigations conducted by police investigators, rather than conducting independent investigations from the day of the shooting as mandated in the ordinance which

created it. Many people hope that will change when its future becomes more secure and less subject to the whims of elected officials and one of their chief financial backers, the RPOA.

Deputy Chief Dave Dominguez addressed the CPRC on the Stokes shooting last year at a public meeting.

He said that on May 27, 2003, Banfill and Brown were dispatched to Casa Blanca to investigate a report of a “suspicious” man who had been sitting

inside a vehicle since earlier that day. Banfill arrived first and approached the vehicle to talk to Stokes. When Brown arrived, he saw Banfill engaged in “quick” conversation and with an alert demeanor. Suddenly, Banfill retreated backwards and Stokes exited his vehicle, armed with a knife and a screwdriver. He walked towards both the officers with the blade of the steak knife pointing upwards. Brown yelled into his radio, “he has a knife,” and both officers

told Stokes to drop the weapons. When Stokes did not and while he was standing 10 feet away, first Brown, then Banfill fired shots at him. Despite medical assistance, Stokes died, having been shot four minutes after the officers had arrived.

Although it took minutes to end Stokes’ life, it may take years for the city and its department to explain to the public, why his life was ended.

comment.

Experts suggest answering why hiring professional African-Americans with IT experience can be tough to pin point due to a wide range of circumstances.

Understanding why

Though African-Americans only account for approximately 12 percent of the U.S. population, IT experts say they strive to include Blacks in their organizations to reflect their consumers and to identify with its consumers needs.

Jason Beltran, the IT manager for First World Financial Incorporated in Aliso Viejo, Calif., says minority customers, particularly African-Americans, often struggle with overcoming apprehensiveness about technology.

“There are cultural barriers which still remain; African-Americans consumers sometimes hesitate to take risks if they are not familiar with IT products or services,” said Beltran.

He says a company’s ability to provide its clientele with support from employees who relate to their needs increases its potential earnings.

Kimberly Meyers, who is also African-American, is a headhunter who believes the benefits of including African-Americans in IT departments should be viewed from more than an ethical standpoint.

“Just as many other industries, African-Americans can speak for the consumer, as related to IT. When an employer excludes or does not make an effort to include a specific group, then it is not looking at a consumers desires, which contradicts the fundamentals of business in general,” she said.

Overcoming the problem

Representatives of Dell Incorporated based in Austin, Texas, said reaching out to African-Americans has been a documented success. Currently, 51 percent of the company’s staff is comprised of minorities and women. However, the company declined to disclose how many of its 46,000 employees are African-American.

Dell’s Director of Supply Chain Strategies, Yolanda Conyers, has spent 13 years with the computer manufacturer - the majority of her career in IT after resigning from Texas Instruments in 1991. Conyers says Dell has taken thorough measures in preparing a culturally-rich work environment which caters to the needs of African-Americans and other minorities.

“Being the number one computer company in the world, (Dell) feels it has an obligation. ... We have a lot of strong partnerships with our communities and professional organizations,” said Conyers.

Conyers said Dell’s efforts to strengthen their relationships with professional Black organizations such as the Society of Black Engineers and the African American Chamber of Commerce has helped Dell develop a positive reputation within the African-American community.

To build their momentum in recruiting and retaining a large portion of African-Americans in their technology sector, Dell makes monetary donations to organizations such as the United Negro College Fund, which will receive \$2.3 million in cash and computer equipment over the next several years.

Capturing the interest of young African-Americans has been focal point in Dell’s efforts to hire Blacks. The company has strengthened its partnerships with historically Black colleges and universities such as Florida A&M and Morehouse College.

primary-care doctors who had participated in a telephone survey during 2000 and 2001. The data extracted from 60 U.S. metropolitan communities found 22% of physicians handled 80% of the visits by Black Medicare patients. Although Black patients were more likely than white patients to be treated by a Black physician, the majority of Black patient’s visits were with white doctors.

Peter Bach, a physician and epidemiologist at Memorial Sloan-Kettering and the study’s lead author, says doctors treating Black patients are less likely to be board-certified than doctors treating white patients. Earlier research has shown doctors who aren’t board-certified are less likely to follow screening recommendations and are more likely to treat symptoms rather than confirming a new diagnosis. About 28% of the visits by Black patients were to physicians who reported that they couldn’t deliver “high quality” care consistently to patients. That compared with 19% of white patients. The findings, Dr. Bach said, “suggest to some extent the reason why Blacks and whites receive different

outcomes.”

Dr. Price bristles and cautions the public not to misinterpret the study as an indictment of minority physicians. “To place blame for health disparities on a subgroup of physicians from metropolitan communities, is misguided. It is important to recognize that many of the physicians representing all races working in Black communities are hard working, committed individuals who often deliver more compassionate, charity care than doctors who mostly treat white patients. Typically these doctors derive a higher volume of their practice revenue from Medicaid, a program whose fees are notoriously low. They are often solo practitioners who scramble to make good referrals for their patients but who are stymied by a dearth of well-trained colleagues, and by limited entrée to professional networks with advanced diagnostic techniques.” Dr. Price says for years minority doctors have largely been fenced out of the nation’s prestigious clinical training programs.

He says racial and ethnic disparities in care in many ways is the manifestation of the broad problems in quality of care that exist throughout our health care system. He points to the much-heralded report on national health dispari-

ty, the 2002 Institute of Medicine “Unequal Treatment.”

That report states that doctors – acting deliberately or unconsciously – were giving inferior care to their minority patients irrespective of insurance coverage, education or socio-economic status. “How much clearer does this reality have to become before the government steps up to the plate,” he says. “The IOM report clearly reemphasized what the NMA has been saying for years; the system is broken.”

Dr. Price says the government must build a nation-worthy craft that can withstand perilous waters and hold all of America’s passengers.

Dr. Price says explaining and describing racial disparities has proven much easier to accomplish than devising strategies to reduce the disparities. He says the NMA is ready and willing to work with researchers, policymakers and physicians from all racial ethnic backgrounds who are serious about “turning the corner” on eliminating health disparities. Those who work in the area of policy and research, Dr. Price says, “would serve the nation well by shifting their focus on the development of effective policies to reduce ethnic and racial disparities and improving the quality of care for all Americans.”

future preliminary budgets are far worse. In May, just four days before the nation paused for Memorial Day to remember those who died for our country, the American people learned about a confidential White House memo that outlined billions of dollars in budget cuts to domestic programs, including \$910 million worth of cuts to the Veterans’ Administration in 2006. If this plan is carried out, the VA will be underfunded by \$1.6 billion in 2006 which could result in cutting medical care services for 240,000 veterans, cutting up to 18,000 fulltime employees for veterans’ medical care, or other drastic measures. The confidential memo went on to describe additional cuts to the VA worth hundreds of mil-

lions of dollars over the next five years, further exacerbating the problem for millions of veterans.

I support the comprehensive legislation proposed by the Democratic leadership, H.R. 2569, which would address the needs of our veterans. Among its provisions, H.R. 2569 would fund additional veterans’ health care, without increasing either fees or prescription drug co-payments. The bill also would immediately authorize full payment of both retirement pay and disability compensation to half a million disabled military retirees and it would end the unfair policy that reduces the benefits received by the spouses of those who retire from the military or are killed in action. Moreover, the bill aggressively addresses the shameful failure to process veterans’ disability claims in a

timely manner. Under the Democratic plan, veterans would be paid \$500 a month if their disability claim has been left pending for longer than 180 days. This is a strong bill, which reflects the Democratic Party’s commitment to our nation’s veterans and I am a proud cosponsor of H.R. 2569.

During a Memorial Day ceremony this year, President Bush paid tribute to our veterans by saying, “we acknowledge the debt [we owe to those who have served our country] by showing our respect and gratitude.” I could not agree more, but the President’s words are meaningless without the funding to back up the sentiment. I will continue to work for the adoption of legislation that will provide our veterans with the care they deserve and allow all of us to show our gratitude to them in the most appropriate manner.

A recent economic impact analysis conducted by regional economics Dr. John Husing estimated that direct employment at the Morongo Band of Mission Indians’ six operations, including the Morongo Casino, Resort & Spa, will grow from 1,726 jobs in 2002 to 3,052 by 2008. The total direct and indirect employment impact on the Inland Empire attributed to the tribe’s business ventures will jump from 3,108 jobs in 2002 to an estimated 5,830 by 2008.

According to the California Employment Development Department (EDD) and California Indian Nations Gaming Association, job growth created by California Indian casinos and their tribal governments grew by nearly 17% for the year ending April 2004. Statistics supplied by the EDD reports that California tribes employed 44,300 workers in April 2004, up .2% from the previous month and 16.6% over April 2003.

“The employment growth and the hundreds of millions of dollars in taxes and economic development being generated from tribal governments’ gaming activities are coming at a time when the state needs it most,” said Morongo tribal chairman Maurice Lyons.

Smart Choices for Small Business: How to Save Money on Your Energy Bill

△ Keep Cool This Summer -- and Save Money

On hot summer days, keeping cool is at top of the "To Do" list, but you can waste a lot of energy and money trying. Small retail stores and offices typically spend \$800 to \$1,000 a month on electricity, and cooling and heating costs can be 16% to 45% of your electricity use.

By making smart choices, you can stay cool and save thousands of dollars every year! And, you can help the whole state of California avoid electricity blackouts this summer by responding right away when you're asked to "Flex Your Power Now" and use less energy on days where the state's energy demand is unusually high.

So before you turn up the air conditioner, try these tips for staying cool:

- Close window shades, blinds or drapes during the day, especially in

areas not in use, such as conference rooms or storage rooms.

- Use fans to stay cool without air conditioning. They make the room feel cooler by 4° F or more. If you use fans with air conditioning, you can set the thermostat to a higher temperature -- and use less electricity -- while you stay cool. Try a ceiling fan or a window fan, or small fans on desks or countertops.

- Use air conditioning only when needed. If you have a thermostat, set it to 78 to 80° F during business hours on hot days. For every degree

above 72° F in your setting, you'll save 1% to 3% in cooling costs, so changing the thermostat from 72 to 78° F can reduce your costs up to 18%. Make sure you turn off the air conditioning when your business is closed. At night, open your windows and let the outside air cool the rooms. For added convenience and reliable savings, you can install a programmable thermostat and set it to turn off the air conditioning after business hours -- and save up to \$500 a year.

- If you have air conditioning,

keep the cool air inside by reducing air leaks. Weatherstrip, seal and caulk leaky doors and windows, and install foam gaskets behind outlet covers. Of course, make sure the windows and doors are closed as much as possible. You can save 10% or more on energy bills this way.

- If you have an old air conditioner, and you don't think fans and other inexpensive measures will be enough, consider investing in a new, more-efficient model. The savings on your electric bill (up to 20%) will soon pay back the purchase price.

- Switch from traditional incandescent light bulbs to compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs). You'll generate about 70% less heat and use about 75% less energy on lighting.

- Avoid using major appliances and equipment from 4 to 7 p.m. since California's energy use is highest in the late afternoon.

Agua Caliente Band of Cahuilla Indians Join Fight Against Verbenia Fire

△ Tribe Allowed Use of Three Ponds for Emergency Water Drops, Donated Fees Back to CDF

PALM SPRINGS

The Agua Caliente Band of Cahuilla Indians joined the fight against the Verbenia Fire in Snow Creek Canyon when they agreed to allow the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CDF) to utilize drop water from three ponds on the Tribe's Beylik Ranch properties as the CDF battled the blaze.

The fire began burning on July 11, and the CDF and the Tribe quickly reached an agreement allowing use of the ponds. The fire quickly reached containment, thanks in large part to the water used from the ponds, according to CDF officials.

The three ponds the CDF uti-

lized in the firefight are critical in fighting fires in the area, as they are the only helicopter-accessible bodies of water in Banning Pass. The State has used ponds in the past for other fire suppression activities.

State law requires monetary compensation when the state uses private land for uses such as the water drop; however, the Tribe donated 100 percent of the fees back to the CDF. The Tribe has long been a strong supporter of fire departments in the Coachella Valley and has given money to help fund equipment and truck purchases.

Tribal Council Chairman Richard M. Milanovich said, "We are glad we could be of service in helping to fight this fire. When the California Department of Forestry called on us, it was an easy decision for us to make. We join our voices with everyone in the area, expressing our sincere thanks to

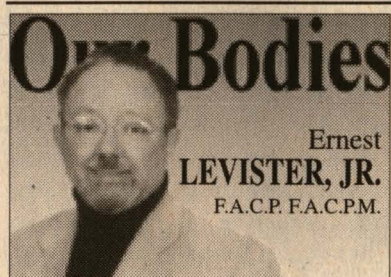
the firefighters for the dedicated service they provide, and we are proud to have been a small part

of their effort."

The Tribe currently owns and operates multiple business ven-

tures in the Palm Springs area, including the Agua Caliente Casino, the Spa Resort Casino

and the Indian Canyons Tours.



Dear Dr. Levister: On several occasions my doctor has asked me in depth questions about my sexual history. Sometimes I think he's trying to make a sexual advance. What are my rights?

V.R.

Dear V.R. The Medical Board of California received 134 formal complaints in fiscal year 2002 alleging sexual misconduct by physicians. The complaints range from inappropriate remarks or questions to improper touching to illegal relationships to sexual assault and rape. Allegations of sexual misconduct have always been one of the highest

priorities of the board's Enforcement Program and can result in criminal prosecution as well as disciplinary action against the physician's license.

If complaints are substantiated to a level of proof which is clear and convincing, discipline can range, minimally, from seven years of probation (with terms and conditions) to license revocation. Sexual exploitation complaints, if proven, can result in administrative and criminal charges being filed against the licensee.

Generally, complaints fall into two categories: those against mental health therapists and those against all other practice specialties. Complaints against therapists often include boundary issues, alleging some type of improper relationship

with the patient. The Board says many complaints pertain to conversations between a patient and physician. Sometimes well meaning legitimate remarks or questioning can be taken out of context by the patient.

The Board offers training and frequent reminders to physicians suggesting caution when questioning patients about their history, especially when their sexual history is discussed, as some patients have interpreted the discussion as sexual advances by the physician. Complaints against non-therapist physicians typically allege improper examination of the breasts or genitalia.

Many patients are unfamiliar with examination procedures and become concerned when a physician offers different treatments or techniques

from their prior examination experience. Cultural differences may further contribute to this miscommunication.

Discuss your concerns with your physician. Misunderstandings can occur. While a chaperone is not mandatory when examining patients, they help avoid misunderstandings and patient complaints. Chaperones are rarely involved during the history phase of a patient's visit. However, if at any time during your evaluation or treatment you wish to have a chaperone, you have the right to request one. Remember, you have options. Worst case, you may feel the need to change doctors. Contact the Medical Board of California if you feel your physician is violating your patient rights. 800-MED-BD-CA (800 633-2322)

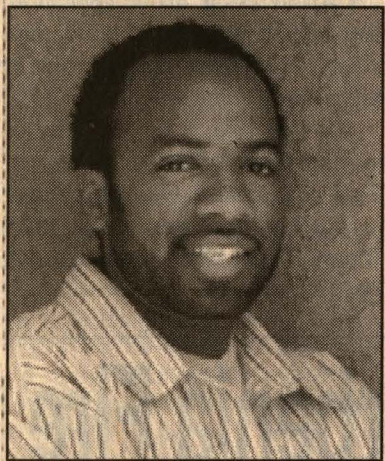

Ordination Class of 2004 Reflects Older, More Educated, More Foreign-Born Men

The ordination class of 2004 reflects a trend toward older, more educated and more foreign-born men entering the priesthood in the United States.

Sociologist Dean R. Hoge, Ph.D., of the Catholic University of America Life Cycle Institute, identified the trend in his Report on Survey of 2004 Priestly Ordinations.

Hoge, who has examined data related to ordinations for several years, found "three changes in the ordinands since the research began in 1998."

"First, the average age at ordination rose from 34.8 to 37.0," he said. "Second, the level of education prior to entering seminary rose. Whereas in 1998, 30 percent had less than a B.A. or B.S. degree, in the 2004 sample it was only 22 percent. Correspondingly, those who had received a master's degree or professional degree beyond the B.A. rose from 13 to 28. This is a notable change in only six years. Third, the percentage born outside the U.S. rose from 24 to 31 percent. The four principal countries of birth today (outside the United States) are Vietnam, Mexico, Philippines, and Poland."

The study also noted that involvement in parish ministries, primarily as altar servers, lectors, and Eucharistic ministers, preceded seminary for the vast majority of men.

The largest numbers of ordinations were in the Archdioceses of Chicago and Newark, which each ordained 14 men. The Archdiocese of New York ordained 13. The archdioceses are the third, ninth and second largest dioceses in the nation, respectively.

Some smaller archdioceses and dioceses marked a significant increase in numbers ordained. The Diocese of Allentown, Pennsylvania, ordained five men. They range in age from 29 to 54.

The Diocese of Columbus, Ohio, ordained six, the largest group in 20 years. The Diocese of Providence, Rhode Island, ordained seven, its largest number in ten years.

The Diocese of Buffalo, New York, ordained five men. The Archdiocese of Cincinnati ordained eight, the Diocese of Joliet, Illinois, the Diocese of Orlando, Florida, and the Archdiocese of St. Paul-Minneapolis ordained six each; the Diocese of Venice, Florida, four, and the Archdiocese of

Washington, eight, one less than last year.

The Newark Archdiocese exemplifies the increasing number of seminarians from other countries. Of the 14 men ordained for the diocese, 11 were born outside the United States, three in Poland, two in Africa, and one each in Brazil, Colombia, Mexico, Nicaragua, the Philippines and Singapore.

Over 50 percent of the seminarians attended Catholic schools and about 46 percent of the ordinands attended Catholic colleges. These percentages are much higher than the percentage of Catholics overall who attend Catholic schools and colleges.

State college graduates also are among the ordinands. In the Diocese of Austin, for example, two of this year's class, Brian Eilers and Patrick Ebner, are Aggies, alumni of Texas A&M University. There are about 50 Aggies currently in formation for the priesthood or religious life.

Three percent of the class is over 60 years old. Among them are two from the Diocese of St. Augustine, Joseph McDonnell and Richard Perko, both 62. Father McDonnell is an attorney; and Father Perko, a funeral director and embalmer. Patrick Forsythe, also over 60, was ordained for the

Evangelicals Demonstrate Against War Profiteering

Δ Christians Part of An Emerging Movement of Evangelical Peace Activists Challenging Bush Administration's Policy in Iraq

PASADENA

A group of evangelical Christians held a vigil in front of the Halliburton Corporation's Pasadena offices Saturday, calling for an end to corporate profit through war, corruption, and injustice. They sent a clear message that the values

espoused by the Bush administration are opposed to Christian values that many evangelicals hold dear.

The demonstrators were evangelical Christians of all ages and came from variety of churches. The group is representative of an emerging movement of evangelicals who believe justice and peacemaking are central to Jesus' teachings. The Pasadena Mennonite Church, an evangelical congregation within the historic peace church tradition, organized the event.

"As Christians, our loyalty

is to Christ and His Kingdom first. When our government fights wars founded on lies for naked corporate interests, we are called to speak the truth and stand for justice," says Eric Getty, a campus staff member with Intervarsity, a campus movement of evangelical students.

The demonstrators held signs, sang hymns and contemporary worship songs to guitar accompaniment, and spoke out against the war profiteering of companies like Halliburton and its subsidiaries. In an atmosphere much like a sidewalk church

service, the songs, prayers, and readings invoked the teachings of Jesus, which oppose the killing of enemies and profiting at the expense of others.

"We would much rather suffer at the hands of another so that they might see the love of God, than to cause their suffering so that we might be free from suffering ourselves," says Getty. "This is no less than what Jesus did for us, and this is why we, as evangelicals, are preaching the Gospel in front of Halliburton."

Evangelical Christians are

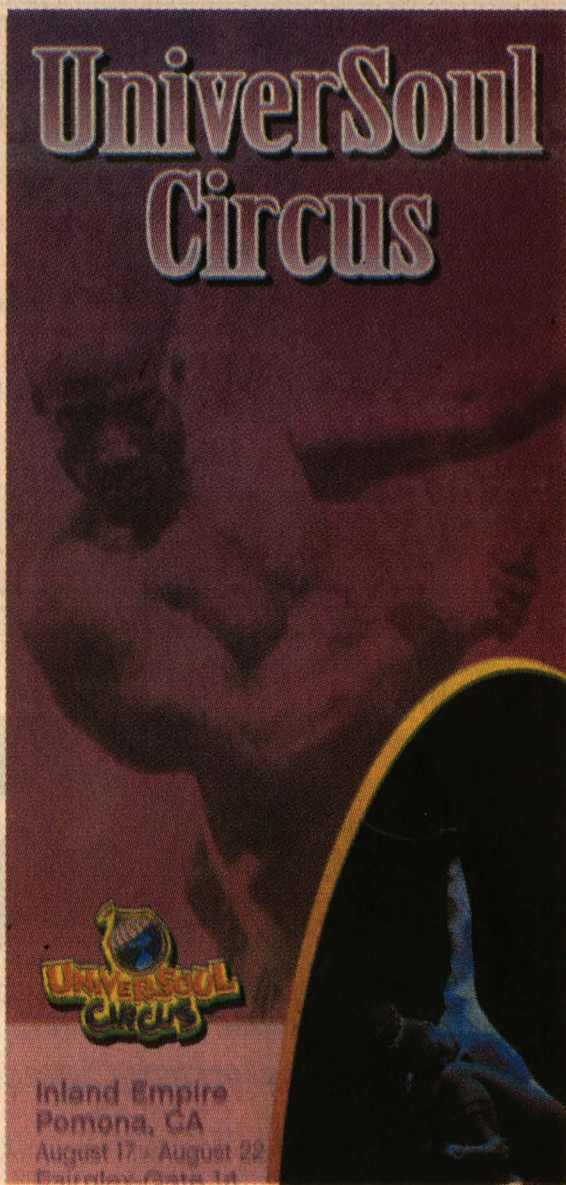
often portrayed as uncritical supporters of Bush, the religious right, and US foreign policy. The group that met in front of Halliburton on Saturday were a small contingent of a wider movement within evangelicalism that includes leaders such as Tony Campolo, Ron Sider, and Jim Wallis, as well as many professors at Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena. These Christians have been reclaiming the language of values that has been controlled by the religious right, and showing that Christian values also address truth-telling, peace-

making, poverty and hunger, race, and justice.

Bert Newton and Jennifer Davis-Sensenig, pastors at Pasadena Mennonite Church, vow to carry on an active peace witness in the Pasadena area over the coming year. Getty intends to do the same as he carries this Christian peace witness to other parts of the country.

"As long as war and injustice continue, we will be out here in the streets proclaiming God's reign of justice and peace," says Davis-Sensenig.

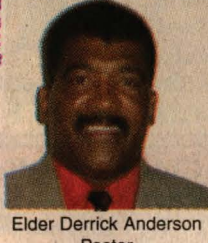

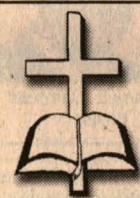

Too often I hear women complaining of lack of companionship, loneliness and Saturday nights spent alone or with girlfriends, instead of with a man or special someone. These women are attractive, educated, young women with often times no children. Yet, no matter how intelligent they are, these women believe that the solution to their loneliness is a relationship with a man. Then they say, "I can't find a man."

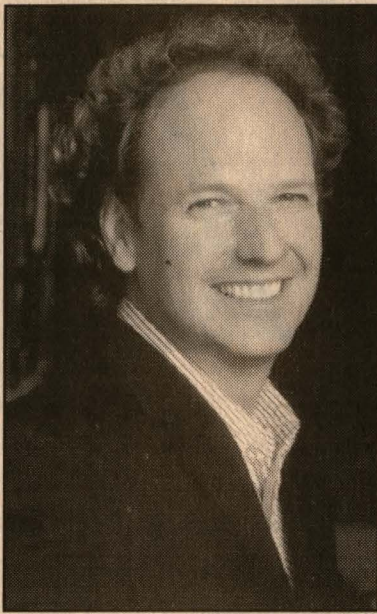

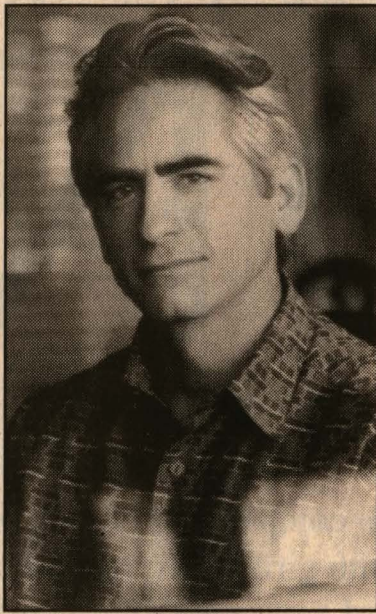

There also are two special musical events associated with the festival: The Patron's Dinner Dance on Friday night, August 27, and the Saturday Night Special.

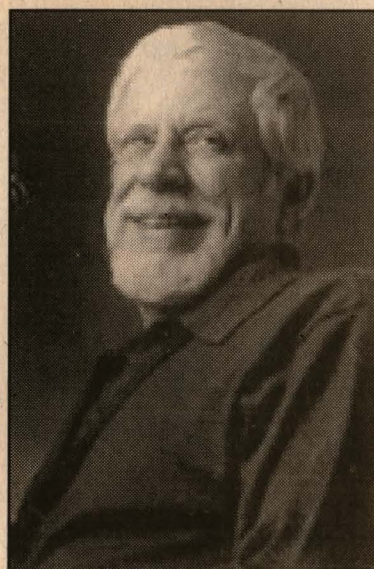
The Patron's Dinner Dance will feature Ruby "Ruby Blue" Presnell and Marshall

Campaign Announces Native Americans for Kerry-Edwards

FLAGSTAFF, AZ

During a campaign swing through New Mexico and Arizona, John Kerry focused on the Kerry-Edwards plan to strengthen Indian Country and announced the campaign's Native Americans for Kerry-Edwards program. In a sign that the Kerry-Edwards plan for America is resonating throughout the country, Native American tribal and community leaders voiced their support by endorsing the Kerry-Edwards ticket.

"I am proud to receive the endorsement of tribal and community leaders from around the country," said Democratic presidential nominee John Kerry. "Our Native Americans for Kerry-Edwards effort continues to grow every day and these leaders will play a critical role in helping to energize, organize and mobilize the Native American community as we head towards November 2nd."

The goal of Native Americans for Kerry-Edwards is to build a grassroots operation to engage the Native American community and recruit volunteers. The program already has state coordinators in key battleground states including Minnesota, New Mexico and Washington State, and will expand in the coming weeks.

John Kerry spoke about his comprehensive plan to improve the lives of Native Americans at the 83rd annual Inter-Tribal Indian Ceremonial Pow Wow in Gallup, NM. He pledged to promote tribal sovereignty and partner with tribes to improve access to health care, provide more educational opportunities, and strengthen economic development efforts. Kerry also said he would increase funding for the Indian Health Service (IHS) and elevate the Director of the IHS to a senior position in the administration.

The endorsement of Native American tribal and community leaders comes on the heels of John Kerry's address at the UNITY: Journalists of Color convention on Thursday, where he committed to reopen the doors of the White House to Native Americans and appoint Native Americans to senior positions in his administration. John Kerry's appearance at the convention contrasted with George Bush's remarks at the UNITY convention the next day where, in response to a question about the meaning of tribal sovereignty, Bush said, "Tribal sovereignty means that, it's sovereign. You're a -- you've been given sovereignty, and you're viewed as a sovereign entity."





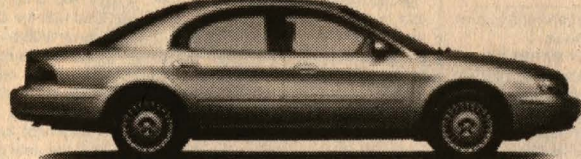
