FACULTY TO HELP CHOOSE OUTSTANDING PROFESSOR

For the first time, CSCSB faculty will nominate one of their own for an Outstanding Professor of the Year Award, presented annually to two CSUC professors.

While only tenure-track faculty and administrators with faculty status may nominate candidates, students and alumni may participate by having a qualified faculty member submit a nomination for them. Since the primary criterion in the award judging is superlative teaching, students and alumni are encouraged to participate in this manner.

Nominating criteria and procedures, as well as nominating forms, have been sent to faculty. Deadline for submitting nominations is 5 p.m., Nov. 26.

Questions concerning nominating procedures, eligibility criteria or other matters may be directed to one of the local selection committee members, who are Walter Oliver, chair, Humanities and Library; Anand Bhatia, Administration and Education; Stu Ellins, Social and Behavioral Sciences; Arlo Harris, Natural Sciences and Students Affairs Officers; J.C. Robinson, administrative representative, and James Lyne, representing Associated Students. An alumni representative will also be named.

CSCSB TO STAY OPEN FOR VETERANS DAY

Veterans Day, which falls on Tuesday, is not a holiday for the campus. All campus offices will remain open and all classes will meet as regularly scheduled. The time is used for an administrative holiday on Dec. 26.

OPEN HOUSE PLANNED BY EVENING SERVICES

The Evening Services Office will host an open house from 6:30-8 p.m. Tuesday and Wednesday to give the college community a chance to inspect its new quarters in LC 236. Refreshments will be served. Roberta Stathis-Ochoa is coordinator of the office, which is designed to assist evening students with course changes, graduation checks, parking permits, changes in major and other such activity.

CSCSB RECORDS PROGRESS IN ENERGY CONSERVATION

CSCSB reduced energy use 11.92 percent for fiscal 1979-80 as part of a system-wide effort to cut the cost of energy.

Electricity consumption fell 12.2 percent for the year and gas and oil 11.75 percent. Compared with the 1978-79 fiscal year, the campus saved \$79,029 overall, of which \$57,706 came through savings on electricity and \$21,323 on gas and oil. The total bill in 1979-80 for lighting, heating and cooling was slightly more than \$575,000.

The savings were the result of such programs as reduced lighting, maintaining maximum heating levels of 70 degrees and minimum cooling levels of 76-78 degrees, installation of flow restrictors in showers, installation of a smaller chiller in the central cooling plant to handle periods of reduced cooling load, and heating and cooling buildings only when they are in use, among many other moves.

Still further savings in energy will be realized in the future as the college implements a new computer-controlled heating and air conditioning program. The first phase--installation of the computer and the necessary sensors, cables and other paraphernalia--has been funded for the library. It is estimated that, when all campus buildings are on the system, the campus will save about \$65,000 per year in energy costs.

The computer will save on electricity, as well as oil and gas, because two-thirds of all electricity consumed on campus goes to power heating and cooling units.

NEW COMPUTER TERMINAL SERVES RESIDENCE HALLS

Students living in residence halls can now do computer course work without going to the computer lab in the Library. A terminal has been installed at Badger Hall, and is available to

any hall resident from 6 p.m. until 8 a.m., and all day on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays.

If the experiment proves successful, additional terminals may be installed at other halls.

STUDENT RECITAL NEXT NOON CONCERT

A student recital is next on the program in the weekly noon concert series. The recital will be Thursday in the Creative Arts Recital Hall.

Eugene O'Neill's "Long Day's Journey Into Night" will open the drama season Thursday at 7:45 p.m. in the Theatre.

The play is an unflinching examination of O'Neill and members of his family during a time of acute psychological stress. It has become one of the nation's most popular plays since its introduction.

Appearing in the campus production, which is directed by Dr. Amanda Sue Rudisill, theatre arts professor, will be Dr. William Slout, professor of theatre arts, as James Tyrone; Veronica Murphy Smith as Mary Tyrone, his wife; Jeff Hubbard as James Tyrone, Jr., their elder son; John Howard Higley as Edmund Tyrone, their younger son, and Corrine Soto as Cathleen, their second girl.

Season tickets, good for all three drama productions this year, are available through the drama department at \$8 for general admission and \$4 for students and senior citizens. Individual performance tickets, which are available at the door, are \$3.50 general admission and \$1.75 for students and senior citizens.

This is the only drama production which starts at 7:45 p.m. Both of the remaining plays start at the usual 8:15 p.m.
