CSUSB is in the Forefront with More Women in the Sciences

% Percentage of Women Professors in the Natural Sciences

CSUSB's women professors have a greater representation in the sciences than the 8.3% national average, reported a study announced last month to Congress and other national agencies

Congress and other national agencies.

In the College of Natural Sciences alone, 31% of the professors in the Physics department are women, five times the national average of 6.6%.

Women professors in the Computer Science department and 31%, the national average is 10.6%.

The Chemistry department has 27%, as compared to the national average of 12.1%.

The Biology department ranks in at 21%, compared to the national average of 12.2%.

When looking for a mentor, female students in the sciences have very few to choose from.
According to Dr. Donna Nelson of the University of Oklahoma, who has done the most thorough study to date.

Across the country women make up an average of half of the enrollment in the math, sci-ence and engineering depart-ments at colleges and universi-

Throughout CSUSB the percentage of full-time female pro-fessors has risen from 38.8%, in the 1996-1997 academic school year to 43.1%, in the 2001-2002 school year.

This study found that women require mentors in order to be successful at entering or com-pleting a degree.

when there is a lack of women professors three will be a lack of future professors, thus continuing a trend of under representation of women profes-

Kim Gandy, President of the National Organization for Women says that the study is "both discouraging and moti-vating" for women and minori-ties and encourages universities to adopt measures to improve the ratio of women in universi-

ties.

According to the study, since CSUSB students have a greater diversity, they are more likely to have a mentor and more like-ly to achieve their academic

Clifford Young Named to County Board

Public administration professor and CSUSB administrator Clifford Young has been appointed by the Board of Supervisors to fill the seat vacated by Supervisors.

Young, who becomes the first black person to hold the post of supervisor in San Bernardino County, was selected from among 14 applicants after making as speech reflecting his background as an ordained AME minister.

Young, is executive assistant for government relations to President Karnig. He was nominated to full the empty seat by Supervisor Bill Postmus and was sworn into office, Young thanked his grandmother in Texas, "who I always know is praying for me in all that I do."
Leaders in the African American community expressed happiness at the Board's choice. Wesley Jefferson of the Westside Action Committee said he and others have been pressing board members to appoint a black to the post.

"This is history!" Jefferson said as he spoke of visits to Chairman Dennis Hansberger's chief-of-staff and to other board members. "All

Army Helps Small Business Win Grants

The NAFEO and the Army Research Laboratory sponsored a workshop conference providing information to small businesses and universities in an attempt to help them become better prepared in the application for grants and contracts with the ARL.

The workshop took place February 4-5 on the CSUSB campus, in the Santos Manuel Students Events Center.

The CSUSB campus was one of four sites nationwide selected by the OTITC (Office of Technology Transfer and Commercialization) for holding conferences of this kind. Ninety people attended from everal western states.

He explained that the board plan is have a comprehensive plan to manage the budget by March. The plan proposes a 5% carollment reduction. This will effectively reduce enrollment of CSUSB students by at least 20,000.

The 2% of the 5% of students enrolling will be directed to community colleges. With 10% of first time college freshmen re-directed to community colleges, an overall projection of savings to the State is \$100,000.

Chancellor Reed says to plan to see an increase in the fee struc-ture. An increase of 10% for undergraduate students, 40% for graduate students, as well as a 20%

The CSU schools should also plan to see the elimination of cer-tain programs, such as EOP (Equal Opportunity Program), an outreach program for disadvantaged stu-


