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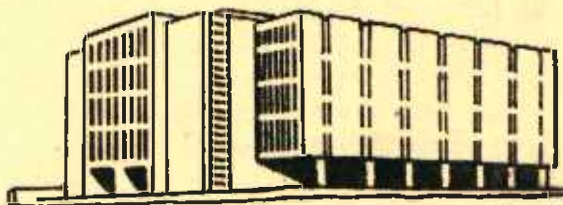

ROBERT O'BRIEN NAMED OUTSTANDING PROFESSOR

Dr. Robert M. O'Brien, associate professor of sociology, has been selected as the college's outstanding professor for 1981, President John M. Pfau announced today.

Dr. O'Brien, a member of the faculty since 1974, will represent this campus in the Board of Trustees' Outstanding Professor Awards program. Each year, the CSUC honors two distinguished faculty members for their contributions to their students, their academic disciplines and their campus communities. Foremost in the criteria is a record of superlative teaching. This is the first year the San Bernardino campus has participated.

A campus selection committee, which included a student, chose the honoree after receiving nominations from faculty members.

The San Bernardino campus' outstanding professor received his B.A. in psychology from Pomona College and his M.A. and Ph.D. in sociology from the University of Wisconsin. He taught at the University of Wisconsin for a year before coming to San Bernardino. He has been chair of the Sociology Department, a 12-month position, since 1979.

In addition to his classroom work, he spent four years as faculty coordinator for the computer center, serving as a statistical consultant. He has been a research consultant and advisor for projects both on and off campus. Currently he is a consultant to the federal Environmental Protection Agency, advising on the social and political effects of a waste disposal site in Denver. O'Brien has written or coauthored numerous papers and books, with the subjects ranging from sociology textbooks to victimization in society.

CPR COURSES OFFERED BY HEALTH CENTER

All employees are eligible to attend one of two cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) classes which will be offered by the Health Center Tuesday. A class from 9-11 a.m. will recertify employees previously trained in CPR. A second class from 1:30-4 p.m. will be taught for employees who have either had no CPR training or whose training was taken before 1979.

President Pfau has authorized release time for any employee who wants to take the class.

Reservations for class slots must be made at ext. 7641 by noon today.

CPR is an emergency procedure designed to provide artificial ventilation and circulation to accident victims.

CSCSB PROF MEETS WITH INDIAN PRIME MINISTER

Dr. Brij Khare (Political Science) met Dec. 23 with Indian Prime Minister Indira Gandhi during a trip to that country. Dr. Khare said he has kept in touch with Gandhi for several years, including the time between her stints as prime minister.

The discussion revolved around three main topics, the possibility of India's acting as intermediary in setting up a summit between President Reagan and Soviet Premier Leonid Brezhnev, the Russian occupation of Afghanistan and the role the Third World can play in bringing the occupation to an end and the situation with the American hostages in Iran. Gandhi seemed to know at the December meeting that the hostages would be released before long. Other issues were discussed, but Dr. Khare promised not to reveal them.

Gandhi sees the election of Ronald Reagan as a positive sign. She believes the Reagan administration will better understand India's position among the countries of the world, something the Carter administration was never able to do.

Dr. Khare plans to maintain his contact with the prime minister and may, in fact, become involved with a planned academic/diplomatic seminar being discussed by the State Department for sometime next year. He will be on sabbatical during that time and may take the opportunity to participate.

The Gandhi interview was set up through a member of the Indian Parliament, though it was a cable from Gandhi herself that confirmed the meeting.

CAMPUS TO OBSERVE BLACK HISTORY WEEK

The campus will observe Black History Week with a week-long series of events sponsored by the Black Students Union starting Monday.

A gospel night will open the week-long observance at 7:30 p.m., Monday in the Recital Hall. The choir from the First Baptist Loveland Church of Fontana will perform. On Tuesday, Dr. Melvin Hawkins (Sociology) will lead a panel discussion on "The Impact of Social Welfare Policies and Services on the Black Family" starting at 3 p.m. in the SUMP Room. "Variations," a series of skits and dramatic readings written and performed by members of the BSU, will be presented at 1:30 and 7:30 p.m., Wednesday in the SUMP Room. A disco dance will be hosted by the BSU from 9 p.m.-2 a.m., Thursday in the SUMP Room.

The week's events will climax Friday with Danny Scarborough's one-man show, "Something Called Freedom," accompanied by "A Tribute to Martin Luther King." Both presentations are a potpourri of literature, music and drama by artists, activists and performers. Scarborough, who is on the faculty at San Diego State University, will start the performance at 7 p.m. in the Recital Hall.

There is no charge for any Black History Week event except the Danny Scarborough production. Tickets are \$5 per person.
