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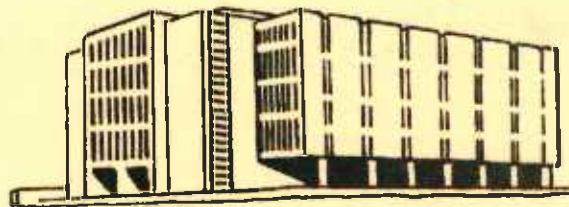

COLLEGE'S REDWOODS ARE THRIVING

Although Sequoia redwoods are usually identified with Northern California, the Cal State, San Bernardino campus has its own miniature redwood forest. Twenty-five redwoods were planted in 1970 north of the Library as an experiment. Only

four have been lost; the remaining 21 are thriving and now stand 20 to 25 feet tall.

In order for the redwoods to survive, it is necessary to cut some alders which are crowding them and keeping out the sunlight. The alders, almost twice as tall, are a vigorous, faster-growing, but shorter-lived tree.

Within the past month, the college has planted 85 new trees, including sycamore and flowering plum and peach. Some 60 sycamores were transplanted from behind the Library to along the road leading to the Physical Plant.

SOUTH INDIAN MUSICIAN TO PERFORM HERE MONDAY

South Indian singer Gowri Kuppuswamy will give a demonstration and a concert here Monday. The concert, which is free, is scheduled for noon-1 p.m. in the Recital Hall. A demonstration will precede the concert from 11 a.m.-noon. It is also free.

Mrs. Kuppuswamy will be accompanied by Ramnad Raghavan on a mridangam (a barrel-type drum) for both the concert and demonstration.

Mrs. Kuppuswamy, considered one of the top performers in her country, was named the best female singer at the Music Academy of Madras in 1973. She has been giving concerts for 25 years, both in India and abroad, and has performed for the Maharajah of Mysore. She also teaches at Mysore University and has written numerous articles and books.

'PETRIFIED FOREST' FINAL PRODUCTION

"The Petrified Forest" will be the season's final offering from the Theatre Arts Department. The Robert Sherwood drama is scheduled for May 14-16 and 19-23 in the Theatre. Curtain time is 8:15 p.m. Dr. William Slout is the director.

The play is set in 1935. Bank robbers invade a small gas station/cafe in eastern Arizona, where they hold the employees and customers hostage. The play was made into a movie in the 1930s and became the vehicle which catapulted Humphrey Bogart to stardom.

Advance tickets will go on sale in the Theatre Arts Department May 3. They will also be available at the door. Individual tickets are \$3.50 general admission and \$1.75 for students with I.D. and senior citizens.

TRUSTEES INCREASE
STUDENT SERVICES FEE

Actions taken by the Board of Trustees, meeting last week in Sacramento, included increasing the student services fee and urging the governor and Legislature to fund certain equity salary adjustments.

Effective this fall, the student services fee will be increased by \$7 per quarter. Students carrying 6 units or less will pay \$53 per quarter or \$159 per year. For students with 6.1 units or more, the fee will be \$63 per quarter or \$189 per year. The current fees are \$46 and \$56 per quarter. This rate went into effect spring quarter 1981; the rates for the first two quarters of the current academic year were \$42 and \$52.

The trustees also are asking for funding for equity salary adjustments, beyond the general salary increase, of approximately 1.5 percent for clerical assistant II, 2.5 percent for certain specialized clerical classes, and 5 percent for vice presidents, deans and related positions.

In other actions, the board:

--Named as the 1981 Outstanding Professors in the CSUC: Dr. Lloyd N. Ferguson, professor of chemistry, CSU, Los Angeles, and Dr. Valene L. Smith, professor of anthropology at CSU, Chico. The honorees also receive a \$1,000 award.

--Withheld taking a position on Senate Bill 101 until the board receives the report of an ad hoc committee consisting of trustees, staff, presidents, faculty and students. The committee will examine student concerns for learning experience benefits from standardized admission tests and staff and faculty concerns for maintaining test quality. It will discuss these concerns with Senator Milton Marks, the bill's author, for a possible clarification of intent and amendment.

--Approved categories and criteria for setting priorities in the 1982-83 state-funded capital outlay program.

--Approved a variety of items affecting specific campuses, named trustees to committees and accepted the 1981-82 legislative report.

--Accepted a resolution from the California Legislature commending the CSUC upon its 20th anniversary as a system, which is being recognized during 1981.
