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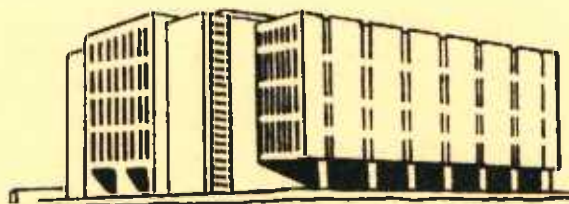

RENAISSANCE FESTIVAL SCHEDULED FOR MAY 1-2

A sumptuous banquet and Gian Carlo Menotti's madrigal ballet, "The Unicorn, the Gorgon and the Manticore," will be the setting for the Chamber Singers Renaissance Festival May 1-2. During the musical dinner-theatre

evening, members of the choral group will serve their guests while entertaining in song and dance. The event, a traditional spring favorite of campus and community, is planned and directed by Dr. Loren Filbeck.

Reservations must be made with the Music Department office by April 21 as seating is limited.

HEALTH FAIR TO BE AT OPEN HOUSE

Cal State will host the Southern California Health Fair Expo '81 during its Open House Sunday, April 26. The massive health screening project, free to everyone 18 years and older, provides a range of health tests and services. An additional

optional blood test, costing \$7, will furnish a panel of 25 blood tests normally costing \$100.

In addition to the traveling Health Fair Expo, the campus sponsors have added other tests and exhibits to the activities to be held in the Student Services Building. Sickle cell testing, relaxation techniques, hearing testing and a bicycle ergometer, measuring heart rate, will also be available. Exhibits are planned relating to food, alcohol and drug abuse.

Students and faculty from the Departments of Health Science and Human Ecology and Nursing are making the local arrangements and staffing the various stations.

SOLID BRASS COMES TO CSCSB TUESDAY

Solid Brass, an internationally known french horn/tuba duo, will perform on campus at 8:15 p.m., Tuesday in the Recital Hall. The performance is part of the Music at Cal State Series.

The program will consist primarily of contemporary music with a smattering of classical Mozart thrown in. Contemporary composers represented are Paul Dukas, Trygve Madsen, Theodore Antoniou, Vitali Boujanovski, Jean Baptiste Arban and Roger Kellaway.

Solid Brass is composed of Froydis Ree Wekre, co-principal french horn with the Oslo Philharmonic Orchestra, and Roger Bobo, tubist with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra and probably the best-known tuba player in the world. They will be joined by Zita Carno, principal pianist with the Los Angeles Philharmonic.

Krull is an opportunist rascal who evades the draft by faking an epileptic seizure during his physical, proves himself a Don Juan by seducing an eccentric professor's wife and daughter and, finally, lands himself in hot water by impersonating a marquis who is suspected of murder. The ultimate deceit comes when Krull feigns death and has his "body" shipped to the professor. The film is free. It starts at 7 p.m. in PS 10.

BLOOD DRIVE SET FOR THURSDAY

The Health Center will sponsor a blood drive from 10 a.m.-3 p.m., Thursday. The drive is being mounted to replenish supplies in the campus Blood Reserve Fund, which supplies students, faculty and staff members and their dependents.

Anyone who weighs at least 110 pounds, is between 18 and 65 and who is in good health can donate. Donors should not fast before giving blood. About 45 minutes should be allowed for registration, donating and light refreshments after. No pre-registration is necessary and President Pfau has authorized released time for donors.
