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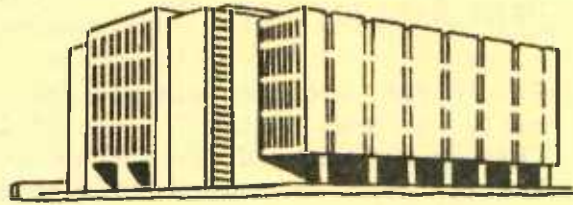

## ENROLLMENT TOPS 5,000

For the first time in the 16-year history of Cal State, San Bernardino, enrollment here has topped 5,000 students. At the end of late registration, 5,131 students had enrolled, compared with 4,827 the same time last year, an increase of 304 or slightly more than 6 percent. The FTE count was 3,839, up 227 from last year's figure of 3,612.

## CAL STATE SYSTEM TO HAVE NEW NAME

Currently called "The California State University and Colleges," the country's largest system of higher education will be designated as the "California State University" effective Jan. 1, 1982.

Names of the 19 campuses will not be affected, as they comprise a statewide system that will continue to include college campuses in addition to the 16 institutions qualified to have "university" as part of their titles. Retaining the California State College designation will be the San Bernardino, Bakersfield and Stanislaus campuses.

The system name change was accomplished through AB 600, which was introduced by Assemblywoman Teresa P. Hughes at the request of the Board of Trustees.

The system, which now has 314,000 students, was established in 1961 and originally named the "California State College," a designation changed in 1972 to "The California State University and Colleges" to reflect the university function characterized within the system.

## VILLAGE POOL SOLAR HEATED

A solar water heating system for the Serrano Village swimming pool has been installed. Solar panels are located on the roof of the new Housing Office. The solar system, which cost \$4,983.27, operates through the pool's filter system. An increase in temperature

already has been noted. The system is expected to increase the swimming season, plus pay for itself with gas savings in about seven years.

## CONTINUING EDUCATION DEAN ARRIVES OCT. 8

Dr. Lee Porter, the new dean of continuing education, is scheduled to arrive on campus Thursday. Dr. Porter was named this summer.

Dr. Porter, who received his M.S. and Ed.D. degrees from Syracuse University, previously was dean of the College of Continuing Education at Roosevelt University in Chicago and managed its Northwest Campus in Arlington Heights. Before that time, he was associate dean of continuing education for the University of Arizona and executive director of the Division of Course Programs (the evening college) at Syracuse University. He also has taught and been a counselor at both the college and the high school levels.

## OLIVER TAKES FIRST IN GOLF CLASSIC

Dr. Walter Oliver (Spanish) placed first with a net 68 in the CSCSB Golf Association September Classic last week at El Rancho Verde Country Club.

Dr. Ed Teyber (Psychology) placed second with a net 69. Third place honors went to Dr. Alfred Egge (Biology), net 72, and fourth was captured by Dr. Clark Mayo (English), net 74. Closest to the pin honors went to James Penrod (Psychology) and Dr. Greg Price (Physical Education and Recreation).

## URBAN LANDSCAPE THEME OF ART GALLERY EXHIBIT

The billboards along Sunset Strip and life in Beverly Hills are among the subjects of the next major show in the Art Gallery which will open with a reception for the artists from 7-10 p.m., Friday, Oct. 9 in the Gallery.

"Locations" is a collection of paintings, photographs and sculptures that include a variety of interpretations of the city by 20 Southern California artists. Don Woodford selected and coordinated the show.

Mostly by artists living and working in the Los Angeles area, the pieces range from specifically Los Angeles to more general expressions of the contemporary urban experience.

## CAL STATE OFFERS FREE COUNSELING

The Community Counseling Center here is once again offering free counseling services to people in distress. Counseling is offered without charge as a service to the community.

This is the ninth year Cal State, San Bernardino has offered counseling through the center. The staff, headed by Dr. Ed Teyber, is made up of faculty members and graduate students. Prospective clients may obtain counseling by calling 887-7272.

The purpose of the center is to provide a place where people with personal problems can receive counseling, and where graduate students in psychology can gain valuable counseling experience. Although the clinic is not equipped to help people with more severe psychological problems, such as psychosis, alcoholism, drug addiction or suicidal crisis, these callers will be referred to sources better able to meet their needs.

## NOTEWORTHY

George A. Weiny (Physical Education and Recreation) competed in the 1,000-meter rough water swim at Laguna Niguel on Aug. 11 as part of the United States Surf Lifeguards national competition. Competing in the Masters Division (40 years and older), Weiny placed third in the event, which attracted entries from Australia, Florida, Great Lakes and East Coast teams, as well as many Californians.

## SPEAKING OUT

Dr. Irving H. Buchen (Humanities) was featured speaker at the California Department of Education Inservice Center in Anaheim Sept. 25. The topic of the conference was "The Future Belongs to Those Who Have Knowledge--and Use It well."

Dr. Amer El-Ahraf (Health Science and Human Ecology) gave the keynote speech, "Public Health Perspectives in the Eighties," at the annual meeting of the Arizona Public Health Assn. Sept. 25 in Yuma. He also presented a paper during the environmental health session titled "A Multilevel Aflatoxin Food Control Program."

Dr. Renate Nummela (Education) spoke to the loaned executives, a group of executives from local business and industry who will work on the United Way campaign. Her talk was on "Stress Management: A Critical Success Factor."

George A. Weiny (Physical Education and Recreation) spoke to the sixth grade classes at Mesa Grande Elementary School in Hesperia Sept. 11. His presentation dealt with the importance of leisure-time activities in adult life and emphasized swimming, surfing, wind surfing, snorkeling and scuba diving.
