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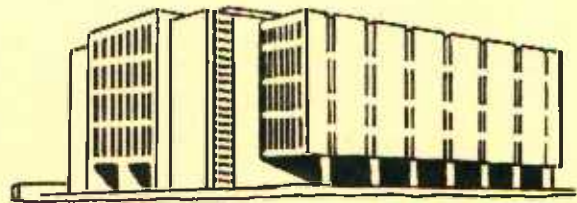

OUTSTANDING PROFESSOR NOMINATIONS DUE NOV. 1

Faculty, students and alumni are invited to nominate faculty members for the 1982-83 Outstanding Professor Awards. Nominations may be made by completing a form available from department offices and the Faculty

Senate Office. The forms should be submitted to the Faculty Senate Office, AD 169, by 4:30 p.m., Monday, Nov. 1.

The campus' outstanding professor will be chosen by a committee composed of Dr. Arlo D. Harris (Chemistry), chair; Dr. Francesca E. Bero (Education), Dr. Michael Clarke (Public Administration), Joe Moran (Art), Dr. Frederick A. Newton (Psychology), Dr. J.C. Robinson (Academic Affairs) and Don Tasker (Associated Students).

Tenure-track faculty and administrators holding faculty status are eligible for nomination. Major attention should be given to teaching excellence. The committee also will consider significant achievements in creative production, scholarly achievements in research and/or production, and service to the campus and community.

Later this year, The California State University will select two distinguished faculty members from the outstanding professors nominated by the 19 CSU campuses. This is the third year the San Bernardino campus is participating.

MUSIC GROUPS TO PREMIERE IN ANNUAL PRISM CONCERT

All the student music ensembles will be on stage during the annual Prism Concert at 8:15 p.m., Sunday, Oct. 24, in the Recital Hall. Admission to the concert, which is the season premiere for the

groups, is \$3 general, \$1.50 students. The stage takes on a prism appearance, with lights illuminating each group individually during its performance. The concert traditionally features a spectrum of music--classical, jazz and modern.

MEMORABILIA OF U.S. FAIRS,
EXPOS DISPLAYED IN LIBRARY

Postcards, photos, brochures and memorabilia from many international fairs and expositions held in the United States are on display through Sunday, Nov. 14, on the first floor of the Pfau Library.

Coordinated by Johnnie Ralph (Library), the exhibit includes bits of history. For instance, visitors to the 1893 Columbian Exposition in Chicago saw the first Ferris wheel, a 137-foot-high structure with 36 coaches, each holding 60 passengers. Also represented are several expositions commemorating occasions such as the opening of the Golden Gate Bridge and the Panama Canal, and world fairs, including the current one in Knoxville, Tenn., which by Oct. 31 is expected to have drawn 11 million people.

A team of volunteers will be contacting employees through Oct. 27 to solicit their contributions to this year's Arrowhead United Way Campaign.

"Let's Take Care of One Another" is this year's theme. The campus goal is two-fold: first, to raise the average contribution from \$66 per year to \$72; second, to increase the number of contributors from 134 (24 percent) to 190 (33 percent). If these two goals are met, Cal State, San Bernardino will be contributing \$13,320 to the campaign effort.

The AUW supports 50 area human service organizations, which sponsor more than 120 programs in the community. Richard Bennecke (Dean of Students Office) is coordinating the campus effort.

AUTHOR OF 'MISSING' TO SPEAK ON CAMPUS

Tom Hauser, author of the controversial book *Missing*, will speak at 7 p.m., Monday, Oct. 25, in the Multipurpose Room of the Student Union. Tickets are \$3.50 with a student I.D., \$4.50 without. The Associated Students is sponsoring the program.

His book, which was made into a film starring Jack Lemmon and Sissy Spacek, traces the search for Charles Horman, a free-lance writer from the United States who disappeared in Chile six days after the right-wing military coup toppled the Marxist rule of Salvador Allende Gossens in 1973. In his account of a true incident, Hauser alleges the United States not only did nothing to help Horman's father and wife discover the truth about Horman's disappearance, but also may have been responsible for Horman's death. The film version provoked an official statement from the State Department.

Prior to Hauser's visit, the A.S. will show the movie based on his book at noon and 7 p.m., Tuesday; 7 p.m., Wednesday; and 8 p.m., Friday. Tickets are 75¢ with a student I.D., \$1.50 without. Tickets for Hauser's speech and the movie will be sold beginning Monday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., weekdays, at the Student Union desk.

RESUME WRITING WORKSHOP THURSDAY

The first in a series of monthly resume writing workshops will be held from 2 to 3:30 p.m., Thursday, Oct. 21, in SS 171. All aspects of resume writing and reproduction will be covered. Information packets will be available in advance

in the Placement Center, SS 116, and participants will be encouraged to bring rough drafts of resumes to the workshop. The program is sponsored by the Career Planning and Placement Center.

MINI-CORPS SEEKS STUDENT TEACHERS

The California Mini-Corps is looking for students from migrant backgrounds who are bilingual and have education as their goal to serve as student teachers. These teacher aides will work from 15 to 18 hours per week with migrant children in the classroom, under the supervision of a teacher.
