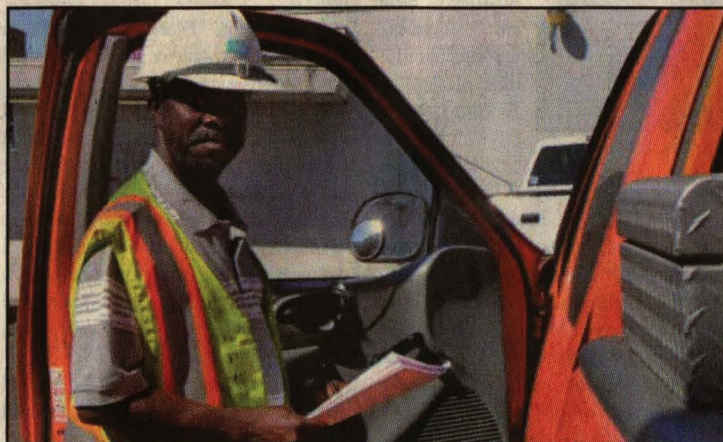
Congress Balks at \$700,000,000,000 Bailout

"It's disgusting! The average American can't begin to comprehend \$700 billion. What does AIG stand for anyway?" "How many trips to the gas pump will \$700 billion buy?" "Think of the alternative. It's scary but something has to be done." "Lucky enough, I'm only 16, I can ride this out. But it's a big problem." "This is the mother of all bailouts."



"Personally speaking the economy is a big mess and the bailout will hurt the little guy. The big guys have run a muck, now they want the rest of us to pay for it. It's unfair," says Caltrans field engineer Festus Apakama.



Shawn Ernest Bane with son Shawn Jr. has been jobless for three months. Last week he received his first unemployment check. "The economy is messed up, the system is broken, people are struggling and the government doesn't seem to care," he said.

That's Vincent, Salah, Loren, Steve, and Sharlee outside a Wal-Mart Super Center in Fontana, ordinary Americans reacting to what's being called the "Mother of all Bailouts", a bailout that could cost American Taxpayers a trillion dollars according to Senate Banking Committee Member Richard Shelby.

"The big guys have run amuck now they want the rest of us to pay for it," says San Bernardino Caltrans field engineer Festus Apakama. "The little guy is struggling while overpaid CEO's fly around in private jets and live in expensive houses what's fair about that?"

Fierce criticism greeted the tax-payer funded plan Tuesday as Democrat and

Riverside Obama to Host 'Debate Watching Party'

Politics Of Despair Recasts Debates

The Obama and McCain campaigns have agreed to an unusual free-flowing format for the first of four nationally televised debates. The first exchange focusing on foreign policy issues kicks off Friday September 26 at the University of Mississippi.

Debate day, Democrat Barack Obama will work out or shoot hoops. Republican John McCain plans to host a town hall meeting and take a short nap. But the exchange between the presidential candidates will be anything but relaxed.

The Commission on Presidential Debates, which is sponsoring the forums, expects the exchanges to be among the most watched presidential debates in history.

With the nation's financial system in near paralysis, investment banks failing, the Bush administration pressing for a \$700 billion business bailout, the Dow tumbling, consumer confidence plummeting, the housing crisis worsening and panic gripping Wall Street, Obama and

McCain will face off on stage without teleprompters or advisers.

Word from both political camps:

Both campaigns see the four debates as pivotal moments in a presidential race

that is not only extraordinarily close but also drawing intense interest from voters; roughly 40 million viewers watched the major speeches at the two parties' conventions. The upheaval in the financial markets has recast the race in recent days, which both sides believe will only heighten attention for the debates.

The McCain camp fought for and won a much more structured approach for the questioning at the vice presidential debate set for October 2 at Washington State University (St. Louis). At the insistence of the McCain campaign, the debate between Republican VP nominee, Gov. Sarah Palin and her Democratic rival, Senator Joseph R. Biden, Jr. will have shorter question and answer segments than those for the presidential nominees. There will also be much less opportunity for free flowing, direct exchanges between the tunning mates.

McCain advisers said they had been concerned that a loose format could leave Ms. Palin, a relatively inexperienced debater, at a disadvantage and largely on the defensive.

Obama successfully sought to flip the

proposed topics for the first and third debates, so foreign policy is now coming first and economic and other domestic issues come last.

The debate commission had proposed that the first debate be on economic issues and the third on foreign policy — because the first debate is usually the most watched, and many voters rank the economy as their top concern.

Obama wanted foreign policy issues first to show voters that he could provide depth, strength and intelligence on those issues. He wanted the final exchange to focus on domestic issues. Both campaigns agree the election is most likely to turn on the state of the economy.

All four debates will begin at 9 pm ET, 6pm PST and last for 90 minutes and will be broadcast on CBS, NBC, ABC, and FOX, CNN, MSNBC, Fox News, and C-SPAN.

Speaker Bass Calls Governor's Vetos "Mean Spirited"

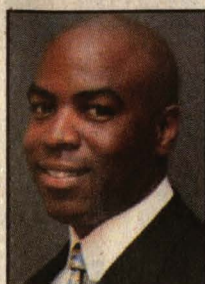
Assembly Speaker Karen Bass (D-Los Angeles) blasted Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger's 'blue' line item vetoes made as part of a last ditch stand on the record late state budget signed Tuesday.

"The Governor's penny-wise and pound foolish and mean-spirited cuts add insult to injury to a budget that already will hurt middle-class and low-income families struggling in a difficult economy. Cutting funds for prostate cancer treatment, domestic violence, HIV/AIDS education, childhood lead poisoning, and eviscerating the program to make prescription drugs more affordable shows a lack of compassion and good economic sense."

The budget closes an estimated \$15.2 billion shortfall with a mix of program cuts, fees and accounting maneuvers that experts say leaves the state virtually certain to face shortfalls in 2009-10.

Bass has vowed to reform the state budget process by requiring fundamental changes in fiscal practice that directly address the causes of the persistent budget crises.

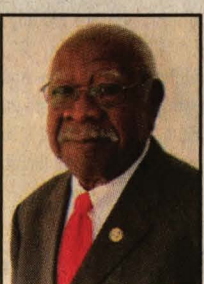

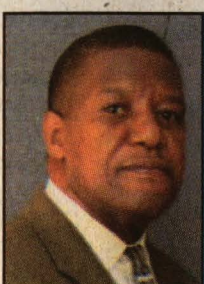

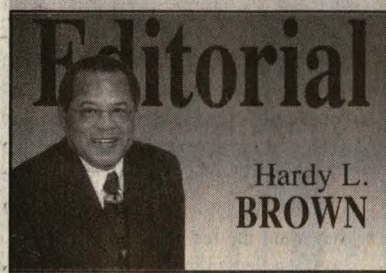

dren to be the best, they must be taught by the best. However, we must also find the teachers who are not doing their jobs and get rid of them.

1. A Rialto diploma must mean something. We must get to the point where a Rialto diploma certifies that our children are qualified and ready to go to college as well as prepared to get a job beyond the minimum-wage.

1. Preschool must be available to all of our children whether parents or guardians can afford it or not. Every Rialto child should start first grade ready and able to learn. All of the research shows that children who go to a high-quality preschool will be better prepared for reading and math. They are also more likely to graduate from college, and make enough money to live a comfortable life.

PRESCHOOL WORKS.

1. Keeping our children healthy must be a priority. Families must have access to doctors and nurses. We must establish full-service health clinics in our schools so that our children aren't missing school or unable to learn due to preventable illnesses. Rialto parents are often unable to take time from work for preventive and other health care services.

1. We must pay more attention to the time students spend out of school. A body of research has shown that much of the achievement gap is rooted in what occurs outside of formal schooling. Students aren't losing ground in the classroom. Where they lose ground is in their lack of participation in learning activities during after-school hours and summer vacations. Rialto schools and the City must increase and maintain investments in areas such as longer school days, after-school and summer programs, and school-to-work programs with demonstrated track records.

Not all of these actions are a popular thing to do, but they must be done to ensure we are doing all that we can to prepare our children. The increasingly inter-connected world of the 21st Century places a premium on the preparation of all of our children to take

their place as effective workers, citizens, and family members.

Rialto has a decision to make. We can continue to pursue education strategies that focus on schools alone and on narrow, test-based accountability-and be satisfied with

the modest improvements. Or we can be BOLD by being ambitious and adopt a new and expanded strategy with the capacity to improve student achievement.

Record Attendance Expected At Annual California Native American Day Celebration

Traditional brush dancers, Southern California bird singers, food and arts will highlight the tenth annual celebration of Native American Day on Friday, September 26 at 6 p.m. The activities will be held in the Lower Commons area at California State University San Bernardino (CSUSB). The event, which is free and open to the public, marks the culmination of the weeklong California Indian Cultural Awareness Conference (CICAC) held each year at California State University, San Bernardino.

"We invite the public to join us and learn more about the history of California and its Native peoples," said James Ramos, California Native American Day Project Director and San Manuel Band of Mission Indians tribal member. "This is a rare opportunity to share in songs and dances that are rarely seen outside of California's native communities and reservations."

Since 1999, nearly 30,000 students and teachers have participated in the CICAC, a week-long forum offering a variety of educational activities about Native Americans indigenous to California, through workshops, educational resources and informative discussions by tribal members and academics.

Over five days of this year's conference, nearly 1,500 stu-

dents are scheduled to participate in events such as basketry, bird singing and pottery classes. All student and teacher events are held in the Santos Manuel Student Union.

Former Governor Ronald Reagan officially acknowledged the contributions of California's Native Americans in 1968 when he signed a resolution proclaiming the fourth Friday of

September as American Indian Day. Eventually, in 1998, the California Legislature passed Assembly Bill No. 1953 (Baca), establishing Native American Day as an official state holiday.

Today, people of all ages celebrate California Native American Day by learning more about the culture, heritage and traditions of California's Indians.

UCR Hosts 23rd California Indian Conference Oct. 3-4

American Indian health issues, language preservation and improving archaeology practices in California will highlight the 23rd annual California Indian Conference on Friday, Oct. 3, and Saturday, Oct. 4, at the UC Riverside Palm Desert Graduate Center.

The conference theme is "Good Medicine and Healthy Nations." Conference sessions will cover a variety of subjects from preserving the language, music and cultural traditions of California's Native Americans to access to medical care and programs that address major health issues of American Indians such as obesity and diabetes.

The event is sponsored by UCR's California Center for Native Nations, the Agua Caliente Band of Cahuilla Indians, the Rupert Costo Chair in American Indian Affairs, UCR's Center for Ideas and

Society and California State University, San Bernardino.

For 23 years California Indians, scholars and Native Americans from many parts of North America have met at the California Indian Conference to learn about the culture, language, history, literature and lives of California Indians, said Cliff Trafzer, professor of history and Costo Professor of American Indian Affairs at UC Riverside.

Multiple conference sessions on Oct. 4 – titled "Finding Common Ground" – will provide an opportunity to share concerns about archaeology practices in California with the Archaeological Resources Committee of the State Historic Preservation Office. Committee member Donn Grenda will be present to take comments.

"There are a lot of hard feelings in California about the way developers build with respect to protecting sites that are impor-

tant to American Indians," Trafzer said. "These sessions will give American Indian people a chance to talk directly with the commission about their concerns, such as desecration of graves."

Also featured during the conference will be art shows by Billy Soza War Soldier, a Luiseño Indian from the Soboba Indian Reservation near San Jacinto; George Blake, a Hupa Indian from the Hoopa Valley

Indian Reservation; and James Luna, a Luiseño performance artist from the La Jolla Indian Reservation.

City Prepares for Riverside Freeway Construction

The high-occupancy vehicle (HOV) lane on the Riverside Freeway (State Route 91), between Tyler Street and Magnolia Avenue will be closed for three weekends, starting this weekend, Sept. 26-28, and continuing Oct. 3-5 and 17-19.

Construction of the La Sierra Avenue overpass requires the closure of the freeway's eastbound and westbound HOV lanes from 8 p.m., Friday, until 5 a.m., Sunday, on all three weekends.

Additionally, both eastbound and westbound No. 1 and 2 lanes

will close from 10 p.m. to 5 a.m. Friday and Saturday nights on all three weekends.

La Sierra Avenue over the freeway will remain open during construction, although delays are expected. All businesses will remain open and accessible. Drivers should use alternate routes, such as Pierce, Magnolia or Tyler Streets, during the closures.

Republican lawmakers rejected dire warnings from the government's top economic officials of recession, layoffs and more lost homes if Congress dares to kill or delay quick approval of the Bush administration's emergency bailout plan.

"We demand to know why overburdened taxpayers should bail out the Wall Street firms that created the crisis. It's their problem. It's their bill. We won't be pushed around by their time demands," Nancy Pelosi (D-San Francisco) said of the Republicans.

The dollar figure alone is staggering, amounting to 5% of the nation's gross domestic product. But the most distinctive element of the plan is the extent to which it would allow Treasury to act unilaterally: Its decisions could not be viewed by any court or administrative body, and once the emergency legislation was approved, the administration could raise the \$700 billion through government borrowing and would not be subject to Congress' traditional power of the purse.

"It essentially creates an economic czar with no administrative oversight, no legal review, and no legislative review. And it gives one man \$700 billion to disperse as he sees fit," said Sen. Diane Feinstein (D-Calif.), referring to Treasury Secretary Henry Paulson.

Already taking a financial beating at the forefront of the nation's housing crisis, Inland Empire taxpayers are understandably anxious if not outraged. How far will the bailout bingo go? So far this year, the federal government has put up nearly \$30 billion to avert a major financial default by the investment bank Bear Stearns; committed to investing as much as \$200 billion in preferred stock of the loss-plagued finance giants Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac and at least \$5 billion in their mortgage securities; and agreed to provide an emergency loan of \$85 billion to (AIG) American International Group, Inc. in return for an ownership stake of as much as 80% in the stricken insurance giant.

"We're talking about hundreds of billions of dollars that are needed," said Secretary Paulson of the bailout plan. "That doesn't mean we will go all the way there, and that doesn't mean we will not go for more."

"First, we were told that Bear Stearns was too big to fail, then we were told that Freddie/Fannie were too big to fail, then we were told AIG was too big to fail. What's next -

Shell Oil?" explained Sharlee Williams who in June lost her Riverside home to foreclosure. Last week the senior student financial aide officer was laid off after ailing Lehman Brothers sought bankruptcy protection.

"The economy is a big mess. It's terrible. I've been jobless for three months

and I'm just getting my first unemployment check," said San Bernardino resident Shawn Ernest Bane with his son Shawn Jr. 3 in tow at a Highland Avenue bus stop. "The system is corrupt and broken and the government doesn't care."

While some locals are deciding how to navigate the job market and housing meltdown, Alfonso Murphy and others are putting the brakes on retirement.

Decades of saving and hard work as a teacher earned Murphy what he thought would be a comfortable retirement. In 2001 he bought a home in Redlands then the bottom fell out of the real estate market and stocks tumbled, wiping out a third of his \$625,000 net worth over the last two years. Tight on cash the 71-year-old retiree recently took a job as a substitute teacher to supplement his dwindling nest egg.

"How do you justify these big bailouts when millions of hard working Americans are struggling? This is obviously coloring my judgment about the upcoming elections and who I should be voting for," said Murphy.

Both Presidential candidates have weighed in on the bailouts. Senator Barack Obama blames the economic meltdown on Wall Street greed and the Republican's failed economic policies. Meanwhile Senator John McCain points the finger at the Democrats' lack of economic planning to solve the crisis.

Key Club at Cajon High School, where he teaches community services and leadership skills to students. The Key Club is a student-run organization affiliated with Kiwanis International, and mentoring these youth is one of many duties McCombs performs as a Kiwanian.

The Commitment to Service Award honors the person the selection committee believes has given the most of anyone through a community service organization.

This year's winner, Pastor Gwendolyn Rose, opened Rescue Team Ministries in 2002 as a place where people as a place where those in unexpected difficult situations could find solutions and keep their dignity.

Since its opening, Rescue Team Ministries has given thousands of dollars to victims of fires, evictions, and to those who have recently had a death in their family. It has sent hundreds of pounds of clothes, shoes and books to Africa to help educate and clothe people on that continent, and Gwendolyn's husband Don Rose has traveled to African villages to give Christian messages.

"When Pastor Rose is not rescuing victims from the street, you can find her in the prison system ministering the word of God and fighting in Sacramento for the rights of those incarcerated," her nomination read. "She can be seen evangelizing to those in need on skid row or sharing God's love in convalescent homes."

Gwendolyn Rose recently received her Master's Degree from Cal State, San Bernardino and now teaches special education students for the County Schools of San Bernardino. She and her husband are the parents of six children.

The Black Rose Award winners are others whom the selection committee believes have done exceptional things for the Black community over the past year.

It has given this award to different people, and sometimes to organizations, over each of the previous 18 Black Rose Award ceremonies. This year's winners join an ever-enlarging group in of Inland Empire residents who are making a difference in their community.

Lea Cash raised her four grown children as a single mom. At the same time she has served in various volunteer capacities in southern California for more than 18 years.

When her children were school-age she volunteered as a PTA mom. She also volunteered with the now closed Los Angeles County Maclaren Hall for abused and abandoned youth, the Elizabeth Glaser Pediatric AIDS/Inland Empire Health Underwriters, San Bernardino's National Night Out and as Rialto's team captain for Revlon's Breast Cancer Run/Walk.

In addition, Cash has worked as a freelance entertainment reporter, for the Black Voice News for two years, and previously for the Precinct Reporter for 16 years.

Three years ago, Cash started a non-profit organization called The Brightest Star, Inc., thus embarking on her dream of building self-esteem and self-worth in children who are abused, neglected and abandoned to live in residential treatment facilities (orphanages) and foster homes. The Brightest Star, Inc. recruits and works with celebrities in the fields of art, television, music, sports, politics, motion pic-

tures, radio, theater, education, community service and business.

Beulah Pitts has been a member of St. Paul AME Church for 40 years, and a deaconess there for many of them. She is a one-woman "sick committee" visiting sick people from her church at least three times a week, one of whom lives in Perris.

Two women in her church are disabled, and Pitts helps them by visiting at least once a week to pay their bills, shop for their groceries, take them to doctor's appointments and run other errands for them as needed. She also makes telephone calls and sends get well cards to the sick and shut-in worshippers at her church, as well as birthday cards to members who are celebrating another year.

The first Friday of each month is Prayer warrior time at St. Paul, and Pitts is there before 6 a.m. to prepare and serve breakfast to all participants. She also shops for the food and cleans the reception hall.

Pitts also has trained volunteers at the Westside Community Center, which was part of her job when she worked for the City of San Bernardino. She's now retired.

Roy Mabry has extensive experience with the California Department of Corrections, where he achieved the level of Lieutenant. As former President for twelve years of the Association of Black Correctional Workers (ABCW), Mr. Mabry helped to provide training for law enforcement officers throughout the state of California and throughout the country.

Although he is now retired he continues to volunteer and to speak to the law enforcement community and the public at large about prison issues. He also speaks at schools, encouraging youth to stay away from drugs and violence and to get involved in community service.

Through his leadership he sponsors a variety of awards and scholarships for deserving high school students as well as funds for programs that cater to underprivileged children.

"As important as good law enforcement is to the community, without community involvement, it would be difficult for law enforcement officers to perform their duties to the desired effect," said those nominating Mabry. "True leaders recognize the importance of community and do everything possible to involve the community in a positive manner."

Terrance Stone is the founder of Young Visionaries, a non-profit agency solely dedicated to eradication of youth gangs in San Bernardino County. Young Visionaries provides mentoring, after school tutoring, community outreach, arts therapy, youth violence prevention, leadership, youth employment development, and youth advocacy training.

Stone has established current anti-gang throughout the county, especially in the desert regions. Additionally, he serves as an executive board member of the San Bernardino County Gangs and Drugs Task Force, a volunteer position which requires collaboration of numerous non-profit agencies in San Bernardino County and law enforcement.

Stone recently has helped to form a Gangs and Drugs Task Force sub-committee to deal solely with gang and drugs issues in the High Desert. He also has trained High Desert residents about the many facets of the gang and drug subculture, resulting in a better awareness and in programs designed to address the issues in the High Desert.

Stone has been invited to the Bahamas

and Australia to assist with their gang prevention programs. He has partnered with the San Bernardino Police Association to provide sports program for the youth of the community, and has been a speaker at assemblies motivating students in the San Bernardino City and Rialto school districts. He has been involved in banquets honoring community members and providing scholarships to students.

"There is no other individual in this county who has taken the steps to personalize the eradication of the gang element in this county," read his nomination. "Mr. Stone has experienced first-hand the negative effects of this subculture and is truly making an impact in this county at the most basic level, the individual child."

Dr. Paulette Brown-Hinds, a San Bernardino native and daughter of Hardy and Cheryl Brown, is the managing partner of BPC Media Works, LLC; Co-Publisher of The Black Voice News and Executive Director of California Black Media.

She serves her community through activities that promote diversity, cultural pride, and political and economic awareness through media, arts and education.

One project she worked on was to collaborate with the San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools office to develop an outreach program that by creating videos, encouraged family storytelling and strengthens students' computer and writing skills. The project also brought diverse cultures together to facilitate better understanding and sensitivity. The 10-week project culminated in a celebration where six videos were screened, and participants told how the project taught them new skills and provided an opportunity to learn more about the people in their community.

Again with the San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools, Brown-Hinds produced the "Footsteps To Freedom Underground Railroad Tour," an educational project designed to teach educators, students and community members about the plight of enslaved African-Americans. She has helped conduct tours with more than 300 teachers, students and community members who travel from Kentucky to Canada to trace the steps of the Underground Railroad. She partnered with the San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools, California State University, San Bernardino and the Riverside County Office of Education, to arrange the tours.

Brown-Hinds is an accomplished writer, publisher and lecturer who has received many personal honors and awards.

Dr. Herb Fischer her former principal at San Bernardino High School, where she was commissioner of Assemblies and Elections nominated her for this award.

For the last six years, Velda Griffin has been the Executive Director at Option House, an agency that works to prevent domestic violence and assist its victims. Under her leadership, the agency has expanded services to include teen violence prevention, workshops and training for men and more transitional housing for those clients who are further along in their goals of healthy lifestyles.

The agency has never been well supported with public funds, so during her leadership Griffin has put together a board to assist in raising private donations.

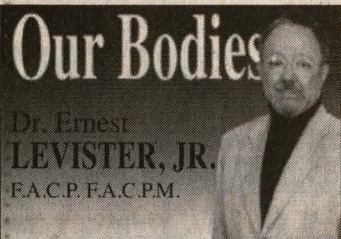

Our Bodies (NPs), (PAs) Can Cut Patient's Costs And Time

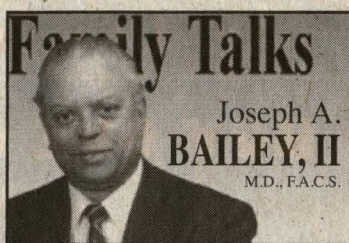
With costs skyrocketing, face time with doctors dwindling and technological innovation occurring at breakneck speed, consumers are increasingly being forced to make difficult healthcare decisions. Getting a jump on the latest developments can empower you to take charge of your health.

One element of the rapidly changing health care landscape is face time with your physician. Very soon going to the doctor won't necessarily mean seeing the doctor.

What this means: To control costs and make healthcare more accessible, many states are allowing nurse practitioners (NPs) and physician's assistants (PAs) to conduct physical examinations, diagnose and treat illnesses, order and interpret tests, write prescriptions, and counsel patients on preventative care without being supervised by doctors. In these states, physicians primarily handle complicated cases.

How will it affect you: Expect more NPs and PAs to treat you unless you have hard-to-manage health issues, in which case you'll still see your doctor. It is now common place to see healthcare services offered in pharmacies, grocery stores and malls rather than just doctors' offices and clinics. Many of them are staffed by NPs and PAs.

Many of my patients have expressed reservations about trusting NPs or PAs. Despite some concerns about oversight on difficult cases, there are plenty of benefits particularly for minor illnesses. Ask your doctor to ensure that your health needs – including any concerns you have about prescription, medications, and how to handle medical records – are met when you see an NP or PA.



Amazingly, in reviewing the indexes of my 300 psychology, sociology, and psychiatry books, only one mentioned the word "arrogance." So what are European males trying to hide? The one book said this one line. The expansive type of Aggression is subdivided into three major groups: the Narcissistic; the Arrogant-Vindictive; and the Perfectionistic types. These three are acquired as part of socialization; are part of the following four types of the Arrogant-Types I, II, III, and IV—representing the

Extreme, Moderate, Slight, and Mild respectively; and their common features are present in appropriate degrees. Being "normal" at birth, one type destined to be arrogant soon experience a loss of power that develops into an **Inferiority Complex**. This is a Selfhood filled with a sense of inadequacy and insecurity resulting from a lack of self-confidence in certain aspects that one deems significant to them in getting through the maze of life. Such a lack of Self-Confidence either destroys or prevents from forming those Selfhood props related to Self-Respect, Self-Regard, Self-Appreciation, Self-Trust, Self-Responsibility, Self-Reliance, and Self-Efficacy. To overcome these lacks or losses, afflicted individuals develop a **Superiority Complex**—a mindset that is never secure because the afflicted know their claims were not earned. It shows in varying degrees of destruction that can range from constant to periodic.

Classification of Arrogance

A second type is where the newborn is treated as a "little god" and this continues throughout their lives. As a result, they are called "Aristocratic"—meaning they have an inordinate claim to a false superiority and have retained their **Infantile "selfishness"**—a phase composed of "self" and "ended" and "self" and "full." The idea is that one is full of one's own self-interest and is oriented to pursue that interest as an end for one's life. Throughout history, people—mainly of the upper social class— who believe special privileges are owed them, reflect narcissistic entitlement. Thus, they expect to always be treated as VIPs (an abbreviation for "Very Important Persons") and are morbidly (unhealthily) interested in themselves. Both are about extreme concern for the self and lack of concern for others. From failing to mature out of a childish state they (and those with an Inferiority Complex) have the features of **Brutes**.

Type I despise good people; are fiercely vindictive; are haters of those who are not like them; are aggressive toward those who challenge them; are suspicious and distrustful of fellow brutes; and intensely seek money and material pleasures. Devoid of a sense of fair play and moral "rightness," they are perpetrators of hate and evil. All four types are deluded and show envious, jealous, boaster, prideful, unappreciative, disobedient, mean, stubborn, false accuser, untrustworthy, and power hungry behaviors. They expect others to be perfect in dealing with them and say: "read my mind and do what I want"; "Do as I say but don't do what I do"; and "I'll judge you but don't you judge me." People with an arrogant superiority complex are "seldom right but never in doubt." By seeing themselves as having "more than" others, they develop an arrogant attitude characterized by: (1) an excessive need for recognition and praise; (2) being

hypersensitive to even mild criticism; (3) overzealousness and excessive conscientiousness in personally performing or having others perform relatively unimportant duties; (4) self-centeredness, as in monopolizing the conversation (especially about oneself); (5) lack of interest in what others are saying to the extent of cutting them off in mid-sentence; (6) failing to show compassion, caring, and empathy for others; (7) the "do it my way or the highway" attitude; and (8) "I build myself up while I tear you down." In summary, arrogance is way "too much" about oneself and way "too little" — if anything—about others.

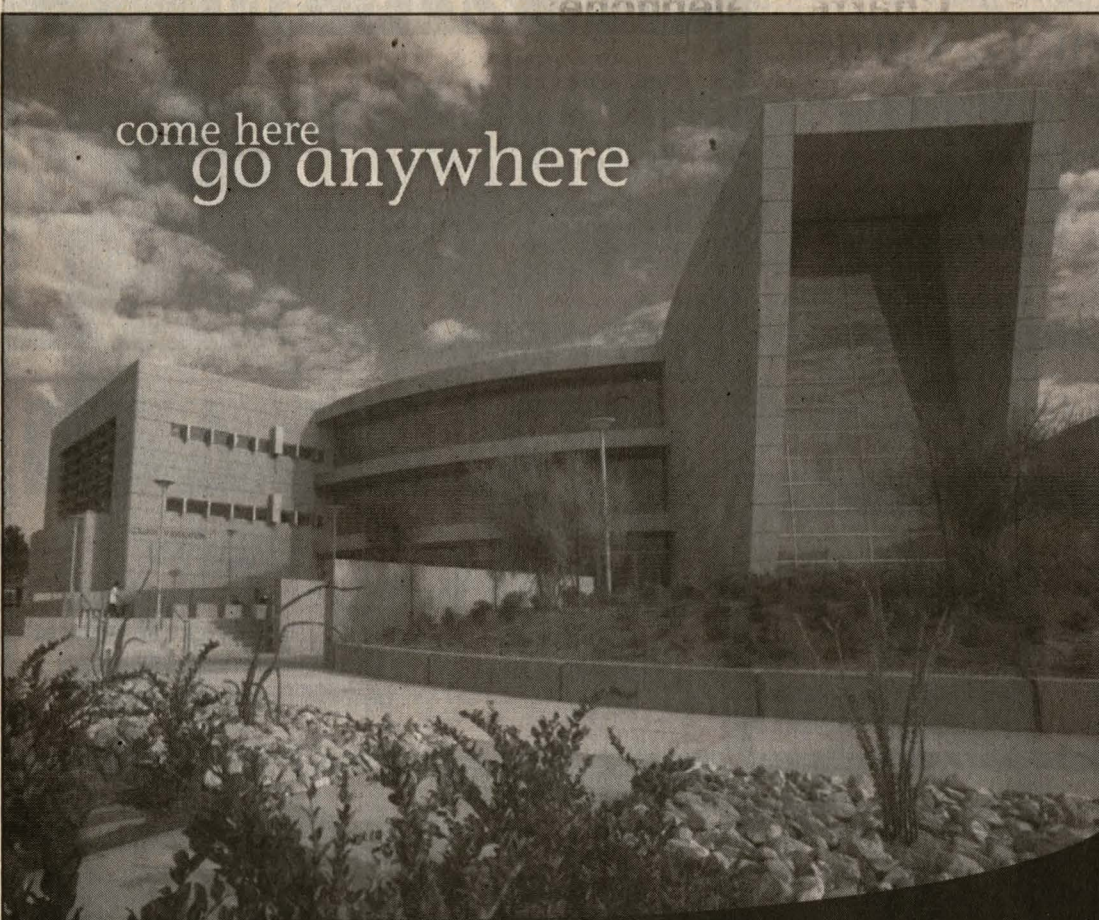

Hope is not so far away for this generation. In fact, if you listen closely enough, you will hear it in the melodic sounds of eighteen year old Andrew DeBarge of Riverside, California.

It began on the bleak, notorious Sigsbee Street of Grand Rapids, Michigan. Total poverty. Drug dealers. Crack houses. Chaos and crime. Homicide rates that supersede your typical hood.

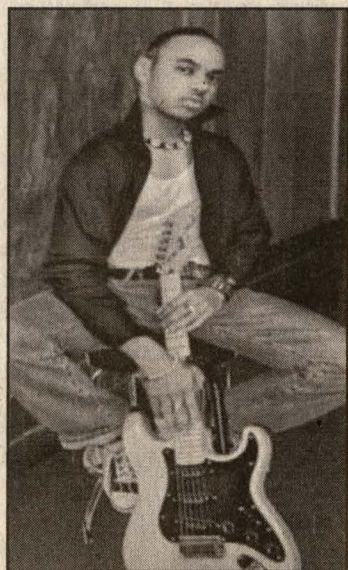
This was DeBarge's environment, but it would not become his reality.

Andrew, son of April and Tommy DeBarge, the bass player of the American R&B group "DeBarge," was born into a musical family whose career peaked in the mid 80's just before the harsh realities of the music industry robbed them of financial stability and left them in poverty.

After years of hardship and struggle Andrew's parents decided it was time to pursue a different dream. So they packed up and headed for California where Andrew might receive a better chance at making his music known to the world. They ended up in Riverside, California.

But even after the three exhaustive days of traveling in a packed sedan and finally arriving in the state that promised them new beginnings, their dream seemed even further away. They had no place to stay; their car would become their home for the next several days.

Yet even under such severe circumstances, Andrew and his family would remain faithful and count it a blessing when, a week later, his mother's friend discovered shelter for them at the "Come on in Motel." It was still not a

home, but the DeBarges honored the welcoming gesture of its name and trusted that home would always be a place inside of them.

Through constant prayer and determination, their faith would see them through and bring them out of the motel and into the two bedroom apartment where they currently reside. Andrew says it was his music that kept him strong.

"Many people underestimate music," DeBarge reveals. "Music is one of the strongest forms of communication; it holds a great deal of power. My music is about my relationship with God."

For this young man, what most would consider extreme conditions of social injustice and despair has become the fabric of the multi-talented teenager's undaunted and tenacious character.

"These events have shaped me. When you have nothing, you realize what life is really about," says DeBarge whose conviction of this truth is carefully reflected in his multifaceted lyrics. "I

don't take my music lightly; money is not an object because I value my brother's life more than music."

Andrew's debut album "Your Place" which includes fifteen self-composed and produced tracks that he recorded in his own apartment studio, is "sort of like [a compilation] of parables," he reveals. Each song illustrates the value that he places on brotherhood. His favorite is song number five, entitled "Where I Belong," and is a message to his brothers and sisters from all walks of life that meditates on feelings of loneliness and helplessness. In the song he encourages his listeners that "when you are going through so much, you can bring something beautiful out of it."

"My message is important. No one should ever feel like they don't matter. There is at least one other person that needs your help in this life. Everyone has a purpose for being here," he emphasizes with a confident wisdom seldom found in the heart of an eighteen-year-old.

But DeBarge is indeed a teenager. He has a youthful, vibrant style and a refreshingly free spirit. He takes courses at Riverside Community College (RCC) and will receive his Associates degree in Business in the Spring of 2009. In between classes you may be able to spot him at the basketball courts at RCC. But usually, if he's not in the studio composing new songs on his guitar, he is working at Cold Stone in the Riverside Plaza earning money to put back into his self-owned record label: Andrew DeBarge Music, Inc.

DeBarge says that he learned in one of his business classes that an entrepreneur is someone who risks all their time and money to accomplish a goal, and by that definition he certainly has the heart of a true entrepreneur, but he reminds us

that his work is done with a clear vision and purpose out of his love for music, for people, and for God.

Reminiscent of a modern day King David, a great man in the Bible who would play his harp and calm souls, DeBarge associates himself with the likings of a contemporary David. Similar to the Biblical king, DeBarge, who is both a talented vocalist and an excellent guitarist, brings peace to his audience through his music. But just as David was not simply a great musician, DeBarge also possesses qualities of a true king.

Desiring that his listeners understand the transcendental elements of his music, he informs that "music is what I do, but it's not what I am. I am a child of God. Music is just a form of communication that God has given me."

Giving his mother and father credit for investing within him their love for him as well as their love for music, DeBarge is thankful for all the situations he has encountered in life. "If all the circumstances in my life hadn't happened, I would not be who I am today," he expresses with the utmost gratitude.

There is a rare quality about DeBarge – about his music – that is seemingly missing in today's popular culture. DeBarge will undoubtedly touch lives in a generation who is in need of the leadership, knowledge, and the authenticity that he emanates.

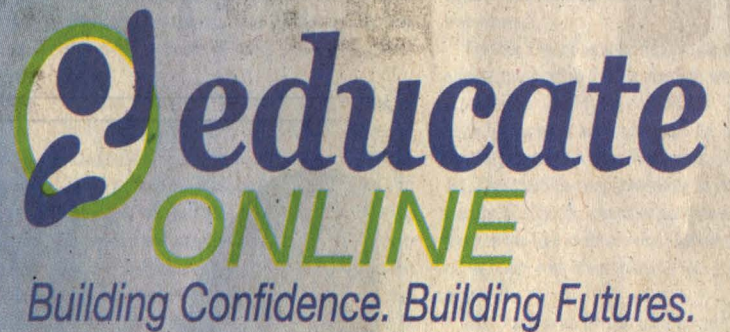

The Labor Movement in the U.S.

AFL-CIO ADVOCATES FOR EQUALITY



AS PART OF OUR CONTINUED COVERAGE ON THE LABOR UNION MOVEMENT, ONE LOCAL ORGANIZING CAMPAIGN DISCUSSES THE IMPORTANCE OF UNION DUES.

Union membership helps raise workers' pay and narrow the income gap that disadvantages minorities and women. Union workers earn 30 percent more than nonunion workers, according to the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics. Their median weekly earnings for full-time wage and salary work were \$863 in 2007, compared with \$663 for their nonunion counterparts.

The union wage benefit is even greater for minorities and women. Union women earn 33 percent more than nonunion women, African American union members earn 37 percent more than their nonunion counterparts, for Latino workers, the union advantage equals 51 percent and for Asian American workers, the union advantage is 4 percent.

Union members in low-wage occupations on average earn a great deal more than nonunion workers in the same occupations, often lifting their earnings above the official poverty level. For example, union cashiers in 2006 earned an average of \$11.87—46 percent more than nonunion workers in the same occupation. Over a year's time, having a union card could translate into more than \$7,800 in additional pay for such a low wage worker. While the nonunion cashier's earnings, on average, leaves a worker \$3,746 below the poverty line for a family of four, the union cashier's earnings, on average, brings the worker \$4,075 above the poverty line for a family of four.

According to Professor Harley Shaiken of the University of California-Berkeley,[1] unions are associated with higher productivity, lower employee turnover, improved workplace communication, and a better-trained workforce.

Prof. Shaiken is not alone. There is a substantial amount of academic literature on the following benefits of unions and unionization to employers and the economy:

- * Productivity
- * Competitiveness
- * Product or service delivery and quality
- * Training
- * Turnover
- * Solvency of the firm
- * Workplace health and safety
- * Economic development

Productivity

According to a recent survey of 73 independent studies on unions and productivity: "The available evidence points to a positive and statistically significant association between unions and productivity in the U.S. manufacturing and education sectors, of around 10 and 7 percent, respectively." Some scholars have found an even larger positive relationship between unions and productivity. According to Brown and Medoff, "unionized establishments are about 22 percent more productive than those that are not."

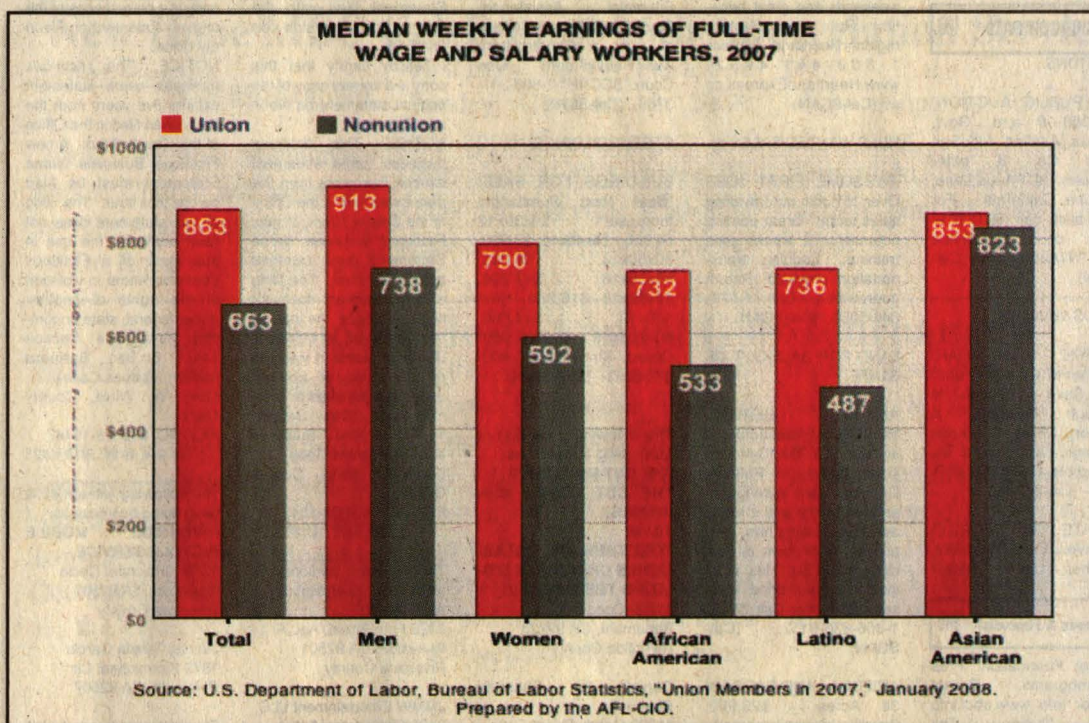
Product/Service Delivery and Quality

According to Professors Michael Ash and Jean Ann Seago, heart attack recovery rates are higher in hospitals where nurses are unionized than in non-union hospitals. Another study looked at the relationship between unionization and product quality in the auto industry. According to a summary of this study prepared by American Rights at Work:

"The author examines the system of co-management created through the General Motors-United Auto Workers partnership at the Saturn Corporation...The author credits the union with building a dense communications network throughout Saturn's management system. Compared to non-represented advisors, union advisors showed greater levels of lateral communication and coordination, which had a significant positive impact on quality performance."

Training

Several studies in have found a positive association between unionization and the amount and quality of workforce training. Unionized establishments are more likely to offer formal training. This is especially true for small firms. There are a number of reasons for this: less turnover among union workers, making the employer more likely to offer training; collective bargaining agreements that require employers to

provide training; and finally, unions often conduct their own training.

Turnover

Professor Shaiken also finds that unions reduce turnover. He cites Freeman and Medoff's finding that "about one fifth of the union productivity effect stemmed from lower worker turnover. Unions improve communication channels giving workers the ability to improve their conditions short of 'exiting.'"

Solvency

Labor's enemies assert that unions drive employers out of business, but academic research refutes this claim. According to Professors Richard Freeman and Morris Kleiner, unionism has a statistically insignificant effect (meaning no effect) on firm solvency. Freeman and Kleiner conclude "unions do not, on average, drive firms or business lines out of business or produce high displacement rates for unionized workers."

Workplace Health and Safety

Employers should be concerned about workplace health and safety as a matter of enlightened self-interest. According to an American Rights at Work summary of a study by John E. Baugher and J. Timmons Roberts:

"Only one factor effectively moves workers who are in subordinate positions to actively cope with hazards: membership in an independent labor union. These findings suggest that union growth could indirectly reduce job stress by giving workers the voice to cope effectively with job hazards."

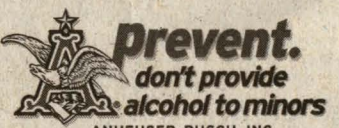

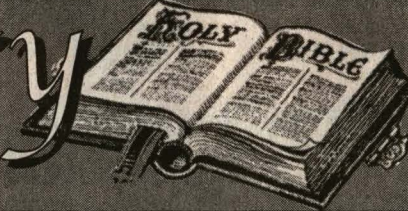
