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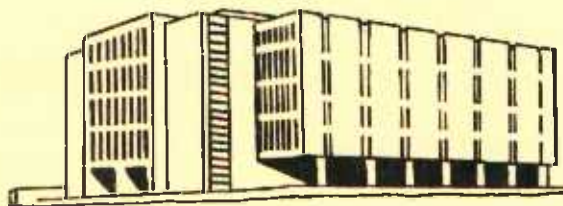

## PROGRAMS IN CRIMINAL JUSTICE, COMPUTER SCIENCE ARE APPROVED

Programs leading to a master of arts degree in criminal justice and a bachelor of science degree in computer science have received final approval by the chancellor and

The M.A. in criminal justice is designed for people in law enforcement, probation and corrections who have a bachelor's degree and wish to improve their management skills and promotion potential. Courses in the major will begin next fall, but students needing prerequisites may wish to begin course work earlier. Dr. Francis Coles is coordinating the program.

Interest in careers in computer science continues to grow rapidly, and the new program was developed to help meet that demand. Courses in the major will begin winter quarter. The first-time faculty in computer science joined the college this fall.

## INLAND BRASS QUINTET IN CONCERT NOV. 7

The Inland Brass Quintet will open its program with the first performance of an arrangement by James Keays (Music) at 3 p.m., Sunday, Nov. 7, in the Recital Hall. Keays, who plans to publish the piece, received a grant

last summer to work on his arrangement for brass of a German madrigal suite by Renaissance composer Hans Leo Hassler. He dedicated the piece to the Quintet.

Another first for the program will be a West Coast performance of "Spring Songs" by contemporary composer Don Freund. The piece mixes 20th century abstract with Renaissance style, including the use of quotes from "Royal Fanfare," by Renaissance composer Josquin des Pres. "Royal Fanfare" also is on the afternoon program.

Stewart Udem, trombone, will be soloist during Malcolm Arnold's "Quintet." Also heard will be Quintet No. 2 Opus 6, a 19th century romantic piece by Russian composer Victor Ewald, and selections from Bach's last work, "The Art of the Fugue."

Members of the Inland Brass Quintet are Udem, who teaches music at California Baptist College and Loma Linda University; David Grasmick, trumpet, a teacher at Cal Poly, Pomona; Larry Johansen, trumpet, California Baptist College and Cal State, San Bernardino; Keating Johnson, tuba, Cal State, San Bernardino; and Mary Keays, horn, Redlands Unified School District.

LAW OF THE SEA TREATY

not signing the Law of the Sea Treaty" at 3 p.m., Wednesday in PL 297. Pending in the United Nations for years, the treaty pertains to how major powers will use the sea. The talk will be given in conjunction with Dr. Richard Ackley's political science class "American Foreign Policy."

Dr. Don Walsh, director of the Institute for Marine and Coast Studies and professor of ocean engineering at the University of Southern California, will give a free lecture about the "Implications for the U.S. in

Prior to joining USC in 1975, Dr. Walsh served 23 years in the Navy. He was first officer-in-charge of the Navy's bathyscaph Trieste from 1959 to 1962 and commanded the submarine USS Bashaw from 1968 to 1969. During shore assignments, Dr. Walsh was involved in all phases of management of ocean-related research and development. He was director of the Remote Sensor Oceanography Project at Texas A&M University from 1965 to 1968, special assistant to the assistant secretary of the Navy for research and development from 1970 to 1973, and deputy director of Navy Laboratories from 1974 to 1975.

In 1973-74, Dr. Walsh was a fellow of the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in Washington, D.C., where he researched ocean policy issues. In late 1979, President Carter appointed him to a three-year term as a member of the National Advisory Committee on Oceans and Atmosphere.

Dr. Walsh holds a B.S. from the U.S. Naval Academy, M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in physical oceanography from Texas A&M, and an M.A. in political science from San Diego State. He has written more than 70 ocean-related papers, articles and book contributions, edited and contributed to the book The Law of the Sea--Issues in Ocean Resource Management, and co-author of the text An Introduction to Ocean Engineering.

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## CSU TRUSTEES PROPOSE 1983-84 SUPPORT BUDGET

A \$1,032,473,800 proposed support budget for The California State University for fiscal 1983-84 was approved by the Board of Trustees last week. The budget reflects a major effort by the CSU to respond to demands for education in high technology areas and recognizes the state's limited abilities for financing higher education.

Although the budget is 9.6 percent more than the current year, 6.3 percent is needed to adjust for inflation and to finance increasing personnel expenses such as a significant increase in retirement costs over 1982-83.

The trustees' budget seeks \$17,185,990 to address challenges in new and changing technology, particularly in engineering, business and computer science. These funds would permit hiring additional faculty and related staff and procuring specialized supplies and equipment.

The budget assumes an enrollment of 240,450 full-time equivalent students, or 550 more than projected for 1982-83. The trustees authorized adjustments of this and other budget assumptions by the chancellor if future events dictate. The Board also authorized the chancellor to add unique campus program proposals as appropriate.

The budget request goes to the state Department of Finance, the Legislature and the California Postsecondary Education Commission. Traditionally, the Department of Finance prepares the budget which the governor submits to the Legislature in January.

Scott Ward (Art), who coordinated the show and wrote the catalog essay, will give an overview of the display Wednesday, Nov. 3. Gillian Brown, who is showing a work duplicating a Polaroid shot, will speak Friday, Nov. 12. Michael Hughes, who created "The Construction Series," will give the final lecture Wednesday, Nov. 17. All lectures will be in VA 110. The show closes Nov. 24.

## UPDATE GIVEN ON AUW CAMPAIGN

With four of 21 campus units reporting, the Arrowhead United Way drive at the college has received \$1,547 in contributions from 36 employees. The amount represents approximately 12 percent of the college's monetary goal, and the number of contributors represents 20 percent of the goal for employee contributions. To date, the campaign has solicited 16 new contributors. Richard Bennecke, campaign chairman, asks that all employees return their payroll deduction forms, whether they wish to contribute or not, or their checks to either their unit volunteer or to Bennecke, at the Dean of Students Office.

Since 1981-82, students have been required to take one math class to fulfill the general education requirements. Some majors require additional courses. The placement test determines which courses students should take.
