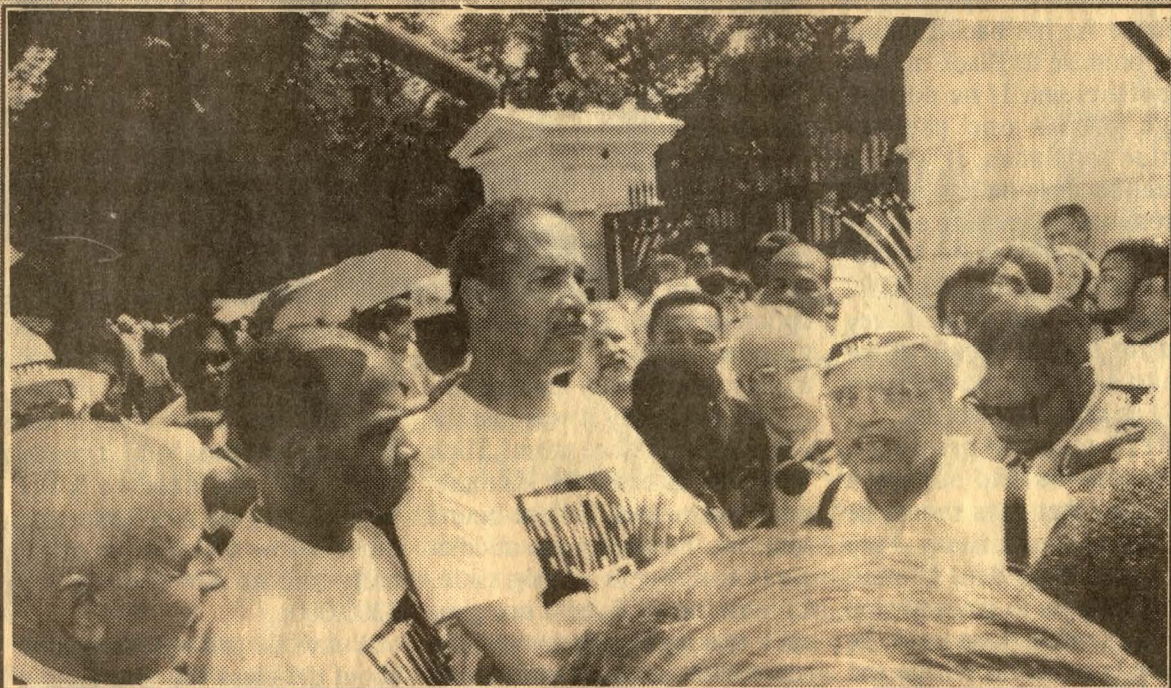

Blacks Thrown Out Of Maruko's Raddison

For one and one-half years James Gaspie and Mal Davis have been producing a networking Saturday night out for professionals in the community. They have been doing it at the Raddison, which is owned by the bankrupt Maruko Corporation. This is the same hotel which went into bankruptcy, when the city refused to help the original Black owner/developer Herman English. Last week Gaspie and Davis were given a thirty-day notice to leave the premises, in a move the hotel management said will better serve their guests.

Gaspie said, for months he has been providing a place for professionals to go for entertainment. Their list of clientele include doctors and lawyers, as well as other professionals. Gaspie said they have been providing the entertainment even though the staff has made it uncomfortable.

Gaspie and Davis both charge the staff deliberately did things to them that all put together, are racist actions i.e.:

1. Only have one hostess on the night of the event.

2. Comments on not liking this type of crowd: too many Black people.

3. Took away the bar stools, so women would not sit at the bar.

4. Last year a conservative political group came in and they were asked to turn their people around at the door.

5. The free buffet was canceled; the Health Department closed it down. However, it was never returned for their group, but is available for others.

6. Complaints that Gaspie and Davis were not treating the other customers (White) right were unfounded and refuted by the customer in question.

"The hotel is still owned by the Maruko Corporation, but many Blacks have been led to believe it is owned by Raddison," said Gaspie. Under the Maruko, African-Americans have had a protest against the way the former owner was treated. Many Blacks will not go there because of it. Others will not go because of the way Black employees are treated. Virtually every Black person hired, is used to get groups to come and then are mysteriously let go. No one

lasts long there and some will only talk off the record about the dealings at the hotel.

Davis, said the reason they use it is because the facility is very nice.

The pair had a written agreement with the hotel's nightclub "Boomers" that said as long as it was successful they could remain. They made their money off the door and Boomers made the proceeds off the bar. The Rhythm and Blues music was provided by a D.J.

Gaspie said he was told by the bartender the reason given for the termination was, management wanted to change the music to top 40 or Country Western. Gaspie and Davis are taking issue with the termination, but are not actually fighting to get back because of the bad feelings in the community about the facility. When asked, why do you continue to take racist comments and behavior, they said, "we are use to abuse. We have been disrespected for so long we get use to it." They said whenever things would get so bad they would talk to the manager, Mr. James Deskus, Deskus, would take care of the

A few weeks ago, we ran a story on Mission Barbecue, a downtown Riverside, barbecue restaurant, who was being forced to change his operation because of the Mission Inn. He ordered a new improved pit that cost about \$6,000 in anticipation of the increased business from the Inn's opening.

The city told him he had to remove his pit from outside of

his store. No one had ever told him that the Mission Inn's reopening would cause him so much grief. The city allows sidewalk dining.

That story was picked up by the Press Enterprise, the LA Times and then Channel 4 KNBC and Channel 2 KCBS news. The result was the Downtown Riverside Association went to bat for him and got the city agreed to give him an Encroachment Permit

for a six month period. Then the city will help relocate the smoker inside of the building or find another new business location in the area.

Owner, Robert Braton said he is pleased with the decision, and would welcome the city's help. "I'm just a small businessman, trying to make a success of this business,". The opening of the Mission Inn has increased his business by about 50% he said.

Mother Looks In Horror As Riverside Police Beat Her Son

A mother on the east-side of Riverside watched in horror as an officer beat her son after he called her on the phone to open the door so he could come in.

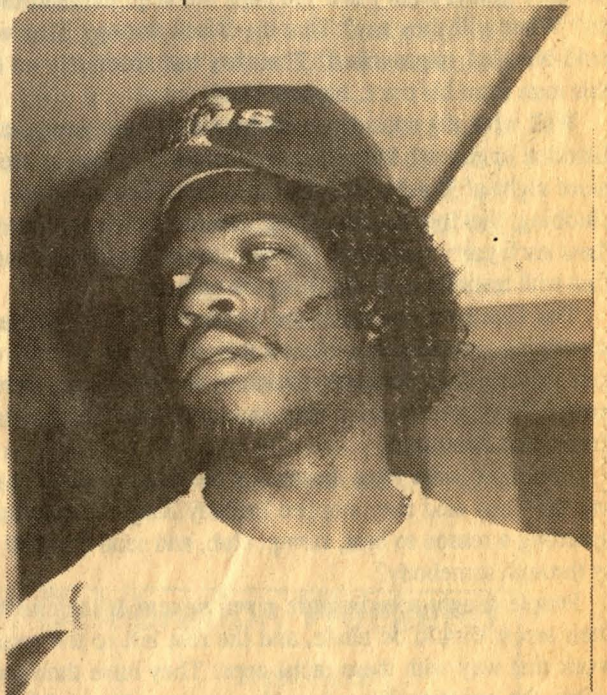
The parolee Charles William Randall, 23, said he was at a friend's house visiting across the street at about 1:00 a.m. on May 26, 1993, when he called his mother and asked her to open the door.

He stepped in the street and the officer drove up. He asked, "do you know me?" Randall said, "no." "Are you on parole?" "Yes". "For what?" Randall answered "for being a bad guy".

The officer told him to put his hands up behind his head. With his hands up, he was holding him by the hair, when Randall complained, he (the officer) told him to shut the "F__" up. He thought my ID was in my back pocket, and he asked permission to get it. I told him it was in my front pocket, and asked, "What did I do?" Again he said shut the "F__" up. The officer told him to get the ID.

Randall said when he complied with the order to get his

ID, two more cars came (on the scene). "The next thing I knew I was on the ground, I had been kicked in the side and stomped on the head." His mother said, she heard the commotion, and

then heard her son hollering for help. He told his girl friend "go get my mother! After he was beaten, they grabbed her, pat searched her and took her back to the (police) car his (mother) said it was a desperate call and one she knew immediately. She looked out the window as they were beating him and hollered, "Stop beating my son!" In just that period of time the officer tried to put him to sleep with a choke hold. the officer was picking him up by 2 fingers, telling him to get up.

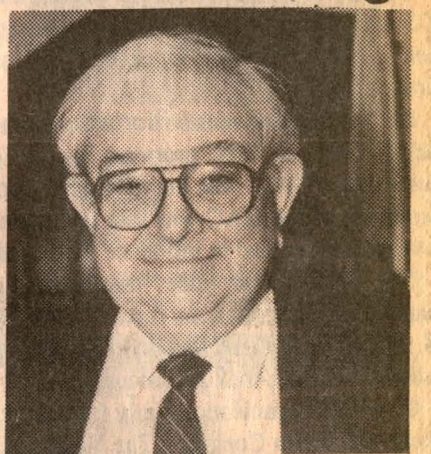
They then ran him to the

The L.A. Dilemma By Louise James

It will be interesting to see how the second trial of the officers who beat Black motorist Rodney King, turns out. Sgt. Stacey Koon, Officers Laurence Powell Theodore Briseno, and Timothy Wind, acquitted in April 1992, are on trial in Los Angeles to determine if they violated King's civil rights. The jury of 9 Whites, 2 Blacks, and 1 Hispanic, will decide to convict, or again acquit them.

However there's a "sticky-wicket" here, as there is yet another trial upcoming. That of four Black men, Damian Williams, Henry Watson, Antoine Miller, and Gary Williams. three are charged with beating white trucker Reginald Denny, and the fourth, Gary Williams, is charged with robbing him.

And so anticipation runs high as we wait for trials end. If the cops are convicted, there will be an outcry from many white citizens, and a lotta of white Cops. It will also set the stage as far as they are concerned, to convict the Blacks who beat Denny.

If on the other hand they are not convicted, there will be a similar, and even more vociferous outcry among Blacks. And a like stage will be set to acquit those accused of beating Denny. Thus.... the "L.A. dilemma". How are they gonna justify it if the cops are acquitted and the Blacks convicted? What will they say? That the Black wrong? That what they did was cold-blooded, unprovoked? That they had absolutely no business dragging this man from his truck, beating him?

Well what the cops did to Rodney King was wrong, and about as cold-blooded as it gets! Moreover these racist.... lunatics are provoked by the mere sight of Black skin! And they had absolutely no business beating, clubbing, kicking, tasing King, no matter their attempt to justify it. Taser darts each carry a reported 50,000 volts of electricity, and witnesses at the first trial testified to seeing King hit with two.

The Blacks involved in the Denny case were at least coming off of something...reacting to a blatant miscarriage of justice yet again, as racist cops having done unjustified harm to another Black, were again let off the hook! They were angry, they saw a White, and they acted out of that anger, that frustration.

...but now what were these cops coming off of? What were they reacting to? They said they stopped Rodney King for speeding. Since when is speeding a reason to beat, stomp, club, and send 100,000 volts of electricity through somebody?

People caught speeding are given tickets. If there is "reason" to arrest, then arrest should be made, and the rest left to the courts. Only it don't work that way with these racist cops! They have their own agenda, which raises the question: Why does the caution about taking the law into our own hands apply to private citizens and not to them? They're famous for it!

They arrest us in the streets, try us in the streets, convict us in the streets, sentence us in the streets...to fractured skulls, broken ribs, dislocated jaws, torn retinas. Sentence us to kicks in the groin, concussion, a bullet in the head!

These racists do serious damage to Black men, and historically drag out that old line about "resisting arrest", as in the Rodney King case. Of course they're gonna say we resisted arrest! How else are they to explain the battered, mangled condition of the bodies standing before the judge in arraignment court?

Without a doubt, some of the same upstanding citizens who were appalled by the beating of Reginald Denny, felt that what the cops did to Rodney King was perfectly alright. Why? Because they are cops! So-called law enforcers. Only they weren't enforcing the law! They were taking advantage of that badge they wear to violate it! ...so now we watch, and we wait, for the outcome of the second trial of Koon, Powell, Briseno, and Wind.

The ANC Women's League invites messages of support to the women of South Africa in their demonstration against the most sexist decision by men to exclude women in the next session of the multi-party negotiations forum.

Before the Convention for a democratic South Africa (CODESA 11) met in 1992, an ANC proposal for the formation of a Gender Advisory Committee (GAC) was implemented. However, on evaluation, the major weakness of the GAC was that it remained a side show. Its input could never be guaranteed to influence the actual negotiations.

The ANC has proposed that women advisors join the 26 men of all shades in the negotiations forum. This was rejected out of hand on March 18, 1993. Men jeered and booed at the prospect of women advising in the political decision-making process.

Out of 26 organizations only four supported the proposal. The ANC, the Transvaal Indian Congress, The Natal Indian Congress and the Communist Party.

So, the ANC Women's League will lead a protest against this backward decision on April 1, 1993.

I speak for myself and many other neighbors in Moreno Valley, California. I would like to formally express my absolute support for maintaining March Air Force Base as an active-duty military facility.

While I am relieved that the Defense Secretary did not recommend March for total closure, I am still very disappointed that such an essential military base would even be considered for realignment. March is the state's oldest air base and is certainly critical to our national security. It is the last major Southern California Air Base that can provide rapid air mobility and support to other military installations in the region, such as the Marine Corps Camp Pendleton and Twenty-nine Palms Bases.

The strategic position and importance of March AFB have been demonstrated clearly over the past 75 years. I'm sure you're aware that March AFB played a key role in special operations as Desert Storm in 1991 and the relief mission to Somalia, (with) air transport and refueling services. Even during "peacetime," the United States cannot afford to feel too secure and "let down their guard." We must always remain prepared, and that calls for a renewed commitment to our most strategically critical military operations. That includes March.

In addition to defense issues, please consider the 60,000 military retirees in our local region who rely on the critical services provided by March AFB facilities. The hospital and commissary are sorely needed.

Why Do They Call Him Slick Willie?

Expect an announcement by President Clinton any day that he has to drastically cut back on the grants h-

He will probably say that pressure to cut back the \$16.3 billion "stimulus" spending is the cause for his backtracking on his promise to Black mayors and politicians. If he doesn't renege on his one pseudo-promise to Blacks, it will be unusual because he has broken his promises to everyone else.

Last week, it was the homosexuals' turn. During the 1992 campaign, he told them if they voted for him he would allow them to serve in the military openly as gays and lesbians.

After becoming president, largely with the help of gays, a judge ruled that gays should be admitted to the military. Five weeks later, President Clinton sent his lawyers to court to stop the judge's ruling. Last week, he completely broke his pledge and said he was considering segregating gays in the military if they are admitted.

This final act of deceit caused his gay friend of 25 years and a

close aide, David Mixner, to call Clinton's decision "morally repugnant."

The President's actions "sickened my stomach," Mixner said. "To see someone in whom I invested such hope, and held in such high regard, seriously present an option to segregate my community was morally repugnant."

You might say it was just the gays' turn. Before them, Slick Willie has finessed the Haitian's, small businesses, college-bound students, the elderly and middle-class taxpayers — big time. Clinton has devised a tax gimmick that artificially bumps low and middle-income families into higher income brackets so he can say the income bracket they truly belong to is not being taxed — only the "rich" are. He calls the flim flam "Family

Economic

Income." For example, if you make \$20,000 a year, Clinton will tell you the "rich" (working families making \$100,000 a year) are the real problem and we are going to get back at them because they stole from the poor in the 80's.

Clinton's hate-the-rich message: If you only make \$20,000, you didn't steal in the 80's, or you didn't do it really well, and you deserve a tax break — so no new taxes for those below \$30,000 (he originally said no new taxes below \$200,000).

But while you're feeling good about the class war and getting back at the "rich," Clinton adds things such as the tips he says you didn't report on your taxes or the rent he says you collected (and you say you didn't) to your

\$20,000 income and artificially puts you in the \$30,000 group. That way he can say he does not tax those below \$30,000.

So, although you pay taxes on \$20,000, Clinton says you make \$30,000 and, of course, no one who makes \$20,000 pays new taxes. But you do because he artificially boosted your income by 40%.

Now do you know why they call him Slick Willie!

To Be Equal: Cut Black Unemployment Now

The unemployment crisis in the African American community ought to be at the top of the national agenda.

Rhetoric about diversity, the long-term beneficial effects of cutting the deficit, and the need to make modest investments in the economic infrastructure are all meaningless to people with no jobs and no hopes of getting jobs — and that's the situation in which too many African Americans find themselves.

The old theory that if the economy booms, wealth and work will trickle down was disproved by the experience of the 1980s, when a booming economy largely bypassed black workers.

... Today, black unemployment is well over double the white rate.

And the official unemployment figures grossly understate true black joblessness, since disproportionate numbers of

African Americans have dropped out of the labor force.

There are many reasons why people who want to work are not in the labor force — school attendance, home responsibilities, health, and others — and the percentages of blacks and whites-citing those reasons are comparable.

But over a million Americans aren't looking for work because they think they can't get a job. Proportionately far more blacks than whites are represented in that category, suggesting that significant numbers of African Americans have a negative outlook about their job opportunities.

For many, that reflects a realistic assessment of the job market and their place in it, and it also reflects past experiences with a discriminatory job scene.

Surveys show that twice as many blacks as whites believe that people often miss out on jobs because of their race and that there aren't enough jobs to go around.

But while those perceptions are accurate, there is a danger that such a negative outlook can become a self-fulfilling prophecy, discouraging people from trying to find work or the training that can qualify them for jobs.

Another disturbing aspect of America's skewed labor market is the worsening employment prospects for black youth.

In 1992 the number of unemployed black youth increased by over 26 percent, while the number of unemployed white youth actually declined by almost ten percent.

Officially, the black youth unemployment rate stood at an incredible 39.6 percent at year-end; among young black males, it was 42.2 percent.

Such troubling numbers can lead some people to throw up their hands and say that the problem can't be solved.

But in fact, the numbers are very manageable. Or at least, they would be manageable if job creation efforts were sharply tar-

geted to the areas of greatest need.

That's why I'm dubious about the effects of scatter-shot training, job creation, and infrastructure programs. They don't target. Therefore they are relatively ineffective in bringing people back into the labor force and utilizing their potential.

And I'm especially concerned about the horrendous unemployment among black youth — a problem that could be solved with real commitment from the government and from the private sector.

Official statistics claim that the total number of unemployed young African Americans is only 316,000. Obviously, that's just the tip of the iceberg, but it certainly puts the problem in a better perspective.

Is it beyond the ability of this giant economy to find work and training opportunities for so few young people. Obviously we can do it, and just as obviously, doing it should be a national priority.

"I was a stutterer, and very shy," said Jones, recently at a speaker's forum on literacy in San Bernardino.

He joined a distinguished panel of guests who told of their concerns and experiences.

Jones' message was echoed by some of the panel members when he said, his parents read newspapers; it was more important in his home than books. Jones explained, his father was an actor, but it was a teacher who corrected his stuttering problem. She made him read his own poetry and

"like a dancer with a weak muscle, I took off. . . practice made it better," he said. Each panel member focused

is our goal, to teach each child to read before they leave school. We are committed to increasing the rate of college bound non traditional students."

Ann Ivey, Public Health Nurse, said it starts in the womb, and that fathers as well as mothers need to learn how to be parents.

Jesse Pointer said reading must be relevant. He told the story of a child who decided not to read. He asked him what he would like to do. The reply was to drive a truck. Reading became relevant when the child found out truck drivers had to keep a log. It became more relevant when he found out that he also had to obtain a driver's license.

Marietta Williams, a retired college counselor, said "reading for her started with pictures. If you have books at home children will learn to read."

Dr. Freeman gave an annual State of Literacy Speech, entitled, "The Connecting Link

Books and The Arts." She spoke of how reading can effect one's life and the correlation between reading and the performing art. She referred to Jones and his plight and spoke of the caring and joy that goes into teaching a non-reading adult to read. She works hard to see that people who are in need get help. Freeman has found that people have other needs that must be met so they can begin to learn to read and once they learn how to read, life changes for them.

One such person, Joanne Daley's life was completely changed. She is now an advocate for the homeless and the illiterate. Daley appeared one day at the library, and asked for books to teach her friend to read. Freeman tested her and told her she must first learn how to read. Daley had been faking it all these years. First Freeman had to clean her up because she had been living as a bag lady on

Prostate And Cancer

Dear Dr. Levister: Recently I began experiencing difficulty while urinating. I put off seeing a doctor in hopes that the problem would go away. What are the facts on prostate cancer and how likely is it that I, a 46 year old healthy Afro-American, can have the disease? C.G.

Dear C.G.: Black American men, for not fully understood reasons, are at greater risk of developing prostate gland disease than other groups of men. According to the American Prostate Society, four Black men in five will suffer from prostate gland enlargement. One in eleven will develop prostate cancer, the disease sometimes referred to as a silent enemy because it strikes without early warning signs. That's why, even without your present urinating difficulties, you and every male over 40 years of age - should have a prostate examination by an experienced internist or urologist at least once a year.

Now the good news: enlargement of the prostate gland which could be the source of your problem - is usually harmless and a normal part of aging. You are, though, a little young for this affliction. One should note though that most, if not all, males, if they

Dr. Ernest Levister live long enough, will have prostate gland problems.

The options for treatment of benign enlargement of the prostate gland have increased. Presently available are medications which appear to enhance the ability of the individual to urinate. In addition to the roto roter (TUR) approach there is the potential to put a balloon into the urethra (which runs from the bladder to the tip of the penis) and blowing it up, compress the prostate or decrease the size and obstruction to the urethra outlet. This is similar to an angioplasty in the coronary arteries.

When an examination reveals the presence of prostate cancer, if detected in time, is

one of the more operable and curable cancers in the cancer spectrum.

Another bright side of the cancer picture is that of a relatively recently developed blood test, called the prostate specific antigen test (PSAT), which is capable of detecting the presence of cancer cells in the prostate long before they have spread beyond the point of no return. If this test is positive a urologist can continue the workup with ultrasound of the prostate. In addition, there is the potential for biopsy of suspicious areas. Once diagnosed the tumor can be approached surgically and/or with radiation therapy.

One should note, in addition, that prostate cancer appears to be much more malignant in the Black male than in the White male.

Don't hesitate to see an internist or urologist at your earliest convenience and urge your male friends to do likewise.
