Wilson Birnell Brue, Sr. a long-time San Bernardino resident passed recently after not feeling well.

On East Sunday, he said he wasn't feeling well, but he also said he wanted to attend church. His only compromise to not feeling well was to forego Easter Sunrise service. He attended his usual 7:00 a.m. service and late that evening went to the hospital because he began to feel worse. "It's this new high blood pressure medicine that is making me feel the way I'm feeling," he told family members. He later passed that same evening.

Born February 15, 1916 to Sampson and Alice Elizabeth Dunceford Brue in Alexandria, Louisiana, he was preceded in death by his parents and sister Eula Mattox.

In recent articles in the San Bernardino County Sun and the Riverside Press Enterprise, the two papers ran an article on Tyisha Miller, the 19-year-old Black girl in medical distress and in a parked idling car who was shot 12 times by four responding White Riverside Police Officers,

Evidence of the illicit drug GHB in Tyisha Miller's body after she was shot by Riverside police has spawned a debate over the relevance of the finding.

A chief deputy district attorney said the autopsy report stated a small amount was found in her urine, and toxicologists said it was naturally produced in the body.

But an attorney for the city said a separate study found a much higher amount in Miller's blood and he contends that supports the officers' contention that the Rubidoux teen-ager was in medical distress when an officer broke a car window to try to get a gun from her lap.

A national expert on GHB said the level cited in the recent study is in a "gray zone," meaning Miller could have ingested the drug or her body could have produced it naturally.

Andy Roth, a Miller family attorney, said the presence of GHB does not change the fact that the teen was struck by 12 police bullets.

"It doesn't make our case any less powerful. I don't see the purpose (of releasing the information0 other than to try to publicly defame a dead girl," he said. "I thought we were past that."

New tests on 19-year-old Tyisha Miller's blood found high levels of a popular party drug in her system the night police shot and killed her, laboratory results released Tuesday show.

The teen-ager's blood contained 62 milligrams per liter of gammahydroxybutrate (GHB), a hallucinogenic drug most commonly associated with rave parties, the April 22 toxicology report states. The drug, also known as liquid ecstasy, reportedly alters the brain in a fashion similar to that of the date-rape drug Rohypnol.

Chemical Toxicology Institute in Foster City conducted the tests after the Riverside County coroner's office released the specimens April 6 per a courtordered subpoena, said Capt. Pat McManus.

Attorney Skip Miller, who represents the city and officers in a lawsuit filed by the teen's family, said a "hunch" led him to request the drug tests and the results 'surprised" him.

Miller said the results corroborate police officers' accounts of Dec. 28, the night Tyisha Miller was shot by four officers.

Poll of White Journalists Finds Some Avoid or Soften Stories

Four in 10 journalists say they have purposely avoided newsworthy stories or softened the tone of stories to benefit the interests of their own news organizations, according to a new poll on the media.

The biggest cause for this is market pressure that causes news organizations to avoid stories considered too boring or too complicated, according to the poll by the Pew Research Center for the People 7 the Press, done with the Columbia Journalism Review.

The poll of 206 reporters and 81 news executives, including 150 from local news outlets and 137 from national news organizations, was taken Feb. 8 through March 21 and had an error

margin of plus or minus 7 percentage points for the entire sample, larger for subgroups.

About a third said they avoided stories at least sometimes to avoid harming the

financial interests of their own news organization or embarrassing an advertiser, though few said it was "commonplace."

White Officers File Discrimination Suit Against Police Department and City

RIVERSIDE

Five White Sergeants, many among those angered by the firing of the four officers who killed Tyisha Miller turned against a man who came up through their ranks causing his early retirement. Last Friday. they filed a discrimination suit in the U.S. District Court in Riverside. The filing came after the city rejected their complaint of discrimination.

Former Police Chief Jerry Carroll promoted three detectives to lieutenants last spring. They were Ron Orentia (Hispanic),

Alex Tortez (Native American) and Meredyth Meridith (White female). Allegedly, two captains, Richard Dana and Mike Blakley, hold overs from the previous administration, told the Sergeants that the way the three were selected was not consistent to the way promotions were handled previously.

The three were imminently qualified and there is no information the qualifications of the other five are better.

"Everyone is certified and qualified on the list to be a lieutenant. Human resources sends a list and everyone is certified and qualified to be on that list," said Chief

The five sergeants, John Carpenter, Mark

Boyer, Wallace Rice, Patrick Walters (who has left the department) and Riverside Police Officer's Association President Jay Theuer filed the case saying they were discriminated against because they are White males

City Manager John Holmes was negotiating with the five and made his intentions known to Carroll that he would work it out for them to get promoted when Carroll suddenly resigned. Community pressure and his (self) forced retirement reportedly made Holmes change his mind. The suit alleges procedure to establish a

list of eligible names was changed to allow for more names to be included.

Why Tyisha Miller Protesters Keep Protesting

RIVERSIDE

Last year, during May's earliest days, the District Attorney's office called a press conference, announcing its decision not to press criminal charges against the four officers who shot Tyisha Miller to death, in a hail of bullets as she lay unconscious in her aunt's car. This May, D.A. Grover Trask is prosecuting 20 protesters, who prayed for justice in her name on the 91 freeway, in the officers' stead.

Last year, every Monday morning, dozens of people of all colors and creeds marched and protested in the heart of downtown Riverside, much to the disdain and horror of its occupants

those who agitated for justice, for over a year, on the streets, have resumed the struggle, this time focusing their attention on both the Hall of Justice and the D.A.'s office across the street. The Courthouse serves as a natural place to assemble and address the local government on the grievances committed against its citizenry, as many of the protesters have been indicted for exercising their constitutional rights or as a means to harass them from participation by reopening closed chapters of their lives.

"What do we want, justice!" is the question asked, but the building and those inside it, remain silent. Fliers which are pasted on the double doors, are torn down by security guards, who

who wanted them to go away. Now, when questioned about their actions, tell us that the Hall of Justice is private property. How does a governmental building, which is supposed to represent and serve the needs of the people, not belong to us? Were the papers of ownership passed into someone else's hands when we were not paying attention? I do not recall ever seeing a "for sale" sign on the doors, of a building paid for by tax

When people enter the building, they must be searched, by security guards, and by a machine. The contraband list does not end with weapons, but includes many items, which are not publicly posted anywhere. Have a camera, pair of shoes or even a nail clipper? Either pay money to rent a

locker, or stash it in a nearby bush. The adage, to be foretold, is to be forewarned, does not apply here.

The deputy district attorneys arrive at the courthouse in packs. Since most of them are White, and male, dressed in nearly identical suits, toting similar files with color-coded tabs, they are easy to spot. They gaze at us in unison, almost as if on cue, disdainfully. The signs bearing the face of Tyisha, during a moment of personal joy, do not melt the masks of grim determination on their faces. The pictures of the four smiling men who took her life, in less than six minutes upon arriving on the scene of a medical distress call, do not register in these lawyers' eyes.

A group of men, wearing dark suits

The Reason Protests Continue

On Tuesday, a young Black man came into our office and asked the question, why are the ministers still protesting the Paul Bugar hiring in San

Bernardino since he needs a job like everyone else? And, why are the Tyisha Miller people still protesting the shooting of Tyisha Miller? I explained to him that due to the past history of those of us who have experienced the pain and hurt of discrimination, we can not forget the fact that our people need employment too. I explained to him that the last time people were concerned about Black people being fully employed was under slavery and all Black people were fully employed, however, we were not fully compensated by our efforts and our labor. We cannot forget the

number of Black men who need jobs today to take care of their families, yet are told that they are not qualified. I also explained that the hiring of Officer Bugar by the County of San Bernardino is yet another indication that the "good ole boy network" continues to reward its own, regardless of the circumstances. But it was his question, why continue to protest these injustices, that concerned me even more.

I reminded him that the Jews continue to remember the Holocaust because they do not want it to happen again, not necessarily to them but to their children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Jews remind us of those things that have brought them much hurt and harm because they understand the dynamics of history. How many times have we heard the saying, "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it?" Yet, we continue to try to "forget" our history with the U.S. "just-us" system. Every new generation wants to believe that oppression and racism is our past, not our present. The Scottsboro Boys happened decades ago, lynchings are a thing of the past, we DO have equal protection under the law. How, then, do you explain the hundreds of police shootings of innocent Black folks across the country? How do you explain Diallo, Landrum, Miller and others. If we don't continue to protest, to remember, to demand change, who will?

After seriously pondering his question, I shared with him the details of the Miller shooting. How on that night of December 28, 1998, a young Black girl, locked inside of her car, unconscious and in need of medical help, was gunned down by four fearful White officers. She literally never knew what hit her. These officers had devised a plan to break the window in the car in an effort to wake her from her unconscious state, that was later viewed by the D.A.'s office as "ill-devised...coupled with bad judgement." These professionally trained officers - who later participated in a celebration by saying things such as, "they had better be glad we used black bullets" and "look at them, it's like the gathering of a Kwanzaa celebration," would have remained part of "Riverside's Finest" if it hadn't have been for these same


That is why the ministers in San Bernardino and throughout the Inland Empire must continue to demonstrate. They must let the world know that we will not continue to tolerate law enforcements' insensitivity to our community, their lack of respect to our women, their lack of respect to our children, their arrogance and then their requests to us to help put our tax monies into their pockets to further their racial biases. We will not tolerate their good ol' boy network anymore. We must continue to march, we must continue to preach, we must continue to teach, we must continue to support each other in our efforts to see that we can get justice in an unjust society. I reminded him of how our fathers had the skilled labor of electricians, brick masons, carpenters, etc. and this country was founded and built by the blood, sweat, and tears of these same fathers, ye, society will not recognize these contributions and others. That is why the ministers are continuing in their protest.

"Leaving things out because they do not fit is writing fiction, not history."

So wrote the eminent historian, Barbara W. Tuchman, in an essay for her 1991 book, Practicing History: Selected Essays.

She might have added that distorting fact and circumstance to make them "fit" a particular, ideologically-driven interpretation of history is writing fiction, not history, too -- and also the rankest dishonesty.

Tuchman's insight remains as compelling today as when freshly

Indeed, its truth was dramatically illustrated when a British court judge ruled that British historian, David Irving, who has focused in numerous books on World War II and Nazi Germany, was an "active Holocaust denier," whose distortions of fact and manipulation of evidence about the Holocaust were often "perverse and

There's No Denying History

Irving has claimed, among other things, that Hitler never ordered the Nazis to try to wipe out European Jewry and that he didn't even know of the mass killings at the concentration camps of the Third Reich until late in the war.

Judge Charles Gray declared in a scathing decision that this was nonsense.

"Irving has for his own ideological reasons persistently misrepresented and manipulated historical evidence," the judge wrote. "For the same reasons, he has portrayed Hitler in an unwarrantedly favorable light, particularly in relation to his attitude toward and responsibility for the treatment of the Jews."

The judge's ruling ended a libel suit Irving himself had brought against Deborah E. Lipstadt, a professor of modern Jewish and Holocaust Studies at Atlanta's Emory University.

Professor Lipstadt had written in a book that Irving, once a respected historian, had become "one of the most dangerous spokespersons for Holocaust denial" and that "he is at his most facile at taking accurate information and shaping it to conform to his conclusions."

Irving filed a libel suit against her in Britain because British law, unlike American law, places the burden on the defendants -- here, Professor Lipstadt -- to prove that their claims are correct.

Her attorneys did just that with an array of Holocaust historians whose testimony shredded Irving's

At first thought, it is difficult to Japan denied the fact of the

assertion that the Holocaust never occurred, or that Hitler was blameless, or any of the rest of the ideology of Holocaust denial and neo-Nazism.

And yet, various private groups as well as government agencies here and in Europe have tracked a clear growth of groups and individuals making such assertions.

Ironically, Professor Lipstadt's book which provoked Irving to file suit was titled Denying the Holocaust: The Growing Assault on Truth and Memory.

As resounding and welcome as Judge Gray's ruling and withering language is regarding the perverse attempts to deny the reality of the Jewish Holocaust of fifty years ago comes amid our current, years-long plague of genocidal wars and guerrilla conflicts in Black Africa, parts of the Asian subcontinent -and in the Balkans; figuratively, in the very heart of Europe where the Nazis unleashed their barbaric "Final Solution" a half century ago. Surely, this is a devastating comment on how thin the veneer of

developed countries. Secondly, in reading some of the fantastical claims of Irving and other Holocaust-deniers that Hitler and the Nazis have been misunderstood and that the things we know happened did not happen,

believe that any sane person could Japanese army's savage overclaim or give any credit to the running of Nanking in 1937, and its forced prostitution of Korean women during World War-II.

> I've thought of the efforts of the right wing in Chile and Argentina to deny the murderous repression that occurred in those countries in the 1970s and 1980s.

> And I've thought of the attempt here in the United States of some to deny that the Confederacy was not what it was: an attempt to ground a nation in a monstrous evil -- racial

> In this controversy, as in the efforts to whitewash the reality of the Third Reich and the other great wrongs, there is the same unwillingness to face indisputable facts -- here, of the damning language about slavery in the Confederate constitution of 1861, for example.

> There is the same taking refuge in asserting the "honor" of the individual Confederate soldiers and sailors, as if individual valor can cover up and purify the stench of a perverse cause.

> And, when all else fails, there is the same clenched-jaw assertion that the great wrong really wasn't so bad anyway.

> So, for me, as resounding and welcome as Judge Charles Gray's ruling against Nazi sympathizer David Irving is, it also underscores the point that the struggle against those who would distort history in order to justify the great wrongs of the past is, for the foreseeable future, never-ending.

A RACIAL PROFILING BILL COPS CAN LOVE

It was a bizarre scene recently in front of the California's State Capitol building in Sacramento. Hundreds of student, Black and Latino community activists, and police reform advocates were holding a spirited rally to support a bill by Kevin Murray, a Black Democrat state senator from Los Angeles, to compel the state to compile figures on the race, age and gender of motorists stopped by the California Highway Patrol. The CHP makes more traffic stops than any other police agency in the nation. The bill also would've required the CHP to tell why motorists were stopped, and whether a search and arrest was made as a result of the stop.

the mood of the crowd changed from exuberance to shock and then anger not at Governor Gray Davis who vetoed an identical bill Murray introduced last fall but at Murray. The crowd turned on him when they got word that he had gutted the bill of the data collection provision to get Davis's signature. The amended bill required only that police hand a business card to drivers and undergo more diversity training. The toothless bill was immediately hailed by Los Angeles County Sheriff and LAPD Chief Bernard Parks. Both have waged a personal crusade to torpedo legislation requiring their departments to keep racial stats on traffic stops.

But midway through the rally

But if Murray's original bill requiring data collection had become law it would've been a big step toward proving or disproving whether police departments use racial profiles to harass and intimidate Blacks and Latinos on the highways. Since laws passed in California are closely watched and frequently emulated by officials in other states, Murray's bill

timid officials in those states to pass a similar law.

This would have been a crucial breakthrough for another reason. Many Blacks and Latinos have long screamed that police target highways and streets. According to a Justice Department study, Blacks comprise about 14 percent of the population, yet account for more than 70 percent



On election night in June, 1998, he and his wife were returning home from his campaign them for shake downs on the headquarters when they were Beverly Hills.

to the officer as a state official and explained where he was coming from and going. This meant nothing to the officer who ran a complete check on him. Murray's title, position, and prestige as an incumbent state senator counted for nothing. He pulled over by a police officer in publicly protested that he was a victim of "driving while Black and brown," filed a lawsuit against the police, and

During slavery there were White people who were poor as well as poor White people. Slaves labeled the latter as "po White trash" because they were ex-convict and prostitute types, seemingly dumb, having low incomes, and quite vocal about "White supremacy." To allow the tension of their self-hatred to escape somewhat, "po Whites" needed other "races," including mestizos, to look down upon. Their differential diagnosis of Mestizos was (1) those "passing" as White without their knowledge; (2) those that were non-White; and (3) the "question mark" group -those that could be Negroes or could be White but "what if" they were not. "Po White trash" and racist Rednecks spent unbelievable amounts of time expressing opinions on the "Question Mark" group. Let us listen in on one of their conversations.

"It is a scientific fact," said Billy Jo, "that people with even

one drop of Niggra blood will have dark shadows on the halfmoons of their (finger) nails." (Throughout the early part of my medical career I made comparisons between the fingernails of White and Black people and never saw the tiniest of difference). Next, Elvis, claiming to have mystical powers of observation, volunteered: "There's something about a White Niggra's hand -- the palms -that says he has Niggra blood." When asked to be more specific, he added: "it just takes experience -- you just know it instinctively." Then, his "good ol' boy" buddy chimed in with: "colored people's blood gives a certain form to the outer ear or makes the gums a little blue or keeps the legs from being shaped well or causes the feet to be flat." Billie Jo follows with: "I can spot a White Niggra no matter where he is by just sizing him up. I reckon you're born with that ability." As Mary Lou passes by she puts in her two cents worth in characterizing people by association: "Yeah, she must be colored because she belongs to that Baptist Church over yonder and nobody but Red bones belong to that." (Terms like "Red bones," "red legs," and "Brass ankles" are frequently used in Southern states like South Carolina to indicate Mestizos who are "neither fish nor fowl").

Even today, it is common among ignorant racist to believe that the mestizos' character is the result of the blood or the mixture of bloods that circulate in their bodies -- a carry over from the ancient concept of "humors." They explain a mestizos' laziness because of the Negro blood; if deceitful, because of his Indian blood; and if virtuous, because of his White blood. Of course, there are the ever-present self-proclaimed "experts" on what all Blacks think and feel and how they behave: "When Niggras are down and out they are meek and humble." (They do not even know what meek and humble mean). "But on payday they feel like they are on top of the world -- they want to cut loose and celebrate." It is of interest how the vast majority of those stereotyping racist who find fault with dark skin people are doing the very same thing they are complaining about -- and usually many times worse. Racist cannot see that Negroes who remain mentally caged should not be compared with the ideal but rather with those on the same social level, if at all. To start Self-Diagnosis. 

Desegregation Expert Speaks at University

REDLANDS

Terrence Roberts, one of the "Little Rock Nine" -- the first Black students to go to public school in Little Rock, Ark. -will speak on "Lessons From Little Rock: Starting A Conversation for the Twenty-First Century" at the University of Redlands, Monday, May 8, as part of the spring Convocation lecture Series.

In 1957, the Arkansas national Guard held Roberts and eight other African American teenagers at bay as they tried to attend Little Rock's all-White Central High School after a 1954 U.S. Supreme Court found decision racial segregation in public schools unconstitutional. Roberts and others attempted to enter the high school for three weeks. It took an order from President Eisenhower and Army soldiers

to force school officials, the governor of Arkansas and the National Guard to comply.

The teenagers shared the high school with 1,900 White students and had to endure constant challenges such as kicks, punches, broken glass on shower floors and even knives.

"I was naive to conclude that it would fade away," recalled Roberts during a lecture earlier this year. "I was not prepared by the fierceness of the opposition. I expected far better treatment and got far worse."

The only member of the nine to graduate from Central High School was senior Ernest Green. The following year, the governor of Arkansas closed all public schools to prevent further integration.

Roberts' family left Arkansas and moved to Los Angeles where he graduated from Los Angeles High School in 1959. He went on to attend the University of California, Los Angeles, where he received bachelor's and master's degrees.

Since 1998, Roberts has served as the "desegregation expert" for the Little Rock School District, helping the district met



Dear Dr. Levister: My husband was recently released from prison after two years. He is very resistant when I ask him about his during activity sexual incarceration. Should I suggest he be tested for HIV/AIDS?

Dear M.G.: The answer is a big YES, but expect him to resist. The late National Medical Association President, Walter W. Shervington, MD. observed that AIDS has become the leading cause of death for African American men between the ages of 25 and 42.

Before his recent and untimely death, Shervington moderated a White House briefing on the tide of AIDS in the African American community, declaring that the nation's jails and prisons are incubators for HIV/AIDS particularly among African American males and newly released prisoners are increasingly infecting women with the disease.

"When you think about incarceration, you think about the number of Black men who are incarcerated every day." "From the juvenile detention systems to state prisons and up to the federal system, there's sexual activity going on." "Eventually most people who go into that system come out, Shervington said."

Prison treatment programs are dubious at best, probably no preventive systems, some counseling and testing. Some states segregate anyone who is HIV positive. That would not

whether or not they're HIV positive, even if they had concerns about it, because once it is known, inmates typically are shunned, and lose privileges and rights. The problem is compounded by a general reluctance among African Americans to discuss sexuality and HIV/AIDS.

That makes it harder to communicate to get the word out to families and to reach out to former. inmates. Some men might be coming from incarcerate populations and have for several years had a same sex partner. They return home to marriage and a wife and don't even want to share that they've had experiences with other men. Men who are incarcerated may not think of themselves as homosexuals even though they are having homosexual contact while in prison. They frequently get out and immediately resume relations with their partners. African Riverside, CA 92502.

necessarily encourage anyone American women who are having within our system to find out sex with men don't realize that they are at great risk for this disease, so this is not a matter of concern for them.

If you think of the system as being an incubator of HIV/AIDS and the degree to which it is passed throughout that system, you can see that without a significant attention to and active development of programs within that system, what we have is a time bomb being passed to the communities in which we live. Protect yourself and your family. Make sure your husband gets

Continued from Front Page straits and needed medical attention, that she was a person in immediate distress. That's why they broke the window," Miller said.

"She had shallow breathing. They couldn't wake her up. That she was, if not actually comatose, semi-comatose."

Attorney Brian T. Dunn, a lawyer with Johnnie Cochran's law firm representing Miller's family, called the release of the toxicology results "mean spirited" and "an attempt to deflect" the responsibility of the woman's death away from the officers.

"This entire thing saddens us because it has nothing to do with what really ahppened out there that evening, which was a senseless murder," Dunn said.

"The cause of death was multiple gunshot wounds. If the police officers hadn't shot into that car, Tyisha Miller would be alive today."

found Miller Police unconscious with a gun in her lap Dec. 28, 1998, inside a locked car at a gas station. After failing to wake her, officers attempted to break the driver's side window and grab the weapon.

The shattering glass startled Miller, who sat upright as an officer leaned into the car. The officers fired 23 times, hitting her 12 times.

The Riverside County district attorney did not file criminal charges against the officers involved, but the city police chief fired the four for violating department policies.

Original toxicology reports found Miller had a bloodalcohol level of 0.13 and traces of marijuana in her system. Dunn said his firm has made several unsuccessful requests for the new toxicology report.

"We would like to run our own tests. We're in a complete informational void," Dunn said.

GHB has been used in the United States as a euphoric drug, a sedative or a bodybuilding substance. The drug acts as a nervous system depressant which produces euphoric or hallucinatory states, according to the Drug Enforcement Administration.

By itself or when combined with alcohol, the drug can cause "dangerously low respiratory rates," unconsciousness or coma, seizures, vomiting or nausea, or even death, according to the DEA and the Amercian Medical Association.

A low to moderate dose of the drug is between one to two grams, according to the National Clearinghouse for Alcohol and Drug Information.

Skip Miller said the teenager's level is twice the amount found in most victims of the date-rape drug, which is usually about 30 milligrams.

Continued from Front Page or gamma hydroxybutyrate, is a depressant that can cause nausea, drowsiness, respiratory distress, seizures and amnesia. It is associated with rave parties and is often referred to as liquid ecstasy and a "date-rape" drug.

The release of a toxicology report by Skip Miller, the attorney who represents Riverside in a wrongful-death lawsuit, comes amid settlement discussions with the Tvisha Miller family.

Skip Miller, who is not related to Tyisha Miller, said the city recently received the toxicology results from Chemical Toxicology Institute of Foster City, Calif., after requesting blood samples from the county coroner. Symptoms of GHB use, such as loss consciousness and semicomatose reflexes, are consistent with what the officers said they saw, the attorney said.

"Their observations appear to be borne out as well-founded," Skip Miller said.

Trinka Porrata, an expert on GHB, said she first thought Miller might have ingested the drug after hearing about Miller's behavior before she was killed. GHB could offer an explanation as to why Miller -who had been unresponsive to police commands -- sat up and looked at her pager, then sat back before she was shot inside a car, said Porrata, a former Los Angeles Police Department narcotics detective.

"With GHB, you can be in a coma and just sit up right away," she said.

Chief Deputy District Attorney Mike Soccio said coroner's officials had Miller's urine tested for GHB after her Dec. 28, 1998, death. Urine gives a more accurate reading than blood, he and Porrata said. And the small level found in Miller's urine indicated it had been naturally produced by her body and did not come from external sources, he said.

Four White officers shot and killed Miller as she sat unresponsive in her locked,

idling car with a gun on her lap. The officers contend they fired when she moved for the gun after they broke a window to retrieve the weapon.

She had a blood-alcohol level of .13 at the time of her death. In California, a motorist at the .08 level or greater is considered intoxicated. She also tested positive for cannabinoids, indicating she recently used

Miller family spokesman Bernell Butler said that the new GHB results lend support to eyewitnesses who said Miller appeared sick or ill before she was killed.

marijuana or hash.

"It shows that the officers and the city are even more liable," he said.

He also said the city's attorney was grasping at straws. Last month, Skip Miller sued Lorcin Engineering Co., alleging the gun manufacturer shares responsibility for Miller's death because they made the gun she had on her lap.

The racial slurs reported by the family and confirmed by a Black police officer, Rene Rodriguez followed by the Riverside Police Officer's Association shaving their heads, a door hanging campaign in predominantly White neighborhoods, a newspaper ad campaign to reach the same people and affect public opinion, (telling Black Voice they didn't want our readership they needed a broader cover) caused Attorney General Bill Lockyer to meet with both communities, and the Justice Department to open investigations the on department.

The officers said they were told by the city in a letter to their members to ignore the rantings and ravings of the Mayor and they worked to get rid of the police chief who had fired the four for using poor judgement in a plan that killed Miller.

Another notch in the belt of the RPOA was when they were

successful in having Police Miller.

The two articles ran on the same day and didn't mention what lead up to this current screen but it has angered Black leadership who feel it was a shot to try the victim. The San Bernardino Sun's seems to give the impression Tyisha Miller was on drugs so she should have been shot in the back 12 times. The Press, dealing with the situation for a longer period of time and not trying to protect a sheriff.

Rev. Raymond Turner, Pastor of Temple Baptist Church and President of the Inland Empire African American Concerned Churches, said of the new unproven information, "that's more reason that they shouldn't have shot her. There was no reason to shoot her in the back 12 times. It shows she was unconscious and could not reach for or fire a gun at the police officers."

"They are trying to make the running for the nation's top victim the villain and shift the blame."

> "I don't care if she was a prostitute or the biggest drug addict on the street, she didn't deserve to die like that. This new finding if it is valid proves she was no threat to anyone."

Beverly Hills police officials responded to Murray, s complaint the same way most police agencies do to thousands of others who say they are victims of racial profiling. They say that it,s illegal and they don't do it. But that's easy for them to say since other than anecdotal horror tales by Black and Latino motorists of police mistreatment on the highways, there is no real smoking gun proof that the practice exists. To get that kind of proof requires state law enforcement agencies to keep hard numbers on the race of all motorists they stop on the roads.

A few police departments and at last count two states, North Carolina and Connecticut, have passed legislation requiring

police agencies to keep racial stats on traffic stops. A dozen or so other states have proposed similar bills but they have either died in committee or been voted down. A bill by Michigan Democrat John Conyers, called the Traffic Stops Statistics Study Act, requires law enforcement agencies to compile figures by race on highway traffic stops. The bill has languished in Congress for the past several years.

Police unions, police benevolent associations, and correctional groups adamantly oppose these bills. They don't want to be told they must identify by race those they stop and why they stopped them. They have the money and the political muscle to get their way. Davis is a good case in point. The Peace Officers Research

Association of California which represents more than 600 police unions statewide openly condemned Murray's original bill. The group dumped nearly a quarter million dollars into Davis's campaign kitty in 1998.

Their money was well spent. The back room deal making between Murray and Davis handed police officials everywhere a near fool proof public relations tool to duck and dodge the volatile issue of racial profiling. What's worse it was handed to them not by conservative Republicans but by a liberal and centrist Democrat. It will be a long uphill fight to undo the damage they've done.

protesters. As if exercising one's rights to free speech and assembly constitutes a danger, that must be scrutinized. Ironic, considering the attorneys employed in this building were hired to represent all the people of Riverside county, yet their employer feels threatened enough by 20 individuals, mostly poor, who dare to speak out, to file misdemeanor charges against them, while allowing four men who killed a young woman, to go free. For attempting to recalibrate the tipped scales of Lady Justice, or at least to return the blindfold on her face, we are being punished in the courts, as we were in the daily press.

Activists hand out fliers detailing upcoming events to those, coming out of the building, receiving smiles from many of the people, especially those with children, who may grow up to be the next Tyisha Miller or an Irvin Landrum, or

Hector Islas if nothing is done, the generation which precedes them. Some jurors scowl, and ignore us, or toss crumpled up fliers in the trash bins, closing their hearts and minds to a message they do not want to hear. Even when asked, to help the children, others shake their heads, or tell us they don't want our crap. Who in this city, would not want to keep a child from being killed, or sentenced into an adult prison at the age of 14? And why are these people serving on our juries?

After an hour spent, walking in a circle, displaying signs and stirring the consciences of those at the Hall of Justice, we move on to the D.A.'s office. The group of men who stared at us, all this time, now scurry into the building, frantically locking the double doors behind them. Signs, announcing the closure of yet another public building are slapped on the glass. Gazing through the window, you see an eerily quiet, darkened lobby, with nary an

attorney for the people in sight, let alone Grover Trask. Prosecutors returning to their headquarters, sidestep us, some even jaywalk across the street to get away from our message. Needless to say, the SWAT team of the Riverside Police Department does not grab them by force, or even issue them citations. Cars drive by, honking their support. Others come up to us, on the street to tell us their stories of police misconduct, and D.A. misconduct, and many join us picking up a sign, strangers to the eye, but not in the heart.

And our numbers grow. Marching together as a group, on the turf of those public servants who have become our adversaries gives us strength and courage, which we take with us, during our daily lives, and on those days we go to court, to face the judge. As Frederick Douglass once said, "if there is no struggle, there can be no progress."

Tortez is a 28-year veteran of the Department. He holds a BA Degree and a Lifetime Teaching Credential. He has worked every assignment except helicopter. He was the first and only minority vice sergeant of vice. Tortez was the first member of the SWAT Team. He established the Problem Oriented Police Team that evolved into Neighborhood Officer Beat Program. Among other things, he was nominated for Police Officer of the Year and numerous community awards.

Tortez and Orentia filed charges of

discrimination three years ago and says the RPOA was negotiating it. The charge became null and void

once they were promoted. The reason for the charge was because Former Chief Ken Fortier told Black Voice he didn't have any qualified minorities in his department. This touched off a firestorm of controversy within the community and in the rank and file.





Great Lakers are Floating Toward a NBA Title with its Triple Play

Shaq, Kobe and Glen gives Los Angeles a three-prong plug that's electrified the NBA.

OS ANGELES - Before I start this dissertation, I have to make certain to Los Angeles Lakers' coach, Mr Phil Jackson, that I know emphatically that basketball, especially Laker basketball, is a team endeavor. Still, there are individuals who traverse the

> NBA hardcourts who stand a little taller, jump a little higher or shoot a little better than the rest.

The Lakers are blessed to have three of the those special players suiting up everyday in the purple & gold.

The Lakers' boast a triple play combination that LELAND would make any baseball manager -- or NBA coach -envious. Shaquille O'Neal, Kobe Bryant and Glen Rice are firmly entrenched in the elite level of NBA stars.

Because of the collective excellence of the Lakers' triumvirate, the Los Angeles squad is the odds on favorite to win the NBA title.

Noted Lakers General Manager Mitch Kupchak: "With Shaq, Kobe and Glen, it's safe to say we have three great players on this team. This does not automatically mean we are going to win (the title), but it's a good position to be in."

The general assertion that this is the Lakers' title to lose, is based in a solid measure of realism. After all, Los Angeles did post one of the finest overall regular-season records in NBA history, finishing with a league best 67-15 mark. Included in that total was three eyeopening win streaks of 11-, 16- and 19-games.

With success like the Lakers experienced during the regular season, the expectations for this team in the season that counts most, the NBA Playoffs, is palpable.

"How the community and the players feel about themselves," Jackson noted, "has a lot to do with the team's success in the playoffs. I understand what that mean, and, I'm sure the players do, also."

Added Bryant: "The pressure from the media and our fans is there for a reason; we have an opportunity to do something special. Everywhere I go people are real supportive and pulling for us. Everybody feels that the time is now to bring the championship home."

Interjected veteran guard Ron Harper: "We've had a great season, but, it just sat the table for what's happening now. I came here for one reason, and that was to win a championship. This is the time of year when you earn your paycheck."

As the Lakers try to close out its first round opponent, the Sacramento Kings, a team known as a free-wheeling contingent led by Jason Williams, Chris Webber and Vlade Divac, the purple & gold clad squad will be leaning heavily on its own exceptional trio as they float down the river searching for NBA Playoff gold.

The last time the Lakers had appeared in a NBA Finals was in 1991. Even worse, is the fact the city which has hosted two Olympics, hasn't had a title of any kind since the Dodgers and Lakers won championships in '88.

To get the Lakers' championship ship afloat, owner Jerry Buss, executive Jerry West and Kupchak brought in the Zen master, Jackson.

With Jackson's inclusion in the Lakers' family came a coach who has pilot the Chicago Bulls to six NBA titles during the '90's. As he took over the Lakers' reigns, he brought instant credibility with him. He also brought with him the famed triangle offense, which at its foundation is based on spacing and movement and passing.

With Kobe, Glen and Shaq as the linchpins of a three-cornered triangular offense, the differences in each players' game is a team strength.

Although the contributions of Harper, A.C. Green, Robert Horry, Rick Fox, Derek Fisher and Brian Shaw are valued and essential for the Lakers' championship ship to stay afloat, it will be the Los Angeles' triple play that will fuel their title engine.

Look no further than the Lakers' 117-107 victory over the Kings in the best-of five Western Conference playoff opener. Shaq, Kobe and Glen accounted for 87 points, which equated to 74 % of the team's scoring. For the year the "Three Amigos" accounted for 2/3 of the Lakers' scoring production.

The Lakers' tricorn offense is an intriguing

collaborative effort.

They have the inside dominance of Shaq, the NBA's leading scorer and odds on favorite for the League's valued MVP award. The "Diesel"




Photo by JON GAEDE - BVN MVP: Shaquille O'Neal produced a breakthrough season as he led the Lakers to the best record in the NBA, while

produced a breakthrough season under Jackson's tutelage, as he finished second in the league in rebounding and finished first among centers in assist.

While Shaq uses exceptional footwork to augment his over-powering strength, Kobe flows through a game like a ballet dancer. The spin moves, the slices between double teams and his array of inventive ways to put the ball in the basket is second to none. Yet, it's been Kobe's defensive efforts, not the fact he averaged 22.5 points per game that's gotten the attention of all across the league. "I'm seeing the game better and I'm really trying to make a difference on defense. I'd like to make the All-NBA Defensive team . . . sure."

The final piece to the Lakers' triple play is the silky-smooth jump-shooting Rice. Many agree that Rice has the sweetest stroke in the game. While playing for the Charlotte Hornets, he made the All-Star squad three times, winning the game's MVP in the '97 contest.

"He's taken a little bit of a back seat to O'Neal and Bryant," Jackson explained, "but he's an All-Star player. He's a player people have to be very honest on, because he's a legitimate three-point threat. He draws the defense out and that allows a lot of room for Shaq."

Added Rice, who averaged close to 16 points per game for the season: "I'm confident that what I have to offer will be needed as we advance in the playoffs. I'm also starting to feel more comfortable about what's expected of me in the offense."

Because Bryant and Shaq are the second and first options, respectively, Rice is sometimes forgotten by the opposing teams.

Said Kings coach Rick Adelman: "The Lakers have two great players that present major problems for any team.

Well coach, I beg to differ! The Lakers have three great players. It's my contention that Rice is the key to the Lakers as they streamroll their way toward the NBA title.

The diversified Lakers' triple play -- Shaq, Kobe and Glen -- was the best in the NBA this year and the trio will likely follow the Zen master's cajoling good enough to hoist the NBA crown.

However, at this writing the Kings had evened the series with Lakers at 2-2, even though the Los Angeles "great trio" scored 74 of the team's 88 points in a 101-88 loss. The Kings Bench Mob outscored the Lakers bench 42-8. The the Lakers bench scoring has been a source of concern all season, yet the team has managed to overcome that deficit.

The deciding contest will be played this Friday at the Staples Center. I know it's nervous time in L.A., but the triple play will, or should reign when the final whistle blows in the Lakers versus Kings series.




Photo by JON GAEDE - BVN TALENTED: Kobe Bryant has elevated his game to the elite level and is excelling on defense, offense




Photo courtesy of the Lakers DIALING LONG DISTANCE: Glen Rice gives the Lakers the valued outside shooting threat.
