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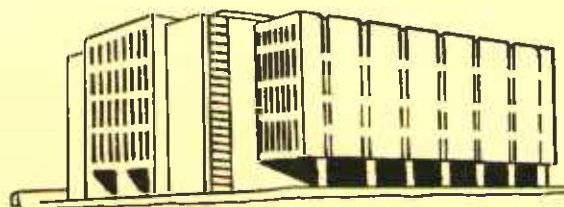

MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND HOURS ARE ANNOUNCED

In observance of Memorial Day, Monday is a college holiday. The Commons will continue its regular dining schedule over the weekend. The Student Union will be closed, as usual, on Saturday and Sunday, and also Monday. The Pfau Library will be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday and from noon to 8 p.m., Sunday, but will be closed Monday. Saturday classes will not meet. The Physical Education Building will be closed Saturday through Monday. The pool will be open from 1 to 5 p.m., Saturday, Sunday and Monday. The courts will be closed Saturday and open from 3 to 8 p.m., Sunday and from 4 to 8 p.m., Monday.

US FESTIVAL MAY CAUSE FREEWAY CONGESTION

The US Festival tomorrow through Monday is expected to cause freeway congestion as early as noon today. The campus community is encouraged to use alternate routes (city surface streets) to avoid delays in returning home this evening. A second concert will be held June 4, and it is advisable, again, to use alternate routes the preceding Friday.

The varied program will include Schubert's "Der Hirt auf dem Felsen" for clarinet, piano and soprano, as well as compositions by Monteverdi, Purcell, Handel, Schumann, Ives, Brahms, Copland and Douglas Moore. Tickets will be available at the door for \$3.50 general, \$1.75 students.

ENVIRONMENTAL ACTION COUNCIL
SPONSORS FILM ON ACID RAIN

The controversial documentary "Acid Rain: Re-
quiem or Recovery," which was produced by the
National Film Board of Canada, will be shown
free at noon, Wednesday in the Student Union.

The Environmental Action Council of Cal State is sponsoring the showing of the film, which is on loan from the Canadian Consulate in Los Angeles.

The documentary and two other Canadian productions, "Acid from Heaven" and "If You Loved This Planet," which won the Academy Award this year for best documentary short, have been labeled political propaganda by the U.S. Justice Department. In response, the American Civil Liberties Union and the State of New York have filed a lawsuit.
