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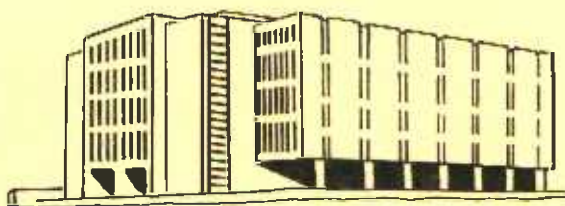

DR. RALPH PETRUCCI TO ADDRESS GRADUATES

Dr. Ralph Petrucci, dean of Academic Planning and professor of chemistry, will be the speaker at the college's 17th commencement ceremony Saturday, June 18.

About 550 of the 950 graduates eligible to participate are expected to march in the exercises, which begin at 9 a.m. on the lawn south of the Gymnasium.

Faculty and students who will be marching may pick up their regalia at the Bookstore beginning Monday. They will meet at 8 the morning of the ceremony near the swimming pool of the physical education facilities.

Parking will be available at the P.E., Serrano Village and main parking lots. The tram will be available to take people from the parking lots to the Gymnasium. Graduates or visitors who have special needs for seating or parking should contact the Activities Office, Ext. 7407, by Tuesday.

President Anthony H. Evans will give his first commencement message at the college and will present the outstanding professor award to Dr. Frances F. Berdan (Anthropology). The Rev. Wendell G. Wollam of Yucaipa Valley Presbyterian Church will give the invocation and benediction.

Escorting graduates, faculty members and the platform party will be Dr. Petrucci, as college marshal; Dr. Joe Bas (Spanish), faculty marshal; and Dr. Dalton Harrington (Biology), student marshal. Music will be provided by the Wind Ensemble, directed by Keating Johnson (Music).

After the two-hour ceremony, the graduates and their friends and families are invited to the traditional reception in the Commons.

The Art Gallery will be open from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. so that graduates may take families and visitors to see the student art exhibition.

COLLEGE HOURS SET FOR FINALS

Saturday classes will meet for the last time tomorrow. Weekday classes will end Monday. Finals will be given Tuesday through Friday.

The Pfau Library will be open from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m., Monday; 8 a.m. to 11 p.m., Tuesday through Thursday; and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Friday. It will be closed June 18-19. The Student Union will have its regular hours, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. The Physical Education Building will be open 8:30 a.m. to 8:15 p.m., Monday through Wednesday; and 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Thursday and Friday. The large Gym will be closed for recreational use Tuesday, June 14 through Wednesday, June 22. A schedule of facility hours for summer will be published in next week's Bulletin.

STUDENTS ADMITTED TO GRADUATE SCHOOL

Faculty and staff have informed the Public Affairs Office of six students who have been admitted to graduate schools. Kathryn Coolbaugh, graduating with honors with a major in biology and chemistry, has been admitted to the Navy medical school, Uniform Services University of the Health Sciences, in Bethesda, MD. Myunghee Min, who is receiving his B.S. in chemistry with honors, will have the opportunity to enter the Ph.D. program in chemistry at UC, Riverside. Sandra Weiser, daughter of Florence Weiser (Academic Administration), a sociology major, has been accepted to Southwestern School of Law.

Two M.A. graduates in psychology have been accepted in doctoral programs. They are Randy Swaim, the counseling psychology Ph.D. program at Colorado State University, and Lucien B. Thompson, the psychobiology Ph.D. program at the University of Virginia. Elise Traynum, 1982-83 A.S. president, a political science major, will be able to choose from four law schools: Hastings College of Law, the University of Texas, University of Minnesota and UC, Davis. She plans to attend Hastings.

VOLUNTEER SPEAKERS SOUGHT FOR COMMUNITY PROJECT

Faculty and staff are sought to participate in the Youth Educational Motivational Project next school year. In this community program, volunteers from various agencies, institutions and organizations visit schools in the area to speak on careers in their fields. Participants from Cal State will give one- or two-hour talks at Frisbee Junior High School beginning in October. The volunteers will be speaking to small groups of students who have expressed an interest in the speaker's field. Headed by Joe Baca of General Telephone, the program is designed to motivate students to continue their education and to plan ahead for college. Some of the participants are the Social Security Administration, Riverside County Personnel Office, TRW, California Highway Patrol, the City of San Bernardino and San Bernardino Valley College.

STUDENT SERVICES BUILDING TO CLOSE FOR CONSTRUCTION

Offices in the Student Services Building will be re-housed temporarily while the building gets a new roof this summer. Construction, which should be completed by Sept. 1, will include a pitched roof to provide water run-off and a new air-conditioning and heating system. A similar project was completed for the Administration Building two years ago.

The first move will be by the Dean of Students Office Friday, June 17. The remaining offices will move the week of June 20-24 into the Children's Center, Student Union, Visual Arts Building, Physical Sciences Building and Pfau Library. A few individuals will have offices in the Administration Building. The Student Services Building will be closed after June 24. Vending machines will be temporarily installed in VA 110.

DR. MACPIKE SELECTED ADMINISTRATIVE FELLOW

Dr. Lorelee MacPike (English) has been selected to participate in the CSU Administrative Fellows Program for 1983-84, Chancellor W. Ann Reynolds announced. Dr. MacPike's assignment, not yet determined, will be at this campus.

The competitive program is directed toward faculty and administrative personnel who have demonstrated potential for administration and would like to prepare for advancement. The selection process includes a campus selection committee, the president, a systemwide Administrative Fellows Selection Committee and the chancellor.

Dr. MacPike, who came to Cal State as a lecturer in 1978, was promoted to associate professor in 1981. She designed and directed the Adult College Opportunity Program, a special program to encourage and assist students over age 30 who enroll here after an interruption in their education. The college received a grant from the CSU to carry on the program. Dr. MacPike, who has worked in women's re-entry programs prior to coming to Cal State, received the 1979-80 Woman of Achievement Award from the California Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs for motivating others and inspiring new ideas.

The San Bernardino campus previously had one faculty member, Dr. Sherrie Bartell (Education), selected as an administrative fellow. Two fellows from other campuses have been assigned here in the past.

DR. THOMPSON NAMED PROFESSOR EMERITUS

Dr. Elton Thompson, who retired at the end of fall quarter, has been named professor emeritus of education. Two other professors, Drs. Dorothy Johnson and Mary Patterson (both Nursing), will retire at the end of this academic year.

Dr. Thompson joined the college faculty in 1968. He has been active on many school and college committees, as well as chair of teacher education and coordinator of administrative services program and the M.A. Degree Committee in the School of Education. An expert and consultant in math and science education, he previously taught at San Fernando Valley State College and San Jose State. He also had been headmaster of the American Community School of Milan, Italy, and director of curriculum for Santa Cruz City Schools.

Dr. Johnson joined the college in 1976 and Dr. Patterson a year later. Both have worked in areas covering the spectrum of nursing, including in hospitals, public health departments and schools. At this campus, Dr. Johnson was instrumental in developing the present nursing curriculum and, as chair of the Department of Nursing from 1976 to 1978, began the preliminary work for its accreditation by the National League for Nursing.

Dr. Patterson succeeded Dr. Johnson as chair of the department. She further developed and wrote the report for accreditation, which was granted in December 1979. Dr. Patterson, widely published in the nursing field, has been active in major nursing organizations and involved in state legislation affecting the profession.

**DR. BLACKKEY TO CHAIR
DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY**

Dr. Robert Blackey, professor of history, will chair the Department of History beginning September. He succeeds Dr. Kent Schofield, who completes his term.

Dr. Blackey, who will serve a three-year term, holds a Ph.D. and M.A. in history from New York University and a B.A. in history from City College of New York. Before joining Cal State in September 1968, he taught at Hunter College and New York University.

For many years he has been a reader for the advanced placement examination in European history for the Educational Testing Service in Princeton. He is the author or co-author of several works on revolution.

**DR. CAIDEN TO CHAIR
PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION**

Dr. Naomi Caiden, professor of public administration, has been appointed to a three-year term as chair of the Department of Public Administration, effective in September. Dr. K. Michael Clarke has resigned because he will be on leave fall quarter.

Dr. Caiden came to the college in September 1981. She previously taught at the UC, Riverside and Irvine campuses; Cal State, L.A.; USC; and Australian National University. She holds a Ph.D. in public administration from USC, an M.A. in political science from Australian National University, and a B.S. in economics from the University of London.
