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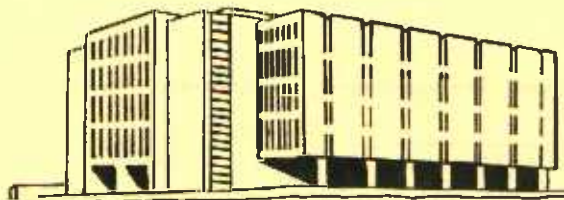

MCCARTHY, BROWN TO BE ON CAMPUS NEXT WEEK

Two lawmakers, Lt. Gov. Leo McCarthy and Congressman George Brown, will be on campus next week.

McCarthy, who is a member of the CSU Board of Trustees by virtue of his elected position, will be on campus briefly Tuesday morning between other engagements in the area. He will meet with senior administrators, Faculty Senate and Associated Students officers and a PawPrint reporter.

Congressman Brown will speak at the luncheon for the Private Industry Councils Thursday. Representatives of councils from three areas will be here for the all-day meeting. The PICs were created under the Comprehensive Employment Training Act to coordinate on-the-job training programs. President Anthony H. Evans will speak to the group during the morning.

GEORGE MARTINEZ HEADS UPWARD BOUND PROGRAM

George Martinez, a former crime prevention specialist and probation officer, is the new director of the Upward Bound program on campus. Upward Bound is a federally funded program designed to improve the academic

and social skills of low-income high school students and to motivate them to continue their education. The program here is funded for 100 students.

Prior to assuming his position here last Monday, Martinez was district sales manager for the San Bernardino Sun. He earlier spent a year as deputy director of Casa Ramona Community Center in San Bernardino. He also has been a crime prevention specialist with the National Council of LaRaza in Dallas, executive director of MACA Community Services in Ventura, a deputy probation officer and an Educational Opportunity Program specialist at a community college. A native of San Bernardino, he earned an A.A. from San Bernardino Valley College, a B.A. from San Diego State and an M.S. from Pepperdine University.

HIGH SCHOOL-COLLEGE PROGRAM UP 700%

Marking a dramatic increase, the High School-College Program this fall enrolled 31 students from eight high schools in courses here. Last fall four students participated and the previous high was seven students in fall 1981.

The high school students must have a 2.7 GPA or SAT/ACT scores sufficiently high to make them eligible for regular admission to the college. Of the current group, 26 entered with GPAs of 3.0 or higher. An additional 12 students were admitted but had to delay enrollment here because of high school regulations requiring them to be in five classes on their home campus. Roberta Stathis-Ochoa (Academic Programs) coordinates the High School-College Program.

OKTOBERFEST TO LAUNCH CAL STATE ASSOCIATES' YEAR

An Oktoberfest on Saturday evening, Oct. 15 in the Lower Commons will launch the new year for the Cal State Associates, a support group open to faculty and staff of the college and their spouses.

Newcomers to the campus, as well as members, are invited, said Linda Pederson, president. The dinner will be a potluck of soups, salads and desserts. Grilled wursts will be provided by the organization. Miranda Munson will provide the program on the sights and sounds of Germany.

NOMINATIONS INVITED FOR OUTSTANDING PROF

Nominations for the college's outstanding professor for 1983-84 are now being invited by the Outstanding Professor Selection Committee.

Any faculty, student or alumnus may nominate a tenure-track professor of any rank or an administrator who holds faculty status. Because the primary criterion used in selecting the outstanding professor is superlative teaching, student and alumni participation is particularly encouraged, said Dr. Arlo D. Harris, chair of the Outstanding Professor Selection Committee.

Statements of the criteria and petition forms are available at department offices, the circulation desk at the Library, the Associated Students Office, the Student Union information desk and the Alumni Office.

Deadline for submission of nominations is 4:30 p.m., Oct. 31. Questions may be directed to members of the selection committee, who are: Dr. Harris, Dr. Margaret Doane (English), Ann Marie Hearn (Accounting and Finance), Dr. Margaret Lenz (Education), Dr. James Mulvihill (Geography), Dr. J. C. Robinson (Academic Personnel), Helga Scovel (Alumni) and Nancy Waterhouse (Associated Students).

The campus' outstanding professor is submitted to the CSU, which selects two faculty members as the CSU outstanding faculty for the year. Dr. Frances Berdan (Anthropology) is one of the system's two honorees for 1982-83.

FEE WAIVER WINTER DEADLINE NEARS

Employees interested in participating in the fee waiver/reduction program for the winter quarter should submit their applications to the Personnel Office by Nov. 9.

All full-time permanent (tenured), probationary (tenure-track) and part-time permanent state employees are eligible. In addition full-time temporary employees in bargaining Units 5, 7 and 9 may participate.

The application deadline for employees in Units 5, 7 and 9, who are applying under Option 12:15, is at least two weeks prior to registration. However, employees are urged to apply earlier in order to facilitate the processing of admissions documents, according to Paul Aidoo (Personnel), who has further information on the program.

MOOREFIELD RECITAL-LECTURE
TO OPEN MUSIC AT CAL STATE

Ways in which music can describe things will be illustrated on the piano and harpsichord by Dr. Arthur Moorefield in the opening concert of the Music at Cal State series Wednesday evening, Oct. 12.

The lecture-recital featuring four fairly large works will begin at 8:15 p.m. in the Recital Hall. Individuals not holding season tickets for the series may purchase single admission tickets at the door.

Moorefield will play Schumann's "Faschingsschwank aus Wein" (Carnival in Vienna) and "The Battle of Prague" by Francis Kotzwara on the piano. A Kunhau Biblical sonata, "Combat of David and Goliath" and Bach's "Capriccio in B flat major" will be heard on the harpsichord.

In addition to the piano and harpsichord, Moorefield, professor of music at Cal State, is an artist on the organ and clarinet. He specializes in music of the German reformation.
