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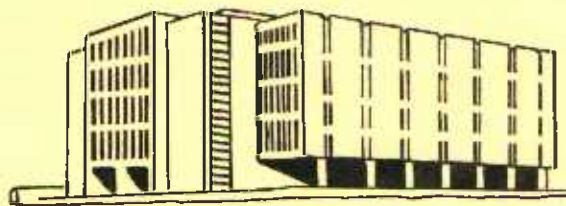

## DR. CAESAR NAPLES TO VISIT CAMPUS JAN. 25

Dr. Caesar J. Naples, CSU vice chancellor for faculty and staff relations since last July, will visit campus Jan. 25. An attorney with collective bargaining experience, he will be meeting with staff and faculty

throughout the day. His morning agenda includes meetings with President Anthony Evans, Administrative Council, Labor Relations Committee and staff representatives.

Following a tour of campus and luncheon with school deans, he will meet with the Faculty Senate.

Dr. Naples, who is in charge of employee group relations, was previously general counsel in the State University System of Florida. There he was responsible for employee relations, faculty liaison, personnel and collective bargaining. Earlier, he was chief employee relations officer for the State University of New York for five years and before that was assistant director of Gov. Nelson Rockefeller's Office of Employee Relations.

His degrees are from Yale University and the State University of New York.

## STAFF, FACULTY DEADLINE ON MASCOT SURVEY IS TODAY

Today is the deadline for staff and faculty to indicate their preference for a college mascot. There has been a controversy on campus several years regarding which animal--a St. Bernard or a coyote--is the official mascot.

Originally, the St. Bernard was the school mascot, but in the late 1970s some students initiated a move to change to a coyote. Students were polled during winter quarter registration and Alumni Association members received ballots in the January 1984 edition of the Panorama.

Results will be collected by the committee, which will formulate a recommendation and submit all information to President Anthony Evans. Committee members are Dr. Tom Rivera, chair; Jean Peacock, Dr. Barbara Sirotnik; John Kerwin and Kathy Fortner, representing alumni; and Shelly Cline and Mike Zambada, students.

## FAMILY PERFORMANCE SERIES OPENS FEB. 10

Music, dance and theatre will all be part of the Family Performance Series, five Friday evening programs designed to expose children to quality cultural events. The series, in its second year, makes entertainment simultaneous and spontaneous for the audience.

The Firebird Theatre Company will open the series Feb. 10 with an introduction to classical Greek mythology, "The Labors of Heracles." The play is a comedy which will use volunteers from the audience.

"Music Americana," here March 2, will explore the contributions of the peoples of Europe, Asia, Africa and the Spanish-speaking countries to the development of the United States through music and song. The L.A. Moving Van and Puppet Company will present "An Asian Fable: Tien Lee and the Fish of Gold and Other Stories" April 13.

On May 11, the Free Flight Dance Company will demonstrate dance as an art. Four actors of different ethnic backgrounds will present "A Show for all Reasons" June 1. The stories will be fables, folk and fairy tales.

All shows begin at 7:15 p.m. in the Recital Hall. Season tickets are \$35 for a family of up to five. General admission for individual programs is \$1.50 for a child under age 14 and \$3 for adults. Tickets go on sale Tuesday, Jan. 24 at the Student Union front desk. Sale hours are 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Further information may be obtained by calling Ext. 7757.

This year's series is being coordinated by Sherri Deutchman, activities advisor and Student Union coordinator. The highly successful series, which played to many full houses last year, was originated by JoAnn Hartzog as a special master's degree project.

## SHARE CONFERENCE TO BE FEB. 4

The second annual Serving the Handicapped of our Area in Recreation and Education (SHARE) Conference, sponsored by the School of Education and the Office of Continuing Education, will be held Feb. 4 here.

The conference should be of interest to teachers, counselors, administrators, parents and anyone interested in working with disabled persons, said Dr. T. Patrick Mullen, conference coordinator.

The one-day seminar will open at 8:30 a.m. with a keynote address by Patricia Medeiros Landurand, special and bilingual education specialist at Regis College in Weston, Mass. Participants will attend four 75-minute sessions of their choice. Topics will range from teaching the severely handicapped, job placement and college selection for disabled students, to survival skills for limited English proficient students.

Cost for the conference is \$30 which includes a buffet luncheon, refreshments and program abstracts. More information is available from the Office of Continuing Education at Ext. 7527.
