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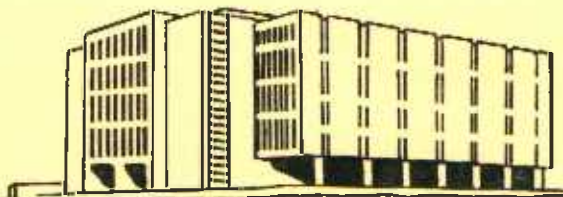

FACULTY BUILDING RECEIVES FIRST OK

The college proposal to make a faculty office building the next addition to the campus received the support of the CSU Board of Trustees, meeting Wednesday in Sacramento.

The college now is seeking funds for the architectural drawings from the 1984-85 state budget. The request, to include \$128,000 for preliminary plans and working drawings for a faculty office building, was submitted to the Assembly Ways and Means Sub-Committee II by Bill Leonard. The request to substitute this building for a previously submitted Theatre Arts Building also received the strong endorsement of our other legislators, Terry Goggin and Steve Clute, said President Anthony H. Evans. The committee accepted the amendment for consideration.

The college's original request for a Theatre Arts Building was not included by the governor in the budget he submitted to the Legislature. With the support of the Chancellor's Office, the college has withdrawn this project in favor of the office building.

The proposed building would contain 81 faculty offices, 21,567 square feet, in two stories to be located slightly southwest of the Physical Sciences Building. The structure would be the first phase of the future Health Sciences Building and would be designed to permit later addition of classrooms. The goal is to have the first phase completed in August 1987.

"The new building will make it possible for us to meet the needs of an increasing student body by providing offices for additional faculty and by freeing spaces that have been temporarily converted to faculty offices," said President Evans. It also would permit the college to remove three trailers located behind the Student Services Building.

FINANCE EXPERT TO SPEAK HERE

Dr. J. Fred Weston, a UCLA professor, author and finance consultant, will discuss the current changes among financial institutions Thursday. The lecture will begin at 6 p.m. in the Recital Hall. A reception will follow.

Dr. Weston's topic is "New Competition Among Financial Institutions." He has written extensively on financial policy, the stock market, corporate income tax, investment portfolios, financial forecasting and profit standards.

He has served as president of the American Finance Assn., the Western Economic Assn., and the Financial Management Assn. and was on the American Economic Assn. Census Advisory Committee.

The lecture is being sponsored by the Cal State Finance Assn., a student club, and the Department of Accounting and Finance. Dr. Adil Talaysum is coordinating the visit.

CLAUDINE CARLSON TO SING
APRIL 7 IN RECITAL HALL

French-born Claudine Carlson, mezzo soprano, will sing Saturday, April 7, in the Recital Hall. Her concert, a guest artist performance of the Music at Cal State series, will begin at 8:15 p.m.

A long-time resident of the United States, she has appeared with many leading orchestras, the Chicago Symphony, New York Philharmonic, the Philadelphia Orchestra and the Los Angeles Philharmonic. She has given recital and opera performances in French, German, Russian, Italian, Spanish and English. Ms. Carlson has sung at major summer festivals at Ravinia, Tanglewood, Aspen, Saratoga, the Hollywood Bowl and Lincoln Center.

Tickets, at the door, are \$5 general and \$2.50 student and senior citizen.

An Oxford-educated Welsh philosopher, Professor D. Z. Phillips, will speak at 3 p.m., Wednesday, April 4 in the Lower Commons. The topic for his talk is "The Devil's Disguises: Philosophy, Religion and Cultural Divergence."

A prolific writer, he has 11 books plus numerous journal articles to his credit. He has taught at St. Andrews University, Northern University of Wales and Swansea, where he has a life appointment as chair of the philosophy department. His visit is being arranged by Dr. Paul Johnson (Philosophy).

ORDER FORMS NOW AVAILABLE FOR ME FESTIVAL WORKSHOPS

Ticket order forms for the Microtechnology for Everybody (ME) Festival seminars and microcomputer-controlled whale show are now available at the Cal State Foundation Office.

The seminars, a popular part of last year's ME Festival, feature topics of general interest, with some of special interest to educators and business people. Seminar tickets are \$5 each. Tickets for the simulated underwater ballet show are \$3 each. The Foundation Office is AD 108, Ext. 7516.

Topics of interest to educators include selecting educational software, problem-solving with LOGO, word processing for kids and teachers, decision-making for kids, the Apple IIe in the classroom, computers and handicapped students, and computers and reading instruction.

Among the business topics are financial modeling with Visicalc, an introduction to business graphics, real estate and property management, office automation, business writing with WordStar and improving personal productivity.

Titles of general interest include pocket and portable computers, accessing data bases by telephone with a personal computer, how to make money with a personal computer, and the story behind the construction of a 22-foot robotic whale.

CUSTODIAL SHIFT CHANGE TAKES EFFECT APRIL 9

Beginning Monday, April 9, all campus buildings will be cleaned during the day as custodians change shifts from evenings to days. The new shift is 5 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The change comes after a survey of custodial hours on other CSU campuses. Most other campuses have custodians working during the day, said Jim Urata, director of administrative affairs.

Announcement of the change has improved morale, Urata said. The new hours will be safer because women will leave the campus in daylight hours, as opposed to 1:30 a.m., Urata said. Some buildings already are on a day schedule.

Laboratories, classrooms, restrooms, supportive staff and administrative areas will be cleaned between 5 and 8 a.m. Any large jobs which would restrict hallway traffic will also be completed before 8 a.m., he explained.

"The staff is preparing for the change and we do appreciate their cooperation," he said.
