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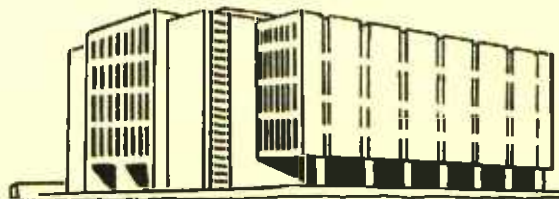

## LECTURER IN MANAGEMENT DIES UNEXPECTEDLY

Dr. Peter Bouvier, 41, lecturer in management in the School of Business and Public Administration, died unexpectedly in his Redlands home late Wednesday or early Thursday.

Dr. Bouvier, who joined the Cal State faculty on a part-time basis last September, had taught Wednesday evening and returned home. He was found in the den of the family home Thursday morning by his wife, Danielle. The coroner's office said the death was non-traumatic and an autopsy was planned.

Currently professor and chair of the Department of Business Administration at the University of Redlands, Dr. Bouvier had accepted an offer to join the Cal State faculty on a full-time basis next fall. Earlier he had taught at Nichols College, Viterbo College, the University of Massachusetts at Boston, Sienna Heights College and the University of Ottawa.

He earned his B.A. from San Francisco State University, his M.A. from UCLA and his Ph.D. from the University of Pittsburgh.

The college community extends deepest sympathy to Mrs. Bouvier. They have no children.

## 4 COACHES BEGIN RECRUITING FOR FALL

Cal State's first coaches are already out in the field recruiting athletes for the introduction of inter-collegiate athletics on campus next September.

The coaches, hired earlier this month, are: Gale L. Fitzgerald, former two-time Olympian in track, women's basketball coach; James R. Ducey, now at Pomona-Pitzer College, men's basketball coach; Cherif Zein, NCAA I finalist in soccer for three years while at UCLA, soccer coach; and Michael Muscare, award-winning high school tennis coach, for both men's and women's tennis.

The search has been reopened for the last two needed to complete the initial coaching staff for the first year--women's volleyball and men's and women's cross country, said Dr. Reginald Price, athletic director. All coaching positions are part time.

Eight teams will be fielded in 1984-85 as Cal State enters intercollegiate competition at the Division III level. The first varsity game to be played on campus will be a home soccer match against the University of Redlands Sept. 27. The basketball season will open on the home court Nov. 17, with the Coyotes facing Cal Tech. In addition to soccer, men's and women's cross country and women's volleyball will be launched in the fall quarter.

Initially the Coyotes will play as independents; however, applications will be filed to join the NCAA and the Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

## UPWARD BOUND FUNDING APPROVED

The Upward Bound program on campus has received funding for the second year of its current three-year funding cycle. The federally funded program has been allocated \$193,135 for the 1984-85 academic year.

Upward Bound is designed to improve the academic and social skills of low-income high school students and motivate them to continue their education.

George Martinez, program director, said although Upward Bound is on a three-year funding cycle, reports showing satisfactory progress must be submitted and approved annually for continued funding.

About 80 high school students are participating in this year's program, up 15 from last year. Martinez is anticipating an enrollment of about 130 students for next year.

Three members of the Cal State faculty and six professors from San Bernardino Valley College will be honored at the Teacher Recognition Breakfast Friday, June 8 in the Commons.

## PRESIDENTIAL ADVISOR TO SPEAK WEDNESDAY

Professor Don Walsh, a member of President Reagan's National Advisory Committee on Oceans and Atmosphere, will speak at 6 p.m., Wednesday in B1 22.

He will discuss the Reagan Administration's policy for a maritime economic zone. Walsh, president of the consulting firm International Maritime Incorporated, was director of the Institute for Marine and Coastal Studies and professor of ocean engineering at USC. He has published more than 85 articles and received the "Legion of Merit" award at the White House from President Dwight Eisenhower for deep submergence explorations in 1960. The program is arranged by Dr. Richard Ackley (National Security Studies).
