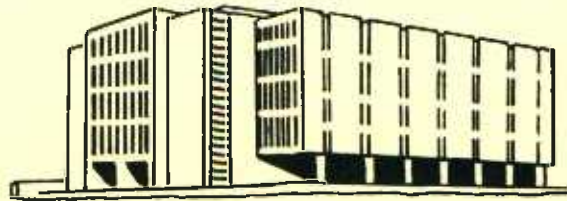

## AGREEMENTS REACHED WITH FOUR UNIONS

The Collective Bargaining Committee of the Board of Trustees has reached agreement with four of the six unions representing employees: Units 1, 4, 6 and 8.

The agreement with the State Employees Trade Council (Unit 6) includes a 10 percent salary increase, increased state contributions to maintain insurance and fringe benefit levels, and adjustments in certain shift differentials. Procedural changes were made in grievance procedures, overtime payments and discussions with the union in cases of contracting out work.

The Statewide University Police Assn. (Unit 8) agreement calls for 8.5% salary increase, increases in uniform allowances and changes in compensation for court appearance times. Changes in fringe benefits are similar to Unit 6.

Details of agreements with Units 1 and 4 are being withheld until the unions have had an opportunity to discuss them and vote on ratification.

Negotiations are still underway with the California Faculty Assn., representing the faculty, and the California State Employees Assn., representing four bargaining units of classified employees.

## CONTINUING EDUCATION NOW IS EXTENDED EDUCATION

In order to reflect a more precise meaning for its role, the Office of Continuing Education has been renamed the Office of Extended Education.

President Anthony H. Evans has approved the change requested by the dean of continuing education, Dr. Lee Porter. There has been a systemwide trend toward using "extended" rather than "continuing," Porter said. Twelve of the 19 CSU campuses now use Extended Education or Extended Studies.

"Continuing education was originally used to describe learning programs designed to up-date knowledge and skills for people already established in their careers," the dean noted. "While this type of activity is one aspect of our operations, Summer Session, ACLP and other programs don't fit this definition."

## DO NOT DIAL 911 FROM THE COLLEGE

Although the new emergency dialing number, 9-1-1, is now in effect throughout the area, it is not to be used on campus, said Arthur Butler, director of public safety.

For fire, police or medical emergencies, campus personnel should dial Ext. 7557, the campus police emergency number.

## HELGA LINGREN NAMED STUDENT UNION DIRECTOR

A former activities advisor here has returned to campus as the director of the Student Union. Helga Lingren, formerly Helga Scovel, assumed her duties in the Union July 2.

Ms. Lingren was activities advisor and student club coordinator from March, 1981 to June, 1983. She earned her B.A. degree in history here in 1979. Before graduation, she was a student assistant in the history, political science and math departments, as well as Academic Affairs and Academic Resources offices.

She succeeds Sherri Deutchman, Student Union coordinator during the past year, who has returned to her former position of assistant housing director.

The Student Union director position now is funded entirely by the Student Union Board. In the past, it was partially a state position.

## FACULTY, STUDENTS IN REDLANDS PLAYS

Eight students, two staff members and two faculty members from the Theatre Arts Department are participating in the Performing Arts Alliance at the University of Redlands this summer.

The 1981 Pulitzer prize-winning "Crimes of the Heart" features students Tina Lardieri, Mary Manthis and Amber Talvi; staff members O.P. Hadlock and Jill Trinquier and Kathleen Lewicki from the faculty. It will be repeated tonight and tomorrow night in the Glenn Wallich's Festival Theatre at the U of R.

The play, "All For November," written by Cal State graduate William Greeley, features students Nancy Learmonth, Mark Peters and Vicki Smith. Theatre arts professor William Slout is directing and playing a lead role. Stage manager is Shannon Rubin. This play opens Thursday, July 19 and continues July 20, 21 and 26-28.

## LAURA HELD NAMED ATHLETIC TRAINER

Laura Held, assistant athletic trainer at Pima Community College in Tucson, will be the new athletic trainer here, Dr. Reg Price, athletic director, announced. She will arrive Sept. 1, the first day of practice for fall sports teams.

She is a graduate of the National Athletic Training Program at the University of Arizona and is certified by the National Athletic Training Assn.

She earned her B.S. from Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo and her M.S. from the University of Arizona, both in physical education. She was a national championship finalist in the 400-meter hurdles at SLO.

"We look forward to having Laura join our program. With her experience as an athlete as an undergraduate, she knows the physical and psychological sides of an injury," Dr. Price said. She also will teach half-time.

## KCBS SPONSORS MEDIA SEMINAR

KCBS-TV, Channel 2, will bring its traveling Public Affairs Workshop to campus from 9 a.m. to noon, Friday, July 20. The free workshop, to be in PS 10, will explain to representatives of non-profit groups how to gain media attention.

A question and answer period will close the program, followed by a no-host luncheon in the Commons. Pat Michaels, general manager of KQLH-KWRM radio, is the luncheon speaker.

## CSU, DOMINGUEZ HILLS PRESIDENT NAMED

Dr. Richard Butwell, vice president for academic affairs at the University of South Dakota, was named president of California State University, Dominguez Hills Tuesday by the CSU Board of Trustees. He succeeds Dr. Donald R. Gerth, who has become president of CSU, Sacramento.

Another presidential search will be launched soon in the CSU. Dr. A. Walter Olson, president of CSC, Stanislaus, has announced he will retire June 30, 1985.

## FCC APPROVES TRANSMITTER FOR INSTRUCTIONAL TV

The Federal Communications Commission has granted the college a permit to erect a transmitter for an instructional television fixed station (ITFS).

The permit is the first step in the college's attempt to secure an FCC license to broadcast classes over ITFS to the Palm Springs area. The signal from the transmitter would be decoded only by the receivers in the classrooms.

The antenna, which would be erected on the Library roof, is licensed for 84 feet above ground. The signal must be repeated three times to get it across the mountains into the lower desert. FCC permits also are needed for each of the receiving sites.

Under this new outreach program, the course work will be broadcast from an existing class on campus.

## TRUSTEE O'CONNELL DIES AT AGE 73

Flags are flying at half-staff through the CSU campuses this week in memory of Trustee John F. O'Connell, who died July 2 following heart surgery.

O'Connell, a graduate of CSU Chico, was the first alumni trustee for the California State University and a three-term chair of the Board of Trustees. He was the past president of Bechtel, Inc., and at the time of his death was senior executive consultant to the Bechtel group of companies.

Survivors include his wife, Mollie; a son, Dennis, a daughter, Judith Allen; and four grandchildren. In lieu of flowers, memorials may be given to the Foundation of Marin General Hospital in San Rafael.
