## If the Idea of Defunding the Police Seems Egregious to You, Consider this

I recently read an article in the publication *New Philosopher* that opined over the reasons people fight for change.

It talked about how many who believe that change always happens in due course and that no matter how bad things get, if we just give it enough time—things eventually get better. It stressed further how many with this mindset expressed as much during the Civil Rights era further noting how it was this attitude by many white ministers that angered Martin Luther King Jr. and prompted him to write his famous “Letter from a Birmingham Jail something like ‘if only the oppressed would not allow their impatience to get in the way, “elderly xenophobes, racists, and sexists die out or certain politicians leave office, [and] time will gift us with a new, transformed day.”

I guess this is an easy position to take for those who have never been oppressed, despised and/or abused.

The author proceeded to highlight King’s retort to this position that noted change was not guaranteed to happen today or tomorrow unless people fight for it.

Some 60 years later, Black Lives Matter was born.

Many of us watched over the last couple of years as leaders on both sides of the aisle at the federal, state and local levels appeared to lose their minds when Black Lives Matter called for defunding the police on the heels of several high-profile murders of young Black people by officers and deputies across the country.

Certainly, amid the COVID-19 crisis, these indiscriminate killings of young Black people, of any people—though long-suffered and fought against in ebbs and flows over time—once again became too much for members of the Black community and others to bear.

But the radical idea of defunding the police—like letting Blacks attend white schools or move into white neighborhoods or give them weapons to fight as soldiers in the military once seen as untenable—saw even members of the Black community stammer and stutter as they tried to find the politically correct footing to respond to such a bold demand. ‘Uh...uh...uh...defund the police...uh...uh...uh...Now I certainly support

## San Bernardino Announces Outdoor Court

**O**n February 28, 2022 San Bernardino Superior Court announced it will hold outdoor court for all misdemeanor arraignments, including those requested by parties.

Presided over by Assistant Presidio Judge Lisa M. Roger, court will be in session Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m.

The outdoor court is scheduled to continue until the end of the year weather permitting.

All litigants will be given written notification of the day and time of their scheduled appearance.

Outdoor court proceedings have been instituted to both meet the demands of judicial backlogs by expanding court calendars to

accommodate more cases in an outdoor setting, as well as a way to meet the concerns over public health brought about by the pandemic.

Initially instituted during the early days of the pandemic, outdoor court and its benefits are determined to be effective, healthier and productive.

Although face coverings are no longer required in court room settings, they remain highly recommended in alignment with CA Governor Gavin Newsom's latest COVID-19 update regarding face coverings.

## CSUSB President Tomás Morales Spoke at St. Paul AME Church on Super Sunday

The last Sunday of February, Cal State University San Bernardino President Tomás D. Morales addressed the importance a college education can make in the lives of Black students.

The speech took place at St. Paul African Methodist Episcopal Church in San Bernardino as part of the university's Super Sunday, where more than one hundred African American churches are visited by college and university presidents, administrators, students and alumni to spread awareness of and interest in completing the goal of higher education.

Super Sunday itself is a part of Cal State University's (CSU's) African American Initiative, an outreach program which addresses the importance of recruiting and retaining Black students in Cal State University schools.

The goal of Super Sunday is to share with potential students and their families that a college degree from the CSU

is possible, affordable and transformative, and to ensure our commitment to partnering with them from admission to the day they earn their degree and beyond.

As part of the CSU's Graduation Initiative 2025 we are laser-focused on eliminating equity gaps and making a measurable difference in supporting African American students to earn their degrees.

"We will continue to work tirelessly with our faith-based partners throughout the Golden State to bring the lifelong and life-transforming benefits of higher education to every student who dreams of a CSU degree." said Sylvia Alva, Executive Vice Chancellor of Academic and Student Affairs.

During his speech, Morales spoke to the importance of providing encouragement to students to attend college. "Each of you can be a tremendous help – at home, around the dinner table, in our schools, in the community and here in church –

## Descendants of Tuskegee Experiment Victims Encourage Blacks to “Get Vaccinated”

California lifts several COVID-19 pandemic restrictions as the state approaches the second anniversary of the initial stay-at-home order issued on March 18, 2020, communities of color still struggle with low vaccination rates.

In an effort to address vaccine hesitancy among Black communities and communities of color in San Bernardino County, the California Association of African American Superintendents and Administrators (CAAASA) partnered with the San Bernardino City Unified School District (SBCUSD) and hosted an informational town hall on March 9th.

The town hall discussion aimed to encourage the community to get vaccinated while also addressing misinformation and disinformation regarding the United States' history of conducting public health studies

on 623 Black men without their consent.

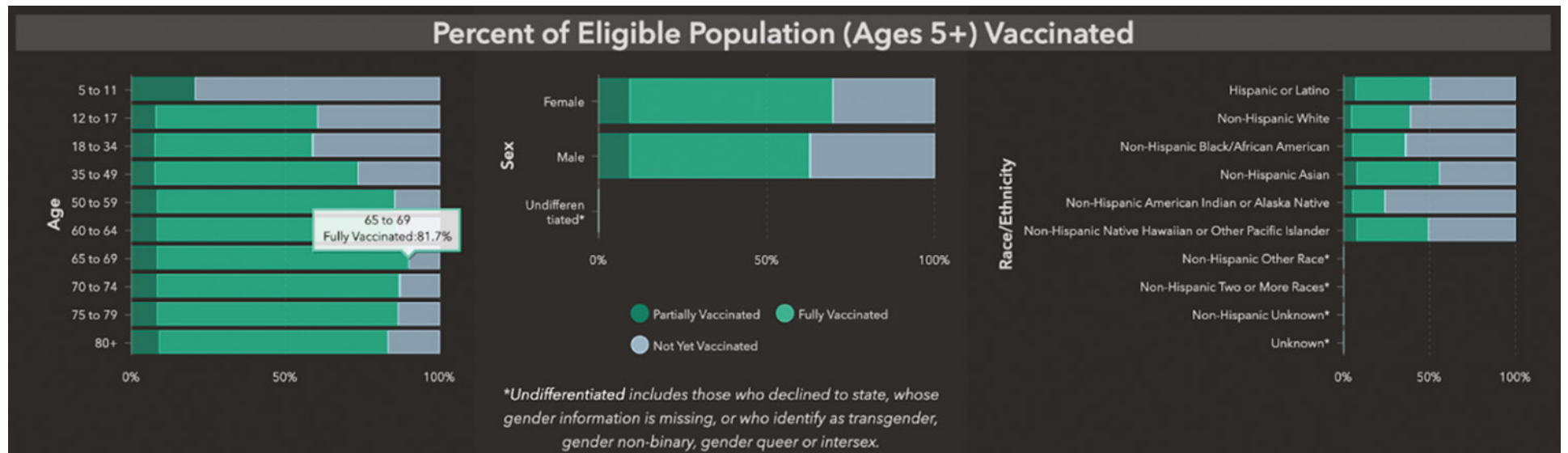
### Mis- Disinformation Regarding the Tuskegee Experiment

The discussion was moderated by Wallace Allen, West Side Story Newspaper publisher and featured several speakers, notably descendants of the United States Public Health Service Syphilis Study at Tuskegee and Macon County, Alabama, formerly known as the Tuskegee Syphilis Study. Lillie Tyson Head, daughter of Freddie Lee Tyson who was a victim of the study and President of Voices For Our Fathers Legacy Foundation, addressed the fact that the study has been used as a reference point for why Black people mistrust COVID-19 vaccines.

“This study should definitely not be used as reasons for not getting vaccinated. It has been used and it has been talked about, and that’s one of the reasons why I’m here representing the descendants and the foundation — to encourage everyone not to make a comparison, but to see and realize the contrast,” said Tyson.

Tyson acknowledged that the history of the study affects attitudes toward trusting the validity of vaccines, but encouraged people to rely on medical science, facts and medical interventions as a source of validity.

She also emphasized key differences between the syphilis study and the COVID-19 pandemic, namely, the men in the study were denied access to treatment (Penicillin) during the study, while now, Black people are denying themselves access to treatment.

“Here, today, we have the opportunity to get vaccinated and if we deny ourselves of the vaccination, we will be doing the same as the government had done to those men, so we shouldn’t do that,” Tyson stated.

### The Roots of Hesitancy

Another descendant of a victim of the study, Eric Patterson, pointed out that skepticism regarding [the vaccine] is a result of a legacy of American history that has left Black people vulnerable since stepping foot into America in 1619 and has lasted throughout a history of slavery, the Civil War, Reconstruction and the Jim Crow era.

Patterson explained that two key variables play a role in why Black Americans have a hard time trusting: historical mistreatment and systemic racism.

In order to improve the relationship among African Americans, Patterson explained that local leaders must work with governmental and private organizations to improve education, healthcare and the criminal justice system as it relates and impacts underserved communities.

### In honor of my mother

Dr. Brenda Ross, assistant professor of Maternal and Fetal Medicine at the University of California, Riverside joined the panel, and spoke

about the personal impact COVID-19 had on her. Ross’s mother died after contracting the virus from a family member who was living in the home.

“And so if I don’t do it for any other reason, I have to honor my mother’s memory by saying, had she had the vaccine available, she would be here today. When she died, the vaccine wasn’t available,” Ross said. “So, it’s tantamount, it’s of paramount importance, it’s absolutely necessary that when you choose to not be vaccinated, that you recognize the consequences of that. And it’s just not personal for you, it affects your home, your family, your community.”

Dr. Ross acknowledged that some people may be shy about sharing that they’re afraid to be vaccinated, but she explained that it’s okay to be afraid because that’s where education comes in to help people ask questions regarding the vaccine.

Across San Bernardino and Riverside Counties, local organizations and churches have partnered with local health departments to educate and provide access to testing and vaccination services within their communities.

Dr. Joshua Beckley, senior pastor at Ecclesia Christian Fellowship, said that his church has been used as a testing site and vaccination site throughout the pandemic. Long before the pandemic, Beckley and his church launched a health ministry to address health disparities within the community and keep the congregation informed by hosting educational workshops and encouraging people to get regular health checks.

### My people perish

“One of the things I understand from a biblical perspective [is] our people perish for a lack of knowledge, the Bible says,” Beckley stated. “And one of the things I intended to do as this pandemic began to rage havoc through our community, was to provide a platform of information.”

Beckley said that he is concerned about the infection rate and the low vaccination rate in the community he serves within the city of San Bernardino. According to the San Bernardino County Department of Public

# San Bernardino County Sheriff: Will Voters Make Their Own Choice in 2022? Part 1

Official records obtained by the IE Voice/Black Voice News, indicate for the past 12 years, the San Bernardino County Board of Supervisors has appointed the county sheriffs from the upper ranks of the Sheriff's Department as endorsed by the retiring sheriff and approved by the board of supervisors over the objections of voters who wished to have their say in the selection.

From January 28, 2009, when San Bernardino County (SBC) Sheriff Rod Hoops was appointed through the most recent appointment of Sheriff Shannon Dicus, this has been the selection process. However, the in-house selection of county sheriffs appears to have begun even earlier.

## What history tells us

Times are changing and the Black Lives Matter movement has focused more attention on who fills these positions.

An examination of official records and historical news articles, uncovered evidence of how Dicus' appointment on July 7, 2021, followed a decades-long pattern.

The 2009 appointment of Hoops appears to be a continuation of a model that apparently began as early as 1983 with then SBC Sheriff Frank Bland, and has continued with the appointment of sheriffs from the upper ranks of the department since.

As noted, a favored, high-ranking sheriff employee receives the endorsement of the sitting sheriff, is appointed by the political establishment, supported by the Sheriff Employees Benefit Association (SEBA) and subsequently receives generous campaign funds which typically ensures a successful election.

Each sheriff since Bland, who retired in 1983, has promised to continue the legacy of the department and once appointed by the Board of Supervisors (BOS), is basically guaranteed the advantages of incumbency in the next election—essentially ensuring a successful campaign.

## Political experts advise

"If your party serves the powerful and well-funded interests, and there's no limit to what you can spend, you have a permanent, structural advantage," said political advisor David Axelrod during a 2012 interview with UC Irvine's New University news publication.

"If endorsements weren't important, politicians would have ceased seeking them decades ago," said Joshua Stockley, political science professor at the University of Louisiana in Monroe.

A Los Angeles Times report further highlights how, "In politics, incumbency almost always provides a crucial boost. Its benefits are immeasurable: a battle-tested army of aides, ready attention from the media, and that most important political asset of all, access to money."

**Back to SBCSD history**

Over the last 12 years, residents of San Bernardino County, including those in unincorporated areas as well as those in the 14 contracted cities patrolled by the San Bernardino County Sheriff’s Department (SBCSD), have read news reports and/or watched videos of their law enforcement officers involved in questionable interactions or deadly encounters with citizens, or being accused of criminal activity.

In one example as previously reported by the IE Voice/Black Voice News, most residents were not aware SBCSD used a surveillance device without a search warrant over 300 times beginning in 2013, between January 2014 and May 2015. The device known as Stingray, simulates a cell phone tower capturing cell phone data and/or communications within range of the device.

On October 8, 2015, California’s Electronic Communications Privacy Act (CalECPA) was signed into law amending penal code section 1546, adding sections 1546.1, 1546.2 and 1546.4, requiring law enforcement to obtain a search warrant to compel or access electronic communications.

Currently San Bernardino County residents have little ability to discover if their phone data and/or communications were or are being captured by a Stingray. And, although the Privacy Act calls for public disclosure regarding how the technology is being applied locally including guardrails surrounding its use, that is yet to happen in San Bernardino County.

SBCSD was one of the three biggest organizations purchasing surveillance equipment in the State of California in 2014.

In 2016, the IE Voice/Black Voice News also reported on SBCSD’s secret collection of biometric information. “In 2013, Riverside and San Bernardino Counties began quietly collecting iris scans as part of a pilot program with the FBI. At the same time, it also incorporated the capture of facial scans to add to the FBI database—neither the iris pilot nor facial scanning programs have privacy impact assessments.”

The report noted that although the Memorandum of Understanding stated it was to be a one-year pilot program, three years later it was still ongoing without any discernible public disclosure and to date there

is no public clarity around its use. Yet, in 2016 SBCSD received the FBI’s Biometric Identification Award that is presented annually to “an outstanding officer or agency” for using the FBI’s next generation identification system.

**Most county residents are within SBCSD jurisdiction**

Although some of the officers/deputies in the following cities may wear their own uniforms, SBCSD is contracted by the following cities and provides law enforcement in these communities including: Adelanto, Apple Valley, Big Bear Lake, Chino Hills, Grand Terrace, Hesperia, Highland, Loma Linda, Needles, Rancho Cucamonga, Twentynine Palms, Victorville, Yucaipa, and Yucca Valley in addition to the unincorporated areas of the county.

The question before the voters in this year’s election, is whether they want the same type of law enforcement this county has experienced for the past 39 as selected by SBCSD leaders and approved by the board of supervisors or will they vote for something new?

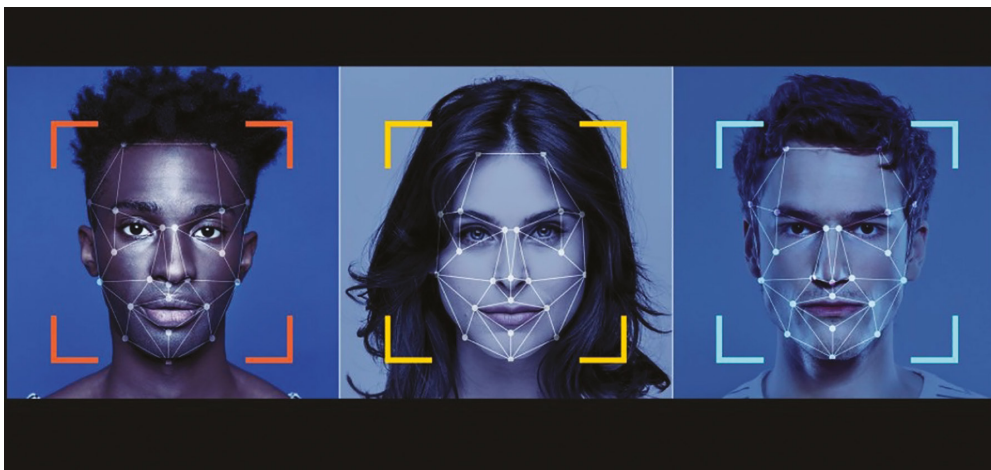
The position of sheriff is one of the most powerful elected positions in any county, and as it currently stands, that position is being chosen for voters in what critics perceive as a “rigged process”.

by surrounding your children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews and godchildren with the message that they can go to college, they must go to college, that it is affordable, and it opens the doors to a world of opportunity and progress for all.”

“I’m here with a message of hope, encouragement and heartfelt optimism. Because I know the great promise and opportunity that Cal State offers for you, your families and our communities.”

Morales' hopeful message may be needed

more now that the Black community has been disproportionately impacted by the pandemic in addition to the longstanding issues that continue to haunt the Black community.

He also discussed CalState’s 2025 Initiative. Its goal is to “... help more students achieve the dream of a college degree...” and to assist students with the services they need to succeed. Morales knows the difference providing comprehensive support to students can make in their lives because he received a public school education and was a beneficiary of the

educational opportunity program—a program that provided him with the help he needed to reach his goals.

“The fact is that I was poor and I was academically unprepared to go to college, I am not ashamed of that. I recognize that and celebrate that,” Morales shared. “It has taken effort and persistence, but I am reminded and eternally grateful to the opportunities that public education has afforded me throughout my life. It has built my career. I am happy to pay

# The Beijing Olympics: Triumphs on Snow and Ice

Celebrating Olympic medalists while saying so long to an icon

**A**ny individual Olympic achievement, or the color of a coveted medal an athlete may earn, can overshadow the true meaning of why Olympians compete and the lasting impression they leave.

Facing great challenges, USA Bobsled's Elana Meyers-Taylor was remarkable in Beijing.

Elana Meyers-Taylor, played softball at George Washington University, but failed to make the US team in that sport. Undaunted, she then attempted a completely new sport, Women's bobsled. Four Winter Olympics later, Meyers-Taylor won her fifth Olympic medal, surpassing the great American speed skater Shani Davis.

On January 19th, Meyers-Taylor, upon arriving in Beijing, tested positive for COVID-19. She was initially selected to carry the US flag during the Opening Ceremony, but was sent directly to quarantine isolation. She eventually provided two negative tests and joined her teammates on the Olympic sliding hill.

Meyers-Taylor promptly took silver in the first ever Olympic "Monobob" event and a bronze in the traditional bobsled.

## The names of Erin Jackson and Brittany Bowe will always be connected

One of the most compelling stories to develop prior to the games in Beijing, involved the kind gesture of American Speed Skater Brittany Bowe to her teammate Erin Jackson, two names that will always be connected. Jackson, the number one 500 meter Speed Skater in the world, failed to qualify at the trials. Then, Bowe gave up her slot to Jackson, so she could compete in her specialty in Beijing. Jackson promptly won the gold in the 500 meter Speed Skate, as Bowe added her second Olympic bronze medal in the 1000 meter race.

Shaun White, the "Red Tomato," a name synonymous with Olympic Half Pipe, completes his final journey.

Born in the San Diego area like Elana Meyers-Taylor, Shaun White, aka "Red Tomato," has carved out quite a career in the sport of Snowboarding and is easily the most successful all time Olympic athlete in the sport of Half Pipe. The five time Olympian and three-time gold medal winner, came up short on his final Olympic run at Genting Snow Park.

## White announced his retirement from Olympic competition at Genting

Shaun White's natural ability, personality and prolific career, has created an industry of snowboarding around the world. Known for gold medals upon the biggest stages at both the "X Games" and "Olympic Games," and always pushing the progression of the sport for over 20 years. White announced his retirement from Olympic competition after competing at Genting.

## While the world looks on, younger and more compelling athletes constantly emerge

For little girls everywhere, especially those of color, Olympic performances can certainly inspire the next generation. While the world looks on, new and more

compelling athletes constantly emerge. Erin Jackson's persistent desire to "go fast" led her to an Olympic gold medal in the 500 meter Speed Skating final. Both Karen Chen and Alysa Liu had impressive performances in Figure Skating Free Dance, but fell short of the podium in Beijing.

Vanessa James of France, one of the very few Black skaters in her sport, competed at a high level in Figure Skating Pairs event at Beijing. Maame Binet, born in Ghana, one of USA's best Short Track skaters, did not medal in Beijing, but made a strong showing in all her races, as her international and Olympic careers continue.

Health's COVID-19 Dashboard, approximately 57% of the eligible population (5 years old and older) in the city is fully vaccinated.

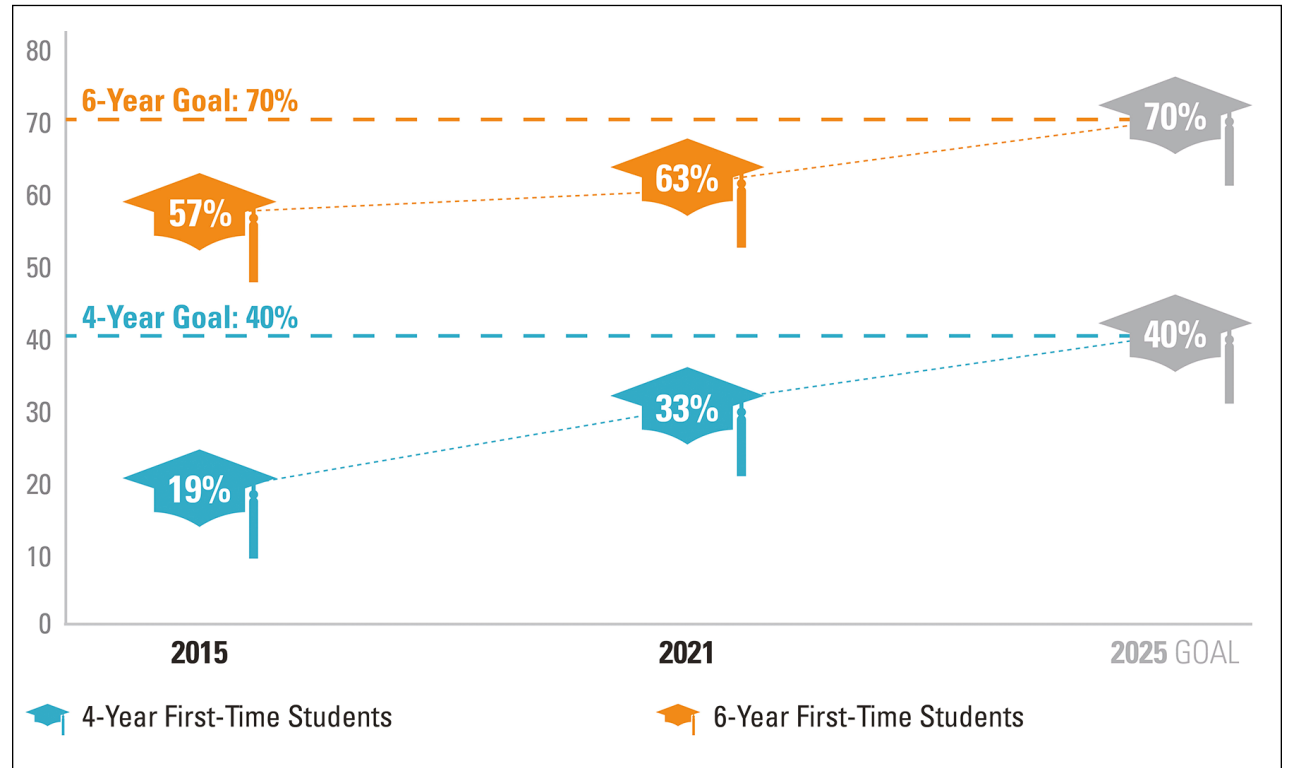
In San Bernardino County, among the eligible population, 30.9% of African Americans are fully vaccinated, 43.5% of Latinos are fully vaccinated and 18.6% of American Indians are fully vaccinated. Older residents have higher vaccination rates compared to younger residents, with elders between the ages of 65 to 69 having the highest vaccination rate at 81.7%, followed by those between the ages of 70 to 74 who have a vaccination rate of 78.8%.

## Mask mandates changing for schools

With mask mandates ending across schools in California as of March 12, San Bernardino City Unified School District will also host vaccine clinics at schools throughout the region, in partnership with the CAAASA.

The district released the following statement regarding the updated guidance on masks: "Wearing masks in SBCUSD schools will be optional beginning March 12, 2022. While the statewide school masking mandate goes away Saturday, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) and SBCUSD continue to recommend face coverings as a personal choice to protect against COVID-19 exposure. SBCUSD will continue to provide masks for anyone who would like to wear them on school campuses and in District buildings."

regarding the police, the president makes sure to emphasize his position of support at every opportunity. Another way he has proven his support is by ensuring billions of dollars continue flowing into police coffers through every channel at his disposal even as he also designates token amounts to the concepts of community organizations playing a part in community-related police initiatives—the real purpose of the defunding call.

In the meantime, as the nation continues to equivocate, hem and haw over police funding, 203 Black Lives were taken by police in 2021 according to Newsweek proving not much has changed regarding police taking Black lives indiscriminately since the 2020 uprising—police funding continues to flow like a fireman's hose without a shut-off valve and Black people continue to die.

Then, as if adding insult to injury, we learned in recent days that between 2010 and 2020 nearly 40,000 payments resulting from allegations of police misconduct were paid by 25 police agencies across the country totaling more than \$3 billion according to a March 9, Washington Post report.

Keep in mind the report looked at only 25 of the approximate 17,985 police agencies in the country. Acknowledging police agencies vary in size, just consider the possibilities relative to the total amount of settlement payments were a complete assessment made of all the nation's police agencies—it would be staggering.

One of the areas included in the report's assessment was Riverside where a total of \$77 million dollars in settlement payments were

made during the study period.

Where is the outcry? All I hear are crickets.

It seems unconscionable that rather than reimagining policing, communities are willing to pay millions of dollars (billions nationally) and sacrifice untold lives being lost or damaged rather than seeking a better way—reimagining—

redirecting funding away from the police and toward more purposeful and proactive ways to build relationships between police/deputies and the communities they serve.

Riverside County Sheriff's Department has an annual budget totaling more than one billion dollars not including additional funding readily accessible through generous state and/or federal grants.

Things will never change unless agencies like Riverside and others in the inland region are in some way held accountable for their violations

of human rights—how else can you describe misuse of force so egregious that every year there are millions of dollars in settlement costs paid by taxpayers—not including the salaries of a contingent of lawyers needed to negotiate settlement outcomes?

Maybe citizens should demand that every

dollar paid in settling police use of force cases should be taken from the police/sheriff department's budget and reallocated to local organizations working to reimagine policing in their communities—it would be a meaningful step toward "defunding the police."

Of course, this is just my opinion. I'm keeping it real.

# File a 2021 Tax Return to Get the Remainder of Your 2021 Child Tax Credit

Many families got up to half of their estimated **2021 Child Tax Credit** as advance payments last year. Here are **three** steps to getting the rest of your credit:

## Step 1: Review Letter 6419

- You should have received this letter in January 2022 if you received advance Child Tax Credit payments in 2021.
- It shows the amount of advance payments you received and the number of qualifying children the payments were based on.
- You or your tax preparer will use this information to figure your remaining credit accurately.
- If you misplaced your letter, you can look up your information using the IRS's [CTC Update Portal](#) or [Online Account](#).

## Step 2: Claim the Rest of Your 2021 Child Tax Credit

- File your 2021 federal tax return and claim the Child Tax Credit, if you're eligible.
- Choose direct deposit if you're getting a refund. Make sure your bank account information is correct.

## Step 3: Get Paid!

- After you file your return, you can check on the status of your refund using the [Where's My Refund?](#) tool on IRS.gov or the mobile app [IRS2Go](#).
- You can check within 24 hours of e-filing or within four weeks of mailing a return. Updates to the online tool are made daily, usually overnight.
- To use this tool, you need your Social Security number, filing status and the exact whole dollar amount of your refund.

## Important Information

- » Filing a tax return is the only way to get the remainder of your 2021 Child Tax Credit.
- » Electronic filing with direct deposit is the safest and fastest way to get a tax refund.
- » Many people qualify for free e-filing through [IRS Free File](#) or at a volunteer tax preparation site.
