Sabbatical Leave Recipients Announced

Seven faculty members have been awarded sabbatical leaves and three were awarded difference-in-pay leaves for the 1985-86 academic year, announced Dr. J. C. Robinson, associate vice president for academic personnel.

Dr. Gene Andrusco, associate professor of accounting and finance, was awarded a sabbatical for fall 1985 to develop a "Problem and Cases" manual for two new courses in the administration curriculum and for publication.

Dr. Jorun Johns, professor of foreign languages, will translate a volume of Paul Zech's South American tales and provide an introduction and explanatory notes to clarify terms, people and places that will be unfamiliar to the average reader, during her spring 1986 sabbatical.

Dr. Loren Filbeck, professor of music, was awarded a fall 1985 sabbatical to do post-doctoral course work at the Claremont Graduate School.

Dr. Alexander Sokoloff, professor of biology, will use his fall 1985 sabbatical to prepare manuscripts for publication and to work on a publication to be titled The Flour Beetle, Tribolium, as an Experimental Animal: A Practical Guide.

Dr. Ellen Kronowitz, associate professor of education, was awarded a sabbatical for fall 1985 to study teacher education in Israel and multicultural education in the Israeli society.

Dr. Robert Cramer, associate professor of psychology, will use his winter and spring 1986 sabbatical to visit the University of Oklahoma to collaborate with a professor there on numerous research projects and to prepare them for publication.

Dr. Edward Teyber, associate professor of psychology, was awarded a 1985-86 sabbatical to finish a textbook, An Interpersonal-Process Approach to Counseling Relationships, to submit a proposal for a grant to evaluate educational media programs designed to prevent child sexual abuse and to obtain further education in applied cognitive development.

Dr. Stella Clark, professor of foreign languages, was awarded a winter and spring 1986 difference-in-pay leave to work on a book, Doce Novelistas Mexicanos Contemporaneos and to work in the fields of semiotics, deconstruction and other systems and theories of communication.

Dr. Kenneth Mantei, professor of chemistry, will use his 1985-86 difference-in-pay leave to acquire some formal computer science credentials.

Dr. Paul Johnson, professor of philosophy, was awarded a difference-in-pay leave for 1985-86 to prepare a book-length interpretation of the thought of Thomas Hobbes, focusing on his political thought and based on suggestions in recent literature which suggest the operation of a dialectical methodology on a tacit level in Hobbes' work.

Trustees Approve Plans For Faculty Building

Schematic plans for the new Faculty Office Building were approved Tuesday by the CSU Board of Trustees, marking another step toward realization of a facility to relieve crowded office conditions on campus.

Projected to cost \$2.1 million, the 21,100-square-foot building would contain 81 faculty offices and administrative offices for the Schools of Education and Social and Behavioral Sciences. The initial appropriation by the Legislature in 1984-85 funded the preparation of plans and drawings. Construction money will be sought in the next state budget.

The building will be two stories, with offices facing open courtyards. Construction will be of concrete tilt-up walls, which will coordinate with the architectural design of the campus. Exterior walls will utilize field stone for accent effect. The building, designed to accommodate a future addition, will be located between the Physical Sciences Building and the Administration Building.

The estimated timetable calls for start of construction in August 1985 and occupancy in March 1987.

Psi Chi Speaker to Discuss Fathering

Dr. Henry B. Biller, professor of psychology at the University of Rhode Island, will speak on the topic of parenting and early relationships at a Psi Chi meeting at 7 p.m., Wednesday, Nov. 28 in the Recital Hall. The meeting is open to the public.

A nationally recognized author on the subject of parent-child relationships and sex role personality functioning, Biller has written Father, Child and Sex Role; Father Power; The Other Helpers: Paraprofessionals and Nonprofessionals in Mental Health; Parental Death and Psychological Development; Child Maltreatment and Parent and Children Growing Together.

AUW Campaign Exceeds Goal

Thirty-nine percent of the University community contributed to this year's Arrowhead United Way campaign. Approximately \$13,404 was raised, which represents 101% of the campaign's \$13,346 goal. "All AUW campus volunteers are to be commended for a job well done," stated Richard Bennecke, campus volunteer coordinator.

Leonard Farwell, AUW campus chairman, said approximately 243 individuals contributed to this year's drive, which represents an 8% increase over last year. "I am pleased that the university community once again responded to the needs of the less fortunate by supporting this year's AUW campaign," said Farwell.

Faculty Artist Recital Set for Monday, Nov. 26

A formal concert featuring 12 poems by Claude Debussy will be performed by Dr. Jerrold Pritchard, flute; Dr. Larry McFatter, piano; and Dr. Mireille Rydell, narrator, Monday, Nov. 26 at 8:15 p.m. in the

Recital Hall. Debussy's rediscovered works, "Chansons De Bilitis," will be narrated in French by Dr. Rydell. "This piece is a reworking of an instrumental ensemble for flute, piano and narrator," explained Dr. Pritchard. "The use of language is very expressive and highly symbolic." The first half of the concert will feature 20th century French music; the second half, 20th century American music, both for flute.

Tickets, available at the door, are \$3.50, general admission, and \$1.75 for students and senior citizens.

Reception Set for Dec. 7 For Fall Quarter Graduates

President Anthony H. Evans will host a reception honoring fall quarter graduates Friday afternoon, Dec. 7 in the Lower Commons.

A new tradition being started, the reception from 4:30 to 6 p.m. will be an opportunity to celebrate the accomplishments of the graduates and to bring a sense of closure to their academic experience. The event will not replace the June 15 graduation ceremonies, as fall quarter graduates still are eligible to participate. It will be, however, an occasion for the graduates and their families to celebrate with classmates and with faculty and staff who have known them.

A similar reception will be planned in March for the winter quarter graduates.

Basketball Season Opens Tomorrow Night

Another chapter of athletic history unfolds tomorrow (Saturday) night as the Cal State basketball squad takes to the court for the first time in intercollegiate competition. The Coyotes host Cal Tech at 7 p.m. in the gym.

Coach Jim Ducey begins the season with five community college transfers and added talent from local high schools. "Our goal for this season is for the guys to learn to play together as a team, play for each other and perform to the best of their ability," he said. Cal Tech's 7-17 record last year gives hope for a winning start for the Cal State season.

The Coyotes also play their second game at home--Monday, Nov. 19 at 7 p.m. against Pomona-Pitzer, which posted a 9-17 record last year.

The women's basketball team, coached by Gale Fitzgerald, kicks off its inaugural season Saturday, Nov. 24, hosting Fresno Pacific College. The women's squad, with only one experienced community college transfer, is described by its coach as "small but quick and well conditioned."

A printed schedule of games for both teams is available from the Athletics Office, PE 122, or the Public Affairs Office, AD 117.

Admission to home games will be \$2 for adults and \$1 for students with a college or high school ID card. Cal State faculty and staff will be admitted for \$1.

Fall Teams Close Successful Seasons

Impressive first season records were racked up by Cal State's soccer, volleyball and cross country teams during fall quarter play.

Facing some tough competition, the soccer squad posted a 11-2 season record, losing only to Biola and Cal Poly, Pomona, both local powerhouses. The women's volleyball team won 9 and lost 4 in its initial season. While the men's cross country team had an 8-1 season, the women's cross country squad was undefeated in its six meets.
