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New Academic Year Begins Tuesday

Next week, Cal State begins writing the 21st chapter of its academic history. In lieu of an all-campus convocation to convene the 1985-86 school year, the university will herald its 20th anniversary with a special convocation Oct. 24.

For the faculty, the new year begins officially Tuesday, Sept. 17 with a general meeting from 9:30-11 a.m. in the Recital Hall. Refreshments will be served from 9-9:30 a.m. on the Creative Arts patio.

Dr. J. C. Robinson, associate vice president for academic personnel, said the main purpose of the meeting will be to introduce Dr. Robert Detweiler, the new vice president, as well as the 36 other new faculty members who are joining the university this year.

"We have quite a diverse group of people joining us this year which, I think, will add to the international flavor of the campus," he said.

In addition to the introductions and remarks by President Evans, the faculty will be addressed by Dr. Diane Halpern, associate dean of undergraduate studies, and Dr. Jerrold Pritchard, associate vice president of academic programs. They will present information on changes in the registration process, the new advising center and the introduction of intensive learning experience programs for incoming freshmen who score in the lowest quartile on the college-entry English and mathematics tests.

Dr. Halpern said she also will reveal a "good idea contest," which will be co-sponsored by Academic Programs and Associated Students. The intent is to generate "at least one good idea from everyone on campus sometime throughout the year to make the campus better." Details will be announced later this month, she said.

New faculty will gather again in the afternoon for an orientation session, which will be conducted by Dr. Robinson. The meeting, to be held from 1:30-3:30 p.m. in the Lower Commons, will outline the faculty affairs functions and services provided by such departments as Audio-Visual and the Computer Center. New personnel will be apprised of the criteria for consideration as an active faculty member and receive a detailed orientation on the new advisement process.

Members of the Personnel Department will distribute health insurance booklets to all eligible faculty members following the general meeting, and will sign-up new faculty members following the afternoon orientation session.

Tuesday, students may begin getting their registration packets in the Student Services Building atrium. In the evening, the final orientation session for new students who missed the summer programs will be held from 6-9 p.m. in the Student Union.

Meetings of the schools and various departments will be held Wednesday, Sept. 18. Students in the Educational Opportunity Program will be engaged in orientation activities from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. in the Student Union.

Faculty advisors are expected to be available in their offices for at least seven hours Thursday, Sept. 19 and Friday, Sept. 20 when students will be on campus for assistance in developing their schedules for the fall quarter.

The residence halls will open Saturday afternoon, Sept. 21. Registration for classes is slated for Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 23 and 24.

Public Safety Proposes Increased Parking Fines

Increased fines for parking violations at Cal State are being proposed by campus police, pending approval by the San Bernardino municipal court system. Basic parking fines have not been changed since 1970, according to Art Butler, Public

Safety director. Although the fines represent a significant increase, Butler noted that Cal State, San Bernardino will remain far below fines collected at other CSU campuses. Campus police will continue to issue written warnings for all violations except illegal parking in a handicapped zone. The proposed fines follow:

Professional Activities

Dr. Jill Buroker (Philosophy) presented a talk, "On Kant's Proof of the Existence of Material Objects," at the sixth International Kant Congress Sept. 8-12 at Pennsylvania State University.

Dr. Michael G. Weiss (Psychology) and Sharon Y. Young, psychology graduate student, presented a paper, "Zookie: A Program on Self-Protection for Preschool Children," at the annual meeting of the American Psychological Association in August in Los Angeles.

Dr. Robert Blackey (History) has an article, "Will Robots Carry Union Cards?," in the spring issue of Business and Society Review.

Dr. Louise Burton (Education) will serve as a regional representative of the Association for the Severely Handicapped, to assist and support parents, teachers, administrators and others in assuring quality services for persons with severe handicaps.

Campus Kept Busy During Summer Months

Several new programs for incoming students, STEP and PEP, plus ongoing programs for high school students, helped to keep the campus buzzing with activity this summer.

A five-week residential program, Summer Transition and Enrichment Program (STEP), gave 45 first-time freshmen their first look at life on a college campus. The Learning Center offered 10 days of seminars on study skills and writing as part of the Preparatory Enrichment Program (PEP). Four orientation sessions were held for more than 200 freshmen and transfer students. In addition 14 high school students participated in the first summer debate and speech institute and 55 Upward Bound students enjoyed four weeks of residential life, study and recreational activities on campus. The Opportunity Second Chance program again brought high school students to campus for morning work experience followed by afternoon seminars.

Adding to the festivities on campus were well-received concerts by Lalo Guerrero, popular Hispanic singer, songwriter and guitarist, and well-known local performers, Clabe Hangan and Music Americana; and the premiere of a new play by Dr. William Slout, "The Burial of Alma," which was presented as a benefit for the Music Department scholarship fund.

Summer session was well received with a record of 1425 students enrolling in the five sessions or attending special workshops in August.

Names in the news this summer included Dr. Judith Rymer, named executive dean for university relations after serving in an acting role for 10 months; Dr. Stella Clark, named interim dean of the School of Humanities while the search for a permanent dean continues; Stephen Menzel, Jr., joining the Personnel Office as employee relations specialist, working with bargaining units and training; and Joanna Roche, chosen as alumni affairs director.

Approval of three sizable grants from the U.S. Department of Education also brightened the summer scene. The Bilingual Education Training for Advancement Center (Beta Center) received \$284,520 to fund an expanded program of training teachers, aides and administrators to enter bilingual/cross-cultural education. Dr. Gordon Stanton received \$108,135 to begin his three-year Civic Education Project, a program to enhance the teaching of law-related education. Education faculty on nine CSU campuses, including San Bernardino, will be involved this year in seminars to learn new ways to teach future teachers problem-solving and critical thinking in civics or law-related education. The SAIL Program (Student Assistance in Learning) received its second installment in the current three-year cycle, \$136,514, to continue providing academic assistance to students.

On a practical note, faculty and 10-month staff returning to campus after the summer respite will find two changes in the telephone system--it's no longer possible to dial out on the "6" line and it's not necessary to dial "1" to make long-distance calls in the 714 area code. The negative news is that the individual office phones are charged for the once "free" calls on the "6" line and for the more easily dialed long-distance calls.

Several campus services are still not "back to normal" after summer hours. The Library remains on post-summer session schedule of 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday-Friday until classes begin and the Commons is closed until Sept. 23.

Marina Kyritsis Named Special Projects Coordinator

Marina Kyritsis is the new coordinator of special projects and the High School-University Program in Academic Programs. She has been with the university since 1983 functioning in various capacities, most recently in the Relations with Schools Office. She holds a B.A. in liberal studies and an M.A. in education with an option in counseling, both from Cal State, San Bernardino. She succeeds Dr. Roberta Stathis-Ochoa, who will be on leave during the coming year as a CSU administrative intern at Cal Poly, Pomona.
