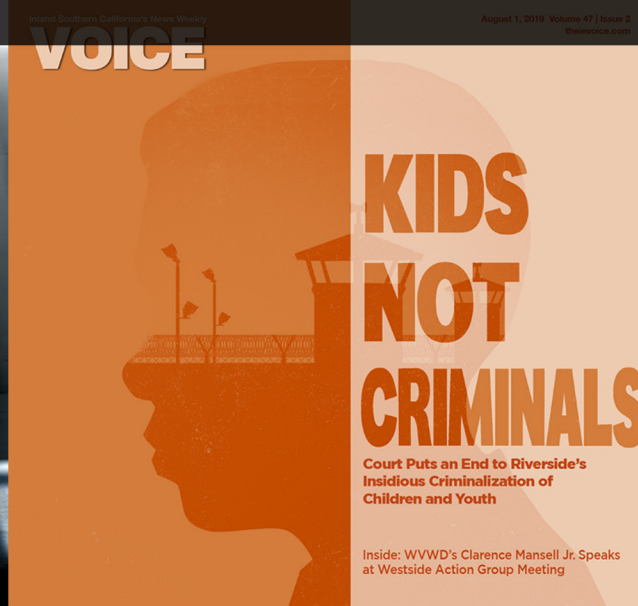
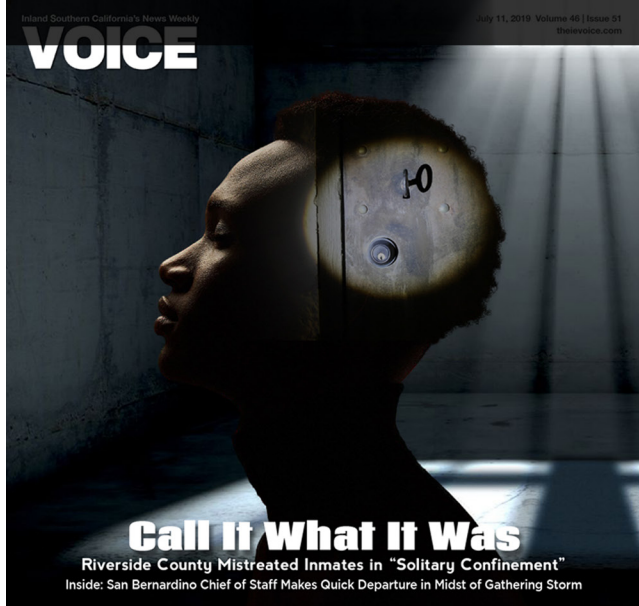

When Congress passed the two-trillion-dollar Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act last week, it grievously omitted additional funding for the nation's Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, or SNAP. This failure is especially concerning to millions of food insecure Americans, many of whom had just managed to hang on to their SNAP benefits—a dependable source of their monthly food budget.

In early December even as the Trump Administration knew—like the rest of the world—the dangers of a looming pandemic exploding in China, officials nonetheless finalized a rule limiting SNAP benefits for single Americans. The administration claimed the rule was intended to move more "able-bodied adults—unable to show they had jobs—into the workplace.

Under the rule, adults without children would be required to work 20 hours a week in order to qualify for SNAP benefits beyond three months. It would also limit the states' ability to waive such requirements.

"We need to encourage people by giving them a helping hand but not allowing it to become an indefinitely giving hand," said U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue in December.

The heartless rule was supposed to take effect April 1, but earlier this month a federal judge issued an injunction blocking the rule

and preserving the states' ability to waive SNAP requirements based on economic conditions.

Not mincing words Judge Beryl Howell of the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia defined the president's rule change



as "capricious, arbitrary and likely unlawful."

Further addressing the administration's objection to the issuance of a nationwide preliminary injunction, Judge Howell proclaimed it should be seen for what it is, "[A] bald-faced effort to restrict the exercise of the Article III judicial power to aggrandize that of the executive branch. This Court declines the invitation."

I applaud Judge Howell's decision. She did not equivocate. She did not hesitate. She used her position to strike a blow against injustice at a time in our history when so many

in leadership have abandoned their morals and sacrificed their reputations as they bow at the altar of a belligerent and ignorant "want-to-be" dictator . . . at a time when the nation's food insecure needed a champion more than ever.

Of course, this is just my opinion. I'm keeping it real.

Tax Day Moved to July 15

Washington, D.C. – The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has extended the filing deadline and federal tax payments—regardless of amount owed—to July 15, 2020 due to the COVID-19 epidemic.

The Treasury Department confirmed the deferment applies to all taxpayers including individuals, trusts and estates, corporations, and other non-corporate tax filers as well as those who pay self-employment taxes. Because the deferral is automatic, taxpayers do not need to file any additional forms or call the IRS to qualify for it.

“Even with the filing deadline extended, we urge taxpayers who are owed refunds to file as soon as possible and file electronically,” said IRS Commissioner Chuck Rettig. “Filing electronically with direct deposit is not only the quickest way to get refunds.” Filing your taxes electronically will also help expedite your stimulus check authorized under the federal stimulus bill passed by Congress and signed into law on Friday.

The City of Yucaipa and surrounding communities braced themselves as news broke Saturday regarding several individuals at a local nursing facility who had tested positive for COVID-19.

San Bernardino County Supervisor Curt Hagman announced there were twelve individuals at one facility who tested positive while another resident at a second Yucaipa nursing facility had presented with symptoms of the disease.

According to Hagman, County Health officials are working closely with both facilities to expedite the immediate testing of all residents and employees of both facilities.

Hagman further explained an 89-year-old woman with underlying health issues had contracted COVID-19 and died from the illness on Thursday. She was a resident of the facility at which the 12 individuals tested positive today.

"This is the first instance we have had in our county of a concentrated COVID-19 outbreak," said Acting County Health Officer Dr. Erin Gustafson. "The county will do everything within its ability and authority

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Congressman Pete Aguilar Speaks about Help for Small Businesses

San Bernardino

In an exclusive interview with the IE Voice/Black Voice News, U.S. Representative Pete Aguilar recently spoke Saturday about new options for the area's small businesses, many struggling to survive during this unprecedented health crisis.

Aguilar highlighted opportunities for small business owners to consider as detailed in the latest version of economic stimulus legislation passed by Congress and signed into law by the president on Friday, March 27, 2020.

The SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loan program or "Paycheck Protection" is a forgivable loan program for small businesses. Any business can apply for this loan, and provided it retains its employees, the loan can ultimately be forgiven.

This option is good news for small news publications who have remained under economic distress since the Great Recession; and will experience further challenges when they come under the mandates of AB5—they were granted a one year exemption for their contract carriers and distributors which expires in January 2021). AB5 codified the decision in *Dynamex Operations West, Inc. v. Super. Ct.*, (2018) 4 Cal. 5th 903.

AB5 calls for the "ABC test" to determine whether a worker is properly classified as an employee or independent contractor. For many of these small publishers, there are growing concerns about the economic



impact "direct and overhead costs" will have on their operations when the contractors are transitioned to employees—for many of them, it may be too prohibitive.

With the Great Recession haunting their past and AB 5 shadowing their future, the current revenue stream of these small publishers/owners is now impacted by the COVID-19 epidemic. As such, the Economic Disaster loans are needed to help them remain economically

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Gyms Closed: Keep Moving While Stuck-At-Home

Mandatory gym closures and self quarantine mandates are forcing people to make big changes in their workout routines. But that doesn't mean they should become instant couch potatoes. It's easy to be sedentary right now and fall into a habit of grazing and watching Netflix.

Creating a daily at-home routine that involves exercise can be therapeutic and bring a sense of normalcy to your day. Older adults and people with heart disease, diabetes, or lung disease face a heightened risk of serious complications from the coronavirus. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says people in those groups should make sure they keep their distance from other people and stay home as much as possible.

One thing that hasn't changed: good nutrition, enough sleep and regular exercise – to boost the immune system. The people who have strong immune systems have a far better chance of fighting off any type of disease or virus than someone who does not follow those principles.

Exercise, and proper nutrition, won't prevent you from catching the coronavirus if you touch your face after being exposed to an infected person's droplets. But exercise's ability to boost overall health and our immune systems – in combination with a smart eating plan – is well documented. Here are some workout suggestions to help you put your new dumbbells to good use.

There are tons of things you can do from your chair or sofa – squats, tricep dips, crunches, body work exercises, and so on. If you have kids

at home, you can get them involved. Make activities fun, like running around or playing hide and seek. Just keep moving.

Exercises that work more than one muscle group at a time – like squats, lunges, push-ups, planks and dips – can give you a quick workout without equipment. Try to do these exercises three or four days a week, 15 to 20 minutes per session. As always, aim for 30 minutes daily of some form of exercise.

Alternate upper and lower body workouts, experts suggest. Stomach, or abs, exercises can be done daily because these muscles don't need as long a recovery time, says fitness guru Jane Fonda on her “5 Minute Abs” workout, which you can watch on YouTube. There are thousands of exercise videos available online on YouTube.

Since so many of us have smart TVs these days, one great way to build a library of workouts is to save a number of workouts into playlists you can easily stream onto the sets around your house. Make sure to gather workout clips that cover

COVID-19 Testing Expanding in the Inland Region

San Bernardino

San Bernardino County held a pilot COVID-19 testing event on Friday, March 27 at the National Orange Show.

The testing pilot was by appointment only and though initially scheduled to run from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. the event ran a little longer because there were enough kits left over to test family members of those with appointments who were also displaying symptoms of the illness.

County officials acknowledge the demand for testing—like elsewhere in the nation—is higher than local officials' current ability to accommodate, also ensuring the county plans to expand testing as soon as more supplies are made available. The eventual goal is to expand COVID-19 testing county-wide so that it will be accessible to all of the county's nearly two million residents.

During the county's first press conference related to COVID-19 last Wednesday, San

Evictions Halted Statewide

Sacramento

Late Friday California Governor Gavin Newsom took Executive Action to halt evictions statewide. The order is effective immediately and will apply through May 31, 2020.

The Order bans the enforcement of eviction orders for renters affected by COVID-19; prohibits landlords from evicting tenants for nonpayment of rent; and prohibits enforcement of evictions by law enforcement or courts.

It also requires tenants to declare in writing, no more than seven days after the rent comes due, that the tenant cannot pay all or part of their rent due to COVID-19. In addition, the tenant would be required to retain documentation but not required to submit it to the landlord in advance.

The tenant would also remain obligated to repay full rent in "a timely manner" and could still face eviction after the enforcement moratorium is lifted. If tenants fail to repay rent costs, landlords will maintain the jurisdiction to evict after the enforcement is lifted.



The order takes effect immediately and provides immediate relief to tenants for whom rent is due on April 1st.

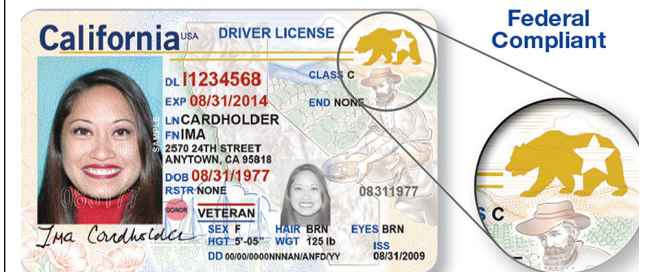
Friday's action by the governor builds on his previous Executive Order issued March 16, 2020 which authorized local governments to halt evictions for renters impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

REAL ID Deadline Extended



Washington, D.C. – Due to the spreading coronavirus the federal government has rescheduled the deadline for compliance with the Real ID Act from its original deadline of October 2020 to October 2021.

Chad Wolf, Secretary of Homeland Security, confirmed many DMVs across the country are temporarily closed. "This action will preclude millions of people from applying for and receiving their REAL ID," he acknowledged in a recently released statement.

The Real ID Act—passed in 2004—mandated that all U.S. residents must have an updated identification card if they wish to travel on commercial airlines and/or access federal facilities. According to the Act, every state to verify documentation that proves an individual's name, birth date and residence.

Even With the \$2 Trillion CARES Act . . . Americans Need More Care

The nation seemed to breathe a collective sigh of relief when Congress passed the third piece of bi-partisan legislation last week to provide economic aid to a suffering nation.

This most recent COVID-19 triggered legislation, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act or CARES Act, provides two trillion dollars in relief to citizens, businesses, states, hospitals, and the list goes on. Some of the key benefits include:

- Provides \$1,200 to Americans making \$75,000 or less; \$150,000 in the case of joint returns; \$112,500 for head of household; and \$500 for each child, to be paid “as rapidly as possible.” Those who filed income tax returns in 2018 or 2019 will receive their monies more expeditiously. Citizens should probably not expect these payments for three weeks at the earliest.
- Expands eligibility for unemployment insurance and provides people with an additional \$600 per week on top of the unemployment amount determined by each state. You can file for benefits if you are laid off, furloughed, or have your hours reduced. Benefits also apply to those who are self employed or are part of the gig economy.
- A \$349 billion loan program for small businesses, including 501(c)(3) non-profits, and physician practices that can be forgiven if the businesses retain their employees.
- \$500 billion for businesses, states, and municipalities, with no more than \$46 billion to support passenger air carriers, air cargo carriers, and businesses important to maintaining national security. However, there continues to be controversy over how the remaining \$454 billion may be used to support lending to eligible businesses, states, and municipalities. In addition, although the bill contains oversight provisions, the president has already made it abundantly clear he has no intention of abiding by them.

- Allocates \$130 billion in relief to the medical

and hospital industries to help secure for medical supplies, drug, and device shortages.

- Expands telehealth services in Medicare even for services unrelated to COVID-19.
- Expands the Defense Production Act by increasing the current limit of \$50 million for two years allowing the government to secure any shortfall in resources without regard to the current spending limit.
- Includes supplemental appropriations to help the government respond to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Despite the provisions of the CARES Act and the two stimulus bills passed before it—many in this nation believe there is more to be done because far too many Americans are still in need of “care” as evidenced by statements from California officials and representatives.

Governor Gavin Newsom stated, “The stimulus bill passed will provide critical support for California to fight COVID-19 and strengthen our hospitals and health care system.” At the

same time, the governor cautioned, “State and local governments will need additional and flexible funding to ensure they can continue responding to this crisis and continue critical services.

California businesses and residents will also need additional federal support to weather this economic storm. California will work closely with our federal partners for more help to ensure that Californians can quickly recover from the economic, health, and humanitarian impacts from COVID-19.”

California Congressman Pete Aguilar (D-31st District) voted in favor of the legislation. When the bill was said, “[T]his bipartisan bill will help ensure that our region can rise to the challenges posed by coronavirus and come out the other side stronger. Aguilar who voted in favor of the legislation also noted however, “Congress still has work to do in the coming weeks.”

No Way Out?

COVID-19 Reaches Inside Riverside County Jails

It goes without question when held in the confines of a jail or prison, inmates have limited, if any ability, to proactively protect themselves. As such, these facilities—at the local, state, and federal levels—are perfect breeding grounds for the transmission of a highly contagious disease like COVID-19.

Here in the inland region—like in communities across the nation and around the world—most knew it was just a matter of time before the coronavirus reached inside the walls of county jails in Riverside and San Bernardino Counties.

On Saturday, March 28, 2020, Riverside County Sheriff Chad Bianco announced via online video, how several days ago an inmate became symptomatic, was immediately isolated and subsequently tested positive for COVID-19. The question is whether—by then—it was too late to protect anyone he/she had been in contact with both inmates and staff.

Early last week, the IE Voice/Black Voice News had reached out to both inland area counties to inquire about the status of inmates in relation to the coronavirus. Although the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department responded immediately, Riverside never replied. Saturday's announcement may partly explain why.

During his announcement, Bianco confirmed several others at the facility had contact with the sick inmate but did not disclose how many.

All he disclosed was the number was, “limited,” and none of the individuals involved were symptomatic (at least, as of Saturday).

“... [W]e knew it was going to be impossible to keep the virus out of our jails,” Bianco acknowledged as he assured the department had implemented systems to help sheriffs contain and limit the spread of the virus now that it has intruded on the jails.

During his video announcement Bianco advised of two additional deputies in the county who also tested positive for COVID-19. Just one day before this announcement, Bianco notified

the public of the first deputy—who happened to be assigned to one of the county jails—to test positive for COVID-19, was quarantined.

Bianco, however, did not disclose the jail facility where the deputy worked—the same holds true for the two deputies confirmed positive Bianco announced on Saturday.

This raised concern regarding how many inmates in Riverside County are now at heightened risk of contracting the virus. Is there only one jail facility involved or are there others?

Although counties across the nation have or are moving to release some inmates, including Los Angeles, Bianco was adamant, “Unlike other jurisdictions, I have no intention of preemptively releasing inmates out of fear something may or may not happen.” he continued, “I feel very strongly that the inmates we have remaining in custody pose a much greater risk to public safety than the risk this virus poses to them while they are in custody.”

When San Bernardino County Sheriff officials were asked whether they have considered releasing jail inmates in response to the threats posed by COVID-19, Public Information Officer Jodi Miller responded, “No, not at this time.”

She continued, “We have seen a reduction in our jail population over the past few weeks and releases are occurring in the jail; however, they are routine and not motivated because of COVID -19 or any urgency to reduce the jail population.”

Expounding Miller added, “We are experiencing a decrease in our bookings. It is difficult to know precisely why the reduction of bookings is occurring. It may be that people are staying home and are not out committing a crime.” (This phenomenon is being observed in other communities across the country according to reports in the Los Angeles Times and the Wall Street Journal.)

Those being released in San Bernardino County according to Miller, include individuals who have completed their sentences, court-ordered releases, or requests from parole to release an inmate who previously had a parole hold.

Changes were made recently at San Bernardino County jail facilities in efforts to reduce the exposure of “flu-like symptoms” to

the jail population according to Miller. “When a new arrest is transported to the jail for booking, a facility nurse is required to meet all arresting officers and arrestees in the intake yard before they enter the facility. The nurse will ask the standardized coronavirus questions and take the arrestee’s temperature.”

Effective Thursday, March 19th, inmate visits at all San Bernardino County jail facilities were canceled. “To accommodate the inconvenience,” Miller advised, “inmates are being allowed an additional two hours of phone access in the evenings.” Official visits—such as attorney visits—are being allowed.

Miller further confirmed (as of the time of the interview), “There are NO staff or inmates in any of our jail facilities that have tested positive for COVID-19.”

In the meantime, activists are calling for compassionate release. In a letter to the White House dated March 24, 2020 the Justice Action Network, a coalition of nine advocacy groups—both Democrat and Republican—urged the president, “[T]o utilize his clemency power to commute the federal sentences of people eligible for compassionate release; and other populations that are exceptionally vulnerable to coronavirus.”

The letter continues, “The public health concerns presented by coronavirus in confined spaces creates an urgent need to ensure the health of staff and those incarcerated, particularly those who are elderly and those with chronic health conditions.”

Although the Justice Action Network (JAN) wrote on behalf of federal inmates, the same could be considered at both the state and local levels. Among the inmates JAN believes should be considered for compassionate release are those who are older and elderly; have a terminal medical condition; have a debilitated medical condition; suffer from a chronic medical condition; or have suffered a death of a family member who is a primary caregiver to a child of the person incarcerated.

They further stressed the need for compassionate release to include those described by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) as being at high-risk for contracting COVID-19 including those with

heart disease; lung disease; hypertension; blood disorders; chronic kidney disease; chronic liver disease; compromised immune system (immunosuppression); current or recent pregnancy; endocrine disorders; metabolic disorders; and those with neurological and neurologic and neurodevelopment conditions.

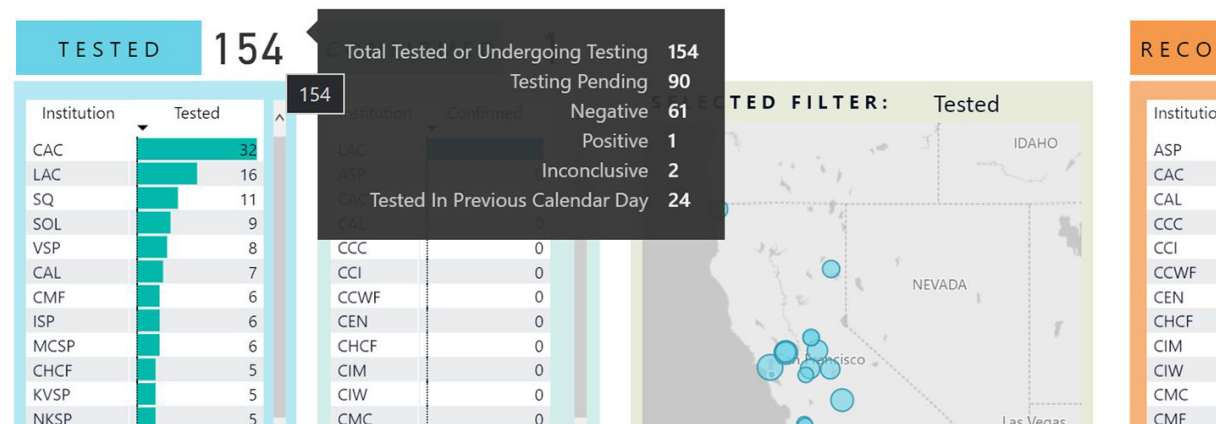
Echoing JAN’s petition, a bi-partisan group of legislators has also called on the president to exercise his clemency powers to commute sentences for people at high-risk of COVID-19 infection and those with serious illnesses.

It is also important to note the criminal justice system has disproportionately imprisoned Black and Brown people who are often also among the groups most impacted by many of the underlying conditions of concern for COVID-19 identified by the CDC. These people may have been sentenced—but they were not sentenced to death.

At the state level California’s Department

of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR), and California Correctional Health Care Services (CCHCS), created a platform to allow people to track COVID-19 inside the state’s prisons.

The data is updated several times a day and provides nearly real-time statistics on people tested or undergoing testing, confirmed cases, recoveries, and deaths. It also breaks each data point down by correctional facility. The Population Case Tracker—a public accessible tool—is available for viewing online at cdcr.ca.gov/covid19/population-status-tracking/.

As of Sunday March 29, 2020, 197 state prisoners were tested for the coronavirus with one inmate testing positive for COVID-19. Among staff, a total of 13 employees at state prison facilities around the state have also tested positive for COVID-19—including five at the California Institution for Men.

who also supported the legislation said, “This \$2 trillion relief bill is far from perfect, but it is an important action Congress has taken to provide direct relief to members of our community who are feeling the economic effects brought about by the response to this pandemic. There is still more work to be done to help every worker and every family in Riverside County and across the country.

And, California Congressman Raul Ruiz (D-36th District) who also supported the legislation stated, “There is still more work to be done to help every worker and every family in Riverside County and across the country.”

One concern stemming from the CARES Act is, although it provides direct payments to individuals and/or couples and their children, many low-income citizens may struggle to obtain a payment.

This especially applies to those who may not have filed a 2018 or 2019 return, including those who earn less than the standard deduction (\$12,200 for single filers in 2019, \$24,400 for

joint filers).

Dependents over the age of 17 who may be young parents living with their own parent(s), as well as disabled children, are not eligible for the direct payments—those who care for them—their parent or guardian—will receive \$500 instead.

Another problem is the legislation excludes those who do not have Social Security numbers. This excludes Dreamers as well as those who file with Individual Taxpayer Identification Numbers.

In addition, this one-time allocation beyond being income limited, is also far from enough to sustain Americans through the projected duration of this pandemic.

In addition, states and local governments who are on the ground doing the hard work of containing the epidemic and are restricted from running deficits or the risk of having their bonds downgraded, are all experiencing reduced revenues even as the battle against the virus is driving up their costs. They need additional

fiscal support.

On Sunday during an interview on MSNBC, California Senator Kamala Harris gave her own assessment of what remains to be done. “We need to begin work on another [stimulus] bill,” she said. According to the Senator, a new stimulus bill should include a commitment to provide paid sick leave for the more than 50 million low-income Americans—two-thirds of which currently have no sick leave; a national moratorium on evictions; a national system to provide monthly payments similar to the one-time payment authorized in the CARES Act; a moratorium on credit card payments, finance charges and penalties; a stay on credit bureau reporting to prevent credit blemishes; and relief of student loans among other recommendations. In addition, members of the disability community are also in need and are calling for funding support for their community.

In a Tweet Harris wrote, “People are still hurting. Our work isn’t done.”

Local Economists Say, “Expect Economic Turmoil to Continue”

Riverside

A new forecast released by Beacon Economics and the UCR School of Business Center for Economic Forecasting painted a bleak economic outlook.

“The uncertainty surrounding the spread, containment, and recovery rates of COVID-19, and the extremely fast-moving nature of daily events, makes estimating the direct economic impact of the pandemic close to impossible,” it stated.

First District Supervisor Robert Lovingood, highlighted the report’s assessment which highlighted how the sudden halt that has occurred in economic activity across in the nation will cause unemployment claims to jump more quickly than ever before. Last week, that proved to be true when claims exceeded three million nationally, out-pacing peak losses during the Great Recession which topped out at 665,000. Last week’s claims also outpaced the historic, all-time high of 695,000 claims filed in October 1992.

The economy is being further impacted by slow home sales and business formation, reduced productivity, disrupt government revenue flows, and sending ripples through the U.S. and global manufacturing base.

“This is unprecedented in nature and by far the worst threat facing

to minimize the tragedy this pandemic has the potential to create in our communities.”

Gustafson went on to explain how the county is testing residents and staff of the facilities and working with the California Department of Health (CDPH) Healthcare Associated Infections branch.

“This outbreak is a signal to anyone in the county who is not taking this pandemic seriously and is resisting complying with public health orders and guidelines that the threat of COVID-19 is very real,” Dr. Gustafson said. “Staying at home, minimizing non-essential contact with others, maintaining social distancing from even people we know and with whom we have regular contact, and consistently practicing good hygiene is our best hope of making forward the other side of this pandemic.”

Hagman assured the County’s Public Health Department is gearing up to begin reporting the number of cases within each of the county’s 24 incorporated cities and towns as soon as Monday on the department’s COVID-19 public information dashboard, which can be found at wp.sbcounty.gov/dph/coronavirus.

viable through this crisis.

Aguilar discussed how the federal government is moving fast to get money to small business owners. He provided an example of a print shop owner who was approved for a \$25,000 loan within 72 hours. He added how time is of the essence and encouraged businesses to apply right away. The SBA’s Economic Injury Disaster Loan program can provide small businesses with working capital loans of up to \$2 million. For more information visit <https://www.sba.gov/coronavirus>. This week the Congressman will host a Facebook Live event to speak about business issues.

Aguilar also spoke about the stimulus bill’s option for unemployment. The opportunity to file for unemployment is open to those who are employed by someone else as well as the self-employed and individuals participating in the gig economy workforce.

California pays \$450 a week and the federal stimulus bill will add an additional \$600 per week for total weekly compensation of \$1050. It is important to note individuals can qualify for unemployment even if they are still working but their hours are cut. For example, an individual who used to work 40 hours per week but due to the coronavirus is now only working 8 hours per week can submit an unemployment claim.

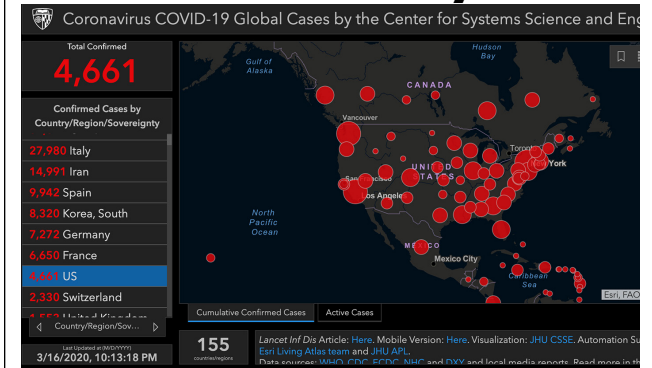

The Department of Public Health under the stewardship of Director Trudy Raymundo, Acting County Health Officer Dr. Erin Gustafson, and their staffs are doing all they can to support San Bernardino County residents through the COVID-19 crisis.

Their efforts include the recent launched of a coronavirus dashboard. The dashboard displays a visual representation of data surrounding COVID-19 testing results, including the number of confirmed cases and deaths, patients tested, patients that tested negative, and confirmed cases by gender and by age groups. It is available for viewing at <http://wp.sbcounty.gov/dph/coronavirus/>.

The team at the county’s Department of Behavioral Health team is also available to members of the public who might be dealing with anxiety and worry, especially due to the current health crisis. Their specially trained staff is available to listen and provide you with support and behavioral health resources. They have rolled out direct assistance via text messaging. The numbers to test are (909) 421-9233, (909) 458-1517 and in the High Desert, (760) 734-8093.

The Department of Aging and Adult Services has established a hotline for seniors and disabled adults to request assistance or get answers to questions. Bernardino County Director of Public Health Trudy Raymundo took a moment to acknowledge the county's first death reported a day earlier. "I have to say that, that death came far too soon knowing that we only had our first confirmed case just over a week ago," she lamented. Sadly, a second COVID-19 death in the county was reported later Wednesday afternoon.

COVID-19 testing in the county—though slow—has increased slowly since the first San Bernardino case was report on March 15. Raymundo justified the slow process by noting the low number of tests (460 as of Wednesday) was largely due to the county confirming its first positive case later than other counties in the region. Both Los Angeles and Orange Counties reported their first cases back in January and Riverside's first case was noted a week earlier than San Bernardino.

San Bernardino's drive through test site will be by appointment only and individuals are being prioritized based on those with symptoms, underlying conditions including diabetes, heart, disease, asthma, etc. and those over the age of 65.

As the virus continues to threaten,

Raymundo acknowledged, "We know that we do not understand the extent or the magnitude of this disease right now in our county simply because our testing capacity has been limited."

Visit the county's coronavirus website at wp.sbcounty.gov/dph/coronavirus to learn when the county will schedule more testing dates and locations. In the meantime, and until further notice, San Bernardino officials encourage residents to, "[S]tay home as much as possible while only participating in essential activities such as critical work functions and shopping for necessities."

The center is open from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. (or until supplies for testing are exhausted) Tuesday through Saturday. If you have symptoms you can schedule an appointment by calling (800) 945-6171.

the U.S. economic expansion since it began over a decade ago," said Christopher Thornberg, Founding Partner of Beacon Economics and Director of the Center for Forecasting. "Will it end the expansion for the year? Whatever the scenario, from best to worst, we are definitely going to see a serious hit in the first half of 2020."

Noting how unnerving and dramatic all these changes are Thornberg cautioned—they may not lead to a recession this year. The defining factor according to economists is whether the containment measures now being implemented across the globe are sufficient to slow the spread of the virus over the next few weeks.

According to the forecast, "If the extreme efforts are effective and the number of cases kept in check, then lost output in the first half of the year could be partly made up in the second half."

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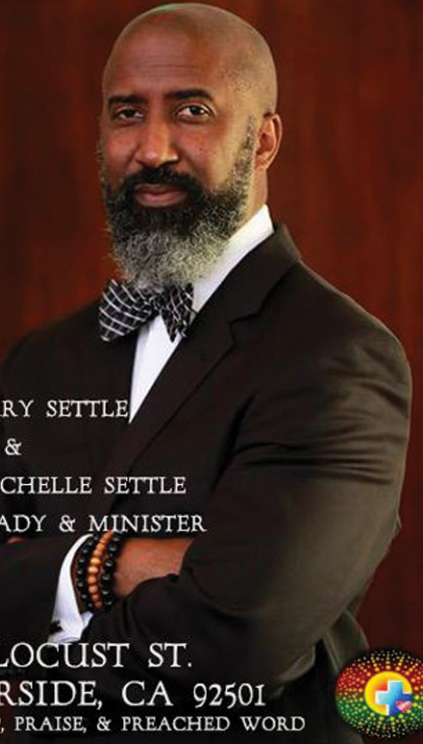
