PUBLIC AFFAIRS REALIGNS DUTIES WITH NEW PERSONNEL

With the consolidation of the former publications and public information offices under a new Department of Public Affairs effective Sept. 1, several responsibilities have been reassigned with the addition of new personnel, reports Cynthia Pringle, director.

Terrie Jo Snyder, former director of marketing and communications for Arrowhead United Way in San Bernardino, joined the university Oct. 16 as the new assistant director of public affairs. Her duties include serving as the university's primary liaison with the media, preparing informational releases, handling inquiries from the press and working with the faculty to develop articles or presentations for the media.

In addition, she will investigate methods to enhance internal employee communication and serve as editor of the bi-weekly newsletter *The Friday Bulletin* beginning with the Nov. 3 issue. Ms. Snyder has previous experience with employee communication and she has worked in public relations for two

institutions of higher education. She can be reached at Ext. 5007 in AD 104.

Cynthia Pringle, now located in AD 117, has management responsibility for the entire Public Affairs Department, including sports information. In the coming months, Ms. Pringle will concentrate on streamlining production in the publications operation. With the addition of a new part-time artist, Gilbert "Gino" Daniels, as of Oct. 8, plus a student assistant artist, Cherie Bailey, the department "is now fully staffed and I look for improvements in our turnaround time on many projects," Pringle says.

Toward that end, the department is establishing specific hours for the intake of printing projects which require consultation time with Ms. Pringle and the full-time graphic artist, Linda Snyder. Effective Oct. 31, new requests for the services of the publications operation will be handled by advance appointments made during the following hours:

American Red Cross Providing Earthquake Victim information

The American Red Cross can provide assistance to area residents who seek information regarding relatives or friends living in or around the San Francisco area, according to William Norsetter, executive director of the local chapter.

The program, called Disaster Welfare Inquiry (DWI), gives priority to those seeking information regarding immediate family members. Callers should ask for a DWI caseworker and be prepared to provide the name, address, home phone and work phone of the individual whom you are calling about. Local Red Cross volunteers will then contact the appropriate chapter in the Bay area. Please allow the Red Cross about 48 hours to handle your request. The phone number is 888-1481.

Individuals wishing to make a financial contribution to earthquake victims may call 1-800-453-9000. Spanish-speaking persons may phone 1-800-453-4487. To donate blood, contact the Bloodbank of San Bernardino and Riverside counties at 885-6503.

University Hosts Teleconferences

Cal State's Audiovisual services is a downlink for two major teleconferences in the near future. A four-and-a-half hour discussion of AIDS from the perspective of Hispanic and Latino community leaders will originate from KCET-TV in Los Angeles on Oct. 27 beginning at 8:30 a.m. Participants in the program include Ricardo Montalban, Rita Moreno, Vicki Carr, Bill Davila, Paul Gonzalez and Lauro Cavasos.

Cal State is one of 32 receiving sites for the free AIDS conference which will be broadcast throughout the U.S. and Puerto Rico. Dr. Jorge Sintés, chair of the Health Sciences and Human Ecology Department, is the site coordinator for the conference. Continuing education units are available for interested health professionals through a grant to UCLA from the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta. Dr. Sintés says conference participants may request course credit at the beginning of the session. More information is available from him at Ext. 5345 or through Cynthia Munoz at (512) 227-2013.

Job placement strategies for professionals who work with rehabilitated individuals will be the focus of a teleconference Nov. 14 from 8 a.m. to noon.

According to the campus coordinators, Drs. Margaret Cooney and Joseph Turpin (Education), the session will be especially pertinent for counselors who work with high-risk populations such as rehabilitated drug abusers. Offered at two other sites in northern California, the San Bernardino campus is the only southern California location for this event. The teleconference features a reduced fee of \$25 for students enrolled in any university program in the inland area, notes Dr. Cooney. FALL ENROLLMENT BECOMES OFFICIAL

The official fall quarter enrollment is 10,886. Talled at the end of the last day to drop classes on Oct. 18, the headcount represents a 12.29 percent increase over last fall when enrollment stabilized at 9,694. The full-time equivalent enrollment of 7,611.7 is a 3.19 percent increase over last fall and reflects the adjustment in courseloads that students had to make with the university's conversion to four units of credit for most classes.
