### STUDENT SERVICES INTERVIEWS ENDING

As interviews for the position of vice president of Student Services wind up next week, Cheryl Smith, associate vice president for Enrollment Services, will continue in her acting role as vice president for the division until a candidate is selected.

Smith took over the post vacated by Juan Gonzalez, who accepted the same position at Cal State, San Luis Obispo. Gonzalez had been at CSUSB since 1987.

In the past week five candidates have been interviewed, and open forums held for each one. Today's open forum at 2 p.m. in the Panorama Room presents Alan Galsky. Other candidates have been Sandra Westbrooks, Joan Hirt, David A. DeCoster and Charles Durant. Frank Rincon will be on campus Monday. His open forum will be at 2 p.m. in the Panorama Room.

In the School of Social and Behavioral Sciences, Ellen Gruenbaum (Anthropology) has been named acting dean for

the school, replacing Aubrey Bonnett, who is now vice president for academic affairs and dean of faculty at State University of New York, College at Old Westbury.

Gruenbaum, whose appointment was effective July 18, had been serving as assistant dean under Bonnett.

Another recent management appointment is that of Bill Takehara, who is now associate vice president for financial operations.

Takehara's duties will include overseeing the accounting budget and support services activities within the administration and finance division. With a master's degree in financial management and public administration from Pepperdine, Takehara worked professionally for the U.S. Air Force at Norton Air Base and for Riverside County.

An official announcement naming an acting dean of natural sciences, a spot left open when Louis Fernandez took over as acting academic affairs vice president, is imminent.

### COMING THEATRE SEASON PLAYS TO THE MERRY SIDE

... We now interrupt state budget crises, political sabre rattling and endless prattle about why everyone on earth's relationships are irritatingly dysfunctional to bring you a little levity.

And, boy, do we need it!

Enough heavy-handed messages—at least for awhile, says the Theatre Arts Department (though not in so many words). The mainstage this year is focusing on the lighthearted.

The department has announced its four main plays for the 1994-95 season, which promises romance, laughter and some old fashioned suspense.

"Lysistrata," a comedic Greek classic by Aristophanes, opens the season in November. In their attempt to promote peace, the Athenian women in "Lysistrata" decide to cancel the one activity men enjoy more than war.

In March comes "The Illusion," an enchanting French story about a father in search of his lost son. The father solicits the aid of a magician, whose potion is a mix of romance, family, values, and some good laughs.

The spring repertory brings "The Mousetrap" and "What the Butler Saw" in May.

"The Mousetrap" is Agatha Christie's magical mystery tour of a most odd couple stranded in a snowstorm—odd particularly because one happens to be a murderer. The play first opened in London in 1952, and is the longest running show in history.

"What the Butler Saw" is no "whodunit" as its name would imply, and it's anything but for children like Christie's mystery. A farce, the play takes a woman's simple employ as a secretary in a psychiatric clinic and turns it into a frenzied mass of mistaken identity and romantic interludes.

A number of special productions also are part of the coming theatre season.

Both the Music and the Theatre Arts departments are sponsoring for the Christmas season "A Dickens Holiday Festival," which will benefit scholarship recipients. Also in December, and for the first time, the Theatre Arts Department will put on a dance concert in the Recital Hall.

And, finally, CSUSB students will produce their traditional series of one-act plays in the Drama Lab in February.

Season tickets for the four mainstage shows are \$25 for general admission, \$15 for senior citizens, Cal State alums, faculty and staff, and \$10 for students. The tickets will go on sale Sept. 1.

### BLUES AND CAJUN, JAZZ SLATED FOR SERIES

Blues and Cajun music duo Eric and Suzy Thompson perform August 3 and jazz trumpeter Andy Cleaves on August 10, marking the start of the second half of the university's Tenth Annual Summer Entertainment Series. The free, open-air concerts begin at 7 p.m. on the Lower Commons Plaza.

Eric and Suzy Thompson have been combining their respective flatpicking and fiddling talents for more than 15 years.

In the 1980s the couple played with the Blue Flame Stringband and the Backwoods Band. Suzy also is active as a fiddler for the California Cajun Orchestra. Eric Thompson's first solo LP, "Bluegrass Guitar," was released in 1979 and featured star artists like David Grisman and Tony Rice.

Eric and Suzy Thompson's release, "Adam and Eve Had the Blues," was done on the Ahoovie Records label.

When Andy Cleaves brings his contemporary jazz to the Lower Commons on August 10, he also brings with him the experience of having played with such artists as Stevie Wonder, Natalie Cole and, on the Arsenio Hall Show, with En Vogue.

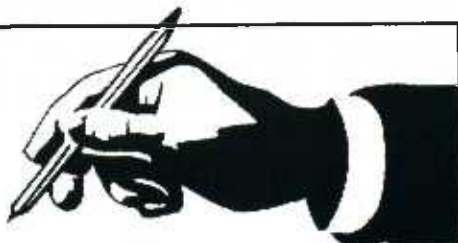

## THAT'S A WRAP!

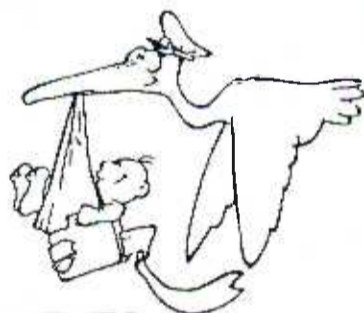
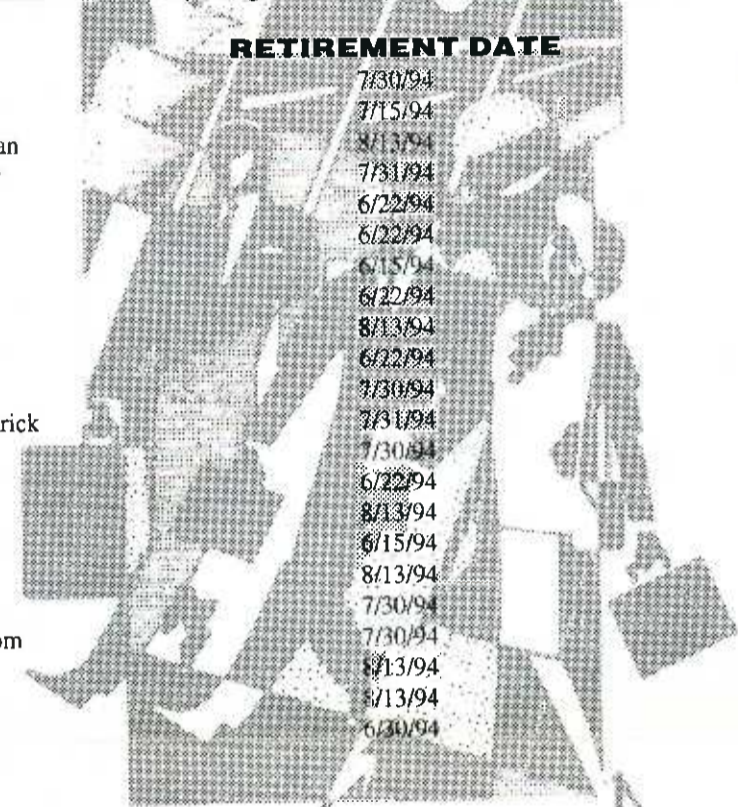
