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Conflict and Controversy in California Over Youth Tackle Football

It was a proud moment for Jayden Daniels, his family, other loved ones, members of the inland community and supporters across the country when it was announced on December 9, 2023, that he had won the coveted Heisman Trophy. By all accounts, Daniels is definitely a hometown hero, a role model for aspiring scholar-athletes, and an all-around good guy. His accomplishments are laudable.

And yet, even as I joined the community in celebrating his success and took pride in his generous comments about the Inland Empire, there remained a niggling in the back of my mind related to the controversy simmering over the safety of this sport.

As a football fan and supporter of youth sports I first read about the issue of CTE and the work of Dr. Bennet Omalu in 2005. Omalu is the pathologist who was first to publish evidence of Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy or CTE, a progressive degenerative disease typically found

in athletes, especially football players, and others. It affects people who have suffered repeated concussions and traumatic brain injuries.

I tuned in because my son grew up playing Pop Warner football as did both my grandsons, all three went on to play in high school. Could it affect them, I wondered?

But in all honesty, I didn't dwell on it until the NFL began to take CTE seriously. In 2009, the league started preventing players who were knocked unconscious, from returning to a game or practice. And meanwhile, the list of professional players impacted by CTE grew, garnering more public attention.

Since then measures have been taken to mitigate risks at all levels of play from Pop Warner to the national league. But news of the risks for brain injuries intensified last year.

In February 2023, U.S. News and World Report ran an article highlighting an announcement by

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Amateur Golfer Nick Dunlap Wins The American Express



With both power and poise, University of Alabama sophomore Nick Dunlap simply beat all the professional players in the field on Sunday, to win the 65th edition of The American Express at PGA West in La Quinta.

How often does an amateur player win a professional golf tournament? Rarely, only eight times since 1945. Dunlap's accomplishment comes in only his fourth career start in a professional tournament. At 20-years-old, he is the youngest tournament winner since 1910, first since Phil Mickelson 1991. He also broke the tournament record for a 72-hole low score with an unprecedented -29 under par 259.

As an amateur, Dunlap will not receive the \$1.5 million winner's share of the record \$8.4 million purse because he is an amateur. Instead the \$1.5 million winner's share went to second

place finisher at (-28) Christiaan Bezuidenhout and the remainder of the prize money is spread among the field.

"I was going to give it everything I had. Whether that was a 75, 65 or 70, I just was going to give it everything I had," said Dunlap.

Dunlap is no fluke, winning the 2023 U.S. Amateur Championship at Cherry Hills, dominating runner up Neil Shipley on that day 4 and 3, in the 36-hole final. With that accomplishment, he joined Tiger Woods as the only two players to claim both Junior Amateur and U.S. Amateur championships.

How did he climb the leaderboard? Dunlap shot an amateur record tying 60 at La Quinta on Saturday with 10 birdies and an eagle to lead Sam Burns by three. Dunlap's impressive driving average gave him favorable looks with



his irons all week, also showing the patience and poise of a veteran tour pro when it counted the most.

Cameron Champ, the former Texas Aggie did not make the cut. The three-time tour winner known for his superior driving ability will need that length at Torrey Pines next week. Joseph Bramlett, 2021 Korn Ferry Tour winner, recovered from a cracked driver on Wednesday to play the weekend, finishing at -13.

On Thursday, January 25, Dunlap announced his intentions to turn pro, stating he will make

Breaking from guidelines set by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), California changed their COVID-19 isolation recommendations earlier this month.

On Jan. 9, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) issued new guidance on when to isolate after testing positive for COVID-19. Previously, the health agency recommended that people who test positive for COVID-19 isolate for five days and stay at home — a recommendation the CDC still encourages.

Now, CDPH recommends that people who test positive for COVID-19, but who have no symptoms, no longer isolate themselves. Instead, CDPH recommends they wear a mask when they are indoors with other people for up to 10 days after testing positive. This means people who test positive but are without symptoms may return to work or school as long as their symptoms do not worsen.

“Previous isolation recommendations were implemented to reduce the spread of a virus to which the population had little immunity and had led to large numbers of hospitalizations and deaths that overwhelmed our healthcare systems during the pandemic,” the updated guidance states.

California Changes COVID-19 Isolation Recommendations



Earlier this month the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) broke with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) over isolation guidelines for those diagnosed with COVID-19. (Chris Allen, VOICE)

According to the new health order, those who test positive for COVID-19 and do have symptoms, CDPH now recommends they stay home until they have not had a fever for 24 hours without using medication, and other COVID-19 symptoms are improving.

Issued by CDPH Director Dr. Tomás J. Aragón, the order stated these changes to COVID-19 guidelines in the state come as COVID-19 impacts have reduced “compared

to prior years due to broad immunity from vaccination and/or natural infection, and readily available treatments available for infected people.”

These guidelines do not apply to those who work in healthcare settings like nursing facilities and hospitals. In other workplace settings, employees are encouraged to follow California Division of Occupational Safety and Health (Cal/

The race to succeed Sen. Dianne Feinstein, who passed away in September last year, took center stage last week at the University of Southern California with the first of two planned primary debates.

The four leading candidates contesting for the seat currently occupied by Sen. Laphonza Butler, debated in front of a live audience on Jan. 22. The two candidates with the most votes in the March 5 primary, irrespective of party,

will continue to a general election contest in November.

Rep. Barbara Lee (D-CA-12), the sole African American candidate in the race, sparred with two Democratic congressional colleagues – Rep. Katie Porter (D-CA-47) an Rep. Adam Schiff (D-CA-30) – as well as Republican Steve Garvey, a former first baseman for the LA Dodgers and the San Diego Padres.

The Democrats, who agree broadly on most issues and vote together about 90% of the time in the United States Congress, tried to distinguish

themselves from each other.

“I have been a consistent progressive who gets the job done, who has delivered for my constituents, and will deliver for California,” said Lee, who disagrees with Porter on earmarks. She supports them and Porter wants to get rid of them.

“Lobbyists and big corporations spend billions to make sure that their agenda is at the top of Washington, D.C.’s agenda. Special interests have too much power and we, as Californians, we don’t have enough,” said Porter, who seemed to be positioning herself as a reformer, highlighting her experience as a law professor and consumer advocate committed to

changing a broken political system.

Porter told the audience that she is “the only elected official on this stage who has never taken corporate PAC money. Not a dime. Never.”

“I’m calling for an end to earmarks, outlawing corporate pact donations and lobbyist donations, and a ban on Congressmembers trading stock,” Porter said.

Lee, on the other hand, said “I believe in earmarks.”

“I believe in targeting and sending money to non-profits and organizations that deserve their federal dollars,” Lee stated.

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Fearlessness.



Congressman Pete Aguilar Highlights Significance of \$35M Grant in Addressing Homelessness

On Wednesday, January 24, Congressman Pete Aguilar held a press conference at the Central City Lutheran Mission in San Bernardino to announce a near \$35 million Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) grant in support of the city's Project Homekey.

This grant, the largest awarded during the current round of Homekey funding, is believed to be the largest competitive grant ever received by the City of San Bernardino. The funds will be used to construct the San Bernardino Community Wellness Campus, an interim housing facility for chronically homeless men.

The campus, a partnership between the City of San Bernardino, Lutheran Social Services of Southern California, and developer Dignity Moves, will provide housing for up to 140 individuals, along with comprehensive support services such as healthcare, case management, job training, and long-term housing assistance.

During the press conference, Aguilar highlighted the significance of this grant in addressing homelessness in the city and the commitment of all parties involved to make a lasting difference in the lives of unsheltered individuals in San Bernardino.

This year's flu and cold season could be a bad one. During the holidays, emergency rooms and urgent care facilities saw increasing numbers of patients with respiratory infections.

Although last week's new hospitalization admissions (a metric used by the Centers for Disease Control to measure the severity of disease transmission) for COVID-19 were down, mortality rates are up. There's also RSV, the flu, and a new variant of COVID-19 to contend

with—what some are calling a “tripledeemic” or “tridemic.”

According to Dr. Jose Luis Perez, Chief Medical Officer at South Central Family Health Center in Los Angeles, “There are more than a hundred different viruses that cause upper respiratory infections. Those include COVID19, RSV and the influenza virus.”

Most people tend to think of the influenza virus as being the same as having a cold according to Perez who shared, medically, this is incorrect.

“It is not the same, having the flu is being specifically infected with the influenza virus.” In popular culture the term is used interchangeably,

he noted, adding, “But make sure we understand that having the flu, medically, is not the same thing.”

It can be difficult to tell which respiratory infection an individual patient may be dealing with because all have some symptoms in common. “Most of these viruses cause upper respiratory infections. Those include the nose, the throat, the eyes along with what we in medicine call constitutional symptoms such as fever and muscle aches. All three viruses can cause lower respiratory infections and that includes infections of the bronchial tree and lungs which can lead to bronchitis and pneumonia,” stated Perez.

Causation

Most of these viruses occur ‘more frequently’

when people are in enclosed spaces breathing the same air and coming into contact with surfaces touched by an infected person. An uninfected person will then touch these areas and touch their own faces or breathe the air around the infected person and the virus enters the body through the nose or the mouth.

“So how do we get these viruses? All three viruses invade the human body by coming in contact with bodily fluids from an infected individual. All occur more frequently during the winter time when people are forced to be more indoors due to inclement weather and during celebrations,” according to Perez. It's very difficult to tell which virus is infecting the patient based on symptoms alone but in general

Many longtime residents of . . . you can fill in the name of the place where you live. . . will tell you they don't remember seeing so many people without permanent homes or housing. If you're old enough, you can remember when the sight of someone laying on the sidewalk made you concerned they may have fallen ill. It wasn't a common sight, but not anymore.

Nowadays, there are many ways to be homeless in America that may not be obvious at first glance. Although there are still plenty of examples of the unhoused visible in parking lots, on sidewalks and on benches, there are ways of being homeless that are place and time specific and easier to glimpse if you know what to look for. Like the neatly dressed woman whose backpack is full of her belongings, or the recreational vehicles (RVs) and cars noticed on the street that keep leaving and returning. And, depending on where you are seeing it, homelessness can look like the student, employee, coworker or family whose nights have been spent sleeping in cars, or RV's, libraries or bus stops or for some, a shelter that provides case management, a shower, a meal,

or some clothing.

In some cities in Southern California homelessness has become a way of life and death.

The Unhoused and Weather

It does rain in Southern California. It also freezes and hails and in some places snows. The unhoused are always the most vulnerable to inclement weather. But weather is more than just atmospheric, it is environmental. The homeless are exposed to whatever is in their vicinity and whatever comes their way. To be homeless is to also live in danger of violence and abuse. The conditions homeless Angelenos face to the west of us prompted the L A Alliance for Human Rights, a non profit organization, to sue both the city and county of Los Angeles over services for the homeless.

LA Alliance for Human Rights was able to settle its historic lawsuits with both LA City and County, forging a new commitment to provide housing for all its citizens.

Annual Count of the Homeless

In January each year, the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)

conducts an annual count of the homeless in America or what's called the Point In Time Count. After the data has been compiled at the end of the year, HUD issues the Annual Homeless Assessment Report (AHAR). The AHAR is based on the information compiled from the January survey of the homeless conducted on a single night and is meant to be a picture of homelessness on

the one night of the survey. An important finding of the 2022 report was that sheltered homelessness among the elderly is on the rise, nearly doubling.

According to the latest report, released in December 2023, homelessness has increased overall among all household types. Household types are the way the government identifies individuals and family groups that live in the same household, for example people in families or individuals.

However, while the latest AHAR continues to show increases in homelessness across all types, the increases have been less than anticipated perhaps due to the vigorous, local, state and federal assistance to families during the COVID-19 pandemic, including moratoriums on evictions.

Riverside County

To discuss last year's AHAR report, homelessness and the needs and services provided to the unhoused, BVN spoke to Leonard Jarman, Chief Solutions Officer with the Path of Life Ministries, a non-profit organization serving Riverside's vulnerable homeless communities.

BVN:

What do you think about the fact that overall homelessness in America has increased among all household types, but the overall increase is less than expected according to the latest AHAR report?

LJ:

Well, I think it's also regionally specific. For example, in Riverside County in certain cities it went up and in others it went down, it all depends on how you look at it. You can look at it geographically, for example all of Southern California. Of course, because that's including Los Angeles, San Bernardino, San Diego and Riverside counties, you're going to see an uptick because

[homelessness] in certain areas have increased. A couple of areas we work in for example, Jurupa Valley, it went down. Riverside increased a little in the city of Riverside but in other areas it also decreased. So kind of a case by case basis per city. But it's not always indicative of how well that city is doing because it's a snapshot just on that day. It's usually the second or third week in January when that's done, so it [the actual number] could be higher or it could be lower than the actual count.

BVN:

Because the count happens in the winter time do you think that might affect the numbers because some people go into shelters when it gets cold that normally don't when the weather is warmer?

LJ:

Well they do both. We actually do it in Riverside County on the same day that they do the HUD shelter count, we do a shelter count. We operate three shelters in the city of Riverside on that day—its usually that weekend. So say the point in time count maybe on a Thursday for example, they'll do the shelter count on that same weekend like that Friday. So you're capturing both the people on the street and in shelters. So you're getting a pretty good estimate again of how many people are actually homeless. If you're saying because it's winter time, no, we have pretty seasonable winters here too. So it gets cold and maybe a little rainy but for the most part [in] Southern California you can pretty much manage about ninety percent of the time outside. It does get super cold in some areas but for the most part people can kind of weather the storm. It's not like back East where if you're on the streets you're going to die. We have about eight or nine of those days a year, but back east the whole winter really is that way. If you're outside you're not going to make it. I think by having both the sheltered count and the unsheltered count you get a reasonable idea about who's being impacted on the streets at least.

BVN:

And what are you seeing as far as families who are homeless?

LJ:

Families? Well, it's been pretty consistent. We've operated a family shelter in Riverside since 2005. What we've seen is pretty much a steady increase and we level off. It's about the same as last year. For example, in our family shelter we served 285 people, that's over one hundred households in our

family shelter alone and 161 of those are children. That tells you what we're dealing with. That's kids zero to seventeen [years old] who are there with their parents. That's pretty consistent over the past five years or so. We're serving right around that number, 285 [to] 300 people a year in our family shelter.

BVN:

And what do you do for families for the holidays?

LJ:

Well, everyday is a holiday at Path of Life you know...(chuckles, laughs) People get excited, the community, and donors. Hey it's Christmas or it's Thanksgiving. [But], everyday we do the same things year round. We do have special opportunities for them like for example during Christmas time along with our donors we provide a Christmas shopping extravaganza for our family shelter and our housed clients. We also operate about 92 units of permanent supportive housing all over Riverside county so we provide food boxes, presents, all those things to help them have a great holiday. Same thing for Thanksgiving we provide over 120 food boxes to our housed clients all over Riverside.

BVN:

And this is for families only or is this for veterans or persons with mental illness because there are different categories?

LJ:

Right, about 30 percent of everybody we serve has a diagnosable mental health condition. We do support them not only in our shelters but in permanent supportive housing. To qualify you need a co-occurring disability. You have to be chronically homeless and have a documented disability. That means it's either mental health or substance abuse or some other type of physical disability, or learning disability that is documented by a clinical physician or a doctor or licensed medical practitioner.

BVN:

What kinds of assistance do you provide them?

LJ:

When they move into permanent supportive housing we have case managers who meet with them at least once or twice a month to help them maintain their housing. If they need transportation we assist with that. We don't provide medication management or anything like that. They really are living on their own with supportive services. We provide supportive services so they'll live in a community just like anybody else but our case managers meet with them once or twice a month

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Dual Enrollment - A Gateway to Empowerment for African American Students

In America's educational landscape, the dual enrollment program stands as a significant opportunity for African American students, meriting attention well before middle school.

This initiative, allowing high schoolers to experience college-level courses, is more than an academic advantage; it's a crucial empowerment tool. Enrollment in these programs offers African American students an invaluable head start. The benefits are not just academic. Economically, dual enrollment can be a game-changer. The cultural implications of dual enrollment are profound. By immersing students in the college environment earlier, it demystifies higher education, equipping them with the confidence to navigate what can be an intimidating landscape. This experience is invaluable for African American students, who might not have extensive family histories in higher education and are often subject to stereotypes and lowered expectations.

Through dual enrollment, these students can redefine narratives around their educational capabilities and aspirations. However, to fully harness the potential of dual enrollment, proactive engagement is essential.

African American families and educators must be aware of these opportunities and integrate them into their educational planning. It's about having early discussions regarding

post secondary educational and career goals, with dual enrollment forming a core part of these conversations.

But the broader question extends beyond individual families and educational institutions. It's about how we, as a society, can implement dual enrollment in a way that maximizes its accessibility and effectiveness for African American students. How do we ensure that every student who could benefit from this program has the opportunity to do so? The potential for change is immense – not just in terms of academic outcomes, but in shaping more inclusive, empowered futures for entire communities.

As we consider the path forward, the role of dual enrollment in shaping equitable educational landscapes becomes increasingly clear. It's more than just a step in the right direction; it's a powerful stride towards a future where educational success and access are realities for

every student, irrespective of their background.

In this context, dual enrollment is not just an option but a necessity, a catalyst for profound and lasting change in the African American community and beyond. The true measure of its success will be how effectively we can bring this opportunity to those who stand to gain the most from it.

a cold may require fluids, bed rest and medicine for pain and fever.

Who's Most at Risk

Anyone can contract an upper respiratory infection however some infections are lower respiratory infections and cause bronchitis or pneumonia. RSV can present with some of the same symptoms but also shortness of breath and an increasing respiratory rate especially in children, wheezing and respiratory retractions can also occur. According to Perez, retractions occur in small children with difficulty breathing, who use their intercostal muscles to move their chest up and down. Young children under six months and the elderly over sixty five are most at risk of RSV.

COVID-19

According to Dr Perez, in addition to coughing, a sore throat, runny nose, and fever you should be aware of tiredness, muscle aches, shortness of breath and the one symptom that is particular to COVID-19 is a loss of the sense of taste or smell. The people who are most at risk are, “Those who suffer from lung diseases like asthma, COPD, and obesity,” Perez stated. “We know now more firmly that obesity does impair our ability to breathe normally. So obesity is a risk factor, especially with developing more severe Covid disease.” Other people of particular concern are those who are immunosuppressed, have cancer and are undergoing treatment or have HIV.


RSV

According to Dr. Manisha Newaska, a Pediatric Pulmonologist at Stanford Children's Health, a typical RSV season in the U.S. and North America is October through March, however since the COVID pandemic, it's a little more variable.

RSV presents as a cold in older children, however the symptoms tend to be more severe. According to Newaska, the signs of infection in younger children can be ‘loss of appetite, irritability and trouble breathing or ‘breathing very fast.’ or ‘retractions’ in small children is

Boston University CTE Center that “they have now diagnosed CTE in the brains of 345 of 376 (91.7%) of NFL players studied.” Such prevalence of the condition in players was staggering to me.

For many young athletes especially in the Black community, even though the odds of making it to a professional team are against them, their dreams of making it to the top don’t wane. And, it seems, neither do the risks of CTE.

Looking at the melanin of NFL players I’m sure many young Black athletes think the odds of playing football at that level are pretty good. After all, in 2022, over 56% of players within the NFL were Black and more than 50% of players chosen in the 2023 NFL draft were Black, including 90 percent of the first round draft picks. Are Black players getting that much better or are white athletes weighing the dangers of CTE and moving away from the sport.

In addition, a 2023 report by Utah State University found “Black football players are more likely to end up in positions carrying a higher risk of career-ending injuries and long-term neurological damage.” The study relied on data of more than 20,000 NFL players from 1960 to 2020.

From another perspective, according to the analytics company, Statista, the number of college players that actually make it to the NFL, at 1.6%, is astonishingly low. This means the other 98.4% of young players will never realize their dreams in this regard while it appears the risks they take as it relates to CTE are great.

For so many of these aspiring players, those dreams start early and often carry through their college careers.

The annual numbers in this regard are pretty astounding. According to Pop Warner there are over 400,000 boys and girls, ages 5-16, participating in their programs across the country. Add to that the 1.04 Million high school football players and then another 81,000 who play at the college level and it totals nearly 1.5 million kids, youth and young adults involved in the sport of non professional tackle football each year.

The question we need to ask ourselves is whether the sport of tackle football is worth the risk of CTE in the long run for our children when the great majority will never have professional

careers in the NFL when there are so many other sports they can play.

Last year, Boston University CTE Center revealed how the hits players take on the field as they pursue their dreams of one day attaining fame, fortune and glory have a greater impact on their brains than previously recognized. Researchers found “repetitive blows to the head” could lead to less white matter in the brain.

This, according to the study, suggests the potential for “poor impulse control, cognitive difficulties and other thinking-related problems” regardless of whether the individual has CTE. These findings, published in Brain Communications, stressed how children, who start playing tackle football at an early age or play it for more than 11 years, are at greater risk for these problems.

The study further warned there exists a greater risk for brain damage later in life for those who start playing tackle football as children.

This begs an additional question. Is the sport of tackle football worth the risk of reduced white matter in the brains of our children and the possibility of brain damage later in their lives?

As might be expected controversy is raging regarding a way forward.

Legislation introduced in February 2023, by California Assembly member Kevin McCarty and amended in committee on January 11, 2024, AB-734, would outlaw tackle football statewide for those under 12 years of age. This is McCarty’s second attempt to act on this issue. He introduced a similar bill that failed in 2018.

The bill is being met with strong pushback beginning with that of CA Governor Gavin Newsom. In a statement earlier this month he declared, “I will not sign legislation that bans youth tackle football.” According to Newsom, a ban is not the answer and favors a safety centered approach to mitigate the problem.

Previous legislation signed by Newsom and became effective in 2021, limits teams to just two full-contact practices per week for no longer than 30 during regular season. It also requires those who coach tackle football to be trained on concussions and head injuries. We should keep in mind many of these individuals are volunteer coaches, not neurologists, and then ask ourselves, Is this enough?

Newsom is not the only one who believes this

legislation is the proverbial bridge too far. Other opponents claim it infringes on parental rights by taking away their ability to decide their children’s activities; that it would put youth tackle football players in the state behind those in other states; restrict access for some children to a source of exercise; and eliminate what some view as an “important” after-school activity.

Despite these protests, data shows participation in high school tackle football had declined in California, showing a precipitous drop of more than 18% between 2015 and 2022, falling from a high of 103,725 players to 84,626 players, according to the California Interscholastic Federation’s participation survey. There was however, an uptick in 2023, a moderate increase of 5% to 89,178 players.

California, is always heralded as a progressive state that prides itself on being the first on many important issues from saving the environment to offering health insurance for undocumented residents to outlawing food additives that lead to diseases including cancer, to name a few.

To date, not a single state in the nation has banned tackle football for children despite research that is warning us of the potential damage and impact it may have on their brains. Is it because the impact on the children is something that will not manifest until well into their future when no one will remember or link it back to the hits they took on the Pop Warner football field when they were 8 or 9 years old?

We are adults, and children count on us to make reasonable and prudent decisions on their behalf. These decisions should not be based on what is popular but on what is in the best interests of the children. Then again, child safety has never been a strong suit for this nation. It was just a couple of years ago that we watched as children were put in cages; many stood silent as kids in Flint, Michigan suffered severe health complications from toxic water; and, we lacked national will to pass gun control legislation even after witnessing the slaughter of 20 elementary school children in CT and more recently, in Uvalde, TX.

Of course, this is just my opinion. I’m keeping it real.

OSHA) regulations.

The CDPH no longer recommends testing for all close contacts and instead recommends testing only for people with new COVID-19 symptoms and close contacts who are at higher risk for severe disease. However, in the instance of workplace outbreaks, Cal/OSHA still requires “testing of all close contacts in outbreaks, and everyone in the exposed group in major outbreaks.”

The new COVID-19 guidance was released as several respiratory illnesses such as respiratory syncytial virus (RSV), the flu and COVID-19 continue to affect Californians.

On Jan. 19, Riverside County Public Health officials announced the death of an infant from southwest Riverside County who tested positive for RSV. Health officials encourage people who are 32 through 36 weeks pregnant, during September through January, to get one dose of the maternal RSV vaccine to protect their babies.

Health officials also recommend immunization for infants younger than eight months of age who were born during or who are entering their first RSV season, if the birthing parent did not receive the RSV vaccine during pregnancy. Everyone who is six months or older can be vaccinated against the flu. COVID-19 vaccines are available to those six months or older.

a sign of ‘low oxygen levels’. If you notice these symptoms, children should go immediately to the hospital or emergency room.’

Protecting yourself

To protect yourself from respiratory viruses, wear a mask when in situations where you are in public and watch how close you are to others. When in doors ventilation is important, open doors or windows, wash your hands, if someone is coughing or sneezing be aware of the potential of infection. If you are ill or immunocompromised, vaccinations, masking, hand washing and limiting contact with others who may be infected is also recommended.

Schiff called the audience’s attention to his record as a member of the House Select Committee that investigated the Jan. 6 attack on the U.S. Capitol and how he led the impeachment effort against President Trump.

“We have a lot of similarities in our voting record,” Schiff pointed out, referring to the three Democrats participating in the debate.

“When our country was threatened by a would-be dictator in the oval office, one of us stepped up to the middle of that fight. I took on the President,” Schiff said.

A former federal prosecutor, Schiff also emphasized his experience challenging big oil and pharmaceutical companies.

All three democrats questioned Garvey, who gave long -winded responses, but would not say whom he would vote for in the 2024 presidential election.

“Once a Dodger, always a dodger,” said Porter, alluding to Garvey’s resistance to taking a position -- and to his baseball career. “This is not the minor leagues, who will you vote for?”

Avoiding direct answers to questions, Garvey, instead, talked up his leadership traits and vision for bringing some balance to the predominance of the Democratic Party in state politics.

“I’m common sense. I’m compassionate. I’m a consensus builder. I think we need to get back to that in California,” said Garvey, who referred to his Democratic rivals as “career politicians” who “talk down to us.”

Throughout the debate, Lee drew a correlation between her lived experiences and political perspective: how empathy, relatability and insight drive her advocacy for issues impacting the lives of Californians.

“We have 40 million people. Twenty million, one paycheck away from poverty. I know that,” said Lee. “I was on public assistance, food stamps, Medi-cal, raising two little boys as a single mom. So many people in California are struggling.”

The biggest divergence on policy came when the debate shifted to the Israel and Palestine.

Lee called for a ceasefire on Oct. 8, one day after Hamas attacked Israel, killed 1400 people

and took over 200 hostages -- a position she continues to hold.

“Israel deserves to live in peace with security free from Hamas and terrorist attacks,” she said. “The only way Israel is going to be secure is through a permanent ceasefire, a political and diplomatic solution.” Lee also pointed out that she was the only Congressperson to vote against authorization to use military force in Iraq.

“I said then, and I’m saying now it could spiral out of control. We have to make sure our national security is also protected,” she said.

Schiff said he would support a two-state solution but stopped short of calling for a ceasefire. “The United States should support Israel in defending itself. We also should work with Israel to reduce the number of civilian casualties, he said. It’s not, in my view, incompatible with human nature to grieve the loss of both innocent Palestinians and innocent Israelis.”

On a ceasefire, Porter’s position seemed to fall between the other two democrats. “We need, as the United States, to be pushing for the conditions that can get us to a bilateral, durable peace,” she said.

“Ceasefire is not a magic word, you cannot say it and make it so. But we have to push, as the United States, as a world leader, for us to get to a ceasefire and avoid another forever war,” Porter said.

All three democrats, however, agreed that a two-state solution is the goal. Garvey disagreed.

“I’m with Israel. Yesterday, today and tomorrow,” Garvey said. Pressed by the other democrats on the stage to present his vision for the Middle East, he said “I think it’s all so naive to think that a two-state solution can happen even in our generation.”

According to a Berkeley Institute of Governmental Studies opinion poll, among likely voters, Schiff is leading with 21%, followed by Porter at 18%, Garvey at 17% and Lee at 12%.
