## ATHLETIC DIRECTOR CANDIDATES NAMED

Three women and two men are being invited to interview between mid-January and early February for the athletic director position, reports Judith Rymer, vice president (University Relations).

The women include Nancy Simpson, who has been serving as the associate athletic director at Cal State since July. Previously, Simpson was Cal State's assistant athletic director and senior women's administrator for three years. She also was senior associate athletic director at the University of California, Riverside. She holds a master's degree from the University of Southern Mississippi.

Betty Werner of Highlands Ranch, Colo., has 13 years of experience as a women's athletic director and an associate athletic director, most recently at Drake University, which is a Division I school. She also spent five years managing private athletic clubs in Dallas, Texas. She holds a master's degree from the University of Missouri.

Joanne Fortunato of Marlborough, N.H., is the former athletic director at Keene State College, where she spent 12 years overseeing the program that will move soon from Division II to Division III. She holds two Ph.D.s from the University of Southern California and Northwestern University.

The men include Turlock, Calif., resident Joseph Donahue, who, for the past five years, has served as the athletic director for Cal State, Stanislaus. He holds an M.B.A. from Monmouth College in New Jersey, where he was a coach and athletic administrator from 1982-89.

### ATHLETIC DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR HIRED

Curt B. Apsey, assistant director of athletic development at Cal State, Bakersfield, has been named Cal State's athletic development director, a new position created within the Athletics Department. He assumed his duties last week.

With two years of experience in fundraising for athletics at CSU Bakersfield, plus six years of service as men's assistant soccer coach for Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, Apsey joins the university's athletic development program at an ideal time, notes Judith Rymer, vice president (University Relations).

"As the Coyote sports teams compete in some of our new facilities, including

Coussoulis Arena next season, the opportunities for the community to get behind Cal State's athletics program will expand," she says. "Curt will be a major player in helping us synergize that support and build our program to its potential."

The newly created position, funded with monies from a CSUSB student fee referendum that increased expanded funding for sports and recreational programs, will oversee corporate and foundation relations, alumni relations, and annual giving for athletic scholarships.

Apsey holds a bachelor of science in physical education with a coaching and teaching option from Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo and has been working on a master of science degree in education administration at Cal State, Bakersfield.

Wayne Edwards of Dracut, Mass., is the athletic director of the University of Massachusetts, Lowell. He has overseen the Division I and II programs since 1987. In 1993, his responsibilities increased to include the position of associate vice chancellor for university relations, which involves the oversight of the alumni affairs program. He holds an Ed.D. from Peabody College of Vanderbilt University.

The athletic director search is being conducted by a committee of university faculty, staff, administrators, CSUSB alumni and community representatives. Rymer chairs the committee. The opening has been created by the retirement of David Suenram, athletic director for CSUSB for the past five years.

The campus community is invited to attend any of the open forums for the five candidates. They are: Simpson on Jan. 13; Donahue on Jan. 17; Edwards on Jan. 31; Fortunato on Feb. 2; and Werner on Feb. 3. All forums run from 11:15 a.m.-noon in JBH 276.

### LIBRARY VANDALIZED OVER HOLIDAY BREAK

Two glass windows and a door were broken in the library sometime between early Christmas morning and Dec. 27, reports Steve Nowicki, acting director (Public Safety). "A few things were moved around...It does not appear that any property left the building." Several sections of the new wing and Pfau Library appear to have been rifled. Because there were no signs of forced entry, campus police can't determine how vandals entered the building, Nowicki says.

### UNUSUAL SCREENPRINTS UNVEILED

One of the 20th Century's most respected painters, Josef Albers, will display serigraphs from two portfolio books called "Formulation: Articulation" Jan. 19-Feb. 24.

Albers uses the medium of screenprinting to demonstrate the relationship between colors and shape in each work.

The driving force behind publication of Albers' serigraphs, which were done in collaboration with Harry N. Abrams and Ives-Sillman, was the desire to see "realization rather than the reproduction of the essential ideas" in Albers' 40-year journey in painting. Screenprinting, says Albers, gives him "maximum control of the color interaction."

The exhibit contains dozens of serigraphs and offers patrons the unusual chance to study an artist's hand in the adaptation of his own work into another medium.

The Ives-Sillman partnership made its mark in the art world when it created portfolio-books, which are complete works of art. Long a European art form, the books were introduced by Ives-Sillman in the United States.

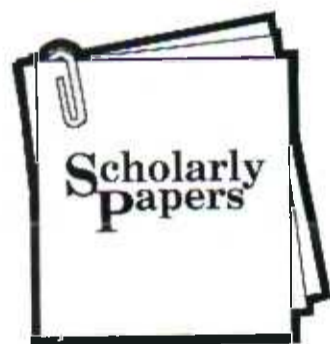
## A Summary of Faculty Development Activities

### GRANTS IN PROGRESS

**Klaus Brasch**, acting dean of the School of Natural Sciences, was an invited speaker at a conference on Mathematics, Science and Engineering (MSE), sponsored by the National Science Foundation and co-hosted by the University of California Irvine and the Quality Education for Minorities (QEM) Network. The two-day event convened educators, scientists, administrators, students, parents, business people and NSF officials to help identify strategies for increasing the production of minority MSE graduates within California to levels commensurate with the state's minority K-12 population.

Dr. Brasch's presentation at the conference, "*A Model System for The Science Education of Diverse Populations*," was based on the NSF-funded project by the same title, which he co-directs with two colleagues from the School of Education, **Iris Riggs** and **Esteban Diaz**. This three-year program targets elementary (grades 3-6) science teachers and bilingual aides in the Fontana Unified School District. The project couples intensive hands-on training in the basic sciences with cooperative learning methods. CSUSB scientists **Javier Torner** and **Lisa Shamansky**, educators **Joseph Jesunathadas** and **Sam Crowell**, and several graduate students have all been closely involved with this project. Lead teacher **Kathy Mouzakis** and strong district administrative support have also contributed to the program's success.

Several major conclusions were reached at the MSE conference. One was that integrative, hands-on teaching programs like this are key to first raising an interest in and appreciation for science, mathematics and technology among all students but especially during their formative elementary school years. Second, this approach fosters attitudes of cooperative problem solving and helps overcome the notion among students that science is boring or too difficult for them to understand. Third, it opens students' eyes to intellectual pursuits and career options they might not otherwise consider. The last factor was deemed particularly important with respect to minority and traditionally underrepresented students.
