Nearly a Million Patients Exposed Due to City of Hope Security Breach



More than 827K patients of the Duarte, CA, based City of Hope (COH), a private, non-profit clinical research center, received formal notification from the organization last week that stated in part, that on or about October 13, 2023, (source: cityofhope.org) they experienced a major security breach. (source: cityofhope.org)

“Protecting the security of information is a responsibility,” noted Equifax, a multinational consumer reporting agency and nearly everyone agrees.

When you are battling Stage 4 leiomyosarcoma, lung, ovarian, pancreatic, prostate, breast or one of any other type of cancer, the last thing you need added to your stress level is a breach of your security that may include anything or everything from your name to your banking information to medical details about your most devastating illness and your epic battle to stave off its inevitability.

But, that is exactly the stress being experienced by more than 827K patients of the Duarte based City of Hope (COH), a private, non-profit clinical research center. Last week these patients received formal notification from the organization stating in part, that on or about October 13, 2023, Further information indicates records were at risk between September 19, 2023, and continued to October 12, 2023.” COH said it began taking action beginning October 13, 2024.

According to organization officials, in

addition to acting to minimize the disruption to operations, it began investigating and assessing the scope of the incident. Although the breach was reported to the California State Attorney General’s office as required by law, it has taken almost six months for the nearly one million individuals impacted by the breach to receive official notification of the incident.

Why should COH patients be concerned?

COH’s system was accessed by an unauthorized individual(s) who captured an assortment of personal information including social security numbers, financial details, medical records and health insurance information according to the organization.

COH patients impacted by the data breach received a letter from the organization dated April 2, 2024, The letter apprised clients of the breach, the type of information exposed, added security measure to prevent such breaches from occurring in the future and the promise of two years security services at no charge as part of its mitigation measures.

In recognition of the advocacy and efforts of the J.W. Vines Medical Society, the University of California, Riverside (UCR) renamed their annual Diversity Equity and Inclusion Colloquium to the UCR School of Medicine's J.W. Vines Diversity Equity and Inclusion Colloquium. The J.W. Vines Medical Society is a nonprofit organization that supports Black physicians and medical students across the Inland Empire with mentoring and educational opportunities.

"This important recognition will ensure that the story and legacy of these important contributions are a part of our history and are woven into our ongoing work far into the future," said Dr. Deborah Deas, Dean of UCR's School of Medicine. Dr. Deas presented the certificate to current J.W. Vines Medical Society President

Dr. Leita Harris during a UCR event celebrating the society's impact on the School of Medicine.

This certificate is one of the many accolades awarded to the J.W. Vines Medical Society over the course of its history. UCR hosted a celebration, honoring the society for their efforts and contributions to the School of Medicine and forging a pathway for Black students and other students of color who were systematically eliminated from the school's biomedical division.

Here's a timeline of how the Vines Society's dedication to supporting the advancement and success of Black medical students made a lasting impact on the community and UCR's School of Medicine.

1974

In July, UCR's Division of Biomedical Sciences launches after receiving approval from Gov. Jerry Brown. The program initiated the idea

of establishing a medical school on the campus. The division is jointly operated by UCR and University of California, Los Angeles's (UCLA) Program in Biomedical Sciences, a seven-year accelerated Bachelor of Science/MD program.

Initially, UCR's Division of Biomedical Sciences set out to admit as many high scoring students to the program to improve and increase undergraduate enrollment at the time.

According to Dr. Craig Byus, former dean and program director for the Division of Biomedical Sciences, the program did well and brought in an estimated 200 students per year. Students in the Biomedical Sciences Division had the highest retention rates among any other majors on campus.

Decades later, as the division was in the process of transforming into the School of Medicine, UCR faced challenges with poor administrative leadership, reduced faculty, poor recruitment, inadequate student support resources, and a lack of Black students.

"Now, the Vines Society stepped into this huge leadership vacuum, and they were advocates, but they really stepped into this vacuum. They provided both a needed vision of what the State of California's Inland Empire needed," said Dr. Byus. "And they brought the leadership ability to get it accomplished by going to the legislature and getting it done."

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Another Smiling Face That Tells Lies in S.B. City Hall; Part 3

Mayor Tran told us a lie that she did not have to.

Only a few people in the NAACP know that we had a complaint filed against the Tran for Mayor Campaign for her taking pictures at local Black businesses and displaying Dr. Margaret Hill's picture on her Facebook page. The complaint had no racial discrimination basis, and as Chair of the NAACP Legal Redress Committee, I informed him it was not a valid complaint, and we would not go public with it because it was a personal issue. I only bring this up now to point out how deep the mistrust concerning Mayor Tran and the Black community was and is.

I supported Mayor Tran when Councilmembers Fred Shorett and Ted Sanchez refused to support her idea for a State of the City event. Shorett would not even support her nomination to be Vice Chair of the San Bernardino International Airport Commission.

Then the big lie came in the last election. It was rumored that Mayor Tran was recruiting her appointed commissioners to run for the city council seats of specific wards, including Ward 6, where I live. So I asked my wife to call her to see if this was true. Mayor Tran told her she was not recruiting or supporting anyone to run for office, which turned out to be a lie.

This is a list of people Mayor Tran has appointed since she was elected and who ran in for office. In Ward 3, Christian Shaughnessy ran against Juan Figueroa and Figueroa won. In Ward 5, Kimberly Knaus against Ben Reynoso. Reynoso lost and Knaus is in a run-off with Henry Nickel. Tran begged Rev. Byron Sims to run and

he had a campaign website but bowed out after members in the Black community asked him to. Mayor Tran then turned to Mario Flores as her second choice. Flores won the seat.

In my opinion all Mayor Tran had to say was yes, I need people on the council I trust to support my agenda. Instead, she lied, when she did not have to. This has placed me in the position not to trust her. Tran has joined the team of lies and Half-truth tellers currently residing in City Hall.

1987

The James Wesley Vines Medical Society Inc. (JWV) is granted a charter to organize as a component society of the National Medical Association and the Golden State Medical Association in the Pomona Valley Area. The first meeting is held in February where Dr. Benjamin G. Vines, an internist, is elected president.

1989

Dr. Vines holds the position of president of the James Wesley Vines Medical Society, Inc. (JWV) until he passed away. Dr. Ernest Levister Jr., a member of the society, serves as a columnist for Black Voice News where he writes weekly articles about a variety of health topics and answers health questions from community members.

Dr. Levister serves as president and the

name of the society changes from JWV to James Wesley Vines, Jr. M.D. Medical Society, Inc., a component of the National Medical Association.

1995

The J.W. Vines Medical Society becomes concerned about UCR's Biomedical Sciences program when they are invited to a campus event hosted by a student organization called African Americans United in Science.

Dr. Levister recalled the event being held in honor of a student, Blake Wilson, who was expected to become the second Black student accepted into the biomedical program in its 28-year history.

"Growing concerns over the low minority selection rate were compounded when Wilson and several other highly qualified students, including Quincy Almond, a junior and Phi Beta Kappa failed to make the final cuts," Dr. Levister said during his speech at the celebration.

"What I witnessed first hand shook me to the core. And Quincy was one of my mentees, and I cried for and with him."

The Vines Society repeatedly seeks answers from UCR administration about how highly qualified Black students were "systematically weeded out" of the program and urge them to address the inequity.

"We were repeatedly rebuffed and ignored," Dr. Levister said.

1997

UCR's Division of Biomedical Sciences program is renamed the UCR/UCLA Thomas Haider Program in Biomedical Sciences after a gift to the program from Dr. Thomas Haider, a spinal surgeon, and his wife Salma. The Haiders support the establishment of a medical school at UCR and are proponents for admitting underserved students into the program.

"After years of constant broken promises, members of the Vines concluded that UCR's commitment to changing the program and boosting minority rates were an abject and cascading failure," Dr. Levister said.

Following this conclusion, the Vines Society wrote a resolution that says they will no longer recommend the program for minority students. They launch a state-wide media campaign and mail the resolution to lawmakers, other medical schools, high school advisors, teachers and major medical societies. They also send letters to the UCLA Chancellor and dean of the medical

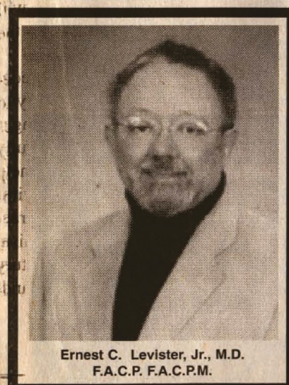

On Friday, May 16, Quincy Almond graduated from the medical school at UC San Francisco, one of the world's most prestigious medical institutions. Little did Quincy know, no matter how seemingly remote to an ailing child in South Los Angeles, his achievement has far reaching implications like a butterfly fluttering its wings and ultimately causing a hurricane. Watching this young man emerge for the traditional hood-

ing, witnessing the exhilaration of his father, mother, host of siblings, friends and classmates, I could only step back a mere five years and remember a heartbroken Quincy at the crossroads of his most formidable challenge. Despite a stellar academic performance in UC Riverside's maligned Bio Medical Sciences Program, in 1998, Quincy's dream of becoming a doctor was shattered. The Phi Beta Kappa graduate was systemically eliminated from the program and left to ponder the truly devastating policies governing medical school admissions and how best to press on.

As we begin to consider possible U.S. Supreme Court rulings in The University of Michigan cases, we seem to miss the point of how truly devastating a ruling that makes race conscious decisions unlawful would be for our society.

We understand the short-term realities - that such a 'decision' would

limit the numbers of minorities on college campuses - but it's often difficult to understand the long-term problems that would arise from a lack of diversity in higher education. In medical education, however, the long-term consequences are clear. A ruling that makes the use of race in college admissions unlawful would severely harm the health of the nation.

Up until the 1960s, medical schools were segregated as most other institutions in American society.

Three quarters of all African-American physicians were trained at the country's two historically Black medical schools, Howard University and Meharry Medical College. The other 81 medical schools at the time averaged one Black student every other year. The past four decades have seen a great deal of progress, but there is still a great deal of work to be done if medical schools are to

accurately reflect our society. A just society must ensure that equal opportunity exists for all that are both qualified and interested in pursuing a career in medicine. With the current crisis in healthcare, diversity in medical education is essential in cultural care, research and service.

Dr. Quincy Almond was one of a handful of minorities receiving the MD that day. Congratulations, Quincy, you are one of us, now. You hold the keys to generations of others like you. Somewhere in the world, there is a proverbial butterfly beating its wings, starting a wave of reactions that may soon cause hurricane-force winds to beat down the doors at UC Riverside and howl at the steps the U.S. Supreme Court.

Levinster explained.

The support and advocacy on behalf of the J.W. Vines Medical Society leads to UCR establishing a new mission: “to improve the health of the people of California and, especially, to serve Inland Southern California by training a diverse workforce of physicians.”

Dr. Levister supports the establishment of the student organization, African Americans United in Science. The J.W. Vines Medical Society also supports students with lectures, mentoring,

a summer medical enrichment program, and funding for MCAT preparation courses.

“Little known fact is, Dr. Levister actually bought me my first suit,” said Dr. Michael Nduati, former UCR Thomas Haider Program student and current UCR associate clinical professor. Dr. Nduati is now a member of the J.W. Vines Medical Society and was a co-founder of UCR's African Americans United in Science alongside Dr. Shareece Davis.

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Ryan Gainer's Death Sparks Controversy

His Death Ignites Debate Over Whether Deputy Escalated the Interaction

On March 9, family members of 15-year-old Ryan Gainer, diagnosed as autistic, called 9-1-1 reporting that he was actively assaulting family members and damaging property at the residence.

“He was upset that he couldn't have his video games or play with his laptop,” the Gainer family attorney DeWitt Lacy explained, “He had begun acting out and broke a glass window near the front door.”

According to a San Bernardino County Sheriff's Advisory update, at approximately 4:54 p.m. on Saturday, March 9, San Bernardino County Sheriff's Deputy Wyatt Eisenbrey responded to the residence.

In a body-cam video of the incident released by the San Bernardino

County Sheriff's Department (SBCSD), you hear a male voice call out as Eisenbrey approaches the front door, “Come on in.”

In response, Deputy Eisenbrey yells, “Where is he at?”

The male voice shouts, “Look out, look out, he's got a stick in his hand.”

Ryan Gainer bursts around the corner running full speed down the hallway and into the front yard directly toward the deputy.

The deputy yells out, “Hey, get back, get back, you're going to get shot” as he draws his weapon. Shots ring out.

When Deputy Eisenbrey turns around Gainer is on the ground, with

Deputy Brandon Clancy standing about 15 feet away.

Then the shrill screams of a distraught woman is heard. She is reacting to the sight of Ryan lying on the ground. Family members pour out of the home.

Deputy Eisenbrey yells, “Get back, get back, get back into the residence, right now.”

“My son! My son,” the distraught mother screams.

“We’re going to give him help, give him help,” Deputy Eisenbrey responds, as Gainer is writhing on the ground.

“We’re going to give him help, get back into the residence,” Deputy Eisenbrey instructs.

“Why did you do that? Why did you shoot my baby,” Ryan’s mother implores?

“We’re going to get him help. We’re going to get him help,” the deputies reassure.

A third deputy arrives and you can hear Deputy Eisenbrey calling for an ambulance.

Finally, the officers are seen rendering aid, one removing the stick from Gainer’s hands, as family members cry out, criticizing the deputies’ actions. “You killed my baby. You killed my baby. They murdered my baby,” Ryan’s mother screams.

Sirens can be heard as the ambulance, fire department, and other law enforcement vehicles approach the scene.

According to SBCSD’s Advisory Update, the stick Ryan held when shot was an approximately five-foot-long garden tool, with a sharp-bladed end, that Ryan raised as he ran toward the retreating deputy.

“A lethal force encounter occurred, Gainer was struck by gunfire and later died at a local hospital.”

Detectives with the sheriff department’s Specialized Investigations Division took over the investigation.

Gainer family attorney speaks out

In an interview with Black Voice News, the Gainer family’s attorney, DeWitt Lacy stated, “The standard for the use of deadly force is whether or not there’s imminent danger of death or great bodily injury.”

A press conference held by Lacy about the

Lacy described the body-cam videos released by SBCSD as edited.

"According to their training, they're supposed to de-escalate," Lacy reasoned, instead, the officer had a confrontational approach, walking up to the house shouting out in a challenging manner and as soon as Gainer appeared, pulled out his gun. The officer escalated the situation with his aggressive approach."

"When you're dealing with somebody who has a mental health issue or impairment in the field," Lacy explained, "officers are trained to plan with their partner to create time and distance between them and the suspect."

"If they approach a circumstance like Ryan, with some type of threat of violence," Lacy reasoned, "it could cause a violent or aggressive reaction, which is what happened, right?"

"If the officers kept their distance and softened their approach, then an officer retreating and firing at Gainer would be unnecessary, Lacy concluded.

Gainer picked up two random objects, a garden hoe and a skillet, Lacy observed, reasoning, that the officer should have been able

to take these objects from a kid.

That the object(s) Gainer had could cause injury was not the standard in their basic training as law enforcement officers to justify the use of deadly force, Lacy explained.

"The law is that there has to be an imminent threat of death or great bodily injury," Lacy confirmed, "That is the law. That's not my viewpoint." Lacy pointed to the United States Supreme Court decision in *Graham v. Conner* 490 US 386 (1989).

"It is the standard that law enforcement around the nation uses to determine whether or not a level of force is appropriate," Lacy voiced referring to a jury instruction developed by the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals.

The jury instructions added other considerations in determining excessive force including the size of the officer versus the suspect; how many officers compared to suspects; the type of crime alleged; whether there were mental health issues; or an imminent threat of death or great bodily injury; [and/or] were there less intrusive alternatives to the use of force.

Lacy recalled the family sharing that by the time law enforcement arrived, Ryan was apologetic to his father and family recognizing that he had gone too far. His parents were asking him to clean up the glass.

These deputies rushed in and made the situation worse, Lacy opined, and it wasn't that Ryan was dangerous per se, but he had begun

acting out.

In past instances, Lacy explained, law enforcement officers responding to the home had been very helpful. They de-escalated the situation, calmed Ryan down, and worked through it. This is the hero's work to lend aid and help keep the peace, which is their job Lacy opined.

Lacy described Ryan Gainer's family as tight-knit with a father and mother, the father and a daughter are military veterans, the mother is disabled and they attend church on Sunday.

California Department of Justice does not take up the case

In an interview with Black Voice News, the public information officer for the California Department of Justice (CADOJ), Alexandria Duquet, explained that under a new law effective July 2021, the CADOJ is required to investigate all incidents of an officer-involved shooting resulting in the death of an unarmed civilian.

As a result, CADOJ is privy to information on any officer-involved shooting.

The law defined an "unarmed civilian" as "anyone who is not in possession of a deadly weapon."

Duquet explained the SBCSD characterized the garden tool as having a sharp edge and as a result, it is considered a deadly weapon, capable of inflicting death, and fell under that definition. Therefore, the CADOJ did not pick up the case, Duquet shared.

Duquet further explained there are times, however, when the CADOJ does investigate an officer-involved shooting where an involved civilian has a weapon. She gave the example of one case where a civilian was beating a woman with a bike lock.

As more evidence becomes available, Duquet explained, it could turn-out the garden tool Ryan held was not capable of inflicting death in our view. If that turns out to be the case, then the CADOJ would reconsider.

It's on a case-by-case basis, Duquet observed.

For instance, Black Voice News found an officer-involved shooting on March 23, in the

Love for the Outdoors is a Gift that Pays Forward

When we see a 75-year-old White man out in the woods teaching a group of Black and brown kids from low-income neighborhoods about nature, few of us assume he is there because that is where he feels most comfortable.

Probably even fewer of us assume many of those kids look just like the ones he grew up with in public housing projects more than 60 years ago. Rocky Milburn grew up as one of the few White kids in a mostly Black public housing development in southern Indiana. His family was very poor. They were still poor when they moved into an old farmhouse in the country. That was where Rocky fell in love with the outdoors. Even though his parents struggled financially – perhaps even worse than when they lived in the projects – Rocky did not care. “We lived right across the street from a creek,” Rocky said, pronouncing it “crick,” “and I spent my days running the fields. You can kind of say it was my drug at the time.”

For more than 25 years, Rocky has been an outings leader with the Sierra Club’s Inspiring Connections Outdoors (ICO) program in Tampa, Florida. The program takes youth from underserved communities on outings such as camping and canoe trips and visits to the beach.

“Many of these kids live two miles from the beach but have never seen the ocean,” Rocky said.

His own experience has taught Rocky the importance of sharing his love of the outdoors. When the kids stand around Rocky and learn from him about nature, they do not see his age or his race. They see his heart. And they know his heart understands them and the challenges they are facing because he is from the same

type of place. People like Rocky who serve as nature’s ambassadors to young people and people of any age who are nature-deprived are heroes. The kids in his program learn how to appreciate and be good caretakers of nature. They experience firsthand the lessons nature has to teach us; how being outdoors benefits both our physical and mental health. And they carry these lessons with them throughout their lives.

Levi Randolph attended the Academy Prep Center of Tampa, which has a partnership with the ICO program. While at Academy Prep, a private middle school designed to give bright children from low-income families top-notch educational opportunities, Levi went on his very first camping trip: an outing led by Rocky Milburn. Now an adult, Levi is an outings leader with the Tampa ICO group alongside Rocky.

Levi is paying forward his experience. He is pursuing a career working with animals and investing his time to make sure other kids from

his old neighborhood and school get the same chance he had to explore and enjoy nature. This is a story that repeats itself in families and communities in every pocket of our country. And we should encourage and celebrate it.

As someone who comes from a long line of outdoors enthusiasts who passed the love of nature on to me, I try to do the same for my kids. Whether we are skiing in the winter, paddling and fishing in the summer, or visiting national parks year round, I try to do my part to make sure my family stays connected to the great outdoors. Everyone can do this, whether it is a community affair, a family affair, or both.

Vedia Barnett is a disabled Air Force veteran. After she suffered a minor stroke, it was reconnecting with the outdoors and her love of nature that gave her a renewed sense of purpose to get back on her feet.

“Just hearing the birds and feeling the sun on my face, it was like giving me life back,” she said.

Now Vedia works with Sierra Club’s Military Outdoors campaign, getting other women veterans outdoors. She recounts one woman who left the service in the 1970s: “This was the first time she felt like she was in community with veterans who looked like her. And I think it’s important even for veterans to understand that all these lands are for us – they’re for everybody.”

Vedia’s mom, a Marine Corp veteran, has also gotten involved, bringing senior women veterans in their 70s out to join the group’s outings.

This month is Earth Month. It is a perfect time to get outside. Bring your friends and family out there with you. If there is a local program near you that helps get kids – or anyone – outside who doesn’t typically have a lot of access to nature, consider chipping in your time. A love of nature is infectious. And it is one infection that is very worth spreading.

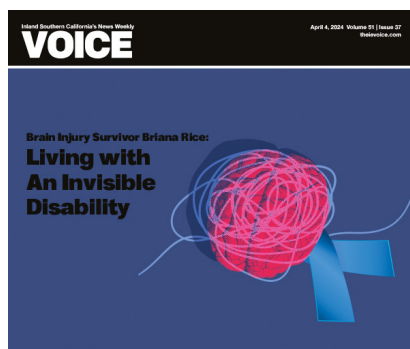

City of Hope is committed to providing the highest standard of patient care, as well as protecting the privacy and confidentiality of your information. This notice concerns an incident in which an unauthorized third party accessed some of City of Hope's systems and copied files, including some that may have contained your information.

While there is no indication of any identity theft or fraud occurring as a result of this incident, we want to let you know what happened, and the steps that we have taken in response. This letter explains what happened, our response, and steps you can take to protect your information.

What Happened?

On or about October 13, 2023, City of Hope became aware of suspicious activity on a subset of its systems and immediately instituted mitigation measures to minimize any disruption to its operations. City of Hope launched an investigation into the nature and scope of the incident with the assistance of a leading cybersecurity firm, which determined that an unauthorized third party accessed a subset of our systems and obtained copies of some files between September 19, 2023, and October 12, 2023. City of Hope has undertaken a detailed review of the copied files to determine the incident's impact and has determined that some of these files may have contained your information.

What Information Is Involved?

While the investigation remains ongoing, the impacted personal information identified thus far varies by individual but may have included name, contact information (e.g., email address, phone number), date of birth, social security number, driver's license or other government identification, financial details (e.g., bank account number and/or credit card details), health insurance information, medical records and information about medical history and/or associated conditions, and/or unique identifiers to associate individuals with City of Hope (e.g., medical record number).

What We Are Doing

Upon discovery of this incident, City of Hope immediately instituted mitigation measures. We then promptly implemented additional and enhanced safeguards and enlisted the support of a leading cybersecurity firm to enhance the security of our network, systems, and data. We also launched a comprehensive investigation, identified individuals who may have been affected, reported the incident to law enforcement, and notified regulatory bodies.

What You Can Do

We encourage you to remain vigilant to protect against potential fraud and identity theft by reviewing your account statements, monitoring your credit reports, and notifying your financial institutions of any potential suspicious activity.

In a letter dated April 2, 2024, to the near one million COH patients impacted by the data breach, the organization apprised clients of the breach, the type of information at risk, added security measure to prevent such breaches from occurring in the future and the promise of two years security services at no charge as part of its mitigation measures. (source: unnamed)

The security breach potentially affected 827,149 patients according to a data breach notification filed with the CA State Attorney General's office.

Sensitive information potentially exposed included full names, email addresses, phone numbers, birth dates, driver's license and/or government identification information, bank account numbers, credit card details, health insurance information and patients' medical records and history.

In addition to its headquarter's location in Duarte, CA, COH has offices located across the state, as well as Arizona, Georgia and Illinois.

COH engages with more than 11,000 clinicians, researchers and other professionals who provide care and treats to approximately 134,000 patients each year.

If you are currently a patient of COH or were a patient through October 14, 2023, and have questions about the breach, please call (866) 495-8913, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Central Time, excluding major U.S. holidays. Please have your COH Membership Number ready. You can also visit

the City of Hope's website devoted to the breach for additional information.

There should be a requirement to let those impacted by a breach to be notified more expeditiously. On July 23, 2023, the Security and Exchange SEC Commission (SEC) adopted rules on Cybersecurity Risk Management, Strategy, Governance, and Incident Disclosure by Public Companies requires reporting to the Attorney General within four business days. In addition, although the rules will apply to foreign private companies, it does not appear to apply to private companies within the U.S. Regardless, however, there appears to be no requirement to notify the general public—especially those directly impacted—right away.

I believe it is important that as these rules are implemented there should be a priority placed on public notification.

Of course, this is just my opinion. I'm keeping it real.

City of Hesperia involving suspect Keith Vinyard was classified as a lethal force encounter. The SBCSD claimed the suspect fled from deputies, and following a pursuit, armed himself with a large metal object, and assaulted the peace officer, resulting in a lethal force encounter.

In a March 26, news release, the CADOJ announced that following an investigation by the DOJ's California Police Shooting Investigation Team, the officer-involved shooting of suspect Keith Vinyard was turned over to DOJ's Special Prosecutions Section within the Criminal Law Division, for independent review.
