SOPHISTICATION TURNS PREPARATION UP A NOTCH

UNIVERSITY'S EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER 'BEST IN CSU,' SAYS KRAUS

Employees in Academic Computing and Media (ACM) might breathe a little easier in the event of a disaster, thanks to dust masks, safety glasses, and other emergency preparedness equipment recently purchased by the department.

In all, \$2,500 bought each of the 16 ACM women and men their own emergency kits, says Elke Noetzel, floor warden for ACM. "We plan to add to our supplies each fiscal year," Noetzel says.

The campus's growing awareness of the need for adequate emergency preparation and response is what prompted ACM's purchases. "I applaud their preparation for a disaster," says Dennis Kraus, director (Public Safety), who reviewed the employees' new equipment. "They're trying to take the extra steps." Kraus also notes that preparedness is an individual, as well as department, concern. "We all need to be ready."

Overall, Kraus gives the campus's disaster preparedness efforts high marks.

"We're as ready as we've ever been, thanks in no small part to the hard work of many employees."

Among recent enhancements to that preparedness are the upcoming moves of Public Safety and the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) to their new location in the temporary offices. EOC equipment formerly was housed in the Health Center, stored in boxes due to a lack of space. The new EOC

will be "cockpit ready," says Kraus, set up and available for operation at any time.

"We'll have the best EOC in the CSU system," he notes.

The new EOC will get a trial run on Oct. 3, when the campus participates in a county-

wide disaster preparedness exercise.

To further increase campus readiness and response, Kraus says the emphasis this year will be on training faculty and staff in emergency preparedness procedures. Toward that end, two evacuation drills will be

scheduled as training exercises, one during the day and one during the evening.

Given in the name of his father, Gail Stockton, the money was generated by Dave Stockton, a long-time Mentone resident and senior Professional Golf Association player.


