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Well-Wishers Will Give 'Future' Regal Start at Inauguration

The inauguration of Cal State, San Bernardino's third president, Albert K. Karnig, on April 30 will mark an historical milestone in the life of the university.

Built around the theme, "Celebrating Our Past, Creating Our Future," the inauguration ceremony at 4 p.m. in the Coussoulis Arena will highlight the 33-year development of the campus through an exhibit in the lobby of the arena as well as remarks made during the installation. Presiding over the ceremony will be CSU Trustee Ralph Pesqueira, who chaired the search committee when Karnig was appointed. CSU Chancellor Charles Reed will officiate the actual installation, which involves the ritual of decorating the incoming president with a medallion.

Created by art student David Ashby, the bronze medallion was crafted in Cal State's state-of-the-art foundry under the tutelage of Roger Lintault, professor and chair of the art department.

Also on the platform at the inauguration will be former Cal State presidents John Pfau and Anthony Evans along with CSU trustees William Campbell, Laurence Gould, James Gray, Ali Razi and Michael Stennis. The Honorable John W. Kennedy, presiding judge for San Bernardino Trial Courts, will bring greetings from the community and Chris Ahearn, president of the Alumni Association, will speak on behalf of the university's 35,000 alumni.

The ceremony will feature the performance of a composition, Fanfare, which CSUSB music professor Larry McFatter wrote for the occasion. In addition the music of several campus choral and instrumental groups as well as those from area high schools and colleges will support the proceedings.

The installation of President Karnig will be followed immediately by an open reception for the public and guests.

Former Olympian to Talk about Struggles, Successes as Amputee

Named one of the most inspiring women in the nation by NBC "Nightly News," Bonnie St. John Deane will motivate her audience in the talk, "Pushing through the Obstacles: The Art of Self-motivation," on May 7.

In promoting the Annual Disability Awareness Program at CSUSB, Deane will describe her own setbacks and triumphs as an amputee. Despite the challenges, Deane is the director for Human Capital Issues on the National Economic Council in the White House, an Olympic ski medalist, and

author of the book, "Succeeding Sane," which will be on display at the discussion. Her inspiring story also has appeared in the New York Times and Ebony magazine.

An update will be given on the Assistive Technology and Assistance Program, and on services available in the service to students with disabilities office. The speech will be in the Student Union Events Center from 9-11 a.m.

May 2 is the Coyote Corral, Cal State's annual event that includes a barbecue, games, face-painting, concerts and a microbrewery beer garden.

The free community and campus gathering begins at noon and continues into the night, while the university's eleventh annual End of the World Party rocks under the stars. The celebration will take place on the lawn in front of the Pfau Library, where most of the events will occur.

There will be activities for everyone, including an exhibit in the Fullerton Art Museum, a concert from CSUSB alumni, cultural dancers and tours around the Cal State campus. The Coyote Corral is the final event of the inaugural week celebrating the installation of Albert Karnig, the university's third president.

For the barbecue tickets are \$6 for adults and \$4 for children 12-and-under and CSUSB students. The microbrewery beer garden is \$10 and includes appetizers and 7 samples. Discount tickets for those going to both the beer garden and the barbecue are \$14 for general, and \$12 for CSUSB students. Tickets are on sale through April 27 at the Cal State A.S.I.
