Karnig Gives State of the University Address

Becoming one of the nation's leading comprehensive universities and building community-based partnerships will be among Cal State's highest goals now, said President Al Karnig as he talked about the university's strategic plan during his convocation address Sept. 17.

Speaking to some 700 employees on a morning thankfully cooler than the blistering days that had dominated for the past month, Karnig said the strategic plan's goals would not be the kind to collect dust.

"Or else the highest and best goals of the university are also apt to sit and gather dust," he added. "It should be a living plan with improvements regularly made." The next day about 120 university leaders worked on concrete ideas that will give the goals wheels.

Karnig used this past year's Western Association of Schools and Colleges review as a springboard for his remarks. The review, which he said was good, recommended that the university place more emphasis on long-term planning and the decision-making process that accompanies it, make student grievance policies clearer and improve policy distribution, and create new ways to promote diversity.

Turning to the budget, Karnig said that the elimination of line items and position controls, as well as the rolling over of monies from year to year, has given the budget much more flexibility. Still, Karnig expects "links between the university plan and the budget." Faculty involvement, for example, in at least one of the strategic plan's key goals -- to research and understand how students learn or to develop community partnerships -- will be given high consideration in hiring tenure-track professors.

Karnig touched on several organizational issues facing Cal State. With the crisis in student performance and the shortage of teachers in kindergarten-12th grade throughout the state, Karnig said CSUSB also will focus on teacher preparation.

On more than one occasion over the past year the president also met with staff employees to discuss the formation of what will be called the "staff assembly," provided such a body is approved by employees. He also said that hours in some offices on campus would be extended to better serve students, that the discussion of a quarter versus semester system needed another look, the athletics and governmental relations arms of the university advancement division might report to an executive assistant -- once hired -- in his office, and that leaders would examine ways to find and recruit superior students.

Perhaps the least controversial question President Karnig fielded after his address was who he figured would win the home run derby between Chicago Cub slugger Sammy Sosa and the St. Louis Cardinals' Mark McGwire. But the answer was no easier to predict than who he thought might win the current CSU administration and faculty battle over merit pay and just when the School of Education building, in light of the rededication to teacher preparation, will finally go up.

About an imminent agreement on faculty contract negotiations Karnig was not optimistic at the

time. The Chancellor's Office, he said, did not seem ready to give up on making faculty salaries 40 percent performance pay and the California Faculty Association still stood firm at 20 percent and wanted the CSU to look at performance through the RPT process. As for education's new building, Karnig said he is working on getting the building on a "five year plan," and in the meantime working with Dean Patricia Arlin on finding other money to hasten construction.

Before his address, Karnig handed out this year's top employee awards and recognized almost 30 CSUSB employees who earned doctorates, master's or bachelor's degrees last year.

Vaziri and Moya were awarded for excellence in performance and Shum and Fox as outstanding employees.

Clark Steps In as Interim Dean

J. Milton Clark has been named interim dean of undergraduate studies at CSUSB.

An English professor at Cal State for the past 15 years, Clark is one of four national consultants chosen to lend expertise in setting the standards for the Writing Sample of the Medical College Admission Test. He's also been the chief reader for many educational tests, including the graduate record examination and the graduate management admissions test.

Clark's many journal articles include a 1995 article on what students say about essay exams published in the Journal of Basic Writing and one that appeared in the Journal of Instructional Psychology that addresses the issue of finding ways to help "lowest quartile" students succeed in college. He earned his Ph.D. in 1988 from the University of California, Riverside, where he also earned his master's. At Cal State, San Bernardino he secured his bachelor's degree in 1972.

For a year Clark served as acting associate dean for the School of Humanities in the early 1990s, and was the schedule coordinator for the school, putting together its seven-department class schedule. Clark will serve as interim dean until a permanent replacement is found.
