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## MEXICAN EDUCATOR BUSY STRENGTHENING TIES, SKILLS, READING PROGRAM

A Spanish translation of the Reading Recovery program is one of the key projects being worked on by Jesus Francisco Galas-Fontes, a visiting professor at Cal State who will be spending a few years at the university.

A former dean from the Universidad Autonoma de Baja California (UABC), Galas-Fontes is working with Stan Swartz, director of the Reading Recovery Program in California, and Cristina Gomez-Valdez, also of Cal State's Reading Recovery program. The three educators are assembling a version of Descubriendo La Lectura that will better suit the Mexican school system.

Galas-Fontes is simultaneously building relationships with the Ministry of Education and the National Pedagogical

University in Mexico to ensure their support for the program.

The Reading Recovery program was started in New Zealand in the mid-1970s and was written in English. It was then translated into Maori, the native language of New Zealand, and later Spanish. In sections of the United States the program is being taught both in English and in Spanish. This year there are 1,677 Reading Recovery teachers in the United States who are projected to help 13,416 first-grade children.

There is a great need for this program in Mexico as well as in many other countries, says Galas-Fontes. He is making sure that it comes to Mexico as soon as possible. His wife, Magdalena, is studying to become a teacher-leader, so that she will be able to train teachers in Mexico in the

application of the Reading Recovery program.

Also the liaison for 14 UABC faculty members, who are working on their master's degrees at the university, Galas-Fontes is assisting faculty from Cal State with mentoring his UABC colleagues. He teaches one of the classes that is required for the master's program.

In addition to his work here, Galas-Fontes is attending Claremont Graduate School to obtain his doctoral degree in education and is helping his son adapt to American elementary school. He plans on staying in the San Bernardino area for at least another two years to finish his studies and aid the faculty from Mexicali in theirs.

When he returns to Mexicali, he will take an active part in establishing the Reading Recovery program in Mexico.



### EARTH DAY CELEBRATES A 25-YEAR HABIT

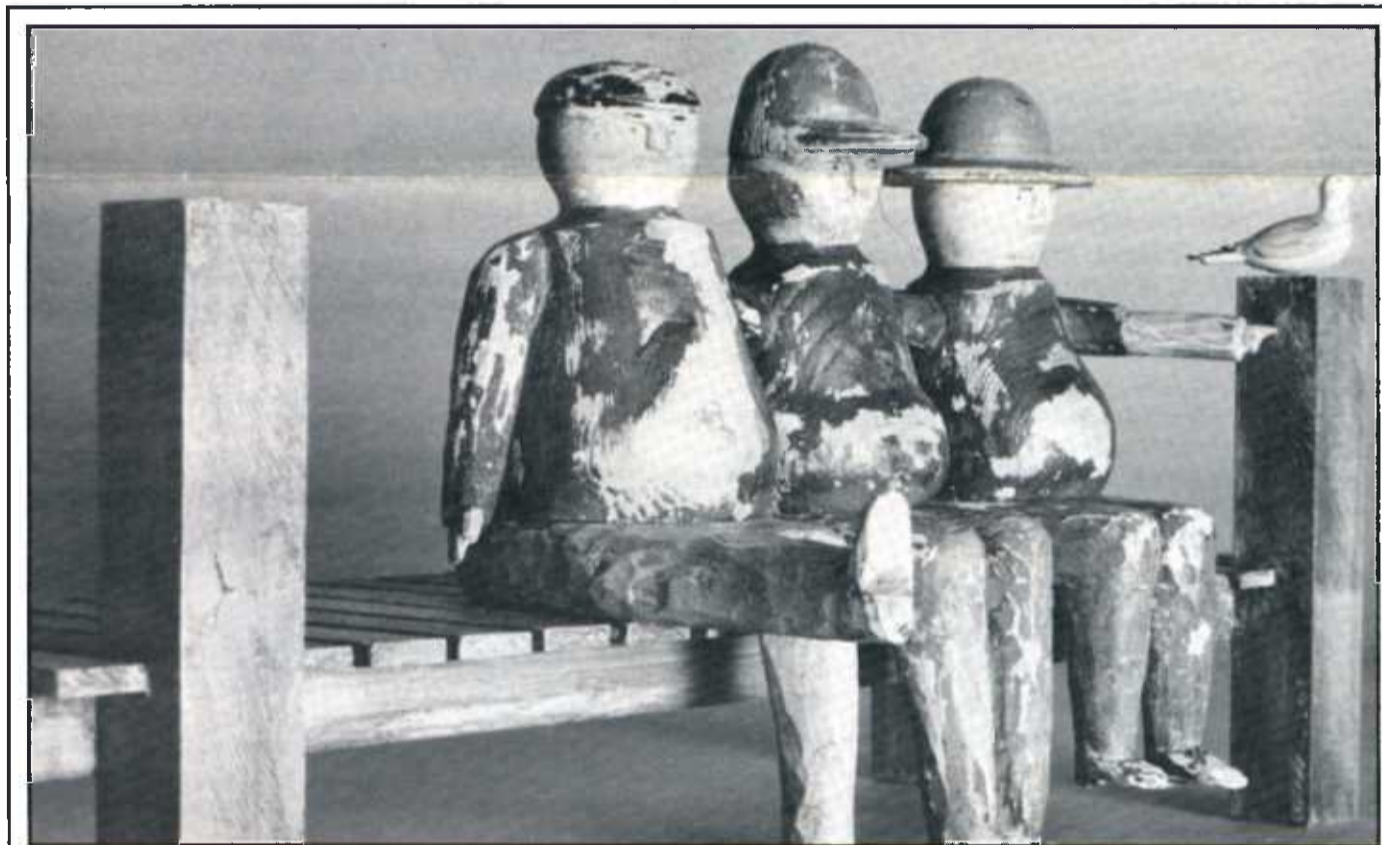

## A Summary of Faculty Development Activities

### Writing Across the Curriculum Seminar Offered to Faculty

Two English Department faculty, Edward M. White, a national authority on writing, and Carol Haviland, are offering a 10-session seminar focusing on teaching and using writing in upper-division classes during the spring quarter. The seminar is sponsored by the Office of Undergraduate Studies in cooperation with each of the five schools. The program, organized by Dean Charles Martin, will assist faculty in modifying courses to reflect a strong writing component.

Currently 13 faculty are participating in the program. Participants were nominated by their respective deans and will be either preparing a 495 syllabus or a syllabus for a class with a purposeful writing component. This will include sequencing of writing assignments for presentation and discussion in the final session of the seminar. Seminar topics include Theory and Practice, Using Writing in Teaching, Developing Writing Assignments, Classroom Teaching (Grammar and Sentence Issues) and Making Revision Part of Writing (Using Portfolios).

This faculty development seminar represents an important part of developing "writing across the curriculum." Plans are underway to offer the program again during the 1995-96 academic year. Faculty interested in participating should request information through their dean.

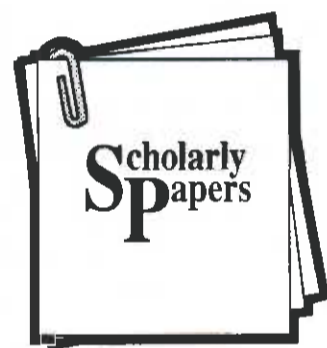

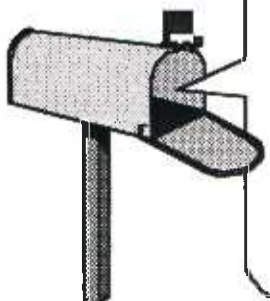

#### ABSTRACTS OF RESEARCH IN PROGRESS

### Grocery Shopping Behavior: A Comparison of Involved & Uninvolved Consumers

Grocery shopping is an on-going and essential activity and has been a favored topic of researchers for several decades. Studies have examined store choice, attention to advertising and point-of-purchase information, couponing, price sensitivity and the attendant consumer decision processes. However, little attention has been given to the relationship between the shopper and the activity, particularly to self-relevance or involvement with grocery shopping activity. An empirical investigation was developed to determine women's grocery shopping involvement, smart shopping description and grocery shopping characteristics, such as patterns of grocery shopping, use of newspaper advertisements and clipping coupons, and the importance of price and economy in acquiring grocery products for the family consumption including, the readiness to switch brands and/or stock up when items are on sale. The sample was comprised of 173 women who returned a completed mail survey to examine these variables. The results extend the research and provide support in the areas of involvement and grocery shopping decision-making styles.

# A NOTE FROM HUMAN RESOURCES



## OPEN ENROLLMENT

The 1995 open enrollment for PERS Health and related CSU plans will be held May 1-May 31. Eligible employees may enroll, add family members, or change carriers during this period. Employees may enroll also in the Flex Cash plan during this time.

Note that there are several changes during this new period of coverage.

- New 17-month period of coverage effective Aug. 1-Dec. 31.
- Safeguard Dental added. PMI Dental no longer offered.
- Expansion of out-of-state coverage for Kaiser, PERSCare, PERSChoice, Aetna and Maxicare.
- CaliforniaCare no longer offered.

## CSU Contributions and Monthly Premiums

The monthly premiums for the individual medical plans have been established for the 1995/96 contract year effective Aug. 1-Dec. 31. The employer contribution for employees in units 1, 2, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and retirees has been determined as indicated below. The contribution by the employer for employees in units 3, 4 and those who are non-represented (Management/Confidential) currently is unknown. Therefore, these employees are urged to consider the "worst case" employee cost shown. You will be informed of the final employer contribution rate as soon as it has been determined.

### Safeguard Dental

Effective Aug. 1, Safeguard Dental will replace the coverage previously offered by PMI. Those employees currently covered by PMI will be transferred to the Safeguard plan. If your current dentist is also a Safeguard dentist, you will remain with that dentist. If your current dentist is not a Safeguard dentist, you will be assigned a dentist based on your zip code area. If you would like to select a dentist prior to having one assigned to you, you may do so during this open enrollment period by contacting the Human Resources Office.

### CaliforniaCare

CaliforniaCare will no longer be offered. Those employees currently covered by CaliforniaCare must enroll in a new plan during the open enrollment period. Failure to do so will result in loss of medical coverage.
